## Scouts To Canvass Newark Welfare Gift Basket Food

Contributions Of Canned, Packaged Foods To Be Sought Saturday In House-To-House Calls For Newark Welfare Committee Christmas Baskets For Local Needy Families

Local Boy Scouts will call at homes in the Newark area Saturday to collect contributions of canned and other food items for distribution by the Newark Area Welfare Committee in Christmas baskets to needy, local families on Christmas Eve.

For more than a quarter century, the Newark Welfare Committee has provided Christmas baskets for distress cases, and this year a record total of 110 baskets was distributed.

Mr. J. Harvey Dickey, chairman of the Newark Welfare Committee, said that the committee's annual project contains a chicken, potatoes, sugar, flour, canned goods, bread, oil, and toys for families in need.

Dickey again is chairman of the Newark Welfare Committee's annual project. He is assisted by C. Lambert, administrative assistant, State Department of Welfare, and newly-elected chairman of the Newark Welfare Committee, who will be in charge of the food collections.

Christmas basket project is dependent upon the success of food collection," Lambert said. "It is more than ever for these baskets, the spirit of good will, and the spirit of Christmas happiness with them," he concluded.

Newark Area Welfare Committee provides year-round welfare services to needy families. Medicine for invalids applied, and through cooperation with the school nurse, dentures were provided for needy children. Fuel and clothing were provided where necessary.

Police To Utilize Space Occupied For 10 Years By Local Welfare Group

Newark City Council has requested that the Thrift Shop vacate its present location over the police department by Dec. 31 so that the second floor can be utilized by the police.

The Thrift Shop will be open as usual on Dec. 9 and 16 from 10 to 3 during the day and from 7 to 9 in the evening. It will be closed Dec. 23.

All clothing on consignment may be withdrawn on Dec. 9, 16, 23, or 29 between 10 and 3. The shop will be open for withdrawals only on Dec. 27, 28 and 29. All articles not withdrawn will be sold on Dec. 30 at a final rummage sale.

City council is still trying to find new quarters for the Thrift Shop. The Newark Welfare Committee can continue with this fund-raising project.

Income derived from clothing sold in the shop is important to the continuation of emergency aid for needy families—food, clothing, medical and dental care.

This year the committee has pledged \$300 toward dental care for children recommended by the school hygienist or nurse.

The Thrift Shop has been located over the police department for 10 years.

Mr. Martin will sing a special number, and a carol song will precede the cantata presentation.

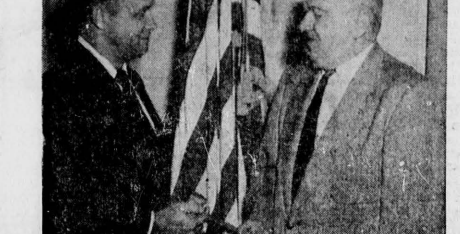

## High School Bond Issue Vote To Be Conducted On Saturday

Final Of Two Public Meetings Scheduled For Tonight With School Board Members Explaining Need For New Building To Avoid Double Sessions At Secondary Level

The second of two public meetings concerning Saturday's referendum to decide upon construction of a new senior high school, will be held at Central Junior High School tonight at 8 o'clock, with William Cooke, vice-president of the Newark Board of Education as meeting moderator.

The school board's proposal for a new senior high school will be presented by Frank Dianich, a member of the board.

This meeting, along with the meeting Thursday, is to provide citizens of the Newark special school district opportunity to ask questions regarding Saturday's referendum.

The Newark Board of Education is proposing to build a new high school to meet the needs of continued enrollment growth at the secondary level.

The new high school building is expected to house 1,200 pupils at the corner of Salem Church and Chopin roads.

Saturday's Vote

The referendum will decide upon a bond issue of \$1,200,000 to be matched by \$1,800,000 in state funds. This bond issue is to be retired over a period of 20 years.

Residents having questions regarding this proposal are urged to attend tonight's meeting.

Voting will be conducted Saturday, Dec. 10, between the hours of 1 and 8 p.m. at all eight elementary schools in the district.

The board of education and the Newark PTA Council have expressed "serious concern" for passage of this referendum, and stress that failure to vote for this local bond issue of \$1,200,000 will result in double sessions for high school children in the district within the next three years.

Newark Recreation Association basketball leagues are set for opening games next week.

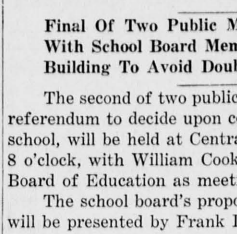

## "Assessing earn-money-at-home schemes"

Frankly, I'm a romanticist. Those get-rich-in-your-spare-time ads even start me dreaming. But my friends at the Better Business Bureau wake me up with a thud.

