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DELAWARE FARM FRONT THIS WEEK

O.P.A. Announces Extra Gas For Home Gardeners

All Delaware turkey growers are invited to attend a meeting on turkey production at the Midland Grange Hall (Georgetown) on April 9 at 8 o'clock in the evening. Chief speaker will be H. Kaufman, poultryman for the Pennsylvania Agricultural Extension Service.

Extra gasoline rations will be issued to home gardeners again this year. Travel necessary to cultivate their gardens, OPA has announced. Applications will be accepted by local War Relocation and Ration Boards beginning March 26. Conditions the gardener must meet to qualify for these extra rations are virtually the same as for the last two years, with the additional limitation that gardeners must not be more than 15 miles from the gardener's home or place of work.

When more than one car will be used for a side-sharing arrangement, all applications for special gasoline rations must be presented to ration boards at the same time and the total ration for all vehicles in groups may not exceed the limit of 300 miles.

Effective March 19, 1945, public auctions of Reconstruction Finance Corporation or its subsidiaries conducted under auspices of the War Food Administration will be under price control regardless of the value of any item or group of items and regardless of particular commodity exemption previously applying, according to OPA.

To aid poultry processors, including small handlers serving civilians, WFA has relaxed restrictions applicable to processors under WFO 123. Through amendments effective March 18, order restrictions no longer apply to eviscerators processing 3000 pounds or less of chickens and turkeys each calendar week, except that they may preserve such poultry only by refrigeration. Eviscerators processing between 3000 and 10,000 pounds per week must establish quotas based on average weekly production in 1944, and are otherwise relieved from restrictions. Eviscerators producing more than 10,000 pounds a week can withhold 10,000 pounds a week of their set-aside, though it is now 100 per cent.

1944 Victory Gardens in towns and cities averaged about 20 by 25 feet — about a third of area recommended — is desirable to furnish fresh foods for the average family, plus surplus for eating and storing. If the 1945 garden cannot be larger, it can be made extra good to produce more food per space.

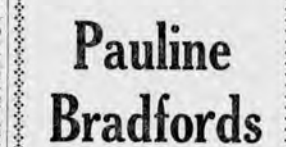

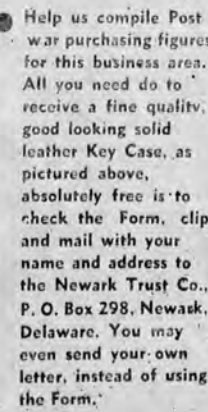

WOMEN'S COLLEGE ALUMNAE MEETING

Dr. E. C. Byam Tells About Early Mexican Craftsmanship

The Newark Chapter of the Women's College Alumnae Association met at the home of Mrs. Ralph Jones, Townsend Road on Tuesday, March 27.

Dr. E. C. Byam, Head of the Modern Language Department at the University of Delaware, gave an informal talk on "The Archaeological Ruins of Mithra and Monte Alban."

These fascinating sites, which are near Oaxaca City, Mexico, command attention for their reflections of the degree of civilization attained by Indian races, centuries before the arrival of the Spanish Conquerors.

The interest of Mithra lies in the general architectural beauty of the ruins and the incredibly detailed workmanship in stone.

Monte Alban, apart from its mysterious origin and the significance of the stone inscriptions, is of particular interest by reason of the immensely rich and surprisingly artistic treasure discovered there by Dr. Alfonso Caso, the eminent Mexican Archaeologist, who was excavating a tomb on the day of Dr. Byam's visit.

These treasures include objects of filigreed gold, in silver, turquoise, alabaster, rock crystal, and jade.

Photographs of some of these relics were shown to illustrate the fine craftsmanship, so exquisite that it cannot be duplicated by contemporary artisans.
