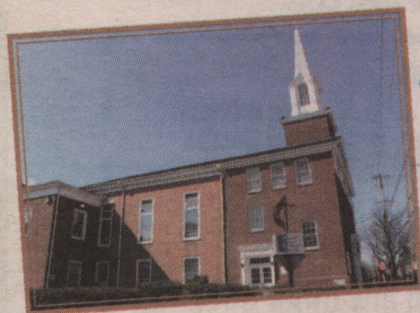
Eagle Scout's project takes pedestrians on walk through history

Four seeking District 4 seat

Funk, Morehead, Clifton unopposed

In next month's municipal election, a four-way race is shaping up in District 4, with five-term incumbent Councilman David Athey opting not to seek a sixth term.

Athey was elected in 2003 to represent District 4, Newark's central district around which the others are arrayed. It runs south of Main Street and includes East Delaware Avenue, the Green and East Park Place.

All council members serve two-year terms.

Asked why he chose not to seek a sixth term, Councilman Athey responded, "Frankly, it was time to move on."

"I will stay very involved with the community; I just won't be at the table," he said.

Mayor Vance A. Funk III, District 1 Councilman Mark Morehead and District 2 Councilman Jerry Clifton are running unopposed. Monday was the filing deadline for candidates.

Mayor Vance Funk said he is opting to seek another

Spring leaf collection begins Monday

The city's spring leaf collection will begin on Monday and continue through April 5.

Residents should rake and pile leaves in the grassy median area between the curb and sidewalk. Do not rake leaves onto the street or curbs and do not bag leaves.

Avoid mixing rocks, sticks or brush with leaves, as

they may damage collection machinery. Leaves obstructed by vehicles will not be collected.

However, the city urges residents to consider using the mulching attachment on their lawn mowers to grind up the leaves instead, so that the nutrients remain on their lawns.

