Workshop to examine budget choices

The Newark City Council will take a look at the tough choices it will face in coming years at a workshop meeting on Monday, July 25th at 7 p.m. in the Municipal Building on Elkton Road.

As outlined in a story in the Newark Post earlier this month, current financial trends suggest that property taxes may have to go up 5 percent

a year to retain existing services, with another 2 percent in fees. Otherwise service cuts will have to be made. The assumptions were based on budget forecasts between 2012 and 2016.

The city was able to avoid a property tax increase in the 2011 budget, but projections from city Finance Director Dennis McFarland indicate

that trend will not continue in coming years, as health care, pension and other costs continue to rise. In addition, the city has kept a tighter rein on expenses and further savings may be harder to find.

Water and electric rates



are expected to rise as the city works to deal with an aging infrastructure and build cash reserves that keep borrowing costs down. Both the electric utility and a water rate study are on the agenda. Residents have com-

plained that the recent electrical rate restructuring was passed without adequate discussion or notice.

The restructuring cut rates for large electrical users (Dow and the University of Delaware) while keeping most rates stable. However, those who use a minimal amount of electricity saw higher rates, due to the addition of a monthly fee.

Council members have said that everything is on the table including the possibility that the city's popular refuse service will be outsourced. The service has a high satisfaction rating among residents.

Brutal heat to pound area

A brutal blend of heat and humidity is expected to intensify in coming days with conditions peaking on Friday.

The National Weather Service issued a Heat Advisory issued for Newark and New Castle County beginning at 1 p.m. Tuesday. Heat and humidity could rise to dangerous levels on Thursday and Friday.

Those with health issues, such as heart and lung conditions should stay out of the sun and remain in an air-conditioned location, according to the release from the Weather Service. Those with elderly neighbors and relatives should make certain they are safe. Pets should be kept in a cool location with plenty of water available.

Individuals working or exercising outdoors should consider rescheduling activities for early morning or evening and should wear light-

colored clothing and drink plenty of water.

Persons with symptoms of heat stroke should call 9-1-1 immediately.

Dana Johnston, public information officer for the City of Newark, said those worried about paying utility bills that will rise during this period should contact the city's utility customer service desk to make arrangements. Staffers provide a list of nonprofits that can provide utility assistance.

To date, the city has not seen an increase in those seeking assistance, according to Johnston. She noted that the city often does not hear from customers until their funds are exhausted.

In its forecast, the Weather Service reported a very weak cool front dissipating by Thursday as high pressure in the central Atlantic combines with low pressure in southern Canada to send an "exceed-

ingly hot air mass into the area Thursday and Friday."

Another weak cool front should slip south into the region this weekend but may not be enough to break the heat wave before the beginning of next week.

High temperatures, as of mid-week, were forecast to rise to 98 on Thursday and 100 on Friday, according to the Weather Service. It won't improve much on Saturday with a top temperature of 97 and a slightly lower 95 on Sunday.

Such temperatures are not unusual in this region in late July, forecasters noted. However, the combination of high temperatures and high humidity create dangerous conditions for those with health issues and even healthy persons who fail to take precautions.

Three arrested in death of Newark-area man

Dover, Del. police charged three more men in the shooting death last year of a Newark man.

The Associated Press reported that Dion Hicks, 26, of Magnolia; David Johnson, 29, of Dover, and Areon Gibbs, of Plymouth, N.C., were each charged with first-degree murder, robbery and other offenses. Hicks and Johnson are being held without bail in Delaware; Gibbs is awaiting extradition in North Carolina.

Police say the men fatally shot Quinton Dorsey, 33, on March 24th, 2010 at Whiteoak Condos. He suffered multiple gunshot wounds.

On April 15th, 2010, Dover Police detectives arrested Leroy Stratton for his involvement in the shooting. Stratton

was charged with Murder 1st, Robbery 1st, Possession of a Firearm During Commission of a Felony and Conspiracy 1st.

Upon arrival officers found Dorsey unconscious with multiple gunshot wounds. He was rushed to Bayhealth and later flown to Christiana Hospital listed in critical condition, where he later died.

Road rage incident turns violent

Newark Police are investigating a road rage incident that occurred last Thursday on Main Street and continued to a car dealership on E. Cleveland Avenue.

The occurrence began when the driver of a black Volkswagen Jetta parked his vehicle in front of the Galleria, located at 45 E. Main St., around 8:40 p.m. on July 15. A green Honda hatchback stopped short behind the victim's car, with two suspects exiting the vehicle. An argu-

ment was initiated by one of the suspects, who stated that he was going to hurt the victim. The victim stayed in his car and tried to roll up the windows to protect himself. The other suspect held down the passenger-side window, while the first suspect kicked off the driver's-side mirror.

