Hi Enrlich is/ getting together the necessary date to apply for lmagetion visas for himself and his Ramily for subsission to the American Consul General in Aavana. His file is not yet complete, but I thought that perhaps you bight be willing to mention his case at the same time as that of $4 r$. Van de Maele, and tell the Consul that he will receive the data shortly.

Ner. Fhrlich's application will include his wife, Mrs. Corina Fhrifch, his aughter Nuria, and ultimately his nephew Hans Wendel, the eldest son of wrs. Lilli Wendel, whom you were kind enough to help recently.

I shall be extremely grateful for your kind Intervention in the above cases.

I received your three letters of January loth and 16 th, and wish to thank you for the interesting information contained therein. I am planning to go to Washington next reek.
