**Real Estate Assessment Rolls Approved By 4-3 Council Vote**  
City Tax Return Of \$291,148.48 At Current 80 Cent Rate To Represent \$16,000 Increase Over Past Year; Binns Residents Protest Rezoning From "RS" To "RD"

Real estate property assessment figures for the City of Newark with a return of \$291,148.48 at the current 80 cent tax rate for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1960 were approved by a 4-3 vote at the regular meeting of Newark City Council last Tuesday night, and assessment books will be displayed at Rhodes Drug Store, 36 East Main Street, today through May 16, and at Neighbors Pharmacy on Elkton Road, from May 17-22. Appeal day was set for May 23, from 1 to 8 p.m. at the council office.

Real estate tax income for the city for the new fiscal year will represent a \$15,702.93 increase over 1959. With a tax exempt property 1959. With a tax exempt property valuation of \$30,177,870, assessed valuation of taxable property within the city is \$36,393,560, a total assessment increase of \$1,962,866 over 1959.

**County Assessment**  
The assessment figures presented by City Assessor Charles D. Long, from the county assessment list as authorized by council, drew protest from Councilman William Coverdale who cited "gross inequities" in local property valuations.

He said there would be no need for increasing the local tax rate if property values were brought into line with a "true, just and impartial evaluation," urging that the school board, along with council and the citizenry review the assessment books.

"I don't see how we can make a reassessment now," Mayor Frank Durnall said. "If you found that many inequities in one evening, there must be 50 times that many."

The assessment figures as presented by Long were accepted by a 4-3 vote of council with Coverdale, LeRoy Hill, Jr., and Vernon Steele dissenting.

At Betty McClelland's suggestion, the city manager is to contact consulting firms concerning cost of a citywide assessment.

Hill was appointed council representative with the Newark Recreation Association, and Mrs. McClelland's effort to have council reconsider requested to appropriate the \$2,750, a slice in the local United Community Fund allocation, was defeated.

**Police Champion**  
James H. Henderson in the audience, urged that council "work with, not against the police department," and said that interference by council members was upsetting the police force to the detriment of police work.

He urged that police pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 instead of the present 48. Henderson said that six police officers are thinking of resigning, and asked "what do we have to offer newcomers?" He urged that Capt. LeRoy Hill "be given a medal for work he has done."

Concerning recent criticism of the police department, City Manager Francis Neide reported that disciplinary action had been taken.

Council authorized a sinking fund for annual funds budgeted for the acquisition of parkland—such money to be accumulated if unspent, from year to year.

**Rezoning Protest**  
Action was postponed until a special meeting scheduled for June 7 at 8 p.m. on rezoning of Binns Homes and College Park after a petition was submitted by 11 Binns residents opposing the change on the basis that it would open the way for multi-family dwelling construction, reduce property values, and make the area less desirable.

City Solicitor John Sinclair said the area was not built to conform with RS zoning standards, but the petition presented will mean council must muster a three-fourths vote to rezone the area.

There was talk of creating a new zoning classification, less restrictive than the RS but limited to single-family homes.

Council appropriated \$3,000 to hire professional help to survey low-income families, for obtaining federal housing aid.

The city's application for federally guaranteed 40-year mortgages on privately built housing for people evicted from slum areas, was recently rejected.

Council also voted to extend the May 6 deadline for eviction of four tenant families from condemned dwellings on Ray Street until after a May 17 meeting of council, the planning commission, and the mayor's housing committee.

Ordinances revising the city salary and wage scales and requiring that sidewalks be built in front of all new buildings were passed at final readings.

First reading was given to ordinances creating an appeal board for hardship cases under the minimum housing law and forbidding the parking of trucks weighing more than 5,000 pounds for more than two hours on residential streets.

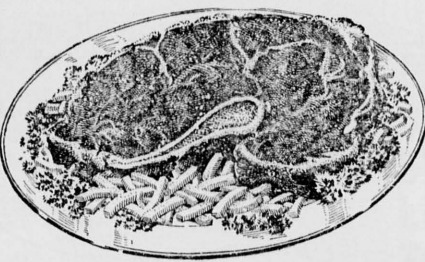

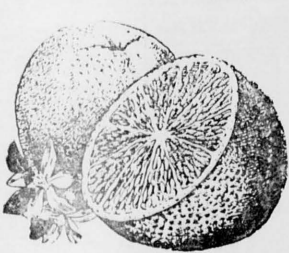

## SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION

Few jobs are as thankless — and as important — as that of public school board member. Newark is fortunate in having had able, conscientious, provident people as a board of education, and with the first public election of school board members scheduled for this Saturday, future performance of the board rests with those who cast their ballots — and perhaps, with those who fail to vote.