The victim sped away, going down Main Street, turning onto Cleveland Avenue, Chapel Street, E. Delaware Avenue, onto Capitol Trail northbound, finally making a u-turn to proceed southbound on Capitol Trail, with the Honda pursuing the entire way. The chase made its way to the intersection of Capitol Trail and Red Mill Road, where another car, a black Honda Civic, attempted to cutoff the victim.

After foiling the attempt, the driver made his way back into Newark, where the driver finally escaped his pursuers.

Authorities questioned the victim and found out that he is acquainted with the attackers through a girl he met at a bar. The first suspect is the girl's boyfriend and is described as a white male, 25 to 28 years old, 5 feet 10 inches to 6 feet tall, with short blond hair. The other suspect was described as a white male, 6 feet 2 inches tall, and was identified as a resident of Chapel Hill. Police are attempting to locate this

person for questioning.

Police have reviewed traffic camera footage from Main Street that matched the victim's description of the event, the vehicles involved and photos of the victim and suspects. Officers are attempting to contact all involved parties for additional questioning.

Teen girl missing

New Castle County Police are searching for a missing teenage girl who disappeared from her home in the Hunters Crossing Apartment complex early Monday morning. The apartments are northwest of the city of Newark, off New London Road (Del. Route 896), near the Maryland state line and White Clay Creek State Park. At 5:20 a.m. police were called to a residence at the complex and were told that Amber Lynn Gates, 14, was missing. Officers were told that Gates had an argument with another family member prior to fleeing the residence and has not returned home. Gates was last seen wearing blue jeans and a white tank top with a black zippered hooded sweatshirt. Gates is described as being approximately 5 feet, 5 inches tall and weighing between 130 and 140 pounds. She has blond and pink shoulder-length hair. No photo of the teen

was immediately available. Police have searched a number of locations where she was known to frequent, but have been unable to locate the teen. The emergency phone service "A Child is Missing" has also been activated. Bike stolen from residence

The owner of a Trek mountain bike, worth \$200, reported that an unknown suspect had taken it by cutting the lock, as the bike was secured to a tree.

The theft occurred in the unit block of Thorn Lane, in front of one the apartment buildings located there. The owner told officers that he had observed the bike still tethered to the tree the morning of the theft, but that it was gone when he returned later that day. The cut lock was seen in the grass near the tree.

The owner stated that the bicycle was registered with the University of Delaware and has one their stickers on it.

No witnesses or surveillance footage were found by authorities and no other physical data was found at the scene.

Air conditioner broken in criminal act

A resident of the unit block of Academy Street reported that an unknown suspect pushed in his window mounted air conditioner, causing it to break.

The suspect is described a white male, in his twenties, wearing a dark colored baseball hat, white shirt, and dark athletic shorts. He was seen getting into a tan colored vehicle and travelling eastbound on E. Delaware Avenue, exiting the Methodist Church parking lot.

Damage to the air conditioning unit is \$200. A basement window was also broken, causing \$50 of damage.

Video surveillance footage captured images of the vehicle at the intersection of E. Delaware Avenue and S. Chapel Street, though the registration was not visible. Police are reviewing other footage in order to get a better description of the vehicle and/or suspect.



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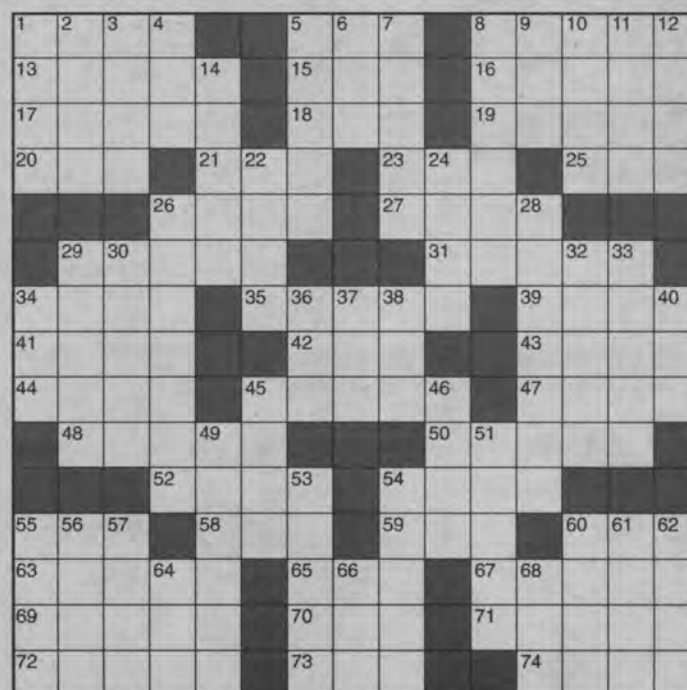

