little more than 15 years ago, 1 walked into the office of the Newark Post to start the next phase of my career.

There was an air of excitement as we launched the New Castle Business Ledger, now the Delaware Business Ledger.

Five years earlier, I had arrived in Delaware as Editor of the Delaware Business Review, a strug-

gling weekly **Rainey** newspaper. With the help of a dedicated staff,

we managed to turn around the Review, despite running head-on into a steep recession.

The desire to seek other challenges led Gene Schwenk, DBR's advertising manager, and myself to join Chesapeake Publishing, which was seeing success with Business Ledgers serving small markets. Over the years, we shared space with The Post and witnessed the highs and lows that come with publishing monthly and weekly

newspapers under one roof. The monthly Ledger clawed its way through a crowded market to take a leadership position, thanks to strong support from the com-pany, most notably Jim Streit, publisher of the Post, who took on the same role at the Ledger.

I had little direct involve-ment in the Post, which has had the great fortune to be have been led by a number of dedicated editors over the

## More to come from **Delaware Does More**

elaware Does More announced that the initiative gathered more than 340,000 pounds of food and more than \$300,000 for Delawareans facing immediate basic needs.

This announcement was made at a conference held at the Food Bank of Delaware's Newark location. Speakers included Senator Tom Carper, Representative Mike Castle, and Lt. Governor Matt Denn.

"The greatest source of joy is not from what we get, it's from what we give," Carper said. Carper was speaking to Natalie Ginsberg, Elizabeth Imhoff, and Rachel and Jeffrey Carlson ---- children who ran a food drive in their Newark neighborhood. They collected 979 pounds of food on a 20-degree day in November, using their wooden wagons.

Delaware Does More was a statewide collabo-ration, initiated by the Food Bank of Delaware and United Way of Delaware, to help with growing food, shelter, and utility assistance needs. To date, more than 320,000 pounds of food have been distributed to food closets statewide. More than 675 individuals have been assisted with critical



The Knights of Columbus held a special banquet to present awards to police officers for outstanding actions and job performance. The semi-annual banquet honored two officers from the past two quarters and the awardees for the winter banquet were Dylan Wiggins and Cpl. Blake Potocki. Recently, the organization honored the two Newark Police officers for their service.

Dylan Wiggins was off-duty and exercising in Handloff Park when he recognized a suspect in a recent robbery walking in the area with another person. This dangerous suspect had escaped arrest after a lengthy foot chase during a robbery the previous week. Officer Wiggins contacted on duty officers and followed the suspect; providing updates to fellow officers about his and the suspect's location. The suspect eventually detected police presence and fled on foot. On-duty officers and Officer Wiggins pursued the suspect until he was apprehended. This is a suspect who at the time was considered dangerous enough that

was considered dangerous enough that had he been located in a building or house the Emergency Response Team (SWAT) would have been activated. Cpl. Blake Potocki was on duty late last year when a Maryland State Police trooper was pursuing a vehicle in an unmarked police car without backup. Officer Potocki recognized the state trooper needed backup and the state trooper needed backup and immediately joined the pursuit. He exhibited calm demeanor, provided clear and concise radio communications, and displayed above average driving skills during the high speed chase. During the pursuit, they headed southbound in northbound traffic lanes. Officer Potocki put public safety first while following the trooper by driving in southbound lanes. When the suspect crashed their vehicle into a sign, he was the first to arrive on the sign, he was the hist to arrive on the scene because the Maryland trooper was hindered by traffic. He par-ticipated in the arrest with the help of Delaware State Police troopers which had arrived at the scene as the suspect crashed his car. The suspect was charged with 39 counts of both criminal and traffic charges, many of which were felonies.





The appearance of "Preauthorized" amounts to the power company, the telephone company, the insurance company, and several other businesses I deal with on a monthly or quarterly basis – but no photocopies of my checks, front and/ or back, to these companies appeared any longer. I didn't like it. It was MY account and MY money, so I reasoned that if anybody was going to "Preauthorize," I should; but I hadn't! Nor did I receive notice that the bank would be doing this on my behalf. When I asked about it at the bank, I was very politely and kindly given an explanation that was excellent – if I understood Bankingese. I don't and never will.

