## LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS OF 1920 AND 1921 COMPARED

Certain snap comments have been made regarding the large expenditures of State money authorized by this year's legislature. The *Wilmington Evening*, in particular, represents the appropriations for the ensuing two years as an "orgy of spending." We fail to notice any discussion of these appropriations in relation to the specific State responsibilities they are meant to discharge, or any clear comparison between last year's expenditures and this year's appropriations. For the purpose of facilitating such discussion and comparison, we have compared the following tabulation for 1920 and 1921, with the amount of increase for the various departments.

We think the comparison might well go further, and a study of the State's resources and expenditures in relation to its needs and responsibilities as a true state, be made to cover a period of ten years past and ten years to come. If unwise appropriations have been made they should be condemned now and guarded against in the future. The people want an economical and efficient government; they don't want unequal and unfair taxation; they want to get their money's worth for the taxes they pay, but at the same time they want the State to grow, and we see no need of harking back to the last century and sentimentalizing over the dear cheap old days when we let the good die young and forged along over the ruts behind old Dobbin, with no sense or appreciation of the State's needs and Citizen's responsibility.

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## CONTESTS DEVELOP FOR TOWN OFFICES

## Fire Company Sets Date for Annual Carnival

Committees to be Appointed Later

### New Fire Fighting Machine Shipped Monday

The Agna Hose, Hook and Ladder Company at a meeting on Friday evening set the date for their annual carnival and discussed general plans for the big affair.

They decided upon the week of July 9-16 inclusive and expressed a determination to make this the best carnival in a list of remarkably successful affairs. Added impetus is given this year by the fact that the Company will by that time have secured the best fire-fighting apparatus obtainable. The new Stutz quadruple engine recently purchased was shipped on Monday and will arrive in a few days.

The local company is an unusually efficient and faithful organization and to their interest and self sacrifice is due the fact that in spite of an inadequate water supply, the town has been remarkably free from serious fire losses. Their prompt and zealous work at the recent fire in the Bon Ton Shop saved thousands of dollars worth of property, since this building is located in a congested district where frame dwellings predominate. In view of this zeal and interest the people of the town and the community give hearty cooperation and support at the big annual carnivals which have become an established part of the town's social life. The committees will be appointed at an early date.

## FIFTH SET OF PLANS SUBMITTED TO SCHOOL BOARD

### Additional Teacher Elected to Grammar School

The fifth set of plans for the new school building were recently submitted to the local Board of Education by the architects, Guilbert and Bettle. After careful consideration by the Board and by the citizens' advisory committee, a few minor changes were suggested and they were returned for correction.

Much time has been spent and much careful consideration given to this important matter in order to insure a wise expenditure of public money and to safeguard the best interests of the Newark children. Sensible and practical changes to meet present needs and to provide for future development, have been suggested to the architects who will doubtless submit the corrected plans within the week.

Superintendent of Schools, J. Herbert Owens, has been in Dover during the past week arranging for next year's budget. The postponement of final action on school finances for 40 days leaves in doubt for the present the amount available for taking care of interest on bonded indebtedness. This together with the uncertainty regarding the provisions of the new law, copies of which are not yet available, makes it seem wise to go slowly in the matter of arranging the final details of the building program. This will be begun, however, at the earliest possible time.

The transfer of the Opportunity Class to the new building makes possible a rearrangement of classes in the Grammar School to relieve congested conditions there.

Miss Charlotte Hobbs, of Miss Charlotte Hobbs of Stroudsburg, Pa., a normal school graduate, has been secured to teach the Fourth Grade. She took charge of the class on Monday morning.

Arbor and Bird Day was observed with appropriate exercises last Friday afternoon. The Opportunity Class inaugurated a planting program which they have planned to beautify the grounds of the new building.

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## Old Dollar and Nickel Are Functioning Again

The American dollar is coming back and is displacing the thirty-two-cent imitation posing as a dollar for the last four years.

