Responding officers, emergency services personnel, and paramedics found the victim, Shirley June Hollins, who was 64 years old at the time of her death, in a bathroom.



Williams, a longtime administrator in the sprawling district that includes Newark and portions of Pike Creek, Bear-Glasgow and the city of Wilmington. However, Williams faced an uphill battle for the post, which for the past two decades has mainly been filled by candidates from outside the district.

Lyles succeeds Lillian Lowery, who is the Secretary of Education for Delaware. She will face continued budget challenges brought on by the state's nearly \$800 million shortfall in the next fiscal year. School districts derive much of their funding from state aid, with the remainder coming from property taxes. Under Lowery, the district returned to financial health, following a reported budget gap

from her successor, Joseph Wise. Wise claimed the gap was largely manufactured by critics and by a complex formula for state aid for Delaware public schools. Lyles is a resident of Staten Island,

Newark Dodge to remain a Chrysler dealership

despite being listed late last week as one of the dealers on the chopping block.

The dealer survived with Tewark Dodge will a unique one-dealer, two-location status, due to its high sales volume.

Chrysler typically opted to quit selling vehicles to lowvolume stores.

'We were on the list because every dealer is assigned a code and they did eliminate one of our two dealer codes," said

Newark Dodge owner Gary Hendrixson Jr.

Hendrixson said he considers himself lucky because he sold Chrysler, Jeep and Dodge at two locations under two dealer codes, which will allow him to continue selling the three brands at two locations by consolidating them under one code.

"We got tons of calls Friday when the story came out that we were on the list to close," said Newark Dodge Manager Tom Biggs. "We will continue to sell and service Dodge vehicles from our Elkton Road store," he said.

Hendrixson said that so far Newark Dodge ranks first in Delaware in sales volume for Dodge in 2009. The owner operates a separate Chrysler-Jeep dealership on Cleveland Avenue and employs about 100 people between the two locations, automaker.

The long-time Newark dealership spent much of its existence as Rittenhouse Dodge, a long-time family business in the city.

Two other dealers in Delaware are also on the list, C.F. Schwartz Motor Co. and

Hertrich Jeep. Those dealers also offer other auto brands.

Newark Dode is adjacent to Newark City Hall and had hired some employees of the nowclosed Advantage Dodge and Chrysler dealership in nearby Elkton, Md. that had closed earlier for reasons unrelated to the latest move by Chrysler.

Auto companies have been working to cull the number of dealers in recent years, due to the expense of the dealership system. However, state laws have often limited the abiliy of companies to make aggressive moves. Management was also reluctant to confront dealers.

Chrysler has the flexibility to make major changes, due to its Chapter 11 filing that gives management more room to make drastic changes.

Plumbing company owner faces charge

A local plumbing contractor has been charged with damaging a vehicle during an apparent dispute over business dealings.

Last week, Newark Police were dispatched to Superior Building Services, located at 1400 Interchange Blvd., Newark.

Owner Mario Mareno reported that the front windshield of his Ford F350 pickup truck had been smashed and that the truck also received paint and fender damage. Police found a cinder block next to the truck and a business card for Stan Perkoski's Plumbing & Heating tucked into the driver's side window.

During his interview with police, Mareno stated that he and Perkoski had entered into a business deal. Mareno was to build a garage for Perkoski. In an earlier deal, Mareno had already owed the plumber \$9,000 for work done and the purchase of a commercial van. Due to some prob-

lems with permitting, Perkoski cancelled the project, though Mareno had already purchased some trusses for the job. Mareno wrote a check to settle what he owed, and later Perkoski notified Mareno that the check had bounced. Mareno telephoned Perkoski to let him know that he would "take care of it".

According to police, a video surveillance system located outside of Mareno's business showed Perkoski throwing a cinder block at the pickup. The additional damage was caused by the block bouncing off the hood of the truck. The damage is estimated to be \$1,200.

Perkoski is charged with Criminal Mischief/Damage to Property Valued Greater Than \$1,000 But Less Than \$1,500. A warrant is being issued for Perkoski.

Thief breaks into dealership's secured lot

Last Sunday, Porter Chevrolet, located at 414 E. Cleveland Ave., reported that a 2009 Chevy Equinox, parked inside of the secured lot, had had all four of its tires and rims stolen.

An investigation by Newark Police discovered that a section of the fence near McKees Road had been pulled. The front passenger side window of the Chevy was broken and the car's jack had been removed to lift the car. Another jack, from an unknown vehicle, had also been used. There were no fingerprints on either jack and no video surveillance of the scene.

Drunk driver goes wrong way on Main

At approximately 3:30 a.m. on Sunday, a patrol stationed on Main St. in Newark observed a black Jeep Cherokee with New Jersey registration traveling the wrong way. The officers present immediately stopped the vehicle and interviewed the driver, Brandon O'Donnell, 18, from Northfield, N.J. Two other occupants were in the vehicle with O'Donnell.

