Newark Public Schools Faced With Acute Shortage of Space

Newark public school officials an-nounced this week that due to the present and expected increase in pop-ulation within the Newark school dis-trict, it is quite possible that a portion of the all the school of the control of the school o

ulation within the Newark school district, it is quite possible that a portion of the elementary school will operate on a half-day basis next year.

Wilmer E. Shue, district superintendent, pointed out that the only other alternative is to reopen the Defaware Avenue elementary building, adding that this is not a satisfactory solution in the minds of many.

He stated that in the event the split day becomes necessary, half of the elementary students will attend school in the morning and half in the afternoon, Those students that are found to be in need of additional schooling will return to school during that part of the day in which they do not ordinarily attend for special coaching.

Mr. Shue pointed out that present indications are that there will be approximately ten classes more than can be handled with present facilities by next fall. If the new Brookside development grows as fast as present plans indicate, then this figure will be increased.

It was pointed out that plans for the Brookside development include provisions for a school in the area, and Mr. Shue stated that when the need becomes apparent, it is likely that no time will be lost in starting construction of the building.
