Local Real Estate Association Announces Policy On Housing

President Alden H. Bugher Announces NREA Adoption Of Policy Supporting Open Housing Principle, State Bill With Exclusions; Group Opposes City Limit Law

"The members of the Newark Real Estate Association support the principle of open housing," President Alden H. Bugher said after a policy meeting of the association last Tuesday morning, but Bugher added that the association "will continue to oppose any future legislation of this type for the city only. Newark is more than just a city, it is a larger community."

"In lieu of city efforts in this direction, we will support wholeheartedly and actively, individually and as an association, State House Bill 170 as written. It includes the two following provisions: Bugher continued concerning the policy adopted by the Newark Real Estate Association.

Provisions are that cases "where the lease or rental of rooms in owner-occupied housing or building having five or less rental units," and "where the lease or rental of apartments in owner-occupied buildings having no more than two rental units," be excluded.

Policy Statement
The policy adopted by the association last Tuesday further states that "we have adopted practices and worked with all community groups in an effort to extend on a voluntary basis, the opportunity to own or lease real estate to all persons without regard to race, creed, color, or national origin."

Following the announced association support of the state bill will be a recommendation of provisions, the statement continues with "we feel this is a major step for an association such as ours, but we recognize one major fact, America is to America, must be for all Americans."

"To those in the Newark area actively working for an open housing bill, we ask that they not be discouraged by our efforts to thwart city action, but to be encouraged in knowing that they have helped at least make one group, the Newark Real Estate Association, recognize a broader need."

Boy Scouts To Aid Goodwill Program In Bag Collection

This Saturday is Good Turn Day. Seven 11,000 Boy Scouts will pick up bags of clothing and other items donated by householders to Goodwill Industries. Scouts of New Castle, Kent and Cecil counties of the Del-Mar-Va Council, Boy Scouts of America, are participating in this drive for the ninth successive year.

Some 55,000 Goodwill bags have been distributed by the Scouts, and they hope to find them all filled and ready when they return for them Saturday.

Donated merchandise is used to provide work for 125 handicapped employees of Goodwill Industries, who refurbish and repair the items, for sale at reasonable prices at one of the five Goodwill stores in the area.

After the boys pick up the bags Saturday, they will take them to central collection points from which they will be brought to the Goodwill warehouse by trucks and drivers donated by Delaware trucking industries.

Executive Director J. Carville Simmons, of the non-profit United Fund agency, has called donations of material "the lifeblood of Goodwill Industries."

Handicapped Folk Offered Services Of "Talking Book"

"Talking Book" service is now available to Newark area residents who are blind or visually handicapped. A demonstration talking book machine and talking book have been placed in the Newark Free Library to enable the public to become acquainted with the service.

Reading materials and equipment are provided by the United States Government through the Library of Congress and are made available through regional libraries.

In Delaware, distribution of record players is administered by the State Library Commission and the Delaware Commission for the Blind. Upon application, the record-player is delivered to the residence of the handicapped person, while reading materials are mailed from the Philadelphia regional free library for the blind.

In this area application can be made through the Newark Free Library.

Kase, Co-Chairman For First Festival Of College Drama

American College Theatre Honors Dr. C. Robert Kase As Leader For D.C. Event

Dr. C. Robert Kase of Newark has been named co-chairman of the first American College Theatre Festival, to be held in Washington, D.C. in the spring of 1969.

Kase and Peggy Wood, stage and screen actress, will head the central committee for the 10-day festival, to give national recognition to high quality college and university theatre productions.

The festival will be staged by Friends of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, the Smithsonian Institution, and American Airlines.

College competition culminating in the festival, is being organized by the American Educational Theatre Association and the American National Theatre and Academy.

Thirteen regional committees will screen and nominate campus productions next fall. A committee will review regional presentations and select 10 to be staged between April 27 and May 11, 1969 in two theaters in the Washington area.

Other purposes of the competition and festival are to promote public interest in theater and film, and to select participants from campus theater groups.

More than 225,000 students in 1,600 college and university theater groups are invited to take part in regional competition.

Computer Lights On Highway Offer Non-Stop Travel

Kirkwood Highway Traffic To Be Controlled By New Synchronization Of Lights

Computer-controlled traffic lights from Newark to Elsmere on Kirkwood Highway will cut travel time between the two towns by as much as 30 per cent according to Raymond S. Pusey, head of the State Highway Department's traffic division.

The new lights at six intersections to start with, are on order. The master control box was delivered three weeks ago, "and the manufacturer promised a delivery date that would have the system installed and operating before the end of May," Pusey added.

When the six are installed, he explained, they will be connected into the master control box into which will be fed information from traffic counters at every intersection.

In the control box is a computer that will adjust the traffic-light pattern, as needed, on the entire highway.

Telephone lines will be used to transmit information from traffic counters to computer, and from there to traffic lights.

Non-stop trips from Newark will be possible with the new system under ideal conditions.

If traffic density becomes critical, signals will be set to reduce the amount of traffic going into the highway. The system will try to maintain the speed at 35 mph, for optimum highway capacity.

"All this is made possible by solid-state components," Pusey said. This is among the first such installations in the country and "that's why it's taking so darn long."

