High School Commencement Exercises To Be Held June 10

Rev. Disston W. Jacobs To Preach Baccalaureate Sermon; Seniors Go To Washington Tomorrow; Attendance Record Improves

BOARD MEETS

The closing exercises for the Newark schools will end with the High School Commencement exercises to be held in Wolf Hall at 7:30, standard time, on the evening of June 10. Class Day exercises will be held in the same place, at the same hour, on June 8. The baccalaureate service will be conducted by the Reverend Disston W. Jacobs, in the Newark M. E. Church, on June 5.

No announcement has been made as yet of the commencement speakers, though several have been invited to address the senior class.

The closing exercises in the colored school will be held in the colored school building on the evening of June 9th.

Washington Trip

Tomorrow morning, at 8:30, the senior class of the High School will entrain for their annual trip to Washington, D. C., to return to Newark on Saturday evening. They will be accompanied by Miss Anne Osborne and Miss Frances McCoy, who were elected by the class as chaperones. The party will stop at the Windsor Hotel while in Washington, and the trip will be personally conducted by a representative of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company.

The class goes to the National Capital as a representative group from the Newark schools, it having been the custom for the past ten years for the senior high school class to make this visit. The expenses are defrayed from the senior class fund, which accrues from class dues, the senior play, and bakes and entertainments. A bake, held by parents of the seniors last Friday, cleared over \$50 for the fund.

J. M. TUNNELL, Jr., WINS ORATORICAL CONTEST

James M. Tunnell, Jr., aged 16, a senior in the Georgetown High School, on Friday night, in the Academy of Music, Philadelphia, won the regional final in the fourth national oratorical contest on the Constitution of the United States. He will speak in the national final, held in Washington, May 27. Five justices of the United States Supreme Court will attend.

Tunnell was winner last year and this year of the Delaware State contest. The award to the regional winner is a four-year scholarship in any college or university in the country, or an extended educational tour in Europe.

Horse Show Saturday

The Brandywine Riding Club has prepared a treat for local horse lovers in its annual Spring Horse Show and Races, to be held Saturday afternoon at the State Fair Grounds, at Elsmere. Besides the judging events, the program will include flat races, pony races and jumping races. George Danby, of Newark, who has had a broad experience with horses both here and in England, has been secretary of the club since its organization in 1923.

Aetna Parades

The Aetna Fire Company, fifty strong, accompanied by the Stutz engine and the ambulance, were ninth in line at the Firemen's Parade, held last Saturday in Bridgeton, N. J., to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the Bridgeton Fire Company. The local company also took with them the Bugle Corps of the Delaware Post of the American Legion, numbering 50 pieces.

This was the first appearance of the Bugle Corps, which was recently organized, and they received applause all along the line of march. Their uniform, of military blouse and breeches in French blue and gold with cap to match, and leather leggings and Sam Browne belt, made a flashing contrast with the red shirts and blue caps and breeches of the local firemen; so that the Aetna contingent provided one of the colorful highspots of the parade.

As the complete list of prize awards has not yet been announced, it is not known whether or not Aetna appears on the list.

Bausman Reports On Clover And Alfalfa

County Agent Tells Curious Findings Of Campaigns; Reports Soil Fertility A Serious Factor

New Castle County Agent R. O. Bausman, in his report for April, comments on the sweet clover and alfalfa campaigns instituted by the University of Delaware extension service cooperating with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the New Castle County Farm Bureau. He reports some curious developments of the campaigns and the discovery that many farms in the county are apparently suffering from low soil fertility. Mr. Bausman's report follows, in part:

Sweet Clover Campaign

"In northern New Castle County, practically every dealer reported an increase in the sale of sweet clover seed this year. A couple of dealers reported a phenomenal increase. The major portion reported a moderate increase. However, in southern New Castle County the dealers reported quite uniformly that there had been a falling off in sales of sweet clover seed this spring of approximately 50 per cent. The explanation lies in the fact that in northern New Castle County sweet clover had not been used until this year and most of the farmers, according to statements from the dealers, purchased the seed as a result of the publicity carried on by the Extension Service. In the southern part of the county there was fairly heavy seeding of sweet clover last year. Practically all of it was seeded without the use of lime and inoculation. The result has been total failures in most cases. These farmers (Continued on Page 9.)