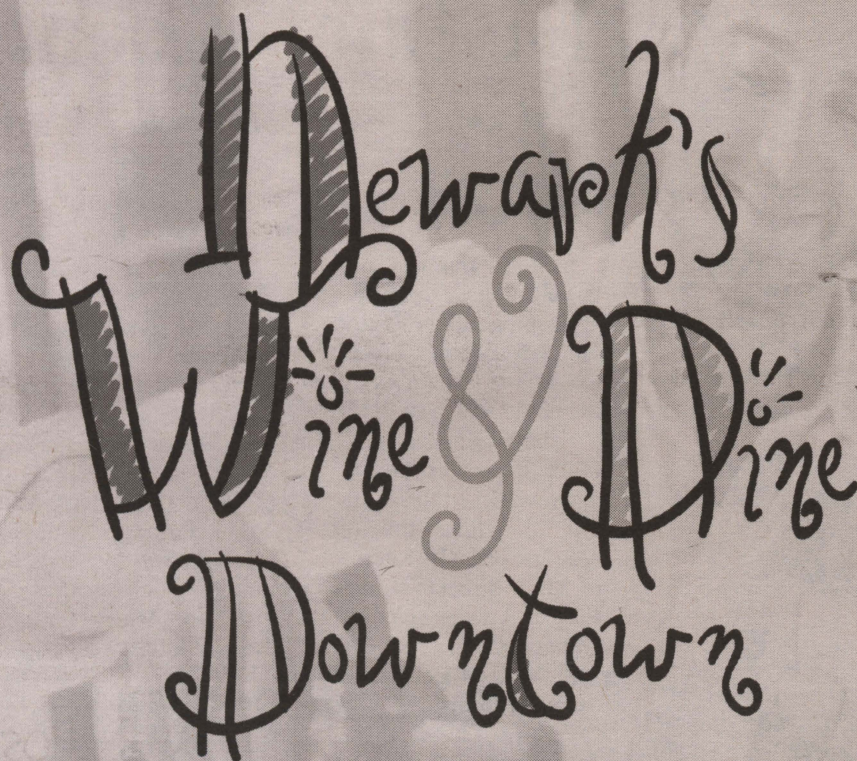

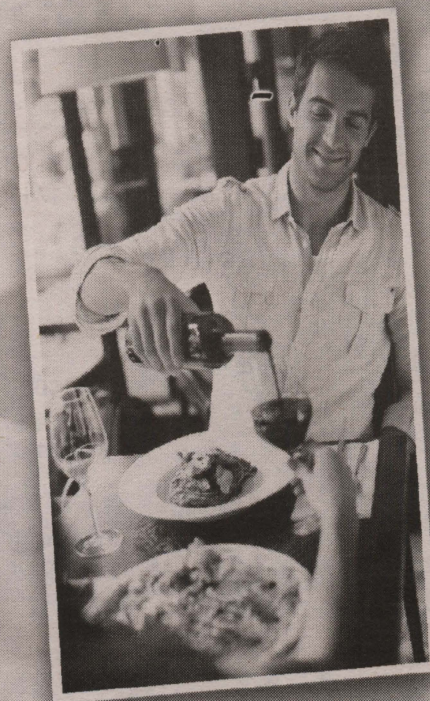

New eatery looks to melt Newarkers' hearts

Grilled cheese restaurant replaces Post House

For more than 50 years, the brick building at 145 E. Main St. housed the legendary Post House Restaurant, where customers could expect to be taken back in history to a time when old-fashioned lunch counters were the norm.

However, the Main Street icon closed last summer, and the building is now home to a much more modern concept — one its owner

says, despite the name, is far from cheesy.

"It's an amazing concept," said Bob Vearling, of Melt Down Grilled Cheese, which opened Sunday. "People have enjoyed grilled cheese forever."

The restaurant offers eight varieties of grilled cheese sandwiches, from the basic sharp cheddar on white bread to the more adventurous Maryland crab grilled cheese and turkey club grilled cheese.

Most popular, Vearling

said, is the grilled mac and cheese, which is macaroni and cheese, topped with two slices of cheddar and grilled between two pieces of Italian bread.

The eatery, which has 40 mostly part-time employees, also sells salads, soups, milkshakes and a grilled ice cream sandwich.

The Newark location is the Pennsylvania-based company's third retail location. A fourth is expected to open later this month, and the company also has a booth at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia.

Vearling, a resident of Delaware County, Pa., said

Newark is an appealing location to open his first franchise.

"Being on a college campus is an amazing opportunity," he said.

Vearling replaced the Post House's lunch counter with tables and chairs and replaced the grill with several sandwich presses.

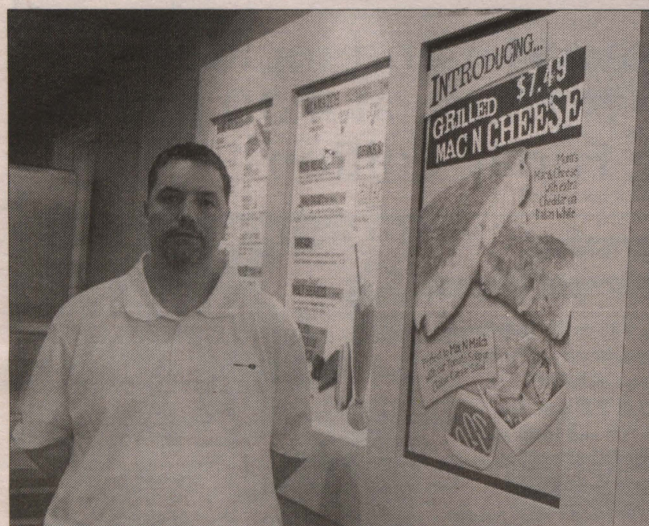
"It's a beautiful building," he said. "The fact we were able to take over a property that was a landmark, it's easy to tell people where we are."

Melt Down is open daily from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., though Vearling said he is considering adding late-night hours.

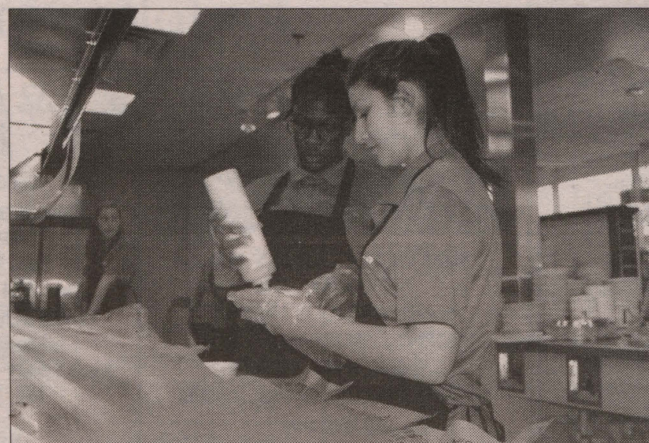

Kmart cashier charged in theft

A Kmart cashier was arrested Monday after the loss prevention officer noticed that she was taking a bigger employee discount than allowed.

