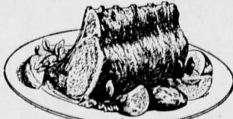

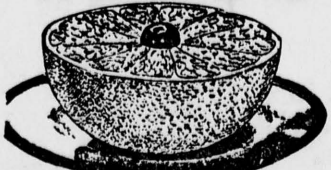

STAY ALIVE!

One for the road often means two or more for the hospital, the Delaware Safety Council said yesterday. Caution against the combination of holiday drinking and driving, the council urged Delawareans to take a new look at their party habits and keep the cork in the bottle for a safe period of driving on New Year's Eve and every eve.

"We have no desire to dampen the New Year holiday spirit," the council said. "We only want to eliminate a definite source of death and destruction on the highway."

National Safety Council surveys show that a drinking driver was involved in 55 per cent of the holiday accidents last year.

Social drinkers—not the obvious drunk—are the big men on the highway, the council said.

Car weavings of the obvious drunk usually can be detected or avoided, but the social drunk whose critical judgment is impaired even with a small amount of alcohol, appears normal until his wits fail him in an emergency.

Three hours are needed to work off the effect of two cocktails, the council warns the social drinker. And coffee doesn't help. Only time will eliminate alcohol from the bloodstream.

The council also warns that no one is liquor-proof, although some persons can tolerate alcohol better than others due to body weight and other physical factors. But even impairment of judgment can be a life or death matter on the wheel.

So, if you have been drinking, have someone else do the driving, the council recommended.

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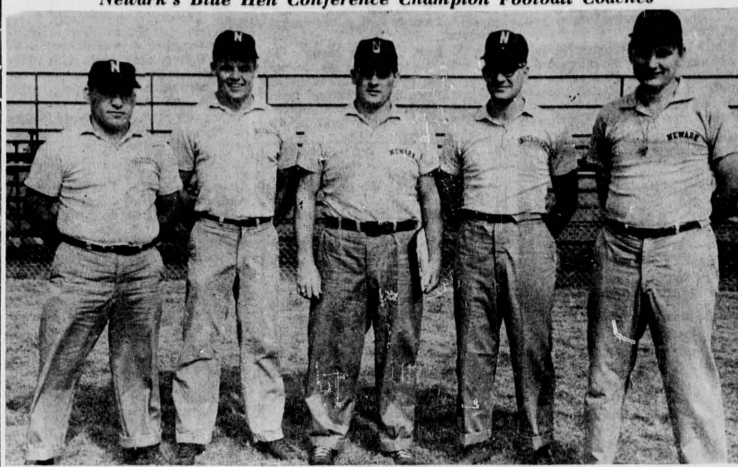

Delaware Park Offers New Racing Strip In Resurfacing For "Softer" Condition

Delaware Park has completely resurfaced the racing strip and arrived at a new surface for 1961.

Donald P. Ross, president of the Delaware Steeplechase and Race Association, announced this week.

As of now the Delaware Park racing strip is under about six inches of snow, but beneath that is a "stand" of barley which had grown two inches before the descent of the storm that blanketed so much of the East.

The work was conducted under supervision of William duPont, Jr., one of the nation's experts on racing strips whether dirt, grass or jumps.

Mr. duPont's plans were carried out by Delaware Park's Clarke Parson and a crew of 50 men who were on the job intensively for weeks following the close of the recent Delaware Park race meeting.

duPont and Pardee are an old combination on redoing racing strips, as they spent weeks at Santa Anita changing that strip some years ago, and worked on others including Mr. duPont's two private tracks, one of dirt and the other grass.

Perhaps the most significant thing about the Delaware Park project is not the size of the job, but the new scientific concept involving control of the strip for the future. Racing strips change constantly by wind and erosion, and planting with barley or some other crop is a device for holding the soil in place in the non-racing season.

duPont's plan, implemented by Pardee and his crew, began with test-taking at various New York, New Jersey and Illinois tracks, together with similar samples from selected private tracks, and Delaware Park. These samples were washed, then heat-treated in a crucible testing pan.

The residue, completely free of moisture, was worked through various screens and the various ingredients of coarse, medium, and fine sand, silt and clay determined.

Mr. duPont believes that the texture and ingredients of the Delaware Park strip can be controlled for the future. He is not ready to say that Mother Nature will not have a dry track or a muddy track when the sun shines or hides, but he does expect to have the same ingredients and percentages from year to year. This opinion is based largely on Delaware Park's ownership of a particular farm with a special soil at Frederica, and its ability to get Millville sand. The mix of the two is the base of the control.

Approximately 5,000 cu. yds. of new material went into the resurfacing job, equivalent to the entire surface of the strip to a depth of four inches. A crew of six men was used merely for loading at the Frederica farm, about 60 miles from Delaware Park. On the job, for almost a month, were 50 men with 35 trucks.

The thousands of cubic yards of old racing strip which had drummed last season to the flying hoofs of such stars as Tompion, Royal Native, Victoria Park, Quill, Stratus, Sailors Guide, Templed, Indian Maid, Berlo, Itobe and Itagreatday, will not be wasted.

The old cushion was trucked to the stable field and distributed on the roads there. Thus, next season horses will tread the 1960 strip in the stable field, and find a completely new surface on the race track.

It is Pardee's opinion that the 1961 strip will dry a little more slowly than the previous strip, as it has less coarse and medium sand. However, he believes it will be softer on the feet of horses since it will have a higher ingredient of fine sand and silt and clay, as well as a higher proportion of humus.

Nelson Coaches Bowl Game For Small College Losers

Delaware's Dave Nelson coached the small college all-stars in the All-American Bowl game last Monday in Tucson, Ariz., as the major school all-stars won the bowl game, 25-12.

Delaware Captain Mickey Heincken played at end for Nelson's team, with Bucknell's Paul Terhes completing 19 of 33 passes for 191 yards against the major college gridgers.

Terhes was selected as the most valuable player in the Arizona bowl game.

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Delaware Basketball Captain Jack Baly Tops Wisniewski Scorers With 75 Points

Captain Jack Baly, senior guard from Union, N. J., leads Delaware's four-game basketball statistics released by Coach Irv Wisniewski, whose Blue Hens have compiled a 3-1 record.

Baly has connected on 49 percent of his shots from the floor and 17 of 23 free throw attempts for 75 points—an average of 18.8 a game.

The 6-1 former Union High athlete owns the best field goal percentage among the regulars.

Baly is one of four starters averaging double figures.

Nate Cloud, 6-5 sophomore center from Wilmington, has poured in 59 points for 14.7 a game; Tommy Adams, 6-2 senior forward from Ocean City, N. J., is averaging 13.3, and John Barry, junior guard from Dunkirk, N. Y., has an 11.7 average.

Cloud is the Blue Hens' leading rebounder, averaging 14 a game. He hit his stride against Pennsylvania Military College when he grabbed 19 off the boards.

Bill Wagamon, 6-4 forward from Milton, ranks second to Cloud with 8.5 rebounds, including a high of 14 in the season's opener against Lehigh.

The Blue Hens lead in all departments except rebounding where opponents hold an edge of seven grabs a game.

Delaware leads in scoring by 10 points a game.

The Hens opened with wins over Lehigh, Johns Hopkins and PMAC, then lost an 81-80 heartbreaker to Bucknell at Lewisburg, because of the Bisons' superior work under the boards.

Delaware will be idle until Jan. 7, when the Hens meet Bucknell in a grudge match at Carpenter Field House at 8:15 p.m.