At-home science experiments – Learn by doing

"Learn by doing" is the national motto for the 4-H youth development organization. What better way to put this motto into action than through science-related activities and experiments? During the 4-H Science Day Camp held in August, over fifty campers will gather at the University of Delaware to explore science and technology.

Through this summer camp and other activities offered throughout New Castle County, children will have the opportunity to actively engage their brain, which may otherwise not be challenged throughout the summer months. It is important to continue learning during the summer so when children return to school, only a minimal amount of time can be spent on re-teaching lost information.

Although there are several summer day camp opportunities that incorporate science into the program, there are also a number of science-related activities that can be done right at home. Many of the at-home experiments



use household items that are generally already inside the average home. Because of the hands-on aspect, children are more likely to retain information regarding science experiments than mathemat-

ics. Because of this, at-home science experiments are highly encouraged.

Children who enjoy getting their hands dirty could go outside and investigate the soil. This way, children can

see which soil is best to use for planting and could possibly even begin a home garden. Children interested in learning about mixtures and solutions can take apart a variety of foods including Chex Mix or multi-pack candy bags. They can also experiment with salt-water and sugar-water solutions. If children are enjoying this topic, there are recipes available online to create Play-Doh or Oobleck using common household ingredients such as cornstarch and water.

The 4-H Science Day Camp runs August 8-12, 2011, and will cover a variety of areas including animal science, energy use, plant and soil sciences, food science and more.

Graduate students from the University of Delaware gather together to teach many of the courses. During these classes, campers will have a chance to create strands of bacteria from pipe cleaners, learn about the new food pyramid while eating tasty, healthy dishes created by Food Science graduate students, and learn about the milking process from the dairy cows located at Webb Farm, University of Delaware.

Suits filed over DuPont herbicide

A Pennsylvania homeowner and an Indiana golf course company Monday filed a class action lawsuit against DuPont Co. charging that DuPont's herbicide Imprelis is causing widespread death among trees and other vegetation across the country. The case was filed in U.S. District Court in Delaware.

A story on the problems was published online by the Newark Post over the weekend.

The suits had been expected as law firms posted Google advertisements seeking possible victims. Earlier, a Michigan golf course filed a similar suit. Possible problems with Imprelis were first reported in Michigan, with the New York Times publishing a story last week. In June, DuPont had issued an advisory on the herbicide, which is only sold to commercial landscapers.

University of Delaware Extension officials confirmed they had received reports related to use of the herbicide but stressed that no testing had taken place.

DuPont spokesperson, Kate Childress issued the following statement: "DuPont is committed to proper stewardship of all of its products. We are working with our customers to investigate reports of unfavorable symptoms observed on certain tree species, primarily Norway spruce and white pine. We are evaluating our response to the complaint, but are confident

that this purported class action lawsuit is unfounded, and we will oppose it vigorously."

The latest complaint charges that DuPont failed to adequately disclose the risks Imprelis poses to trees, even when applied as directed, and failed to provide adequate instructions for its safe application.

"Even though it's a new product, Imprelis has been widely adopted by landscapers and lawn-care specialists who believed DuPont's claims that it is safe and an environmentally-friendly herbicide," stated plaintiffs' counsel Jonathan Selbin. "Instead, the evidence is quickly piling up that Imprelis is attacking trees as if they are weeds."

"It is critical that property owners with dead or dying trees take steps now to preserve evidence," Selbin added. "You should take soil and foliage samples that can be analyzed later to show the presence of Imprelis, as well as take detailed photographs of the dead or damaged trees."

"This is affecting thousands of homeowners and other property owners, such as golf courses, who have watched as their valued and valuable trees die," said plaintiffs' counsel Scott Starr. Noting that DuPont recently acknowledged the growing problem, sending a letter to some owners and posting a belated warning on its website, Starr added: "DuPont should promptly take Imprelis off the market and accept full responsibility for the great damage the product has caused."

