## NEWARK COUNCIL IN MONTHLY SESSION

**Town Election To Be Held; Contest In Eastern District**

The Newark Town Council held their regular monthly meeting in the council chambers this week with Mayor Charles C. Hubert presiding. Other councilmen present were Norris N. Wright, Herman Wolfson, Norman E. Battersby and George E. Ramsey.

Town Treasurer, George E. Ramsey reported a cash balance on hand as of February 28 of \$65,917.99; receipts for the month of March amounted to \$17,667.77, making a total of \$83,585.76; disbursements for the month were \$11,448.12, leaving a cash balance March 31 of \$72,137.64 plus War Bonds amounting to \$20,000.00 which gives the town a total cash worth of \$92,137.64.

Electric receipts for the month were \$1,182 and the receipts for water were \$1,849.44. Interest on U. S. Treasury bonds amounted to \$43.64.

Open-up days for the collection of rubbish and trash were set on Wednesday and Thursday, April 18 and 19.

Then Alderman John H. Rumer, reported cash collected for the month of March amounted to \$308.00.

Robert S. Gallaher and Frank Luttrell were named as election officials for the town election which will be held on Tuesday, April 10 from 1 to 6 p. m. in the afternoon. It was noted at the meeting that only one contest was expected at the election which was in the Eastern District where William H. Swan has filed as a candidate in opposition to Norman E. Battersby who is seeking reelection.

Chief of Police William H. Cunningham reported that the department had made 45 arrests during the month of March, classified as follows: threatening bodily harm, throwing litter on the streets, loitering on the streets, permitting an unlicensed person to operate a motor vehicle, and operating a license, one arrest for speeding and failing to stop sign, two arrests for each reckless driving and assault with a deadly weapon, four arrests for disorderly conduct, six arrests for public drunkenness, and one for disorderly conduct.

**Mrs. Webber Announces Collection Depots**

Newark's participation in the United National Clothing Collection officially opened this week following a meeting of the general committee called by Harry L. Bonham, who has been appointed general chairman by Mayor Charles C. Hubert.

Mr. Bonham is assisted by the following local committee: E. Newman Rose, Dr. C. Robert Kase, Mrs. M. M. Daugherty, Mrs. G. Cuthbert Webber, George M. Haney, Fred C. Evans, and John H. Rumer.

Dr. Kase has been named chairman of the special events committee and will be assisted by Mrs. Alex D. Cobb, Louis Handloff, and M. James Parsons. Mrs. Webber is in charge of local collections and Mrs. Daugherty will supervise rural collections.

Mr. Haney has been placed in charge of sorting, packing, and shipping the clothing and Mr. Rumer is handling publicity.

Newark's three mills, the Curtis Paper Company, the National Vulcanized Fibre Company, and the Continental-Diamond Fibre Company, will handle their own collections, as well as the churches and service clubs.

Mrs. Webber announced that the general contributions of clothing for the drive can be left at the Newark post-office, the State Theatre, and the Newark OPA office, and clothing also may be left at the Old Press of Kells building, corner of South College Avenue and West Park Place, Monday through Friday from 6:30 to 8 p. m.

The first of a series of special events during the drive will be a clothing collection party at the Newark Country Club on Saturday night.

## 6 FIRES IN WEEK

Two more fires were put out on Saturday, the first call was at 1:30 p. m. when the fire company was called to put out a grass fire on South Chapel Street along the Pennsylvania Railroad and at 4:18 P. M. a second fire was extinguished on the Newark-Ogletown Road.