Newark Police Cpl. James Spadola said Nyemah Taylor, 18, manually entered prices for merchandise she purchased for herself. He did not know what the item was.

The alleged theft, which cost Kmart \$30.63, took place March 4 but was not reported until Monday.

She was taken to Newark Police Department, charged with theft under \$1,500. She was released on \$500 unsecured bond and ordered to stay out of Kmart.

Intruder scares sleeping women

Police are on the lookout for a man who apparently entered two unlocked apartments on East Main Street at 1:30 a.m. Saturday, stole a laptop computer and frightened two sleeping occupants.

In the first apartment, the female occupant awoke to find a man with a bottle of liquor standing at the foot of her bed, asking for a man named Matt, according to Newark Police Cpl. James Spadola.

The intruder tried to get the woman to take a drink, but she escorted him out the door.

In the second apartment, another female occupant awoke to find an intruder walking around asking where he could find a man named Tim, Spadola said.

She had to push the intruder out the door, he said.

The intruder is described as a light-complexioned black man, about 5-foot-11, bearded, wearing a hat and an olive green jacket.

Spadola reminded residents to

keep their doors locked and contact police immediately when they see suspicious activity.

Woman, 18, arrested in Main Street fracas

Newark Police who responded to a report of a fight in progress on Main Street early Friday morning arrested an 18-year-old University of Delaware student and charged her with disorderly conduct, offensive touching, underage consumption of alcohol and possession of a fictitious ID.

According to Cpl. James Spadola, one of the men told officers he tried to intervene when Nicole Santo was assaulting another woman, but Santo struck him giving him a bloody lip and nose.

An employee of Main Street Sliders told police Santo also struck him, causing minor injury to his left eye.

Santo was taken to Newark Police Department, where police found a fake ID saying she was 25 years old.

She was arraigned at Justice of the Peace Court 20 and released.

Men walk out on tab, leave women behind

Four men walked out of Buffalo Wild Wings without paying their tab at 1 a.m. Sunday, leaving their female companions to fend for themselves, police said.

Cpl. James Spadola said a large group visited the eatery at 100 South Main Street at midnight and ordered French fries, wings, a mixed drink, a lemonade, boneless wings and fried pickles.

When presented with the check, the men walked out, he said. The women paid their share of the tab, then left.

The incident cost Buffalo Wild Wings \$50.97.

Four Md. residents charged in two downtown Newark robberies

Newark Police have arrested three teenagers and a woman, all from Cecil County, Md., in connection to two related robberies on Feb. 15 and 18, police reported.

In the Feb. 15 incident, a 19-year-old Newark man was walking on South Chapel Street near Scholar Drive about 11:30 p.m., when he was approached by three suspects who engaged him in a conversation.

While talking to the suspects, the victim was struck from behind and knocked to the ground, police said. The suspects removed the victim's wallet from his pants pocket before fleeing. The victim's credit card was used later that night and the next morning at several locations in Maryland, police reported.

That victim did not report the incident to police until Feb. 19, after reading local news reports of a subsequent Feb. 18 robbery in town.

During that incident, a 24-year-old man was walking on East Delaware Avenue about 1:35 a.m. when he was approached from behind by three suspects, one of whom, later identified as Brandon Gatewood, of Elkton, allegedly placed what appeared to be a gun to his face, police said.

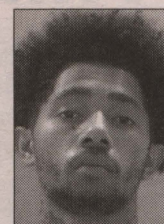
The victim was then knocked to the ground and was kicked and punched repeatedly in the

head and face by two additional suspects, who police later identified as Lawrence Ray and Anthony Gatewood, both of Elkton. The suspects fled with the victim's wallet and cell phone to a waiting vehicle, which was determined to be operated by Yannick Gray, of Perryville, police said.

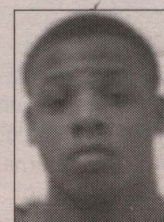
Using video surveillance obtained from multiple locations, detectives positively identified Brandon Gatewood for his involvement in the Feb. 15 robbery, police said. Detectives continue to investigate the identity of the other two suspects in that incident.

Further investigation into the Feb. 15 robbery determined that Brandon Gatewood was also involved in the Feb. 18 robbery.

Brandon Gatewood, 19, of the 100 block of Rudy Park, is facing two counts each of second-degree robbery and second-degree conspiracy in relation to the two incidents. He surrendered himself to Cecil County Sheriff's deputies on March 3 and is currently in custody at the Cecil County Detention Center awaiting extradition to Delaware.