Mayor, Three Councilmen To Be Elected Next Tuesday In Newark Municipal Vote

Registered voters in the City of Newark will elect a mayor and three councilmen with the annual municipal vote to be conducted at six polling places here next Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. There are 3,955 registered voters in the City of Newark.

Mayor Norma B. Handloff, seeking reelection for a second two-year term, is opposed by Francis E. B. McCann in his first bid for local public office.

With Councilman David H. Doehlfert retiring after two consecutive terms as the 3rd district representative, Alden H. Bugher and John H. Fasnacht are competitors for the council seat in this district.

Councilman Arthur P. Mayer, seeking a second successive term as representative for the 5th district, is opposed by former Councilman George M. Wilson.

Councilman Alan R. Thomas is unopposed for a second term in the 6th district.

Councilman Frank J. Osborne, Jr., William M. Coverdale, and William E. Frame have second years to go in their terms.

Housing Plats, 3 Ordinances Approved By Newark Council

Laws Increasing Meter Installation Charge, Amending Union Agreement, Creating Ass't Electrical Engineer Post Enacted; Barksdale Road Bridge "2 Years Away"

Three ordinances were approved at final readings last Monday night at a special meeting of Newark City Council, and plats for the housing developments of Hunting Hills, Collingswood, and Cherry Hill Manor received council approval.

New ordinances provided for increasing meter yoke, crock, and installation charges at cost plus 10 per cent for metering; amending the collective bargaining agreement with the American Federation of State County and Municipal Employees Local Union 1670, AFL-CIO, to provide similar employment terms and conditions for non-union, hourly rated workers; and creating the position of assistant to the electrical engineer.

Council unanimously endorsed provisional approval of a preliminary plat for the Hunting Hills development of 44-acres after objections raised by Councilman William M. Coverdale and Alan R. Thomas concerning a reported sewage problem in the area.

City Planner Alan Chase said that "subdivision regulations do not include provisions of sanitary sewer systems," and the developer's Attorney William Lynch pointed out that "installation of ditches follows approval of plat."

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Bond Referendum Result "Mandate" Wilson Affirms

Former City Councilman George Wilson, campaigning for the 5th district council seat, says the language of the forthcoming parks and recreation bond referendum is ambiguous - but, as a councilman, he will regard the referendum vote as a mandate from the people of Newark.

"It's what I would call an 'Ordy' question," Wilson says. "The language appears to leave room for delay or changes in the parks program, even if the referendum passes."

Nevertheless, Wilson says, he regards the parks and recreation program as a major issue requiring a clear statement of any candidate's position.

"The voters should know when they vote on the referendum that their decision will be carried out promptly," Wilson declares.

"Whatever the result of the vote, I will abide by it, but if the vote is favorable to the bond issue I will push for immediate implementation of the parks program."

Wilson, who already has come out with a proposal to open one council meeting each month with public discussion so that citizens can make their views heard, says his position on the parks referendum grows from the same concern.

"There shouldn't be any question," he says, "that all of Newark's voters play a role in determining what the town does about any of the issues confronting it."

"When the voters make their wishes known in a referendum, the city council should act promptly on those wishes."

This weekend is an excellent time to get your lawn in shape for the coming season, says Dr. William H. Mitchell, extension agronomist at the University of Delaware.

Begin by liming and fertilizing the lawn, advises Mitchell. Applying 50 pounds of ground limestone and 12 to 15 pounds of complete fertilizer per 1,000-sq. ft. of lawn should get grass off to a fast start.

Next, rake the lawn with a heavy steel garden rake. This will help incorporate lime and fertilizer into the soil and remove dead leaves and grass which may smother new growth.

Eliminate garlic and onion from the lawn with application of 2, 4-D.

Scotch Professor Discovers Rare Book In Morris Library — By Correspondence

A Scottish professor of French literature has discovered, perhaps the only copy of a rare edition book in the United States—and in the University of Delaware library.

The University received a request from Prof. Douglas Munro of Cupar Fife, Scotland, for copies of library catalog cards of books by or about Alexandre Dumas, pere. A French literature scholar, Munro is preparing an exhaustive and definitive bibliography of Dumas.

Dr. John M. Dawson, director of libraries at the university, and his staff complied with the routine request.

Munro quickly sent an acknowledgment letter which disclosed that the university library holds an edition of Dumas' play "Napoleon" which is rare.

Munro writes "Beside your own, there are copies at Mecklenburg, Jena and Augsburg; so far as I yet know yours is the only copy in the United States and its whereabouts has been noted in my bibliography."

Dawson, delighted with this discovery, said the library has no records when or from what source the book came. But he added that the university library also has a copy of the first illustrated edition of "Les Trois Mousquetaires," published in 1846.

Since it was published in installments it is seldom that all 32 plates are found—all are in our copy," he said.

"We expect to fill graduation holes with sophomores, and all returning regulars should anticipate a great deal of pressure and competition from the freshman class," Raymond says.

Raymond is looking forward to greeting some of the big, aggressive members of last year's undefeated freshman team. There could be as many as 45 freshmen reporting to opening practice on Monday.

Raymond, who directed his team to the Middle Atlantic Conference title in 1966, is hopeful that the youth movement will help the Hens get through their tough 10-game schedule in the fall.
