## LET THE PEOPLE KNOW

The Outdoor Writers Association of America—an organization which is vitally concerned with the conservation and development of our water and other natural resources—has adopted a resolution condemning the "big dam" which is the incredibly expensive pet of socialized groups.

The resolution pointed out that dams usually are second-hand water conservation measures, saying that it is practically certain that if watersheds were managed to produce a more constant flow of silt-free water, there would be much less need for the gigantic dam down stream. Then it made this significant observation: "The dam must be told in advance the whole truth concerning constructional projects which will be paid for by the citizens. . . . Over-playing 'benefits' of a project, over losses, underestimating costs to get initial approval with ultimate costs multiplying unreasonably, serious errors from general public knowledge, as happened in actions of some public agencies, cannot be excused."

Millions have been wasted in big dams for which there was no genuine need—untold millions more will be wasted in the same manner if the socialists in and out of government have their way. Socialism is both incredibly destructive and incredibly destructive—measured in the coin of dollars as well as in money and other material considerations.

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### TV Effect On Children Discussed By Local Man

The impact of television on our children was discussed by Gordon C. Gentry, associate director of the University of Delaware extension department, at a meeting of the Alfred I. duPont Young Men's Association on Tuesday night in the school auditorium.

Mr. Gentry analyzed TV's influence on the health, attitudes, education and lives of youngsters. A question and answer period followed.