Ray, 18, of the 300 block of Willow Drive, is facing one count each of second-degree robbery and second-degree conspiracy in relation to the Feb. 18 incident. He was arrested at Elkton High School by Elkton police on March 8. He is currently in custody at the Cecil County Detention Center awaiting extradition to Delaware.

Anthony Gatewood, 16, of the 100 block of Rudy Park, is facing one count each of second-degree robbery and second-degree conspiracy in relation to the Feb. 18 incident. He was arrested at North Caroline High School, in Caroline County, Md., by the Caroline County Sheriff's Office on March 8. He is currently in the custody of

the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services awaiting extradition to Delaware.

Gray, 21, of the 100 block of Cove Point Way, is facing one count each of second-degree robbery and second-degree conspiracy in relation to the Feb. 18 incident. She turned herself in to Newark Police on March 8. She was arrested and released on \$2,500 secured bail.

Council delays action on plan to charge Cherry Hill Manor residents for road repairs

Newark City Council agreed Monday to delay until after next month a resolution that would add nearly \$400 to the tax bills of Cherry Hill Manor residents for five years, starting in 2014.

Cherry Hill Manor is a development of 89 town homes in District 4, the only electoral district contested in polling April 9.

The resolution gives the city the right to assess property owners half the cost of the estimated \$350,000 it will

cost to redevelop the service roads in Cherry Hill Manor.

According to City Manager Carol Houck, the resolution is needed because residents there failed to keep service roads maintained.

The service roads, somewhat akin to fire lanes, run the perimeter of the development and are used for waste collection and other city services.

"The current condition of the internal service roads is very poor," Houck wrote in a recent letter to mayor and council. "They are virtually impassable without causing damage to our Public Works

and Water Resources and Police Department vehicles.

In other business, council voted to replace seven city-owned vehicles at a cost of \$160,671:

- A 2002 Ford 350 truck used by the Water and Sewer Department will be replaced by a Ford F150 pickup.

- A 2001 Dodge Ram pickup used by Public Works will be replaced by a Ford F150 4-by-4 pickup.

- A 2002 Dodge Ram pickup used by Parks & Recreation will be replaced by a Ford 350 4-by-4 pickup.

- A 1996 Ford cargo van

used by Public Works will be replaced by a Ford Transit.

- Newark Police Department will replace three Ford Crown Victorias with two Chevrolet Caprices and a Chevrolet Impala.

City Manager Houck said the price of the police vehicles will increase between \$4,000 and \$5,000 per vehicle once the cars are outfitted with radios, computers, dash cams, sirens, light arrays and other custom features.

The seven vehicles the city is replacing will be auctioned off by an independent auction business.

Newark, UD police plan increased patrols for St. Patrick's Day

St. Patrick's Day means more than breakfast shots, pitchers of green beer,

Jell-O shooters and the potent concoctions known as Irish Car Bombs.

It also means fake IDs, disorderly conduct, open containers, field-sobriety

tests and DUI arrests.

The Newark and University of Delaware police departments will have extra officers on duty Saturday and Sunday to pro-

tect and serve an anticipated large number of revelers in the Main Street bars and in the surrounding neighborhoods.

"If you don't notice an increased police presence in Newark this weekend, you don't have your eyes open," said Newark Police Cpl. James Spadola.

Typical St. Patrick's Day complaints, he said, are loud music, litter and public urination.

On March 17 and March 18 last year, the Newark Police Department issued

the following charges:

- 12 arrests for fictitious ID
- 12 arrests for underage consumption/possession
- Three DUI
- 12 open container
- Three resisting arrest
- Seven disorderly conduct
- Six noise ordinance arrests
- 10 disorderly premise

Chief Patrick Ogden, of the University of Delaware Police, said that while extra officers will be deployed on both days, most of the efforts will focus on Saturday.

"We'll be sending a clear message to the students about being responsible and being good neighbors," Chief Ogden said.

He said some cases can be adjudicated through the University's Office of Student Conduct rather than arrest and arraignment.

Chief Ogden said his department's mobile command post, usually stationed at Courtney and Academy streets, will be deployed elsewhere in the city.

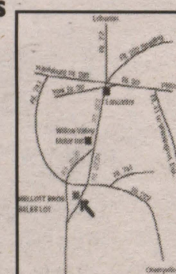

Newark High drive collects 1,000 sleeping bags

Three years ago, Lavina Smith discovered a family with four kids sleeping on a motel floor using towels and coats to keep warm.

Smith, homeless education advocate for the Christina School District, knew drastic measures had to be taken to help homeless families in Delaware.

