# **UD plugs into car-to-grid**

The University of Delaware was a major player at Monday's event that marked the launch of the first vehicle-to-grid (V2G) electric cars made in Delaware and the signing of Senate Bill 153 by Gov. Jack A. Markell, which rewards owners of V2G technology for plugging in.

The event was held at AutoPort Inc.. near Wilmington, where retrofitted a Toyota Scion from AutoPort was on display. Also shown was the University of Delaware's eBox V2G vehicle, which was developed by vehicle-to-grid pioneer Willett Kempton, professor in the College of Earth, Ocean,

and Environment (CEOE).

The bill, which Markell said was the first of its kind in the world, compensates owners of electric cars for electricity sent back to the grid at the same rate they pay for electricity to charge the battery.

V2G vehicles work are capable of absorbing excess energy when demand for power is low, and returning some back to the electric grid when the demand for power is high. The new law lets people take advantage of this unique ability by requiring owners providing V2G services be "net metered," meaning they only pay for the net amount of electricity they draw.

While the vehicles do not generate electricity like solar panels or wind turbines, their

ability to provide electricity back to the electric grid means at times V2G customers' meters will actually run backwards. "This technology improves the electric system by providing balancing power via storage that would otherwise require burning fossil fuels to produce," Kempton said.

In addition to Kempton, UD was represented at the event by CEOE Dean Nancy Targett; graduate student Jon Lilley, who coordinated the UD project; postdoctoral computer scientist Sachin Kamboj, who worked on programming the car; and UD alumna Sarah O'Neill, who works for AC Propulsion in California, which makes the batteries for the car.

Roy Kirchner, president of AutoPort, which received a grant from the Delaware Economic Development Office to train workers to retrofit V2G vehicles, welcomed the group of about 50 people, calling the project "another first for the First State," and introduced the governor.

Markell paid tribute to Kempton, whom he said he met five years ago when Kempton first told him about his project. It is "amazing, but here we are," Markell said, thanking Kempton for his "continuing education."

After the signing of the bill, the keys were given to a representative of Pepco Holdings, the Delmarva Power parent company that supported the vehicle's development.

The legislation, Senate Bill 153, was sponsored by Sen. F. Gary Simpson, R-Milford. It was co-sponsored by Energy and Transit Committee Chair Sen. Harris B. McDowell III, D-Wilmington North; Sen. Liane Sorenson, R-Hockessin; Sen. David Sokola, D-Newark; and Rep. Gerald W. Hocker, R-Ocean View. It was also sponsored by John Kowalko, D-Newark South.



# Newark High bathroom fire ruled arson

smoke damage in the room. There was no structural damage to the building. Due to the smoky environment, students were dismissed around 11:30 a.m.

### Baseball bat assault

Delaware State Police have arrested Anthony Dorio, 47, of Old Harmony Road in the Ogletown area near Newark, after an assault on his ex-wife and her boyfriend.

At approximately 3:30 a.m. Sunday morning, troopers were called to a home along West Main Street, in the village of Christiana, for a reported domestic assault.

This investigation revealed Dorio, 47, of Old Harmony Road and his wife, a 39-yearold female, had been separated for several months. Shortly after 3 a.m., Dorio came to the West Main Street address where his wife and her boyfriend, a 27-year-old male, were staying.

Dorio broke into the home and proceeded to a first floor bedroom where his wife and the boyfriend were sleeping. He was armed with an aluminum bat, and as the boyfriend was sleeping, began to strike him in the head. The wife woke up and started to scream. She was then stuck in the arm a single time with the bat.

A 37-year-old male, also living in the home was asleep in another bedroom and heard the commotion. He walked into the

### Children's view of the world.

Preschoolers have their eyes examined so that certain ailments can diagnosed and treated early. Among the common problems uncovered during a comprehensive exam of young eyes are strabismus (crossed eyes), in which one or both eyes are unable to align properly, and amblyopia (lazy eye), in which one eye fails to correctly process sensory input. These conditions affect up to five percent of children, but can usually be corrected if treated early enough. Treatment for amblyopia relies on covering the strong eye with a patch in an effort to force the child to use and strengthen the weaker eye. As for strabismus, remedies include eyeglasses, eye drops, eye patches and eye exercises in less-than-severe cases.