The dollar of today will buy ten pounds of sugar. The dollar of 1920 bought only three and three-quarter pounds. The dollar now buys twenty pounds of rice, as against six pounds in 1920; sixty pounds of potatoes, as against eleven and a half in 1920; four dozen eggs, as against one dozen a year ago; three pounds of butter, as against one pound a year ago,

and two and a half pounds of coffee, as against one and one-quarter pounds of the same brand a year ago.

The dollar also will buy now three times as much clothing and better clothing, a third more coal and nearly twice as much flour, lard, fruit and some varieties of meat as it did in war days.

The nickel also is staging a come-back. During the war the nickel would buy nothing, not even the cheapest sort of cigar, but now many articles that formerly sold for a nickel are back at the old stand.—Philadelphia Public Ledger.

## METHODIST CONFERENCE AND EDUCATION

### A Quotation from Dr. Vaughn S. Collins' Report

See the fight that has been made throughout the State of Delaware. Our own Methodist Governor John G. Townsend, during his wise administration as Governor of Delaware succeeded in having written into the laws of the state more constructive, progressive legislation than any administration in the history of the state so far as I have knowledge. Among these forward-looking laws was the "School Code," which if faithfully carried out would have raised Delaware from the low position of forty-third state in educational standing to the very front rank among the states of the union. A survey made by Federal experts showed that \$10,000,000, or more would be needed to put the school houses of Delaware into suitable condition for their work. In order to carry out this educational program one public spirited citizen of Delaware nobly pledged \$3,900,000 of his private fortune for the benefit of the children of Delaware, and aid in their equipment for life's work. But because it necessarily increased taxes a bit, and more still because it took the control of the district school out of the hands of local politicians, from the date of its enactment it has been so bitterly fought, all over the state, that the recent session of the General Assembly has so loaded it with amendments and emasculated its best provisions that it is virtually repealed. O the pity of it, that ignorance, and prejudice, and avarice can be so appealed to by the small-fry demagogue that voters close the door of opportunity in the face of their own children.

Why does this item appear in my report? What has the public school question to do with church work? Reason enough. The Methodist Episcopal Church has ever stood for education. A Methodist preacher is recreant to his trust if he is not intensely interested in the schools located in his charge. The church ought not, dare not shirk her duty to the children and youth. Besides, in this land of ours life and church are so interwoven that the line of demarcation binds rather than separates. I know one church in Salisbury district that has been literally rent in twain for three years because the membership is divided on the question of improved school facilities for the children. I know one pastor who had to move from his charge because he actively and openly, as he ought to have done, advocated an improvement in the grade of the local school. Is it any wonder that communities that thus fight against educational privileges for their own children should utterly fail to understand the great Centenary program, that seeks to bring enlightenment to the mind, as well as rejoicing to the heart of mankind all around the world?

## Pity the Poor British Taxpayer

If any one who has just paid his income tax wants consolation, a writer in the New York Evening Mail suggests that he reflect on what he would have to pay if he were living under the British flag. The man who pays an \$88 tax here would probably have to pay between \$600 and \$700 if he were living in England, and he would find the paying of the tax a much more complicated matter. The income tax plight of the small-salaried Englishman is explained as follows:

In Britain the "standard" rate of the tax is now six shillings in the pound. That is approximately one-third of a man's net income. This tax is levied at that rate on every pound of taxable income above £225 (equal at pre-war rates of exchange to about \$1,225). The rate charged on every pound of taxable income up to this amount is three shillings in the pound. The taxable income figure is the balance figure arrived at after deducting all statutory rebates and allowances.

It will be best to give a concrete instance of how the tax works without going into elaborate details of unusual exemptions. Let us take the case of a man who benefits by none of these and suppose him to have an income of \$2,500, all earned. He is allowed to deduct one-tenth of it because it is earned, or \$250, making his taxable income \$2,250. On half of this he must pay a rate of 30 cents in the dollar and on the other half in a rate of 15 cents in the dollar, making his total payment \$506.25. In a similar case here he would pay only \$60.