The City of Newark has a special challenge to select candidates for the school board because all four must be filled. . . . These people will determine the future of public education in Newark, and thereby, develop tomorrow's citizens."

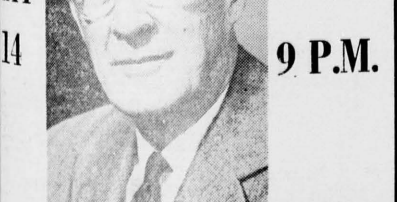

As school board observer for the American Association of University Women, I have attended every regular monthly school board meeting since September, 1959, except one. I have seen the school board work until after midnight considering the many large and small decisions brought to them by the school administration and the public.

In my frank and considered judgment they are a well-balanced, dedicated group of people, representing varied points of view and professional skills. I have seen them study and weigh recommendations from the school administrators. At times they have agonized at times they have not; at all times independent, conscientious thought was given to the decision. I have seen the same effort put forth on pressures brought from the state and from the public.

It seems to me that those of us in Newark who are interested in seeing our schools continue to improve and meet the needs of our youth and community should certainly unite and vote for the incumbent members of the school board: Martin Gauger, Mrs. John Munroe, William Cooke, and Frank Danich.

I would consider myself less than fair if I failed to mention that sitting with me on the observers' bench at the school board meetings has been Allan Duff. His interest in the Newark school and education has been proven to many of us in the community.

For what it is worth, I have seen none of the other candidates at any of the school board meetings.

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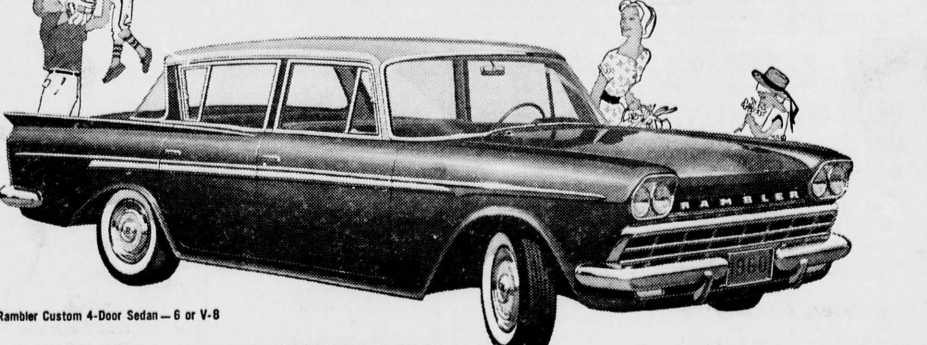

## Pollari To Coach Blues For Annual All-Star Contest

Former Newark Athlete Named Northern Pilot For High School Game

Undefeated winner of the Blue Hen Conference championship last season in his very first year as a head coach, Newark's Wayne Pollari—now of Mt. Pleasant High, was elected to coach the Blue team against the Gold in the Fifth Annual Delaware All-Star High School Football Game for the benefit of the Delaware Foundation for Retarded Children.

Pollari, 35, was elected by fellow members of the Delaware Interscholastic Football Coaches Association. He will have tradition on his side, for the Blues have yet to lose the colorful spectacle. His predecessors—Billy Cole of William Penn, Dim Montero of Salesianum, Earl Smith of Wilmington and Bob DeGroat of Tower Hill—all guided victories over the Golds.

Wayne has done all his coaching at Mt. Pleasant. Joining the faculty shortly after graduating from Delaware in 1951, he served as junior varsity coach for five years. In 1956, he moved up as line coach of the varsity.

Born in Girard, O., Pollari came to Delaware as a youngster when his parents started a chicken business near Newark in 1934. He attended Newark High, where he played varsity football and basketball. After graduation in 1943, he entered the Navy. He participated in the invasion of the Philippines and received the Silver Star for "gallantry in action."

The new All-Star coach entered Delaware in 1946, but his athletic activity was curtailed by injuries. As a freshman, while captaining the junior varsity football team he broke a knee. Returning to action in his junior year, he developed a sacroiliac condition that ended his competitive career.

Because of his keen interest in sports, Pollari stayed with the football team as student manager, and Coach Bill Murray awarded him the varsity letter that he would have earned as a player had it not been for injuries.

The gentle rise and fall of the boat, and the soft, gurgling slap, slap, slap of moonlit water against the hull prevented prolonged, profound pleasure provided with a night on the water. All hands were asleep before the first snorer tuned up—and the next thing we knew, the sun was up.