Upon questioning, O'Donnell stated that he was visiting his brother at the University of Delaware and that he was trying to get home. O'Donnell could not provide police with a current insurance card, though he had several that were expired. Officers detected a smell of alcohol coming from O'Donnell and the vehicle. A search revealed two half-filled bottles of vodka. O'Donnell did not pass the field

sobriety tests he was given and was taken to the police station. After being given an Intoxilyzer test, O'Donnell registered a .141 blood alcohol level.

O'Donnell was charged with Driving Under the Influence, Open Container in a Vehicle, Wrong Way on a One Way Street, and No Proof of Insurance.

The officer separated the two, whereby the 14 year-old threw a punch at the 16 year old, but missed him. The 14 year-old was restrained by the officer and asked to leave the classroom. However, he resisted and was removed to the hallway. The 14 year-old continued to forcibly resist the officer until a stern warning was issued by the patrolman, where upon he complied with verbal orders.



UD trustees appoint panel to buy Chrysler site

The University of Delaware Board of Trustees voted to give an ad hoc committee the authority to purchase the Chrysler site.

Appointed were trustees Howard Cosgrove, Gil Sparks, Bobby Fischer, Tom Burns, Chris Schell and Scott Green.

The board stated that it considers the acquisition to be "of great importance to the University and beneficial to the City of Newark and State of Delaware."

The Chrysler plant is not part of the Chapter 11 bankruptcy filing of the automaker. However, the financial problems of the company have complicated asset sales.

Other bidders have considered the site, but troubled financial markets have apparently left UD as the best hope when it comes to a plant.

The Trustees also came up with a funding plan for a new Interdisciplinary Science and Engineering Building, which will house laboratory and teaching space for programs in both the College of Arts and Sciences and the College of Engineering.

A planning budget of \$7 million was approved. Costs for the 150,000 square foot building are expected to be \$130 million with funding coming from UD operations and restricted gift support. The building is planned to be finished in 2013. UD President Patrick Harker and the Board agreed that the new building is a "No. 1 priority" and that the university must make a commitment to not falling behind in providing quality facilities for its researchers and educators.

An announcement was made that the incoming freshman class for the 2009-2010 school year will be 3,858 students, the largest class in the school's history. Delaware residents will comprise 1,202 of these freshmen, an increase of 27.3% from last year's class. The incoming class has an average 3.54 GPA on the 4.0 system.

President Harker stated that the Class of 2009 has donated their gift to the school: a collection of solar panels that will allow the university to generate 6 megawatts of power. The president further emphasized the commitment of UD to become a leader in alternative power

Edgar Johnson, who has stepped down after serving for 25 years as Athletic Director, was recognized for his many years of service. He was awarded a plaque given to him from Student Council President Teagan Gregory.

Finally, Board Chairman Howard Cosgrove will be stepping down from his position in June. Cosgrove will remain on the Board. His successor was not announced.





UD president's pay package remains lucrative

The University of Delaware's practice of keeping the compensation of its presidents in the top tier among the nation's universities continued when Patrick Harker was hired.

The Review student newspaper reported Harker earned \$810,603 during his first year as president, which began in 2007.

That ranks No. 3 among the nation's universities, according

to the newspaper.

Harker will be taking a 10 percent cut in his salary this year, due to cost cutting by the university.

David Brond, vice president of the office of communications and marketing at UD, said the figure includes all compensation for Harker, including use of the president's home on campus.

According to Brond, university trustees set the compensation package based on Harker's accomplishments as dean of the internationally known Wharton (Business) School at the University of Pennsylvania and his progress in meeting goals that include faculty recruitment and admissions targets. He said the president's base compensation of \$640,000 compares favorably with other universities.

UD is expected to see a record freshman class this fall, with a higher percentage of Delawareans and higher average test scores.

The Review obtained the information from an IRS 990 formed filed by the university. Former UD President David Roselle ranked as one of the highest paid university presi-

dents for many years and gained notice with a more than \$2 million in compensation during his final year in the post. The figure was based on compensation he earned during his long tenure as president that was to be paid at retirement.

The University of Delaware has long been tight-lipped about financial matters.

However, Brond said UD is working to increase transparency and released information on details of Harker's compensation package.

No information on current salaries was released.

They will grow in little or no light, Ruppenthal says; if you prefer to green them up just expose the plants to an hour or so of sunlight.

He uses sprouts fresh in salads and stir fries and juices the wheatgrass.

Make the most of mushrooms:

Look to dark cabinets, the basement or other dark areas that you might not immediately think of as productive growing areas.

Old plastic bottles:

Ruppenthal grew a thriving bush bean in an old 2-liter plastic soda bottle cut in half and filled with soil. The bush produced well with the bottle positioned in diffuse light. "I got a crop from it," he says.