Exemption from tax is allowed where the total assessable income does not exceed \$675 in the case of unearned and \$750 in the case of earned income. Where a man has a wife living with him or wholly maintained by him the amount fixed is \$1,225. For children graduated allowances are made—\$180 for the first child under sixteen and \$135 each for any others. For each wholly dependent relative a further allowance of \$125 may be claimed.

Suppose a man has an earned income of \$5,000 and has a wife and three children dependent on him, this is how the tax would work:

Therefore, roughly speaking, a man with all these incumbrances must pay about 13 per cent of his income in income tax alone. The corresponding figure here would probably be \$88, or about 1.45 per cent of the total income.—Literary Digest.

### PLANS FOR BOYS' CORN CONTEST ANNOUNCED

#### Delaware Growers' Association to Back the Project

The Delaware Corn Growers' Association has just announced the plans for conducting the Boys' Five Acre Corn Contest this year in cooperation with the County Farm Bureaus and interested local communities. As last year, the contest will be open to all boys of the State between the ages of 14 and 21 years, including all corn club boys of previous experience and high school students of agriculture, provided that they enroll with the County Agent, the County Club Agent, or the State Club Leader on or before June 1. All contestants will keep a practical farm record on five or more acres of corn grown on the home farm. These records will be turned over to the County Judging Committee or the State Corn Growers' Association when the corn is harvested.

Each boy will be expected to exhibit at the County and State Corn Shows. The awards will be made on the following basis:

Yield of dried shelled corn . . . 70%  
Quality of corn produced . . . 15%  
Completeness and accuracy of records . . . 15%

The champion corn grower from each county in this contest will be awarded a free trip to the Delaware Farmers' Short Course at the University of Delaware, provided that there are two or more contestants in the county.

A silver challenge cup will be awarded by the State Corn Growers' Association to the State Junior Champion corn judge of Delaware. The champion judge can keep the cup as long as he remains the state champion.

The name of the champion for each year will be engraved on the cup. Stanley Short, of Cheswold, now holds the cup by virtue of his winning the first annual junior corn judging contest conducted by the State Corn Growers' Association.

The State Corn Growers' Association has made arrangements for the cooperation of County Agricultural Agents and the County Farm Bureaus in conducting this contest.

John Ponder, of Milton, is the President and M. O. Pence, of Newark, is the Secretary of the Association.

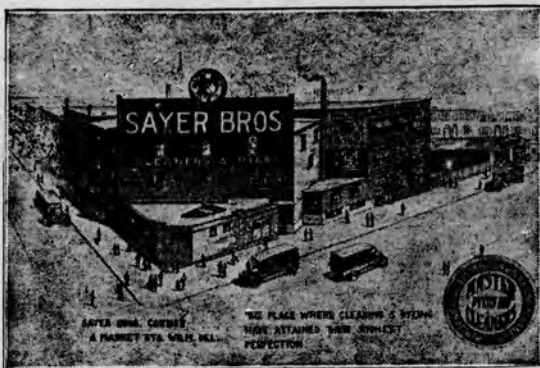

tion. Put the jars in a cool place where they will be undisturbed during the year.

## Strength of Solutions

The water used should be boiled several minutes to thoroughly sterilize it and should be cooled before using.

One gallon of liquid water-glass should be diluted with ten gallons of the sterilized water, or one quart to ten quarts of water, to give the solution the proper strength.

One pound of the dry form thoroughly stirred into two gallons of sterilized water gives the proper strength.

Four pints of the water-glass (preserving strength) will cover one gallon of eggs.

## Suggestions

Do not preserve dirty eggs or eggs that have been washed. Washed eggs will not keep, because the protective gelatinous coating has been removed by the washing; and dirty eggs will become tainted in flavor.

Do not use the same liquid preservative more than one year.

In preparing to boil eggs which have been preserved in water-glass prick a small hole through the large end before placing them in the water. The pores of the shell have been sealed by the water-glass solution, and without the pin-hole the expanding air within the shell would burst it.