INVENTS SPRAYER

Council Opens Bids On Sewer Extension

Low Bidder Unknown; Will Decide Award Tonight; W. J. Lovett Seated

A special meeting of the Town Council was called by the president last Friday evening to open sealed bids for the proposed new sewer extension. Six companies submitted bids, but as the low bidder was unknown locally, another meeting has been called for tonight to decide on the award. It is expected that it will be decided with whom the contract will be placed at tonight's meeting.

The first business on the calendar at last Friday's meeting was to swear in the new Councilman, William J. Lovett, who was elected by the Council to fill the vacancy in the Middle District caused by the resignation of R. G. Buckingham. Mr. Lovett was sworn in by Mayor Frazer. Other Council members attending the meeting were: Mrs. Laura Hossinger, A. L. Beals, E. C. Wilson, O. W. Widdoes and Louis Handloff.

The bids and the amounts, each accompanied by a certified check for \$1,500, were as follows:

The Fernow Company's bid of \$30,395 was low, but as they were unknown to the Council, the award was postponed until the company could present further credentials. Work will start 10 days after the contract is signed. Mr. H. Roberts, Baltimore engineer has been retained by the Council to supervise and inspect the work.

D. E. O'Connell & Son are at work repairing the holes in the streets made by the Gas Company in laying pipes and mains. The Gas Company is assuming the full expense for this work.

The new dump truck for the Street and Water Department has been delivered, and is being proudly displayed by the members of that department.

Garcia Dies Of Burns From Blazing Bedding

"Mexican Joe," Caught In Burning Bedclothes Friday Night, Expires Monday In Hospital

Joseph Garcia, Mexican of uncertain age, died Monday in the Delaware Hospital of burns received when his bedding caught fire last Friday night.

Garcia, known as "Mexican Joe," lived with Joseph Ivory, colored, in one of the old cannery shacks near the Curtis paper mill. He was employed as a track worker by the Baltimore and Ohio R. R. Company. On Friday night, a lamp sitting on a shelf next to his bed toppled over while he was asleep and the burning oil set the bed cover ablaze. When he awoke he was enveloped in flames and was severely burned about the arms, abdomen and chest before he could extinguish the fire. He received no medical attention until the next morning when Ivory, returning from work, found him and called Dr. G. Burton Pearson. Dr. Pearson, noting his serious condition, treated him and summoned the ambulance to take him to the hospital. He caught the Newark ambulance just as it was about to depart for the Firemen's parade in Bridgeton, and William Clancy and William Bolton took Garcia to the Delaware Hospital, where he expired Monday.

Robert Jones brought the body from Wilmington on Monday afternoon to his Funeral Home in Newark. Garcia, who has no known family, will be buried somewhere in Newark, probably tomorrow.

Garcia attained prominence some years ago when he was arrested in connection with a fatal stabbing affray at Singery. He was, however, acquitted of the charge of murder.

The driver crawled out of the cab unhurt; the tractor rolling into the steep bank at the side of the road, was damaged only to the extent of a broken steering wheel; the truck suffered a few dents and a flat tire.

A recent transfer of property which will interest Newark people was the sale of the William Beadenkopf farm, north of Newark, to J. I. Dayett and John K. Johnston. The farm contains 236 acres, and was at different times owned by William P. Wollaston, Daniel Thompson, and the late James Hossinger. It is tenanted by G. E. Emstrom. Sixty cows, several mules and horses, tractors and other farming equipment were included in the sale to Messrs. Dayett and Johnston.

Plan To Provide University Swimming Pool And Increase Gallery Capacity

Would Build West Wing To Gym Allowing For Pool 85 x 25 Feet; Campaign For Funds A Student Movement

Due to the efforts of Dr. Walter Hullahen, president of the University of Delaware, plans have been formulated that will probably result in a fine swimming pool for the University. After several meetings with the Student Council, the Athletic Council and the Board of Trustees, a clever plan was devised whereby the University could have a swimming pool and also put basketball on a paying basis.

Dr. Hullahen with Mr. Alec Taylor, a member of the board, examined the possibilities of installing a pool in present University buildings. The boiler house was first examined, but the idea of installing a pool there was rejected. The plan adopted, tentative to the raising of the necessary funds, was to build a west wing to the gymnasium the full length of the building, and 10 feet wider than the present structure. This would allow for a pool 85 feet long and 25 feet wide, with reversible bleachers that would accommodate an increase of five or six hundred spectators over the present capacity of the gym. The present west wall of the gym would be removed so the new bleachers could be turned to face either the pool or the basketball court. It is estimated that this alone would result in putting basketball on a paying basis at the University and bring in an additional revenue of seven or eight hundred dollars a year.

