Board Of Education Sets 80 Cent Newark Tax Rate For Fiscal Year 1960-61

The total tax rate of 80 cents will consist of 45.25 cents for debt service obligations (principal and interest on outstanding bonds) compared with 51 cents during the present fiscal year; 33 cents, the permissive maximum for current expenditures as approved by referendum in 1956, compared to 32 cents during the present fiscal year; and 1.75 cents for the local public library, compared with two cents during the present fiscal year; and 1.75 cents for the local public library, compared with two cents during the present fiscal year. The increase in assessment, as reported to the Newark Board of Education by the New Castle County Collector of Taxes during the past week, was considerably above the estimated increase.

This increase in assessment thus resulted in a substantial reduction in overall tax to meet the fixed amount of principal and interest obligations of the school district due next year.

The increased total assessment also resulted in an overall reduction of one quarter of one cent in that part of the tax for the public library, reduced from two cents, is estimated adequate to raise the \$15,000 requested by the library board in its annual certificate of need to the board of education which, by law, must levy such a tax as a part of the total school tax.