## BADGE MOTTO CONTEST

The D. I. A. A. is now considering designs for the official State badge to be awarded to those who pass the test for bronze badges at the county meets this spring. On whatever design is chosen, there should appear a short motto, or phrase, telling at a glance what the badge stands for. Since it is to be for the school boys and girls of the State, the Executive Committee has decided that it would be a good plan to let the boys and girls choose the motto they will have on their badge. Therefore a badge test motto contest is hereby announced, in which any school boy or girl in Delaware may compete. Here are the conditions:

1. The school you attend must be a member of the D. I. A. A., if it has the high school grades.

2. You must yourself make up the motto which you suggest.

3. It must express the purpose of the D. I. A. A. and the reason why we have the badge test—to develop good strong, healthy bodies in boys and girls who are active, clean and noble.

4. It must be short; a three or four word motto is best.

5. It must be in the hands of

the Secretary, R. L. Totten, at Dover, not later than April 14th.

6. All mottoes will be judged by the Executive Committee.

7. In case the winning motto is submitted by more than one person, the prize will be awarded to the one whose entry is earlier.

8. The Committee reserves the right to reject all mottoes if they are not suited to the needs of the Committee.

9. A prize of \$5.00 in gold will be awarded to the boy or girl whose motto is judged to be the best for use on the badges. The prize will be delivered to the winner on the date of the first County Track and Field Meet, May 14th.

## DISCUSS COOPERATIVE DISTRIBUTING MILK PLANT

### Farm Bureau Executive Committee Has Important Meeting

The Executive Committee of the New Castle County Farm Bureau met in the Directors' Room of the Security Trust Building, Wilmington, last Saturday afternoon. Mr. Frank Yearsley, of Marshallton, President of the Farm Bureau, presided. Messrs. J. D. Reynolds, of Middletown, and C. P. Diekey, of Stanton, were elected representatives-at-large of the Executive Committee of the Delaware Federation of Farm Bureaus. Each county farm bureau has the privilege of electing two representatives. The officers of the State Federation are: W. V. Costen of Dover, President; John Ponder of Milton, Vice-President, and Frank F. Yearsley of Marshallton, Treasurer.

The status of the proposed milk

producers' co-operative distributing plant was discussed and a motion passed suggesting to the milk producers that a committee be sent to the New England States to investigate cooperative distributing plants. If this committee is sent the Farm Bureau agreed to pay one-half the expenses.

Due to the numerous inquiries received at the Farm Bureau office by boys and girls for membership in a pure bred calf club, County Agent R. O. Bausman was instructed by the committee to proceed with the organization of a pure bred calf club. When thirty members are enrolled Mr. Bausman will purchase the calves from some dairy center and distribute them among the members of the club at actual cost. The local banks of the county will be asked to cooperate in this project.

The farmers of the county are experiencing difficulty in securing good cows to replace those that have reacted to the tuberculin test. The County Agent was instructed to make a survey, and, if the con-

ditions warrant it, to assist the farmers in securing tested grade and pure bred cows from good dairy centers.

## FARMERS ARE URGED TO VACCINATE FOR HOG CHOLERA

### Work is Done by State Through Local Veterinarian

The State appropriation for hog cholera serum and virus has not all been used and farmers can call on their veterinarians to have their hogs vaccinated and the only charge will be the fee of the veterinarian for doing the work. The law does not permit the veterinarian to charge anything for the serum and virus and no more than fifty cents per head for vaccinating the hogs. Where the farmer has a large number of hogs to be vaccinated, or where neighboring farmers get together and have the work done in a cooperative way the charge may be less than fifty cents per head.

Wherever hog cholera has existed within a year farmers should have their hogs vaccinated. The best time to do it is when they are young and weigh about fifty pounds each. In case the farmers have any trouble with their hogs and do not understand the cause they should call upon Dr. M. L. Zurkow, of Dover, the United States Hog Cholera Specialist, to make an investigation.

Farmers in districts where anthrax has occurred during the last two or three years should have their animals protected by vaccination. This work is paid for by the State and the farmer should simply call upon his local veterinarian and have the animals vaccinated free of charge.