At a meeting of the Student Council at the home of Dr. Hullahen, it was decided that the campaign for funds should be a student movement. The first step in the campaign will be a mass meeting of the student body tomorrow at 11 o'clock at Wolf Hall, at which each student will be asked to pledge \$30 to the pool fund. It is expected that the alumni will raise an amount equal to that pledged by the students, and that the combined amounts will approximate \$25,000. The rest of the necessary money will be solicited from friends of the University.

With a swimming pool in prospect, and in view of the splendid record of the swimming team over the past season, it is thought that swimming will be made a major sport.

H. W. Cook Appointed Captain Of Battery E

Succeeds J. C. Hastings; R. E. Ramsey Made 1st Lieutenant

Word has just been received that the promotions of 1st Lt. Herman Cook to be Captain, and 2nd Lt. Richard E. Ramsey to be 1st Lieutenant have been approved and Federally recognized by the War Department. Captain Cook succeeds Captain James C. Hastings, who was forced to resign his commission due to business pressure.

Captain Cook enlisted in Battery "E" as a private February 24, 1921, and was promoted to Sergeant May 4, 1921; commissioned as 2nd Lieutenant May 16, 1923; promoted to 1st Lieutenant, August 1, 1925; attended R. O. T. C. at University of Delaware four years, graduated in June, 1923 as an Honor Graduate in Military. Expert rifle and pistol shot and member of Delaware National Guard Rifle team at Camp Perry in 1921.

Lieutenant Ramsey has served in all grades up to 1st Lieutenant. He enlisted as private, February 11, 1921; given warrant as Corporal, July 28, 1922; made a Sergeant, May 5, 1924, and commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant, July 8, 1926. Lt. Ramsey is a graduate of Newark High School in the class of 1919, and attended the University of Delaware for 2 years. In school he played on the baseball and basketball teams, and will have charge of all athletics for the Battery.

MISS REXTREW TO HEAD HOME ECONOMICS DEPT.

In the absence of Professor Ethel L. Parker, who will have a year's leave from the Women's College for study, Miss Amy Rextrew will be acting Head of the Home Economics Department. Miss Rextrew is a graduate of New York State College for Teachers at Albany, New York, and will receive her M. A. degree in June from Teachers College, Columbia University. From July, 1925, to July, 1926, she was acting State Supervisor of Home Economics at the State Department of Education in Albany. Previous to that time, Miss Rextrew served in Buffalo State Normal School as critic teacher and supervisor of practice teaching in the Buffalo State Normal School center for training Home Economics teachers (Kenmore High School).

Miss Rextrew's work in the past has been highly praised and she comes to the College with an enviable reputation for pleasing personality and professional ability.

Chewing Gum

A Theme Written at Summer School

In his book on "Your United States," Arnold Bennett said that the habit of chewing gum seemed almost national. He had observed many of his traveling companions and he had concluded that the chewing gum habit is finally, eternal and unconquerable. Of the worth of his impression I have had more than one striking illustration.

Last Tuesday evening on a People's Line Car in the city of B—I sat opposite a family, consisting of father, mother and son—all chewing gum. The energy with which they chewed seemed to have something of a magnetism in it for my eyes became riveted upon this group. The father, a young man, well-dressed, sat in a careless position with his hat tilted back. But that would not have attracted my attention, it was his jaws. They were moving up and down and in a rotary manner. He was chewing fast, to the time of the two step or jig. He appeared to feel the rhythm and was oblivious of his five-year-old son who sat next to him, pounding him with stout little fists.

The boy was chewing and trying to speak to his father at the same time. He chewed a word, then a phrase; then he chewed between words. Evidently, all that reached his father's ears was a mumbling of sounds, to which he gave no heed. On the other side of the boy sat his mother, neatly dressed but lackadaisical in attitude. She likewise was chewing. Her manner of chewing was more deliberate than her husband's; more to the time of the march, slowly but surely going on with measured tread. The car passed corner after corner. The chewing continued. The supply was never replenished, still the process kept going on. At last their home corner was reached. Father, son and mother started for the door of the car, still chewing. These human machines could be changed from place to place and yet not have the running of the machine interfered with. The father's hat was moving regularly up and down as he stepped from the platform of the car. When he turned to lift his son to the ground, the conductor in a squeaky, high-pitched voice interrogated:

"Been to the movies, eh?"