Children know only what they see and not what they are supposed to see, so they don't complain about certain symptoms. their cars being carted off.

Funk says he had a lengthy conversation regarding the issue. It was not the first time, Funk and members of the City Council have expressed concern over aggressive towing practices at the center and elsewhere. They have claimed the center and/or towing company employs "spotters" who look for persons exiting the center.

Concern that aggressive towing practices are hurting efforts to bring more people to downtown Newark have led the council to pass ordinances that encourage landlords to order

towing, rather than leaving the decision with towing companies that are often accused of predatory practices.

Amy McDowell, of Newark, confirmed this week that a refund had been issued by the towing company. McDowell and a friend parked in the lot with the intention of seeing a late night movie at the festival. After patronizing one of the businesses at the center, they decided to grab a meal at a restaurant on Main Street. When they returned, the vehicle had been towed away.

Persons claiming to represent the shopping center told McDowell they were within their rights to tow vehicles,

citing problems with student parking, loitering and even drug dealing.

Timme says it was never the intention of the ownership of the center to discourage patrons of the theater from going off shopping center property and described the Film Festival situation as "a mess."

Timme says the the ownership purchased the center a year and a half ago and remains enthusiastic about the community and events, such as the film festival. She concedes that the company and a entity managing the center got off on the wrong foot in dealing with towing issue. She notes that three different local towing companies have been used and, in each case, strayed from a flexible policy that targeted only long-term parking.

"I know they have a problem," Funk says of the parking difficulties at the shopping center. The mayor, whose law office is near the center, says it is strange that vehicles, many with out-of-state plates, are parked at the lot before stores

Even with the towing problem, owners remain happy with the shopping center and hope to attract regional and national companies, Timme says, adding that she is hopeful that announcements of new tenants will be forthcoming.

# From the farm to school and beyond

nless you just fell off the turnip truck yesterday, you are well aware that eating fruits and vegetables is a good way to maintain a healthy lifestyle. You've probably also heard about 'green' movements and growing your own food as a way to promote healthy living and help the environment. However, many don't have the means or motivation to do this. Over time, our economy has developed into one of large distributors purchasing and processing produce into what may or may not be recognizthe consumer. I'm not necessarily suggesting that this is good or bad – we won't debate

that here. But, what about our local farmers? And with fewer and fewer produce farms in Delaware (particularly New Castle County), and more people working full time with less

time to devote to growing and maintaining their own fruit and vegetable gardens, where do children learn about fruit and vegetables and where they

able as a fruit or vegetable come from? If they aren't by the time that it gets to learning at home, there are a few things happening that you may be interested in hearing about.

> There are several movements around our state right now to help reconnect children with their food, as well as to provide stimulus for local agriculture. On a state level, the Delaware Department of Agriculture, the Fruit and Vegetable Growers Association of Delaware, and Nemours Health and Prevention Services have teamed up with various other agencies to help promote "Farm to School." Farm to School isn't a new program,

but it is fairly new to Delaware and it is gaining momentum. The idea sounds rather simlink up local farmers with local schools to provide healthy, nutritious (and delicious!) fruits and vegetables for school lunches. It sounds simple in theory, though in practice there are some hurdles to cross. The logistics of having enough produce to supply, pricing, delivery and various other factors come into play.

That is why this week the United States Department of Agriculture's Deputy Secretary Kathleen Merrigan announced a new initiative called "Know Your Farmer,

Know Your Food." As part of this, "Farm to School" tactical teams will be formed by the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) and Food and Nutrition Service (FNS). The idea behind these tactical teams is to help school districts with the logistics behind connecting and buying local foods from local growers and hopefully make the transition less cumbersome.

