## Continental-Diamond Fibre Co. To Honor Long-Time Employees

107 Employees With Twenty-five or More Years' Service Will Be Presented With Pins At Dinner Tonight

The Continental-Diamond Fibre Company of Newark will hold its first New Year's Reception Dinner tonight at 8:30 p.m. at the New Country Club, honoring 107 employees who have had twenty-five years or more service with the large plant manufacturing company. Charles L. Bonham, of the New York district office, will be the first speaker in view of his 46 years' service. C. P. F. (Cotton) F. Murphy, who served gold pins with diamonds to 77 employees with J. E. Anderson, vice president, making similar presentations to 10 retired old-timers.

Next in longest service is Robert Stewart who joined the company in 1907. Rufus R. Roberts of the Newark office, 1909; Joseph P. Lloyd, District manager, 1910; Scott V. Norris, plant manager of the Haver Corporation, 1909; Earl F. Dawson, advertising manager, 1908; and William H. Ayle, fibre tube department, 1910.

On the feminine side, Mildred Armstrong, advertising department; E. Lavina By, assistant secretary; Ann M. Galt, secretary to the sales manager; and Alice M. Blackson, technical control secretary, will receive 23 year pins.

Later in the week service pins will be distributed by plant officials to 32 employees with over 20 years of service, 62 with 15, 104 with 10, and 143 with 5. A total of 424 out of the entire plant personnel of 924 will receive recognition. Plant manager, T. Russell Sisk, who came with the company in 1924, commented that this is an unusually good employment record and a credit to the industry and the community.

At the head table will be Timothy F. Murphy, president; J. E. Anderson, vice president; Clarence H. Hopkins, treasurer; Harry K. Collins, director of manufacturing; Harry A. Dextor, sales manager; Walter Tracey, director of industrial relations; T. Russell Sisk, general plant manager; James B. Hays, public relations counsel; Harry L. Bonham, a former secretary of the company and one of the original officers of the old Continental Fibre Company, the parent company established in 1893, will be present.

Other guests include Dr. J. E. Anderson, mayor of Newark; Richard W. Hays, chairman of the Newark Board of Health; president of the Newark Chamber of Commerce; Dr. E. H. Ruffin, plant physician; Dr. E. R. Winkler, Jr., personnel director; Virginia Winkler and Marie Crookshank were selected as hostesses.

The possibility of a parade to call attention to the week set for the campaign is being considered, and it is planned to bring the matter to the attention of local residents by means of posters and window displays. Special inspections for sanitary code violations and fire hazards are planned by committees under Dr. John R. Downes, city health commissioner, and Elmer J. Ellison, fire chief.

Others at the initial meeting last week represented the Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, Kiwanis Club, Rotary Club, Soroptimist Club, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and Newark schools.

## Red Cross Officials Get Initial Report From Blitz Canvass

Campaign Chairman Urges All Volunteer Solicitors To Renew Efforts

G. Collier Webster, local Red Cross Fund Campaign chairman, expressed satisfaction this week with initial reports from last Sunday's blitz canvass of Newark homes, but at the same time urged the volunteer solicitors not to allow the drive to lag.

According to campaign officials, most of the volunteers reported that their contacts, on the whole, had been fairly successful. Although each worker completed a large number of calls in this blitz canvass, many follow-up calls will be necessary to finish the assignment.

Mr. Webster recommended this week that each solicitor finish his or her district calls promptly so that a definite accounting may be given as soon as possible to show the progress made in the local campaign.

Partial reports so far reveal that a total of about \$1500 has been collected. "These incomplete reports are very encouraging," stated the campaign chairman, "and I believe that we will reach our goal provided there is no relaxing on the part of the local solicitors."

