SELF-MADE TRAPS

Recently the word was spread in Livingston, Mont., that mountain lions had been spotted on a nearby ranch. The chase was on and before the hunt was over two large cats had been treed and shot. One measured seven feet and weighed 125 pounds and the other was seven feet six inches and weighed 145 pounds.

The interesting part about these native lions is that they always head for the false security of a tree when the bounds are after them, thus assuring their ultimate destruction. They cannot reason that immediate security is not always the best—that the only escape from the tree is down, into a trap of their own setting.

Sometimes we people reason as poorly. We encourage inflated government spending and public debt to get some easy money, thereby setting a tax trap for ourselves just as the lion made the fatal mistake of climbing a tree of no return for temporary relief.

More than one nation has been trapped into bankruptcy by the baying of public spenders.

Other activities carried on by Mr. Preston have included the testing of materials for Hoopes Reservoir Dam, E. I. duPont de Nemours and Company, Hercules Powder Company, Atlas Powder Company, Electric Hose and Rubber Company, Bellanca Air Craft Corporation, and the Chrysler Tank Plant.

Professor Preston holds membership in the American Society of Civil Engineers, the American Association of University Professors, Alpha Chi Rho, Phi Kappa Phi, and Tau Beta Pi. In 1954, he was awarded a certificate of service by the Delaware Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers for his long and faithful service to that organization.

Mr. Smith graduated from Rutgers University in 1933. After a brief period as an instructor at Gettysburg College, he became an engineer on sewer and bridge construction for the Philadelphia Department of Public Works. Mr. Smith returned to the teaching profession in 1938 as an assistant professor of engineering at the University of Florida. In 1920, he assumed similar duties at the University of Delaware.

Mr. Smith conducted a survey of land for the preparation of topographic maps for the Federal Housing Authority; was engineer in charge of two FHA housing projects at George Reed Village, Newark, and at Hollingsworth Manor, in Elkton, and was a visiting professor of civil engineering at Northwestern Technological Institute in Evanston, Ill.

Mr. Smith graduated from the University of Delaware in 1928 and later attended the University of Pennsylvania and Temple University. After some industrial experience, he entered the teaching profession.

After serving as a shop instructor in the Wilmington public schools and at Dover High School, he assumed a similar position at the Philadelphia Normal School. He joined the Delaware faculty on July 1, 1938, and has served as instructor and director of shop practice since that date.

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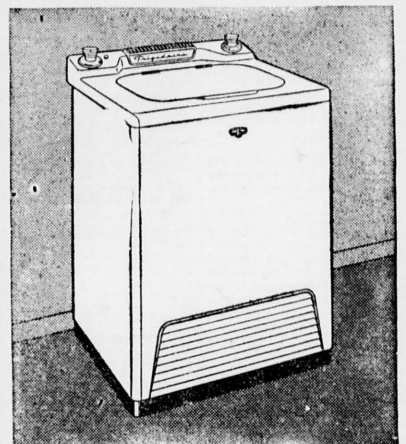
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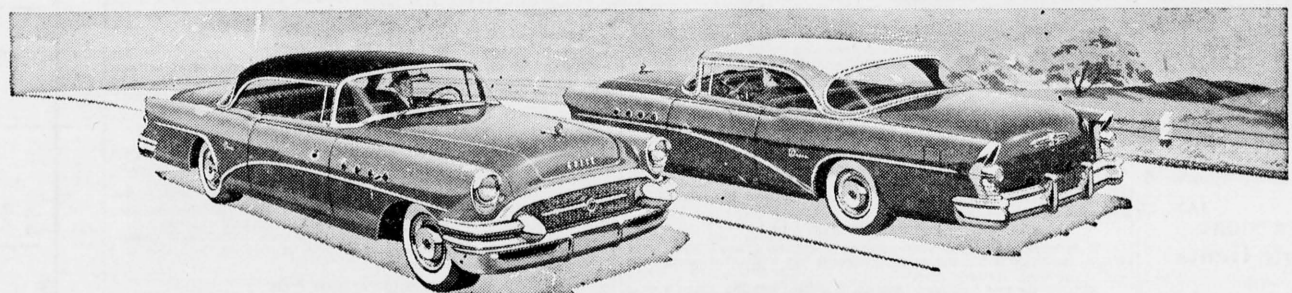
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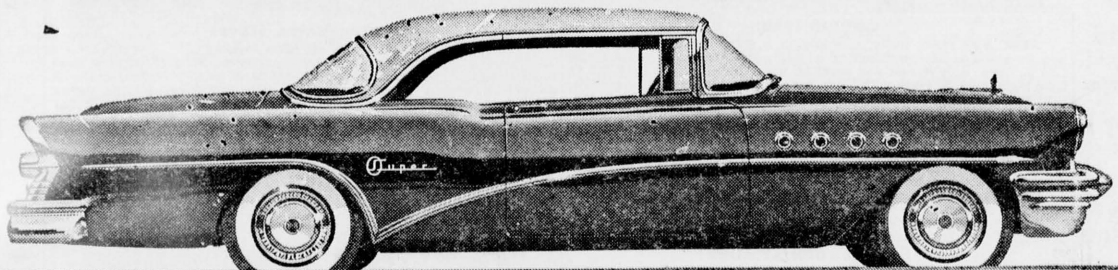