Plaintiff R.N. Thompson Golf, LLC, owns and manages several golf courses in the greater Indianapolis area, including the Winding Ridge Golf Course and the Ironwood Gold Course. "We have witnessed catastrophic tree loss around our golf courses after the application of Imprelis, and have received numerous complaints and inquiries about the tree damage and appearance of our courses from our customers," explained Mark Thompson, Chief Executive Officer of R.N. Thompson Golf, LLC. "We filed this lawsuit to inform other businesses and homeowners about this problem to let them know there is reason their trees are dying and to give them a course of action to fix the problem."

The lawsuit, entitled *Shomo v. E.I. du Pont de Nemours & Company*, was filed in federal court in Delaware, where DuPont has its headquarters. The proposed class consists of all persons and entities whose property was exposed to Imprelis between October 4, 2010 and the date of trial, in particular, those who own: (a) property on which Imprelis was applied; (b) trees or other vegetation whose roots extend under property on which Imprelis was applied or; (c) property onto which Imprelis migrated.

The relief plaintiffs seek for themselves and the proposed class includes compensation for the cost of replacing trees that have died or are dying and an injunction barring DuPont from continuing to sell Imprelis.

This week's Out of the Attic item is a view of the modern Howard Johnson's Motor Lodge on South College Avenue as it appeared in an advertising insert in a 1969 Delaware State Chamber of Commerce publication. This was one of the earliest motel and conference facilities in town. With its companion Howard Johnson's Restaurant next door (now Friendly's), it was heavily used by local businesses, organizations, and residents. The Banquet Room and Meeting Room hosted countless conferences, club dinners, special events, and party gatherings. The brochure describes the guest rooms as, "Suites so elegant, they'll make you feel as important as your really are. Big double beds, four inches longer, let you stretch without pulling off the warm fluffy blankets."

Handsome wood paneling covers the soundproof walls and thick wall-to-wall carpet-



ing envelopes the huge 350 square-foot suite. Each room has big-screen color television with remote control. Your bath has two shower heads, heat lamps for drying and lots of large soft towels. Outside your sliding-glass doors is a patio designed to let you enjoy the sun."

Newark QB focuses on senior year

his college decision before his senior season begins, but instead will follow Simpson's advice and wait until after the season, hoping that by doing so it could lead to more offers, and thus, more schools from which to choose.

"In addition to the football program, academics and the area surrounding the college are important to me," said Reynolds, a member of the National Honor Society who plans to major in criminal justice in hopes of one day becoming a lawyer. "I like hot weather. I want to be in a good area so I can enjoy the college life. I don't want to be in the middle of nowhere."

"My dream schools to play at are Virginia and Virginia Tech. And hopefully coaches will come in and see me throwing to two future [Atlantic Coast Conference] receivers and hopefully I'll get some more offers."

Those receivers are Xavier Griffin and David Grinnage, who each verbally committed to North Carolina State University earlier this summer. And so now, with an arsenal of Div. I prospects as targets, Reynolds admits the expectations are as high as they've been in his four years under center at Newark.

"There are higher expectations," he said. "I'm glad for [Griffin and Grinnage]. Whatever they do on the field helps me out and vice versa. We are all in this together."

Together is a term often used in the Reynolds household. The soft-spoken young man is quick to point out the love and support he has received from his mom, her parents, and his other grandmother. So much support, in fact, that they will be part of his college decision.

"I want my family to be able to come see me play," he said. "I am very close to my mother, and my grandfather and two grandmothers have been there for me all my life. I get a lot of support from them."

Whether his family has a short drive to Delaware Stadium to see him play — Simpson pointed out that "to UD's credit, they were the first to offer and I think the first offer is always special to families" — or will travel to a campus in Virginia, or somewhere in between, one thing is certain — on the field and off, the future is bright for Taylor Reynolds.

"He has a tremendous amount of character, sophistication and dignity," Simpson said with pride. "In addition to his skill set and academic abilities, you are talking about a guy who brings a lot to a program ... to our program. Taylor is the epitome of whom you want in your locker room. I feel very fortunate he plays for us."

Taylor Reynolds is a gifted runner. He's also a gifted passer. And it's those two gifts that have made him a complete package and caught the attention of several college coaches who have already offered football scholarships to the Newark High senior.

But while the modest young man is flattered with the attention he is receiving from around the country, he says there is still work to be done and one primary goal to accomplish this fall right here at home.

"For the past three years we've been home watching other teams play in the playoffs," said Reynolds, who has attended several invite-only camps on college campuses this summer. "Hopefully this year other teams will be home watching us."

