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INTRODUCTION.

WILMINGTON is a flourishing borough, pleasantly situated, between Christiana and Brandywine Creeks, within about three miles of the river Delaware, in latitude $39^{\circ} 54' 21''$ N. and longitude $1^{\circ} 27' 31''$ E. from Washington City. Distant from Philadelphia twenty-eight miles, and course nearly due S. W.—from Baltimore seventy and an half miles, and from Washington City one hundred and twelve miles.

The two creeks, above mentioned, after running through a fertile country for several miles form a junction about a mile and a half below the borough. When opposite to Market-street they are only one mile asunder; which distance may be considered as the length of the town from north to south. The former of the streams runs to the southward, and the latter to the northward, separating Wilmington from Brandywine village.

Brandywine creek may be considered as a tributary stream to Christiana, and, though

shallow in many places, is of sufficient depth to admit vessels of considerable burthen as high as the mills—consequently a great part of the immense trade of these mills is carried on by navigation.

Christiana is of sufficient depth to admit ships of upwards of three hundred tons burthen as high as Wilmington wharves. Thus situated, Wilmington is well calculated either for a maritime or manufacturing town. But as the Brandywine affords so many elegant seats for mills and factories, the commercial interest yields to that of the manufacturing.

Agreeably to the census of 1810 the number of inhabitants were 4416 ; since that time we may calculate on an increase of 4 or 500 ; making at this time near 5000.

Agreeably to an account recently taken there are twenty one schools and seminaries of learning within the borough, including a college, a female boarding school upon an extensive plan, and a select school for the education of young gentlemen, where the French language is taught. These different schools educate near 700 scholars daily.

There are eight places of religious worship in Wilmington : viz. one Friends, one Baptist, two Presbyterian, one Episcopalian Church,

one Methodist and two African, exclusive of a second Baptist now forming. There are likewise a number of humane and public spirited societies calculated to relieve the oppressed and "soothe the woes of man," now organized, of which mention will be made in the Appendix.

The views from Wilmington are exceedingly beautiful. On the east, beyond a large extent of highly cultivated meadow, whose beauty is heightened by numerous flocks "as they carelessly feed," rolls the river Delaware, the great commercial highway for thousands "to the four corners of the globe."

On the south the eye is delighted with the meandering Christiana, gently rising into the country till the sight is obscured by intervening objects—whilst the adjacent meadows, farms, woods, hills and mansion houses greatly enrich the scene.

On the west and north the view is sooner obstructed; but the rising hills, the waving lombardies and the spreading oaks, which terminate the view, rather increase than diminish the beauties of the prospect.

The remarkable grandeur of the Brandywine can be better viewed than described. The confused noise of thirteen merchant mills, of the largest size, is no sooner lost (when ascending

the stream) than the ear is saluted with the sound of the descending waters dashing over the falls in torrents—whilst the contiguous hills present sites for country seats equal in beauty to any upon the Delaware.

Upon the whole Wilmington may be considered as pleasant a town as any upon the continent. Nor is this the opinion of a *few residents therein* ; but the fact has been testified, and will be confirmed by numerous succeeding travellers.

PREFACE.

IN offering the Wilmington Directory to the public, the compilers will just observe, that as it is the *first* thing of the kind ever published in the borough, they hope its juvenile days may be spent in *peace*—and if it is permitted (through a fostering hand) to grow to maturity, they hope it will increase in perfection as it increases in years.







HUMANE SOCIETY.

Sec. 1st and 2d of the constitution—This institution shall be called the “Humane Society of Wilmington, Delaware.”

The objects of the society are “the recovering from apparent death by drowning, suffocation, by burning charcoal, or other noxious vapours; drinking cold water; strokes of the sun, damps of wells; lightning or other similar casualties.”

The society's card.

DO NOT DESPAIR.

The managers of the Humane Society offer the following compensations, viz.

A sum of money, not exceeding ten dollars, to any one who shall take out of the water the body of a drowned person. This sum to be in proportion to the risk incurred, and the exertions used to restore life.

Two dollars to any one who shall receive into his house a drowned person, provided the body be in such a state as to afford a probable prospect of restoration, and that the means for that purpose be fully applied;—and

Two dollars to those who shall be employed by the medical assistants in applying them.

DIRECTIONS,

For recovering persons who are supposed to be dead from drowning.

I. As soon as the body is taken out of the water, it must be conveyed on a board or bier, if at hand, to an house, or any other place, where it can be laid dry and warm, avoiding the usual destructive methods of *hanging it by the heels, rolling it on a barrel, or placing it across a log on the belly.* Endeavour to procure two or three medical assistants—and, if practicable, inform some of the managers of the circumstance.

II. The clothes must be immediately stripped off, and the body wrapped up in blankets, well warmed. It should be laid on its back, with

the head a little raised. If the weather be cold, it should be placed near a fire, and an heated warming pan should be passed over the body; but in warm weather, it will be sufficient to place it between two blankets well heated, or in the sunshine, taking care to prevent the room from being crowded with any persons who are not necessarily employed about the body.

III. At the same time, the whole body should be rubbed with the hand, with hot woollen cloths, or with the brushes in the boxes. The rubbing should be moderate, but continued with industry, and particularly about the breast.—Apply also heated bricks to the feet, belly and breast. The immediate application of frictions is of the utmost importance, as many have been recovered by frictions only, when early used.

