It was established to mark those who have conferred honor upon their Alma Mater by distinguished scholarship and exemplary character as undergraduates in engineering, and to foster a spirit of liberal culture in the engineering colleges of America. The society has conducted a faculty rating poll, and has given informal talks to local high school groups interested in engineering. Members are elected from the top eighth of the junior engineering students and the top fifth of the senior engineering students. Although women may not be elected members of Tau Beta Pi, those meeting the requirements set forth for regular membership are awarded a woman's badge in recognition of their achievements. This year, Grace Schulze, a member of the senior engineering class, was awarded the woman's badge.