It is a step in the right direction. Thianda Manzara from Healthy Foods for Healthy Kids, Inc. in Hockessin is quite familiar with educating children in the classroom about fruits and vegetables and how they grow. She coordinates multiple elementary school gardens across New Castle County. The mission is simple. "Our vision is to assist schools in starting vegetable gardening programs which are integrated into the school curriculum," said Manzara. "It's incredibly exciting to see students happily eating veggies they thought they disliked.'





### Man lunges at troopers

The Polly Drummond Hill yard waste site is located east of Newark in the Pike Creek area on Polly Drummond Hill Road, about a half-mile north of the Kirkwood Highway.

New Castle County resi-

dents wishing to drop off yard waste when the Polly Drummond Hill Road site is closed can take yard waste to one of several alternatives, including DNREC's other two drop off sites and businesses in New Castle County that provide yard waste services.

DNREC's Community Yard Waste Demonstration Sites:

DART Mid-County Community Yard Waste Demonstration Site.

Regular Hours: Daily; 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., unless otherwise posted.

The site is located on the southwest corner of the intersection of U.S. Route 13 and Route 72 near Bear. (Turn into the DART facility at 1423 S. Dupont Hwy, Bear.)

Brandywine Hundred Community Yard Waste Demonstration Site

Regular Hours: Open Friday, Saturday and Sunday; 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., unless otherwise posted.

The site is located on the north side of Cauffiel Parkway, approximately 100 yards east of the Cauffiel Parkway and Philadelphia Pike (Business Route 13) intersection.

DNREC's three community yard waste demonstration sites were developed as one of many yard waste management options to help New Castle County residents comply with the yard waste ban. Commercial businesses, such as landscaping

and lawn care companies as well as municipalities, are not eligible to drop off materials at these sites.

DNREC's three yard waste sites do not charge a fee to drop off yard wastes.







# Plant workers make case for competing jet fighter engines

Employees of a small Newark-area plant are lobbying for a choice when it comes to an engine for a new generation of fighter aircraft.

Signing a petition in support of the engine for the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter were the nearly 50 employees of the GE Aviation composites plant in Glasgow.

The plant produces ceramic composites that would be used in an engine that would be jointly produced by GE and Britain's Rolls Royce.

The engine was designed as a back-up to one produced by Pratt and Whitney, an archrival of GE.

The Obama administration, however, favors one engine for the aircraft that is designed for use by NATO countries, citing the GE-Rolls project as an example of waste in military spending.

Various groups, including aerospace worker unions, have argued otherwise, claiming the competing engines will retain high-paying jobs and spur innovation.

The second engine option emerged, after problems arose with previous generations of jet engines. With one type of engine, such problems can ground an entire fleet of jets

"We just want to compete," says Brian Dix, operations leader for the plant.

Dix says the second engine option is needed to keep costs of the aircraft down. "This has already paid dividends," Dix said, referring to the competition between the jet makers.

GE and Rolls are working hard to make their case to members of Congress, who have not always followed recommendations of past administrations.


They are also vowing to produce the engine at a fixed cost, a contrast to the cost plus 10 percent contracting that is widely blamed for military cost overruns.

Dix says that with added work from the new jet engine, the plant will continue to see growth in revenue and employment. Ceramic composites are emerging as an alternative to metal alloys, particularly in high-temperature applications that include jet engines

Meanwhile, the Glasgow plant in the Pencader complex has been posting strong figures in a tough economic environment.

Dix says revenues rose by double-figures, with the plant adding staff. More workers would be hired, if GE and Rolls Royce can be a part of the F-35 project, he says.

The site has done so well that GE, known for shedding operations that do not fall within its core businesses, has retained the business and sees continued

growth.

The Glasgow plant has its roots in an effort by the region's chemical companies to make breakthroughs in composite materials.

In the late 1980s, composites were touted as the "next

big thing" for the Delaware economy.

While that never happened, composites have remained a part of the local economy, with the University of Delaware operating a composites center. Dix says the company would

like to partner with UD on future breakthroughs in the technology.

The Glasgow site was originally a DuPont business, but after ownership changes became a part of GE.



# GREEN GETAWAYS

Now more than ever, a couple's honeymoon is as personally unique as the ceremony itself. Adventurous couples climb mountains or kayak through turbulent waters. More traditional couples spend languid days on white-sand beaches. Cultureloving couples head to Europe.