IV. As soon as it can possibly be done, a bellows should be applied to one nostril, whilst the other nostril and the mouth are kept closed, and the lower end of the prominent part of the wind-pipe, or that part which is called by anatomists, *pomum adami* is pressed backward. The bellows is to be worked in this situation; and when the breast is swelled by it, the bellows should stop, and an assistant should press the belly upwards to force the air out. The bellows should then be applied as before, and the belly again be pressed; this process should be repeated from twenty to thirty times in a minute, so as to imitate natural breathing as nearly as possible.

V. During this time, a large quantity of heated ashes, water, salt, sand, or brewer's grains, should be procured, and the body placed in it; the blowing and rubbing are then to be continued as before; and when the water, ashes, salt, &c. are cooled, some warmer must be added, so that the whole may be kept milk-warm.

Loud noises have sometimes proved successful in recovering such persons, and restoring to life. When signs of returning life are apparent, the frictions must be continued, but more gently.

These methods must be continued three or four hours; as in several instances they have proved successful, although no signs of life appeared until that time. When the patient is able to swallow, he must take some wine, brandy, or rum and water; bleeding or purging ought never to be used, without consulting a physician, but glysters of salt and water may be injected.

After life has returned, if convulsions come on, blood should be taken by direction of a physician.

To prevent the fatal effects of drinking cold water, or cold liquors of any kind in warm weather.

1st. Avoid drinking whilst you are warm,
or

2d. Drink only a small quantity at once, and let it remain a short time in your mouth before you swallow it; or

3d. Wash your hands and face, and rinse your mouth with cold water before you drink. If these precautions have been neglected, and the disorder incident to drinking cold water hath been produced, the first, and in most instances, the only remedy to be administered, is sixty drops of liquid laudanum in spirit and water, or in warm drink of any kind.

If this should fail of giving relief, the same quantity may be given twenty minutes afterwards.

When laudanum cannot be obtained, rum and water or warm water should be given. Vomits and bleeding should not be used without consulting a physician.

BOUNDARIES OF THE BOROUGH OF WILMINGTON.

*Extracted from the Charter passed at Dover,
31st January, 1809.*

"Sec. 2d. The said borough shall be bounded as follows, viz. Beginning at the mouth of Brandywine creek, on the easterly side of the same; thence along the eastern and north-east-

ern side thereof about two miles and a half to the Old Ford above the head of the tide water; thence crossing the Brandywine westwardly and passing along the Old King's Road, according to the several courses thereof, to the present state road leading from Wilmington to Lancaster; thence in a direct line, southeasterly passing over the mouth of the rivulet called Stalecup's Gut to the opposite side of Christiana river; thence down the side of the same until south west of the lower point of the mouth of Brandywine; then north east to the place of beginning."

Extracts from a Borough Ordinance, passed the 10th of 5th Month, 1800, respecting curbs and gutters, &c. and the width of pavements in the Borough of Wilmington.

"Sec. 2d. The foot-ways and pavements of the several streets, lanes and alleys shall be, when paved, of the following width from the true range and extreme limits of each street to the outside of the curb, viz. King street, from the south side of Second street to Christiana, Wood street and Water street shall have their pavements of the width of six feet and no more; and all those streets, lanes or alleys which are forty-nine feet in width, shall have their pavements twelve feet wide and no more; and all

those streets, lanes and alleys, which are of a greater width than forty-nine feet, shall have their pavements twelve feet nine inches wide and no more, except High street from Market to Pasture street, the pavement whereof shall be twelve feet wide and no more, to accommodate the Market house whenever it may be necessary to extend it. And all foot-ways and pavements, twelve feet wide and upwards, shall ascend from the curb-stone to the true line for building at the ratio of half an inch to each foot and no more.

“ Sec. 3d. The bottom of the gutters in all streets, &c. of forty-nine and an half feet wide and under, shall be ten inches below the centre of said streets, &c. and the bottom of the said gutters in all the said streets, &c. which exceed forty-nine and an half feet, shall be twelve inches below the centre of said streets and no more : Provided that this rule shall not be considered to be rigidly observed in the several streets running easterly and westerly, which are necessarily, by the plan of regulation, higher on one side than the other, but that the regulators for the time being be enjoined to conform to it as nearly as circumstances will admit.

“ Sec. 4th. The curbs of wood or stone, placed to support the edges of foot-ways, &c. in the several streets leading from Chesnut street to High street shall be of the height of eight inches from the bottom of the gutters ;

and in the same streets from High street to Water street, the curbs shall be of the height of ten inches from the bottom of the gutters and no more; and all the streets running at right angles and crossing the aforesaid streets, leading from Chesnut to Water street, shall have their curbs elevated six inches above the bottoms of the gutters and no more.

“Sec. 5th. No stoop, porch or steps to ascend into any buildings now erected, or hereafter to be erected, adjoining any of the streets, &c. nor any doors or other inlets into cellars now erected, or hereafter to be erected, shall extend further from the front or line of building and erecting houses than three feet and three inches on Water street and Wood street, and on King street to the south side of Second street (going from Christiana river in a northeasterly direction;) and in all other streets, &c. the said steps, porches, cellar doors or other inlets to the respective buildings thereon erected, or hereafter to be erected, shall not extend on the pavements, from the true line for building, further than four feet.