(It reminded me of a grouchy CPA whose firm would not make him a full partner until he took a business communications class. He could speak and write Accountingese - but his clients were NOT accountants, so they had little idea of what he was talking about! And they were sore vexed! The young CPA felt aggrieved that he had to become an interpreter and translator of the obvious; to become a full parther he had to endure taking my undergraduate class to redress his clients' failure to understand the one true language – Accountingese!)

Oh, well. I let my banking "situation" go. The nice, polite bankers would never get me to understand Bankingese. And, the Preauthorized charges were indeed for companies I dealt with on a monthly or quarterly basis.

Then one month, Preauthorized entry showed up on my account that I did not recognize - it was cryptically encoded in numbers and letters that made no sense to me. I called my bank. 17 phone calls to people and voice-robots later, I ended up with a representative of another bank! He shunted me off to a representative of still another bank, darkly suggesting that somebody was up to something nefarious at my account's expense! I called the third bank and met with Bankingese!

housing or utility expenses. Food donations were col-lected by the Food Bank of Delaware, which distributed the food to agencies throughout New Castle, Kent and Sussex counties.

"The economy was causing working families to go hungry, and overburdened agencies were unable to help," said Patricia Beebe, CEO of the Food Bank of Delaware. "Delaware Does More helped us to meet that critical need and feed those families."

Monetary donations were allocated by a committee

convened by United Way of Delaware. One hundred percent of the funds collected went to select agencies statewide



## **Begleiter honored**

elaware Press Association (DPA), an affiliate of the National Federation of Press Women (NFPW), recently named Ralph J. Begleiter the 2009 DPA Communicator of Achievement. Begleiter, Distinguished Journalist in Residence at the University of Delaware (UD) as well as the Rosenberg Professor of Communication, was recognized for bringing more than 30 years of broadcast journalism experience to classrooms for students interested in international affairs and broadcast journalism. Additionally, he directs the university's outstanding annual "Global Agenda" speaker series on international issues.

During two decades as CNN's world affairs correspondent, Begleiter was based in the network's Washington Bureau, writing and producing thousands of news reports and programs that aired worldwide. He was the network's most widely-traveled reporter, logging nearly two million miles while visiting some 95 countries on 6 continents.

At CNN during the 1980s and 1990s, he covered U.S. diplomacy, interviewed count-less world leaders, hosted a global public affairs program called "Global View," and co-anchored CNN's prestigious "International Hour." In 1998, he wrote and anchored a 24part series on the Cold War. He covered many historic events at the end of the 20th century, including virtually every highlevel Soviet/Russian-American meeting; the Persian Gulf Crisis in 1990-91; Middle East Peace efforts; and many UN and NATO summit meetings. In

recent years he has hosted the Foreign Policy Association's annual "Great Decisions" television discussion series, aired on Public Broadcasting System stations.

Although Begleiter has received numerous awards for outstanding coverage of politics and diplomacy around the world, he says, "What's most important in a career that has taken me from the remotest corners of the earth to the most sophisticated cities of the world still boils down to the people with whom I've worked over the years. Photographers and producers, other reporters, dip-lomats, politicians and military men and women. It's those people who remain constants, amid all the political shuffling

and changes of assignments. At Delaware, Begleiter teaches undergraduate cours-es in "Media and Politics," "Broadcast News," "Crisis News," "History of TV News Documentary," and "Global Media & International Politics." But the former globetrotting journalist also offers special courses with the world as his classroom.

## Athey seeks 4th term as representative on City Council

David Athey, who is completing his third term as District 4 Representative on Newark City Council, has filed with the City Secretary's office to seek a fourth term.

In a release, Athey cites his experience gained in the six years

he has been in office as a reason for his decision He headed City Council oversight of the development of Newark's Comprehensive Development Plan. This included facilitating council workshops to gather statements from residents and work through implementation

challenges. During the budget process in December, he helped craft a compromise that enabled funding for three additional police officers while maintaining competitive property tax and utility fee levels. He also led the initiative which resulted in an increase in speeding

fines as part of an overall program to improve pedestrian and bicyclist safety.

Athey believes the biggest challenge will be providing the services Newarkers have come to expect within budgetary constraints. This will necessitate a detailed analysis of revenue sources and expenditures as well as the development of a long-term sustainable financial plan. While he acknowledges financial pressures may be a limitation, there are numerous action items from the Comprehensive Plan to be put into practice including environmental components of subdivision regulations and affordable housing programs. Finally, using his engineering background and public administration education, he plans to work with the City Manager in improving infrastructure maintenance and rehabilitation programs.