"Ninety percent of my clientele is doubled up living with another family," Smith said. "Just a few weeks ago, we found a family living in a truck."

These striking realities—led Smith to help launch a campaign that distributes hundreds of sleeping bags to homeless children with the help of schools and agencies throughout the state each year.

This year, Newark High School's Jefferson Awards' Students in Action team orchestrated the campaign in conjunction with the Governor's Advisory Council for Exceptional Citizens.

Newark High School was the final distribution site of sleeping bags that were handed out to homeless children last week.

Parent Christi Milligan said the

students collected approximately 1,000 sleeping bags, making it the second biggest distribution in the state.

Her daughter, Madeline Milligan, organized drop-off sites and informed others about the cause as an active member in the Jefferson Awards Student Action Team.

This year, the sleeping bag campaign was the organization's largest project.

"Doing this helped me to feel like we're doing more in giving back to the community," Milligan said. "We were able to take that next step and do more."

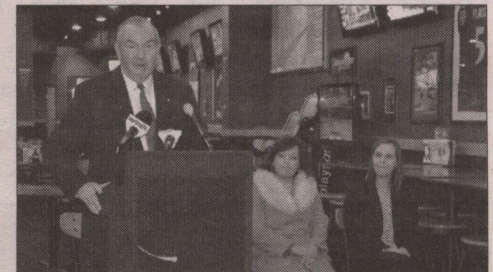
Newark Mayor Vance A. Funk III will receive the New Castle County Chamber of Commerce's Free Enterprise Award, chamber officials announced.

Newark man's passion for officiating earns him top honor

Like many men from his generation, Earl Burns worked a full-time job during the day and moonlighted at night. But unlike most of those men, the Newark resident will be inducted into a Hall of Fame as a result of working one of his part-time jobs.

Burns, 86, worked as a high school and college basketball official over a period of four decades in three different parts of the country, and this month he was the lone basketball referee inducted into the St. Louis Officials Hall of Fame.

"Back then, you could referee in several states and conferences," Burns explained of his days in St. Louis. "So I got to ref in the Metro Conference, Big Eight, Big Ten and most of the other conferences in the Midwest."

Burns was born and raised in Wilmington, graduating in 1944 from the former Wilmington High School, where he's recognized on the

school's Wall of Fame. He went on to serve in the Air Force before playing basketball at Goldey-Beacom College. He graduated and worked for Coca Cola during the day, played semi-pro basketball in Philadelphia on the weekend and refereed high school games in the evening. On a whim, he agreed to be the head coach at Goldey-Beacom College.

"It was just a part-time job I was supposed to do for just one year," recalled Burns, who amassed a 101-31 record. "It turned into six years."

In 1963, Burns' day job transferred him to Virginia Beach. There, he continued to officiate at the high school level and also refereed college games in the Southern and Mason Dixon Conferences. He also was appointed as a substitute referee for the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference, he said proudly.

In 1968, he changed jobs and moved back to Delaware for two years

before being transferred to St. Louis, where he would spend the next 17 years of his life. He refereed some high school ball, but spent the majority of his officiating time working games for the major college conferences in the Midwest.

"I liked doing the tough games," he said. "The harder the games, the better I liked it. I always tried to handle issues in a gentlemanly way. I never argued with a coach. I would tell people at clinics, 'Whatever you do, don't argue with anybody.'"

Burns said one of the highlights of his career was working a high school state championship game in three different states: Delaware, Virginia and Missouri. He also refereed several college conference championship games, but said that the "biggest" game he ever officiated was a Metro

Conference Championship game between Wichita State and Southern Illinois.

"Referees for those conference championship games were assigned by the coaches back then," Burns explained. "I was assigned by the coaches, so I felt good about that. It made you feel good when the coaches in the conferences selected you."

Burns reminisced about how he played with Bill Foster, helped Ed Hightower get his first job as a college referee, takes in local games with former NBA ref Lou Moser, and gets a Christmas card from former Delaware coach Mike Brey.

"I made a lot of great friends over the years," he said smiling.