The treasurer for the Newark drive, R. P. Watkins, of the Farmers Trust Company, and Mr. Webster were on hand at the local headquarters located in the New Castle County Health Office on Sunday evening to receive reports and cash from the team captains. ## Foster Will Oppose Coverdale In Only City Election Contest

Mayor Johnson, Frank Durnall, Carl Rankin Will Be Unopposed In April Election; Saturday Is Last Registration Day

With the passing of the filing season, the last Saturday it was possible for city officials to file only one voting district will produce a contest in the coming municipal election. This will take place in the Eastern district where Thomas Foster has filed to the post of city councilman in opposition to the incumbent, William Coverdale.

Mayor Wallace Johnson is unopposed in his bid for a second term as chief executive in the city administration. Two other incumbents, Frank Durnall of the middle district and Carl Rankin of the western district, will also be unopposed in their bid for another term.

Thomas Foster, who is seeking his first office in the city government, is plant manager for the National Vulcanized Fibre Company and vice-president of the Newark Chamber of Commerce. His opponent, William Coverdale, is completing his first term of office in the Newark city council.

It is reported that one other candidate filed for the post of councilman from the middle district in opposition to Durnall but the petition lacked the required ten signatures of qualified voters. It was reported that only eight of the signers had previously registered for the municipal election. In order to be qualified to sign the nomination petition, voters must have registered on one of the designated registration days prior to March 3.

This Saturday will be the last opportunity for city voters to register before the April election. So far only 622 of the approximately 3000 persons eligible in the community have taken the trouble to register. City officials hope that a last minute rush on Saturday will find most of the remaining eligible voters registering.

It has been repeatedly pointed out that all prior registration fees are void under the terms of the new city charter and that previous voters also will have to register in order to take part in the election on April 6.

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

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

## Growing Pains Aren't New

Twenty-five years ago the residents of Newark were faced with pretty much the same municipal problems that confront the city today.

In the March 2, 1927, issue of The Newark Post it was reported that three bills had been submitted to the Legislature calling for the extension of the town limits, the building of sewer, water, and electric lines within the extended limits, and permission to borrow \$100,000 to finance these projects.

In an editorial concerning the new bills, Mrs. Everett C. Johnson, then editor of The Post, agreed with the intent of the bills but "deplored the fact that the residents of a town feel it in their power to include the residents of outlying districts in the jurisdiction of the town, without the formality of first publishing the facts of the case, and calling a town meeting, where there may be open discussion of the matter."

Things have changed in Newark since 1927. The people of Newark, under the provisions of the new city charter, have the right to approve or disapprove the annexation of any additional area into the city limits by means of a referendum. It is also necessary now that a majority of the residents of the area to be annexed vote in favor of coming into the city.

With regards to the borrowing of money to finance new utility facilities, the property owners of the city must approve of the expenditure and the method of financing, through a referendum.

Such a referendum is scheduled to take place here in the near future. Under the provisions of the city charter, City Council must notify the city property owners of the amount of money to be borrowed, the purpose for which it is needed, the manner of securing the money, and set a date for a public hearing at which time all persons of interest shall be given an opportunity to express their views.

Following that, the Council shall set a date for a special election at which time all property owners shall be entitled to one vote, and each corporation owning property in the city shall be entitled to one vote. A majority of those voting at such a referendum will decide whether or not the bonds shall be issued.

Therefore, things have changed in Newark in the past twenty-five years. First, the people of Newark, and not the Legislature, decide on such matters, and second, the amount instead of being \$100,000 is more likely to be in the neighborhood of \$750,000.

For some time now, professional planners have been studying the effects of population and area increase in the city of Newark and what can be expected in the foreseeable future. The result of these studies has been definite recommendations with regard to public utility facilities. The people of Newark have little choice, for we have grown to the point that to neglect this increase in utilities would be sheer ignorance and lack of foresight.

When the time comes for the residents to vote it is inconceivable that they will do other than approve the bond issue. There may be differences of opinion as to the size and type of facilities to be installed; ways and means of financing the project; but it is hard to imagine any intelligent citizen not realizing that these improvements in public utilities are a must.
