Blue and Gold Wins Mile Relay Event

University of Delaware Athletes Provide Sensation at Franklin Field

The University of Delaware track athletes provided one of the surprises of the afternoon at the Penn relay carnival on Saturday, when the Blue and Gold speedsters carried off the honors in their event with a record of making a new mark for their class and establishing the best record of the day for the college relay teams, in which there were about six classes, with five and six institutions represented in each.

Our athletes turned in their biggest victory when they captured first place in the fast time of 3 minutes, 30 2-5 seconds, which was three seconds better than their nearest competitors in the college classes. In addition to the record in the college relays, the Delaware team finished third in the mile relay for the Middle Atlantic States championship, the winning team Rutgers, making a mark of 3 minutes, 25 2-5 seconds. Rutgers won the race over Lafayette by a few inches, while the Blue and Gold finished third. Thirteen colleges were represented in this event.

Betzmer Makes Fine Showing

Betzmer added more glory, when he placed third in the javelin event with a field of 30 candidates representing every college and university in the country. McDonnell, the Blue and Gold pole vaulter, cleared the bar at 11 feet 6 inches, being tied with six others for third place.

Of the Delaware runners, individual honors go to Smith, the fleet-footed youth of Quality Hill. Smith not only helped the University to hang up a new record in the class relays by stepping a fast quarter, but came back in the Middle States championship and ran the last leg of that event in remarkable fashion and won third place. Lilly, the dark horse, also ran in good style, and from his showing will no doubt earn a permanent place

Track Team Wins Another

Speedsters Continue Winning Streak by Outclassing Haverford

University of Delaware track team added another victory to its list when it smothered Haverford in a dual meet on Joe Frazer Field on Tuesday. The final score was 72 1/2 - 38 1/2. Fouracre, Harmer, and Betzmer were the outstanding features of the meet. Fred tied the University record for the 220 yard hurdles, and Betzmer again broke the javelin record. Smith's running in the 440 was a very creditable performance when he paced through the event like a champion. Gunlack, after several weeks of faithful training, came through with a shot-put heave of 32 ft. 6 ins. Gunlack's showing was very promising and indicate great things in the meets to come.

Humphreys is slowly but surely regaining his old time form and heaved the spear 154 ft. In the discus, Betzmer broke his record for the distance by heaving the missile 112 ft. 9 in.; this is far below Gray Carter's record but "Tarzan" is new at this event. McDonnell, as usual, won the pole vault. We may seem to be neglecting the "Smiling Irishman" in the write-up but all know his ability for soaring to heaven. Bill Lilly finished a strong second in the 220 yard dash. Pat Hoey ran a fine race in the two mile, fighting every inch of the way.

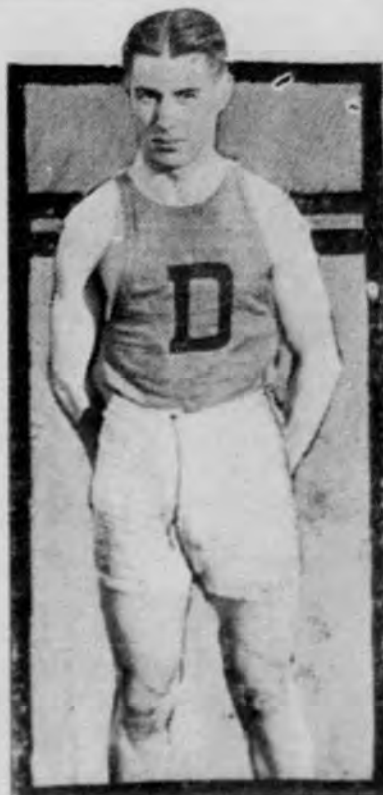

"Miss Bob White" Wins Applause

Annual Production by the Combined Dramatic Clubs Proves Great Success

Last Friday evening the Glee Clubs of the University presented the comedy opera "Miss Bob White," at the Newark Opera House. The presentation was so successful that it was interrupted by loud and frequent bursts of applause. From the raising of the curtain to the last note in the finale the attention of the audience was held by the extraordinary acting of the cast.