In 1987, Burns retired and moved back to Newark, where he's enjoying life with his wife, Norma, and their six children and eight grandchildren, "at last count,"

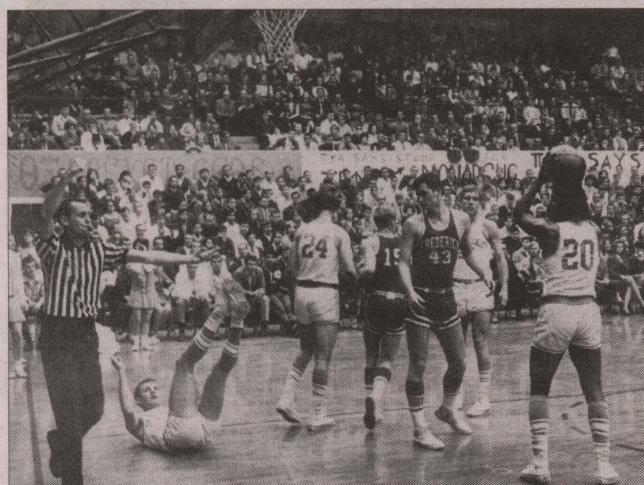
he said chuckling. He is a member of the Delaware Legends Basketball Hall of Fame and gets his basketball "fix" watching University of Delaware men's and women's games.

"I'm watching some good officials there for the most part," he said. "But not as many in the girls' games. I'm disappointed how they let players hang on Elena Delle Donne. We used to

break the rough stuff up right away. We used to say, 'A touch becomes a bump, which becomes a push, and then you have a fight.'"

Spoken like a referee who, although he's hung up his whistle, hasn't lost his passion.

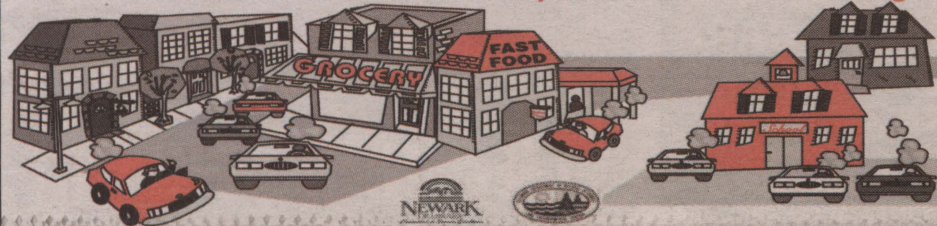

Some 2,500 University of Delaware students, faculty and members of the community turned out for Sunday's UDance event, raising over a half-million dollars to help fight childhood cancer.

UDance is a 12-hour dance marathon that unifies the campus community in the fight against pediatric cancer. All the money raised benefits the Andrew McDonough B+ (for "be positive") Foundation.

The B+ Foundation, named for a Salesianum student who died from leukemia in 2007, supports medical research for critically ill children across the country.

Dozens of university organizations, from sororities and fraternities to sports teams and clubs raised a total of \$551,051.61 this year, according to spokeswoman Julia Denhoff, a sophomore sociology major.

"That's the most that's ever been raised," she said.

total of \$51,251, she said.

Sunday's event, held at the Delaware Fieldhouse, was the seventh annual UDance.

The event ran from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m.

"We had lots who stayed for the whole thing," Denhoff said.

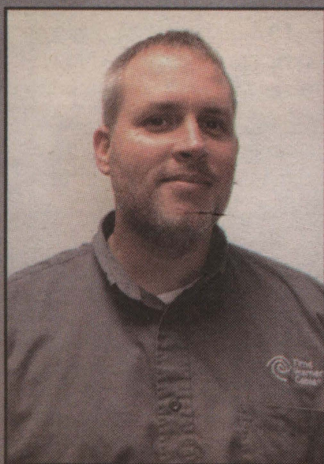

State investigation took years

evidence that patients were abusing the medicines, the board reported last week.

Dr. Muhammed Niaz, who ran the Tri-State Health pain management clinic on South College Avenue as well as another clinic in Elkton, Md., was also ordered by the Delaware Board of Medical Licensure and Discipline to pay a \$5,000 fine and complete training in pain management and addiction before his license can be reinstated.

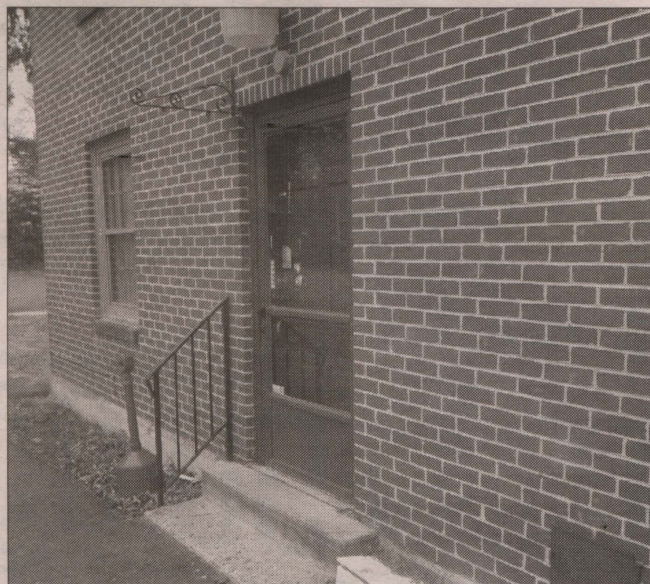
A receptionist at his Elkton office confirmed last week that he is still affiliated with the business.

