



FEVER IS EASILY CARRIED

Germs Can Be Transmitted In Epidemic

"The germ of scarlet fever can be carried from one person to another by means of toys, books, bed clothing, etc., which makes the dis-ease hard to handle in the event of an epidemic." Dr. Paul A. Kee-ney, staff member of the Pennsyl-vania Department of Health, said today.

Scarlet fever is highly contaging and is caused by certain spece germs. The disease is charterized by a sudden onset of fever miting, inflammation of the

direct contact as are measles and chickenpox.

"Serious epidemics of scarlet fever have been the result of infecting a milk supply with the organism. Healthy carriers play a large part in spreading the disease. By healthy carriers is meant persons who carry the germ that causes the disease and can spread the germs by droplet spray, although they themselves do not have the disease. This type of carrier is only found among people who have been in actual contact with a case of scarlet fever recently.

"Missed" case also play a part in the spread of the disease. Missed' cases are those in which the symptoms are so mild that a diagnosis of sore throat is made while the case is actually scarlet fever.