And thanks to a growing movement in ecotourism, green couples can opt for environmentally friendly getaways.

"There are a lot of eco-lodges and hotels that are eco-friendly and have activities that focus on the environment," says Ayako Ezaki, director of communications for The International Ecotourism Society.

She says Central America and the Caribbean seem to be the most popular destinations for eco-minded couples, both for their romantic settings and the slew of eco-friendly hotels and resorts that have begun peppering the landscape throughout the past few years.

For some, the term "ecotourism" may conjure images of mosquito nets, natural thatch huts and bland organic cuisine. And while there is some of that, the span of ecotourism ranges from the hands-on and adventurous to the downright luxurious. "One of the important things about ecotourism that not everyone understands is that it's not one way," Ezaki says, adding that another misconception is that environmentally responsible trips will be inevitably more expensive than traditional honeymoons. "It's more about a set of principles that you can apply to whatever you're doing," she says.

These principles include minimizing environmental impact, building environmental awareness and cultural respect, and providing direct financial benefits for conservation and the empowerment of local people. According to the IES Web

site, "for the world's 40 poorest countries, tourism is the second most important source of foreign exchange, after oil."

Locating a location

Even if you already have a honeymoon destination in mind, the best way to start planning an eco-friendly escape is to do your homework. "Being a smart consumer in terms of what you choose and how you decide where to stay is basic research you can easily do online," Ezaki says.

You can reduce your honeymoon's carbon footprint by opting for hotels and excursions committed to environmentally responsible practices.

Even airlines are going green. In a recent rankings list released by sustainable directory greenopia.com that measured everything from an airline's carbon offsets to the fleet's age, Virgin America and Continental Airlines were found to be the most eco-friendly. Internationally, hotels are making strides to buy and hire locally, implement solar power and reduce water and electric consumption. Some take it a step further by offering greenspecific packages and activities,

from tree planting to educational presentations on sustainability.

To get started, visit Web sites like conservation.org, ecotourism.org and ethicaltraveler.org. These have resources like destination guides, expert directories and suggestions on how to assess the sustainability of a particular hotel or amenity. If you're set on a certain hotel or resort already, try calling or emailing to learn more about any potential sustainable practices they use. Do they have a written policy on environmental responsibility? Where does the food in their restaurants come from? What percentage of employees are local, and does the hotel make any contributions to the community? Often, hotels and resorts committed to sustainability will post written policies or feature pages on their Web

Additionally, here are a few eco-friendly destinations with special honeymoon packages Ezaki recommends:

Lapa Rios Rainforest Ecolodge, Costa Rica

Set on more than 1,000 acres of nature preserve in the middle of Costa Rican tropical rainforest, Lapa Rios aims

to protect the land on which it stands. Honeymooners stay in bungalows and can choose from excursions like a boat ride in Golfo Dulce complete with nature guide, horseback riding on the beach, or planting a tree in the lodge's rainforest reserve as a "memory of your unforgettable honeymoon." The lodge's buildings and paths incorporate erosion control, water is solar

When Hamanasi was built on a 10-acre nature preserve, in order to avoid deforestation, they built rooms in the trees rather than on top of them. 

## What a difference 40 years makes

When my parents were engaged and went to meet with the priest at the church where they were to be married, the first thing he asked them was whether or not my mom was pregnant. That might seem like an odd question to ask in a small lowa town – in 1968 – but, apparently, the brides in the two previous ceremonies at the church both had been pregnant. Who knew?

What was a concern then might be more accepted now – maternity gown boutique MaternityBride.com cites one in six brides being pregnant when married — and that's just one of the many differences in the bridal landscape between the late '60s and the late whatever it is you call this decade.

To get a better take on how "now" has changed over the last 40 years in the nuptial world, I tracked down a Modern Bride magazine from June/July 1968, when my folks would have been planning their wedding, and from June/July 2009, when I'm in the throes of my own wedding plans. Here's what I discovered.