About those earn-money-at-home advertisements—watch out! I'm all for extra money at home. But apply the rule that you and I have seen working through all economics—that you get back about what you put out. Mother Nature built that rule into the universe.

Point is—nobody gets rich doing some simple little chore... like addressing envelopes. You've seen the ads—"earn big money in spare time addressing envelopes." Send one dollar for instructions. But the instructions just tell you how to address an envelope, and how to try to sell your addressing services to someone else. You could figure that out yourself. But besides, addressing envelopes just isn't an important enough contribution to this world to make you rich.

Next—watch out for the ads about fabulous profits in your basement raising chinchillas, foxes, muskrats, minks, nutria, rabbits and bull frogs... if the advertiser says he'll buy the pelts back from you after you buy the breeders from him for \$1500 a pair. The usual outcome is that he finds your finished product "below standard." He gets

your \$1500 and you get a basement full of pets. Who needs so many pets?

Likewise... watch out for work-at-home schemes which sell you the tools and materials: sewing machines, knitting machines, typewriters, art materials, instruction kits, Christmas card photo-coloring kits, and so forth. It's often just a below-the-belt sales punch for the materials... and goodbye to you. Better Business Bureau estimates a half-billion bitter dollars a year go down this ad-plated drain.

Watch out for these phrases: "huge profits," "guaranteed market," "no experience necessary." For example, one scheme advertises: "Grow mushrooms in your basement. We pay \$3.75 a pound. Make \$4,000 in a few weeks. No experience." unquote.

Well fine—but it turns out that after they sell you a very expensive outfit, this pesky mushroom is quite a temperamental little prima donna. It won't grow for just any-ole-body. In fact the best mushroom growers have several generations of experience. And then, too, it takes one whole of a big basement full of mushrooms to make \$4,000. If you have a basement that big, you don't need the mushroom business.

Also—watch out for the publisher service who says

you have song-writing or movie-scenario talent. How does he know? For \$50 he'll see that the people appraise your work on "professional copies."

Sure—they print 50 copies of your work, all right, and mail them to recording or motion picture studios. But of the 200,000 musical compositions annually copyrighted in Washington, 200 are successfully published. And of the 42,000 movie scripts submitted by non-professionals to motion picture studios in one year, four were purchased.

For some solid information on home businesses, write to: Small Business Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce for business service bulletins Number 95 and 98.

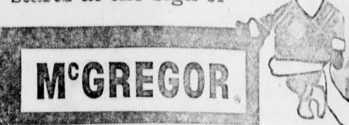

**DOUBLE SESSIONS?**  
 Public approval of a \$1,200,000 local bond issue for construction of a new senior high school will be sought by the Newark Board of Education with a referendum to be conducted this Saturday from 1 to 8 p.m. at all eight elementary schools in the Newark district.

All citizens over 21 who have resided within the district at least 30 days, within the county for 90 days, and who have resided within the state for at least a year may vote. Central Junior High School has an over-capacity enrollment of 817 in a building designed for 780 pupils, and Ogletown Junior High has an enrollment of 898—just two young-uns shy of the 900 capacity.

The existing senior high school will have its limit of 900 pupils by next year, and with the increasing enrollment at this educational level, cannot adequately accommodate evidence of accelerated pupil growth after next year.

With \$1,200,000 in Newark funds; \$1,800,000 in state money; and with a tidy, hard-won \$1,000,000 on hand, the Newark Board of Education hopes to build a new senior high school for Newark district youngsters on a site purchased at the corner of Salem Church and Chopin roads, southeast of Ogletown Junior High School.

Without the new high school building, normal, current schedules will have to be abandoned for double sessions within the next three years—unless there is an exodus of high school youth from the district. And this latter possibility is far from probable.

Approval of the school board's request for Newark money to supplement the state appropriation for construction of a new high school building will prevent sub-standard education at a cost not to exceed an additional 10 cents on each \$100 assessment for local real estate owners.

The choice is between maintaining present educational standards with higher taxes, or curtailing Newark's educational program while maintaining the present tax rate. With the new high school building we face double sessions for high school pupils within the next three years. It's as serious and simple—as that.

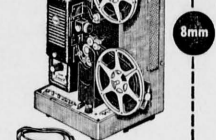

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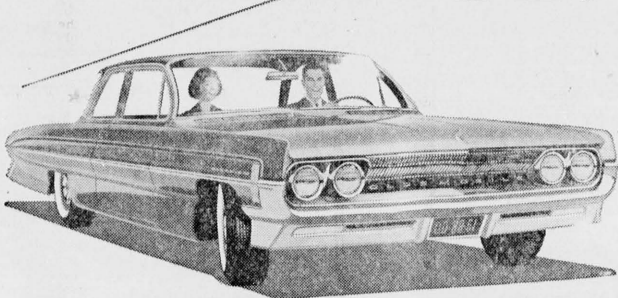