An inquiry to the Maryland Board of Physicians as to the status of Niaz's Maryland medical license, in lieu of Delaware's judgment, was unreturned as of press time.

Delaware Deputy Attorney General Barbara Gadbois argued against probation for Niaz in the case, stating that it was not appropriate for the "egregious professional misconduct" committed by the doctor, according to board records.

Niaz criticized the findings of the investigation, arguing that the investigating officer used "circular reasoning" to find legal conclusions without facts and added that he had "made all the necessary corrections in his practice in response to the legitimate concerns raised by the state," according to board records.

The board ultimately sided with the state however. "Dr. Niaz's... failure to refer patients time and again for testing or other modalities beyond opioid prescriptions when compared to the high dosage strengths prescribed... routinely prescribing thirty-day supplies of opioid medication for many patients...

and basing prescribing decisions in large part on patient requests or representation of prior scripts constitute such egregious deviation from the standard of care that this level of unprofessional conduct must be met with the appropriate discipline," the board wrote in its judgment.

The suspension order, issued Wednesday, follows a lengthy investigation of Niaz's medical practice for the past several years.

On Dec. 9, 2011, Delaware Secretary of State Jeffrey Bullock suspended Niaz's license, along with the license of his nurse practitioner Jean Binkley, on an emergency basis alleging they were overprescribing controlled substances. Officials alleged that between Jan. 1, 2011, and June 28, 2011, Niaz wrote prescriptions for more than 57,000 tablets of controlled drugs, including more than 42,000 tablets of oxycodone, a Schedule II narcotic. The state added that Binkley allegedly prescribed 89,000 tablets of oxycodone in the same period — though under her own CDS registration.

On Feb. 28, 2012, the secretary rescinded his temporary suspension upon the recommendation of a three-member state controlled substances registration board. Three months later, however, the state filed a second complaint against Niaz with the licensing board, seeking to prove he had violated medical ethical protocols.

In a 234-page complaint, the attorney general's office outlines an environment of unprofessional conduct, including improper record-keeping, failure to document medical histories, failing to adequately train staff, and disregarding signs of abuse and addiction. It specifically examined 29 patients of Niaz or Binkley at the Newark office with various histories of pain or prior drug addiction problems.

During the hearing, the state called medical tech Nicole Krivan, who had worked at Tri-State for a little more than a year, as a witness. Krivan stated that about 60 percent of Tri-State patients were there for pain management, but at the Elkton office, it was only about 15 percent of patients. She added that Niaz typically saw 40 to 50 patients a day and had "thousands" of patients.

Eagle Scout is the highest rank attainable in Boy Scouts. The service project is one of many requirements that must be completed to achieve this honor.

Mitchell was recognized by his troop and its charter organization, Newark United Methodist Church, for his service project in a Court of Honor Ceremony on Saturday.

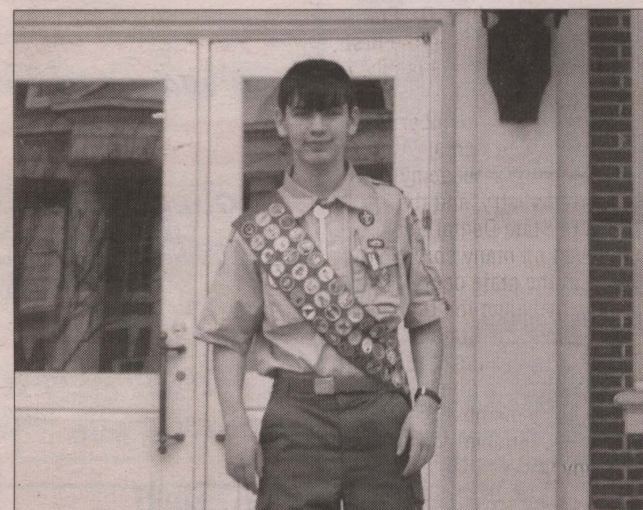
The idea for Mitchell's project stemmed from a hiking trip he took three years ago. While hiking a historic trail in Lewes, his scoutmaster, Rus Davis, suggested that he make a similar historic trail in Newark.

