Letters May Save Bohemia Mission As Historic Site

Friends of Old Bohemia Mission, who live in the Newark area, are being asked by the Old Bohemia Historical Society, to write to the committee on interior and insular affairs, 1324 House Office Building, Washington, D. C. and ask them to pass House Joint Resolution 452, to recognize Old Bohemia Mission as a national historic site.

Old Bohemia, Saint Francis Xavier Mission was founded in 1704 near the town of Warwick, Md. Charles Carroll of Carrollton, who signed the Declaration of Independence, and his cousin John Carroll, who founded Georgetown University and became the first Catholic bishop in the United States were students at Bohemia Academy.

Kitty Knight, of War of 1812 fame, is buried there, and 10 pioneer priests lie under very old boxwood at the rear of the church. "Ten good men, who carried the Word, and love of country, to many of the surrounding states."

One of these priests was Father Matthias Mannors, who founded the first Catholic church in Delaware in 1772.

The building at the mission have been placed in good condition by the Historical Society, and four masses are held each year, on the third Sundays of June, July, August and September.

Congressman Thomas F. Johnson of Maryland, introduced the resolution to recognize this mission as a National Historic site.

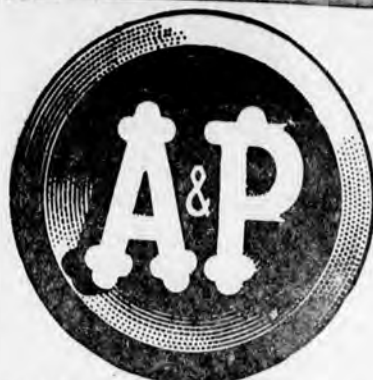

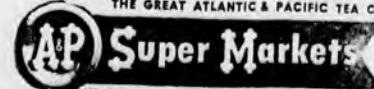