Voltage Shift
Mr. Nedde reported on a recent conference with University of Delaware officials concerning a proposed change-over from 2400 to 4160 volt city electric power. For the most part, he said, the university will be able to use 4160 volts, but some special provisions may be necessary at the Academy Street power station. Further details will be worked out.

Mr. Diehl reported on last week's initial meeting of the mayor's committee appointed to study the proposed bond issue to cover capital improvements. A new bond issue of \$500,000 to \$800,000 could be financed, he said, with a 10 cent increase in tax rate, and ultimately a lower tax rate with increased sales of electricity, water, and sewer service.

Miss Beulah Ridgeway, city office employee, is preparing another set of cost figures, and the city engineer is preparing a list of capital improvement projects for consideration by the bond issue committee.

Where?
In connection with the proposed bond issue, Councilman Wm. Coverdale requested an accounting for funds allocated in the previous bond issue for such capital improvements as additional city wells and water and sewerage treatment facilities—improvements which had not been made.

Mr. Diehl replied that a comprehensive report on such allocations and disposal had been prepared, but that another accounting would be made.

The solicitor was instructed to investigate the legality of the contract between the city and the home developers, calling for payment to Blinn of 60 percent of the water rents for the area, upon completion of the 100th home in the development.

Street Lights
Mr. Maclary urged city provision of street lights in the Lumbrook, Nottingham Manor, and Elliott Heights areas. The residents of Lumbrook, he emphasized, had been promised street lights within six months after the city had been included in the city limits.

Mr. Sinclair reported that the Kappa Alpha fraternity was contemplating a lawsuit for past taxes paid the City of Newark in alleged violation of an exemption for charitable corporations.

"That's something we can't drop," Councilman Frank Scott said wryly, "and it's up to Mr. Sinclair to defend us. I'm a fraternity man, myself, but I didn't know that I was a member of a charitable corporation."

Council agreed to pay the difference in cost between a six and a 12 inch water main to be installed as part of the city loop serving the Gordy & Son development in the West Park Place area, the first section to comprise some 600-ft.

Election Laws
Concerning city registration and the municipal election in April, Councilman Coverdale proposed that sample ballots be printed; that all candidates be provided with voting lists for their districts; that the new city boundaries be surveyed and determined voting eligibility; and that the minimum number of three registration days be extended to five, or, preferably, to permit registration during a 30 day period at the city offices, with registration to be conducted by office employees. Further, it was proposed that three voting places be established, the locations to be decided by the election board.