"The one in Lewes was created by an Eagle Scout," Mitchell said. "The idea has always stuck with me."

Mitchell, 16, started his project last year.

"I had people hike throughout Newark and write historical places down and take pictures and bring the records back to me," Mitchell said.

He worked with two-do-



en volunteers from his troop, pack, church and family, as well as members of the Newark Historical Society, City of Newark Parks and Recreation Department and BSA Order of the Arrow's Nentego Lodge.

The 9.1-mile long trail starts and ends at the Newark Reservoir and gives hikers an opportunity to experience Newark's local industrial, educational, religious and military history. Some of the stops include the former Curtis Paper Mill Site, Deer Park Tavern and sever-

al buildings at the University of Delaware.

Mitchell said his favorite site is the Newark United Methodist Church, where his troop holds its scout meetings.

"It's the place with the most history," he said.

Mitchell also designed a map, brochure and trail patch. The brochure provides a brief history of the city and trivia questions about the sites on the trail. Those who complete the hike can purchase a trail patch that includes the city of Newark logo.

The project took a total of 342 hours. Though it was overwhelming at times, Mitchell said his hard work paid off.

"I really liked closing all the history," he said. "It was cool seeing the history of the town I grew up in."

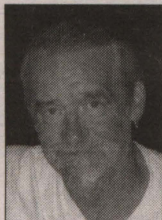
On February 8th 2013 the world became a little less whole, as we lost a dear friend, Brother, Father and Son.

Out of the Attic**New Delaware Turnpike (1963)**

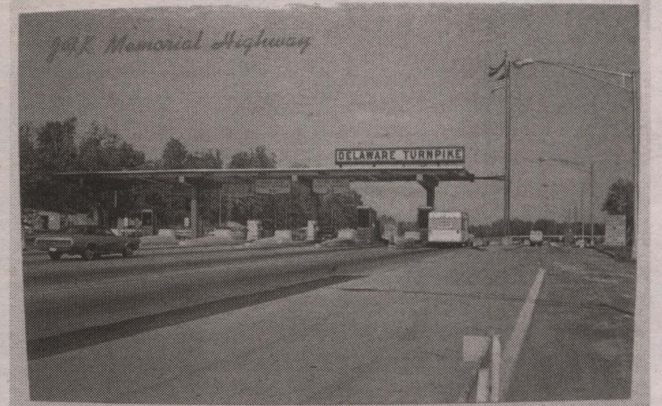
This week's Out of the Attic item is an undated Don Ceppi photograph of the west toll-booth of the new Delaware Turnpike, looking eastbound from near the Maryland state line. The bridge ahead is Route 896 with Newark to the left and Glasgow to the right. The unused post card was published by Delmar Merchandise Sales Company of Wilmington.

President John F. Kennedy spoke at the dedication ceremonies for the new toll road. This stretch of road closed the gap between Elkton and the Delaware Memorial Bridge north of New Castle, making Interstate 95 continuous from deep in Florida to New York City and New England.

Tragically, 10 days after the dedication, Kennedy was assassinated in Texas. By the time this postcard was published, the new interstate

stretch was named the JFK Memorial Highway.

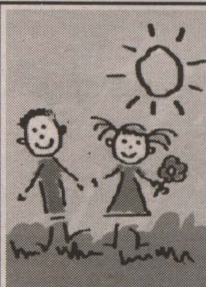

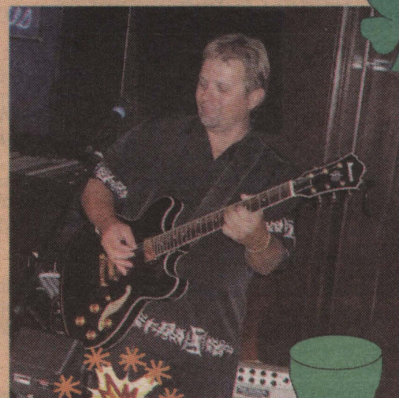

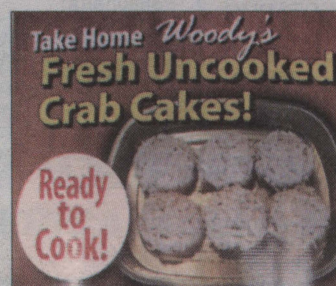