#### On the cover

The covers of both magazines – like all bridal magazines – are designed to capture brides' attention and inspire them with bold fashions and exciting coverlines.

The '68 magazine features a bride wearing a white satinfrosted dress with crystals and pearls on re-embroidered Alençon with a cowl neck and removable train from Milady (price not given); the '09 dress is a white taffeta and lace strapless gown with crystal brooch and sash from Exclusive Bridals by Allure (\$678).

The similar approach, however, is differentiated in the coverlines/types of stories being teased outside.

The '68 coverlines on dresses and honeymoons are fitting, but stories on bedrooms and babies show a wedding culture that more a transition from unmarried life to married life – which it is – than an event or party, which is what the culture of weddings seem to be today.

Check out what's being talked about in 2009: trendsetters, cakes, flowers, locales. The ads featured throughout both further support that difference in cultural climate between the two times.

The contents

As mentioned, the advertising showcases many difference between then and now – but also a few similarities.

For one, there was a plethora of luggage advertisements in 1968. Samsonite, Hartman, Ventura and America Tourister all had ads, and one - Hartman even highlighted a product called "The Shopping Bag," large enough to fit all your travel purchases and still make it back home. I didn't see any luggage ads in the '09 issue, nor do I currently have any on my registry. On the opposite, ads for bridesmaid dresses are commonplace in today's bridal mags but were completely nonexistent 40 years

As for china and crystal, the same brands you saw then are the same you see today – Lenox, Noritake, Wedgwood and Waterford. Wedgwood, for instance, in 1968 is advertising its new Westbury pattern; today it's advertising it's collaboration with wedding impresario Vera Wang. Noritake, in '68, promotes it's legendary status; today it's being promoted as part of the registry by retailed Dillard's. Noritake also will be the china in my new household, as Melissa inherited her grandmother's circa 1940 collection.

The same goes for some of

the dresses. Ads for Priscilla of Boston, Christos and Alfred Angelo appeared then and are just as likely to be seen today.

#### How-to & how much

Like most magazines today, the '68 MB features a countdown checklist for what to do when in your planning process. The big-day advice back then:

Have a leisurely breakfast, and your day—so carefully planned—is off to a glorious start. Absolutely everything is everything has been done will be perfect, so relax and enjoy yourself.

The most interesting aspect of the countdown is the layout: it begins on page 158, goes to page 160, and then it jumps back to the front of the book to page 10, a pagination technique you just won't see today.

In terms of etiquette, the present-day practices are more mindful of money. If you're looking to cut down on expenses, there's a story on how to tell friends they're not invited. Where as in the older issue, in a "Who Pays for What" feature, it tells both the bride and groom to pay for their attendants' accommodations – a practice I'm sure many-a-couple are thankful is out of mode today.

Gowns

The haute fashion of the late

'60s were waisted gowns – belted, sleeved and long. Today, they're often sleeveless, can be short and don't have to be white (like the Jenny Lee dress in the main gown spread).

#### Honeymoons

The'68 story on the Bahamas would be just as appropriate today. But today's domestic destinations are more California (think Napa or Santa Barbara) than Creole, like the '68 story on New Orleans. Fun fact: Both Melissa's and my parents honeymooned in New Orleans.

#### Grooms

There was not much for grooms back then, editorial-wise, other than a him-specific what-to-do-when checklist. But today, there's a "we" mentality in the wedding copy and a "he" mentality in the ads – promos for Men's Warehouse and Scott Kay's Javlin ring collection are common fixtures.

#### Modern-day marvels

Finally, there are just some things that are a sign of the times. Today, an annual feature in Modern Bride is their list of Trendsetters – 25 pros who are leading the way with the latest and greatest in weddings. Some of today's trends, such as wedding videos shot on vin-

tage 8mm film, were the standard medium years ago.

But perhaps the most prescient item of all came from the 41-year-old mag – a cartoon featuring two


amorphous and, well, amorous figures, the male being told by the female: "I don't care if we did meet by computer. That machine is not going to be your best man."

In a modern world in which couples often log onto dating sites long before they log onto Brides.com, something like that simply makes you smile.