Miss Helen Fisher, who took the leading part, portrayed the character of "Miss Bob White" remarkably well. At all times she was at her ease and her acting and singing called forth much applause. Miss Eleanor Vinyard, of Milford, also played a leading role. As "Goldenrod," she typified the true Quaker girl. Her "Swing Song" in which she sang opposite James Deputy as "Jack Hearty," her lover, was a great success. Both Miss Vinyard and Miss Fisher were admirably suited for their parts and much of the credit of the opera belongs to them.

The comedians, Leonard B. Daley and J. Gilbert Christfield, created vast stores of amusement for the audience. Their natural wit and humor coupled with their dramatic ability were one of the outstanding features of the opera. They figured in every scene of importance and rendered their parts faultlessly.

Clifford A. Smith and F. Johnson Rowan as the "Duke of Hightitles" and "Lord Bashville" did remarkably well. Their excellent voices and their ability to portray the nobility as the American sees it were the source of much applause. Miss Beatrice Naylor portrayed her part exceptionally well as the "shrinking little bride" of Lord Bashville.

The choruses also deserve particular praise. In the last analysis the chorus determines the success or failure of the show. The choruses consisted of four groups: One-only-al Dames, Quaker Maids, Milk Maids, and Foxhunters. Several times the audience called the chorus out for encores. Special commendation was earned by these different groups.

To Miss Dora Wilcox, supervisor of music at the Women's College, goes the largest share of credit for the success of the play. Miss Wilcox has carried a large part of the responsibility and has worked unceasingly for the success of the opera. She was assisted by Miss Watson, Mr. Kirkbride, and Mr. Brinton, members of the faculty.

It is quite probable that the opera will be repeated in Wilmington, but as yet no date has been definitely set.

The Blue and Gold added another to her string of scalps when West Virginia University was defeated 5-3, at Frazer on Monday.

"Joe" Rothrock again demonstrated that when in form he is almost unbeatable. He did not allow a hit the last seven innings and not a runner in that time reached second.

West Virginia got the jump on the Blue and Gold by putting over two runs in the first inning. In the second, the visitors scored another on Wood's triple and S. Herrick's single, but this was the last time they even had a chance to score.

Delaware tied up the score in the first. After Wilson was out Donoho walked and scored on McDonald's three-base drive over S. Herrick's head. McDonald scored on a passed ball. In the third the "Chicks" took the lead. Wilson's drive was too hot for Maderia and went for a hit. Donoho dropped the ball down and by a fine sprint beat it out and both runners moved up a base when Woods threw wild to first. They scored on Madden's two-base smash to right center. Delaware's fifth run was put over in the fifth on Wilson's single, Donoho's sacrifice and McDonald's single to right. The latter was again the leading

on the relay squad, and be graduated from the Bolshevik class. Against Delaware in the college relay were such teams as Allegheny, City College of New York, Temple and University of Florida. At the start, Delaware drew fourth position from the pole, and at the crack of the gun, Fouracre, who started for Delaware, shot into the lead and finished his leg of the journey with a good ten-yard lead. Smith took up the chase and increased the lead to 25 yards.

The baton was passed to Pitman, who sped away from the field and at this point Delaware was in a class by itself. Harmer covered the last quarter. City College of New York's runner tried to make things interesting in the final lap, but it was useless.

Harmer finished fully 25 yards ahead of the field. Had there been any competition at all, it is hard to say what the Blue and Gold would have done, but it is safe to predict that they would have hung up a record for this class that would be tucked away for some time.

Delaware Places Third

Lilly was selected to start things in the Middle States event. There were 13 starters and Delaware being at the extreme outside position, it was difficult for Lilly to make his way to the front. Despite this, however, he came up from the rear position and in the home stretch, passed his competitors one by one and handed the baton to McMullen in fourth place. McMullen then sped away and while he failed to move up in the running, he closed up a nice little gap and Fouracre was sent away close behind the Haverford runner. Fouracre performed brilliantly and only inches separated the leaders. Smith then took up the last leg of the race and by remarkable courage and splendid running, he closed in on the Haverford runner, who was in third place and when but a few feet from the finish, nosed in ahead and placed third. It was one of the best races of the carnival.
