1,000 New Jobs Slated June 1
With Chrysler's Second ShiftAuto Assembly Plant At Newark To Increase Production
With Two-Shift Operation; \$5 Million Annual Payroll
Increase Expected With Addition Of 1,000 Employees

A second shift operation to begin here at the Chrysler Corporation auto assembly plant on June 1, is expected to provide 1,000 new jobs with a \$5,000,000 annual addition to the local payroll, Chrysler officials announced this week. Operating on a single, daytime shift basis since December, 1961, the Chrysler assembly plant at Newark is producing some 60 automobiles per hour with approximately 2,600 employees.

With the two-shift operation scheduled to begin this June, shift personnel will be equalized, and hourly production of 40 cars is expected with 3,600 employees rolling some 640 cars per day off the assembly line—an increase of 160 automobiles over the present rate. C. E. Fowble, Jr., is the manager for the Chrysler assembly plant at Newark. He succeeded James G. Shepherd as plant manager last fall.

Under normal delivery schedules the Newark plant supplies cars for an area extending to North Carolina in the south, New York in the north, and west into Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

With production increases, deliveries as far south as Georgia and north into New England are expected.

With introduction of new models last year, deliveries were going from Newark as far north as Maine as a temporary measure.

Training of 150 key personnel in what company officials classify as more difficult jobs, especially in metal sections, has been in progress for several months preparing for the new shift.

Most of those being given job assignments are men still in the area who have worked for Chrysler and have some seniority rights and job experience.

Pre-School Tests
Scheduled Friday
To Aid 1st Graders

Robert W. Mayer, assistant superintendent for student services in the Newark school district, reports that this Friday is the date for the pre-school testing program to assist students over the first year in school.

The testing program will necessitate certain changes in the daily schedule, Mayer announced.

Sixth-grade classes at Ogletown and Central junior high will attend school on regular schedule, but in elementary school in the district will open for regular classes until 10 a.m.

Students in grades one through six should not be brought to any elementary school before 10 a.m., and all bus drivers have been notified of this change.

Parents who bring their children to school should arrive at the schedule so that children do not arrive much before 10 o'clock as they will not be permitted to enter the building during the testing.

There is no change in secondary attendance times for this Friday. Elementary schools will be dismissed at the regular time, also.

Libraries Lacking
For Two Schools
In Local DistrictReferendum Slated June 6
For Bond Issue, Tax Raise
For Facilities, Teachers

Two elementary schools in the Newark district — the Jennie E. Smith and Central schools — do not have libraries. Library books for the children in these two schools are stored in adjacent junior high schools where the children must go to use them.

This situation is far from what is recommended as good educational practice, and the minimum standards set by the American Library Association, local school authorities report.

The Newark Board of Education has scheduled a bond issue referendum for Saturday, June 6, from 2 to 9 p.m., for eight specific needs of the school district, including these two libraries.

"The two most pressing problems of schools sharing libraries with other schools," according to one Newark librarian, "are time and space. Time, because a librarian should be able to work with children of each school on a scheduled basis set up at the convenience of elementary teachers."

"The junior high school librarian is on an even tighter schedule because of the fully departmentalized structure of the secondary school and should be available to work with students during their specifically assigned class library periods."

"Obviously, something's got to give," when two schools are sharing one professional person and one library, and the something that gives is usually the program.

"Space is a problem because the one room is simply inadequate for storage of books needed by two schools. As more and more books are added for better educational and library program, the problem becomes even more severe," the librarian concluded.

Taxpayers of the Newark school district will be asked to decide on the need for libraries as well as a new elementary school, expansion of four existing buildings; site purchase and improvement; and the purchase of more library books to bring local schools up to the American Library Association standard of 10 books per pupil.

At the same time there will be another referendum for an 11-cent increase in the current expense tax rate to be used for teacher salaries.

Samuel Handoff, chairman of the city charter commission, announced yesterday that the charter commissioners will have a public meeting in the Newark City Council office next Thursday at 8 p.m.

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Jones Wins Vote
Over Mrs. Munroe
For School BoardChristiana Resident Tops
Saturday Balloting By 12
Votes To Defeat Incumbent

Albert H. Jones of Christiana defeated Mrs. John A. Munroe of Newark by 12 votes last Saturday to win election to the Newark Board of Education, with a total of 964 ballots cast.

Mrs. Munroe, who is completing her first four-year elective term as a member of the local school board, was defeated 488-476 in her bid for reelection.

Jones, elected to his first term on the Newark Board of Education, was president of the Christiana-Salem school board from 1957 to 1960, before consolidation with the Newark school district.

General service manager of the Du Pont film department's Chestnut Run plant, he has a daughter in Christiana High School, and two sons attending the Christiana-Salem Elementary School.

Jones led Mrs. Munroe in the voting in the 10 polling places, rolling up a 102-2 advantage at Christiana-Salem School.

He led 62-38 at Brookside; 17-10 at Christiana High; 31-20 at Eden; 30-13 at Gallaher; 43-36 at Medill; and 51-24 at the Jennie E. Smith-Ogletown Junior High polls.

Mrs. Munroe topped her opponent 162-63 at the West Park Place School; 35-19 at Newark High School; and 136-50 at the Central schools.