The dual-threat quarterback, who is listed at 6-foot-1, 185 pounds, earned first team All-State honors last season after passing for 2,380 yards and 23 touchdowns. The flashy runner also rushed for 758 yards and 11 scores while leading the Yellowjackets to a 6-4 record. It's those impressive stats along with his overall athletic skills that convinced several college coaches he was worthy of a football scholarship.

"Every college coach who has seen his films is enthused," said Newark coach Butch Simpson, who in his 34 years as head coach has seen more than his share of players move on to play Div. I football. "They see the obvious — athlete first; and what I like the most is that they didn't run with that by saying 'we are going to recruit him as an athlete,' even though it's been mentioned. Every school who has made him an offer felt strongly he was legitimately a college quarterback."

The schools that have made offers include Delaware, Delaware State, Old Dominion, Elon, Liberty, James Madison and Bucknell.

"Old Dominion and Liberty said Taylor would step right in to a system they've already had success with," Simpson said. "They run the same offense that we do. And what is really interesting is that both of them have returning quarterbacks who are in the Top 10 as finalists for the Walter Payton Award."

"Another neat thing is that some of the other schools talked about that although they don't have a system like ours, they like what we do well enough to say that with Taylor they would incorporate our offense into theirs to put enormous pressure on defenses."

New charter school to open next month in Newark

Aug. 25th has been scheduled for the grand opening of the Las Américas ASPIRA Academy. The academy will open on Ruthar Drive east of Newark.

ASPIRA Academy is a Spanish/English dual-language charter school for students in grades K-8. It will open in August 2011 in

socio-economic backgrounds. Half of the Academy's students will be primary English speakers and the other half primary Spanish speakers. in six years in the program while gaining the academic, physical, social and emotional skills to succeed in school and in life, according to the information on the website.

UD, Fraunhofer announce partnership

Delaware Gov. Jack Markell, Fraunhofer USA President Georg Rosenfeld and University of Delaware President Patrick Harker, signed an agreement combining the strengths of the Fraunhofer Center for Molecular Biotechnology (CMB) and the University of Delaware research into a partnership that aims to develop interdisciplinary programs and create educational and economic benefits for the First State.

According to a joint release, development of any biological product, from discovery to market, takes more than a decade and hundreds of millions of dollars. In addition, in spite of significant increases in new discoveries, the pipeline of biological products actually reaching the market has decreased. One of the reasons for this is the weakness of translational research that moves discoveries from university portfolios into an industry product pipeline. This partnership, among other things, provides opportunity to close the gap between scientific innovation and the commercial market, according to the joint announcement.

"By translating basic discoveries into clinical and commercial applications, the combined strengths of the two institutions could lead to significant economic benefit for Delaware and the region. The discover-

ies that have been and will be made at these facilities can have an impact worldwide," said Markell. "Our state has a well-earned reputation as a center for excellence and innovation, which this partnership furthers."

The University of Delaware has established a strong complement of life-sciences core instrumentation centers. Many of these centers are located at the Delaware Biotechnology Institute, directly adjacent to CMB. These instrumentation centers include state-of-the-art facilities for bioimaging,

sequencing and genotyping, proteomics, bioinformatics and others.

CMB is a unique institution conducting research and development in the area of plant biotechnology, utilizing newly developed and cutting-edge technologies to advance products for infectious disease and autoimmune disorders in humans. The Center houses nearly 90 researchers with expertise in plant virology, molecular biology, protein engineering, protein biochemistry, immunology, vaccine development, Quality Assurance, Quality Control and regulatory expertise to guide clinical product development. CMB has also established advanced

research facilities, including a GMP pilot plant for production of clinical grade materials, and has successfully conducted two Phase 1 clinical trials.

This six-year agreement will provide increased investment from Fraunhofer CMB's parent organization, German-based Fraunhofer Gesellschaft. Rosenfeld believes that the new partnership will be beneficial to all the parties. "The partnership will provide each with access to the other's technical know-how, expertise and facilities as well as increased opportunities to collaborate on advanced applied research projects and improved possibilities to commercialize results. This type of partnership is the model upon which the Fraunhofer organization was established and has developed throughout its history."

Alan Levin, director of Delaware's Economic Development Office, says the state has seen great success with its investment to date in Fraunhofer. "Through the past ten years, CMB has moved its alternative vaccine production technology from concept through pre-clinical studies to clinical development, while adding nearly 100 high-paying, high-impact, scientific jobs to the Delaware economy. We look forward to the Center's continued growth and believe that this new, expanded partnership enhances Delaware's competitive position for biotechnology companies."
