Delaware won the second of the series of debates with St. John's College by a unanimous descision. The debate was held in the college oratory on Thursday evening. May phrey, Delaware, 6-3 and 6-2. 11. The question was: Resolved, that the Federal Government should compel every able -bodied male citizen between the ages of 18 and 24 years to take under adebated the affirmative, St. John's Dover. the negative side of the question. The team which represented Delaware College was composed Wm. S. Levey, T. S. Carswell, and W. T. Mitchell; while St. John's was represented by L. J. Miles, J. T. Duke and N. D. Woodward. The judges were Wm. J. H. Cotton, Ph. D., head of the commercial department of the Wilmington High School; Henry M. McCullough, President of the Maryland State Senate, and Charles B. Finley, States Attorney for Cecil county. Dr. K. Roberts Greenfield acted as chairman.

Each speaker was allowed 12 minutes for his opening speech, 3 minutes for his rebuttal. In their opening speeches, the affirmative tried to prove the following points: first, that we are in actual danger of war, and that our present army and navy is too small to meet that danger; second that our present and proposed methods of increase for the army are impractical; and third, that this system would not be opposed to American ideals, but would strengthen morally and physically the men taking part in it. The negative brought forward the following points: first that one year is not sufficient to give a man a thorough military training, and that the only result of the proposed system would be to deprive a man of one year of the most valuable part of his life; second, that the system would be distasteful to the citizens of this country, and would also be a great waste of money; third, that our past history does not warrant such a change, for our armies in the future as well as in the past can always be recruited from volunteers.

Mr. Finley, in announcing the decision of the judges, said that, while they congratulated the St. John's team upon their excellent work, they had decided unanimously in favor of the team representing Delaware College.