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Late Debate Defeats Proposal
For City Grant To NHS StudentProposal For \$100 Scholarship To Political Science
Scholar Stymied; Council Rejects Planning Group's
Sidewalk Study Offer; Constable Fee Refunds Slated

"I withdraw my motion," Councilman William M. Coverdale said at 11:50 p.m. last Monday when his proposal for city provision of a \$100 scholarship for an outstanding Newark High School political science student created late debate by Councilmen Henry R. Folsom, Jr., and David H. Doehrlert. And the regular scheduled meeting of Newark City Council was adjourned just before midnight.

Folsom opposed limiting the scholarship to a Newark resident with the thought that a more deserving student may be excluded, and Doehrlert suggested extending scholarship benefits to all Newark resident students, but included those attending high schools outside the city.

Introducing the proposal, Mayor Joseph A. Shields said that he felt the proposed scholarship would have to be awarded to a resident of the city because such an award would be provided from city taxes.

Council unanimously adopted a resolution approving the American garden-type apartment development on South College Avenue with a 35-ft. right of way to be deeded to the city as a public roadway, and Councilman Albert P. Chittenden urged that "architectural eyesores" be prevented with approval of architects' drawings by the city manager and planning director.

Esthetic Regulations

Planning Director John Griesbaum cautioned that "esthetic regulations" may be based on "pretty shaky ground," and addressed Chittenden and Griesbaum, Mayor Shields asked "how about you battling this out?" and calling for a vote, obtained unanimous approval for the apartment project.

The mayor opposed council's denial of Arthur Park assumption from sidewalk requirements, and the planning commission offer to review the city program for sidewalk regulations was refused with Folsom's comment that "we have already done this."

Coverdale said "this sidewalk thing is odious, and I am personally tired of it," citing the late hour of 11 o'clock with the discussion, and it was agreed that council is to take care of the sidewalk problem with consistency and according to population density.

The contract for completion of the city's 1963 sidewalk program "within certain distance of schools" was awarded to Fontana Brothers for their low bid of \$147,375, with a total of \$1,000 of this cost to be borne by the city.

The contract for city purchase of a substation unit was awarded to Artcraft Electric Co. of Maryland as one of two low bidders with a price of \$30,400. The municipal budget includes \$30,000 for this expenditure, City Manager J. Francis Neide said.

Solicitor's Responsibility

Council agreed that City Solicitor Kenneth Lewis be responsible for drafting all municipal ordinances and resolutions, and concerning city annexation of property on the west side of Cooch's Bridge Road as requested by residents of the area, the solicitor is to review local laws on annexation in comparison with the Delaware code, and to present recommendations on legal procedure.

The third report from the city committee on housing was referred to the city manager for recommendations with Coverdale's objection to the committee's proposal for regulation of all rental units. Councilman Coverdale said that the situation was "adequately covered by the minimum housing law" and cited additional regulation as approaching a "police state" with "overbearing renting rooms subject to inspection."

The mayor instructed Neide to list all projects referred to the city manager for subsequent establishment of priorities by council.

Sewer system engineering for recently annexed city territory to the south in the area of Route 896 at a cost of \$5,000 was authorized, and council approved issuance of a building permit for an addition to the Newark Auto Parts building at the corner of East Cleveland Avenue and Chapel Street, with traffic safety measures to be taken.

Creation of parks and recreation advisory committee is to be used as a guide by the municipal finance committee in budgetary work, and council authorized an additional appropriation of \$1,600 for the Greater Newark Recreation Association program.

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





THEY DO COME BACK!

When a stroke occurs, perhaps the hardest thing the patient must fight is a feeling of hopelessness and despair. Strokes are not hopeless. In the past 10 years, medical research has given us many effective weapons against stroke—new drugs, surgical procedures, and physiotherapeutic methods which can restore muscle function to even severely disabled stroke patients. And the outlook for the future is even brighter.

A most important weapon at the service of the stroke patient is his own determination to recover—to strike back at stroke. One good example of how such determination pays off, is Louis Pasteur, the French chemist whose contributions literally shaped modern biological science.

During Pasteur's lifetime (1822-1895), practically nothing could be done for the stroke patient except to let Nature take her course. Yet Pasteur lived and worked for 27 years after he had suffered a "big stroke" at the age of 45. What's more, much of his best work was done in this period in which, it is reported, he had another 50 "little strokes."

Refusing to throw in the towel, Pasteur went on to make scientific history as the founder of microbiology and as principal architect in the conquest of germ-caused disease. We honor his memory every time we take a container of pasteurized milk from the refrigerator.

In our own time, perhaps the most famous persons who have survived strokes to continue their important work are Sir Winston Churchill and former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Sir Winston was stricken at 79 during his final term as Britain's Prime Minister. He celebrated his 89th birthday last November.

In 1957, during his second term as President, Mr. Eisenhower had a stroke which was mild and transitory in its effects. He made an excellent recovery and soon returned for three more years of what is often called the most strenuous job in the world. He was 73 last October.

Discouragement is a common side-affect of stroke, one that sometimes affects the whole family as well as the patient. However, the fact that should be stressed is that nine out of 10 stroke patients do recover.

Modern medical research will continue to provide new ways to help the patient fight stroke. Stroke can be conquered. It happens every day.

Services were conducted in the chapel at Grace-lawn Memorial Park on Monday afternoon with interment in that cemetery.

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