Been to the movies? Yes, they are at the movies; they are going to the movies; they are movies; they never cease to move. They are one continuous, living, moving picture show.

Eternal! They had gained such an impetus and had accumulated such force in this continual motion, that it is feared it could never be checked. Unconquerable! No finished product resulted. There never would be anything but a soft gummy mass to be stuck under the table and chewed over again.

The Bible still holds the first place in circulation among books in America. At the 11th annual meeting of the American Bible Society last week it was announced that the circulation in 1926 approached ten million copies (the exact figure being 9,917,361 volumes), an increase of more than a half-million over the preceding year, making a total circulation under the auspices of this venerable society of 184,028,860 volumes. This doubtless includes copies sent to other parts of the world, but even so it does not include an enormous circulation through other agencies. Last month the British and Foreign Bible Society at its 123d meeting, over which the Lord Mayor of London presided, celebrated the purchase in China alone for last year of "well over 4,000,000 volumes," and its own publication in all of 10,128,087 copies of the Bible in no fewer than 592 languages.

When a million members of a single denomination in America are asked to read a chapter a day in one of the books of the Bible, it is easy to understand why the circulation mounts; for what is true of one is in a measure true of all. It is to be noted also that in this State credit may not be given through Regents' counts for the study of the Bible outside of the schools, and that under a decision of the Court of Appeals all public school pupils may be excused for attendance

upon religious instruction, also outside of the schools. This is permitted in several other States. The Bible is likely to keep its place in a nation the foundation of whose society and government, as President Coolidge has said, rest to such an extent upon the teaching of the Bible, that "it would be difficult to support them if faith in these teachings should cease to be practically universal in our country."

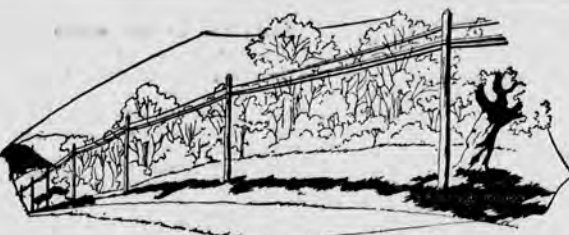

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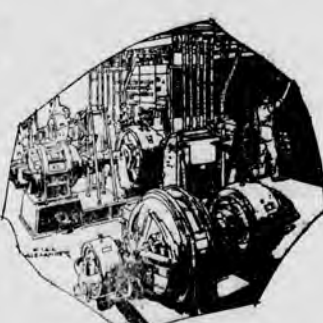

When you are lodging in the city, your breakfast room, lunch and dining-room are here, there and yon. As I have walked to work for the past week, I have been able to see my breakfast room two blocks away. The big sign, DRUGS AND SODA, hanging far out above the window, called loudly in the distance. I answered, "I'm coming, for it's almost nine." Down the street I sprinted and glided up to the counter for a glass of milk. Light is often applied to lunch. I should apply it to breakfast, after six days breakfasting in a Drug Store. I began to wonder if there was such a thing as a restaurant for Lilliputians. That would please me quite. Here one could have variety. Be rid of the ogre, Quantity. (I had not got over the effects of an 85c vegetable dinner which confronted me last Sunday as a small sized vegetable garden. It looked like harvest day in the patch.)

Again I turned to the menu. A remedy might be in store for the situation another day. Entrees, special plates—a steak was horrifying—I knew them all to be the big orders I was facing. An idea! It glistened the more I thought of it. Had it ever occurred to the restaurateur to have a section on the menu devoted to ladies' plates. School Projects

The Newark schools will participate in the international movement to restore and endow the Shakespeare Memorial Theatre at Stratford-upon-Avon, destroyed by fire last year. Scrolls bearing the names of pupils contributing will be placed in the archives of the Shakespeare Memorial Library at Stratford-upon-Avon. Contributions are limited to no minimum amount.

To measure the achievements of the Newark schools, standard tests are being given in English, history, geography, algebra, plane geometry, Latin, French, general science, biology, physics, reading and spelling.

Mr. Thomas Mallin's class in agriculture made a field trip to the Mayer farm yesterday.

On Saturday, May 21, from 1 to 5 in the afternoon, in the Art Gallery of the University Library, there will be an exhibit of work done in the Newark schools. This exhibit will include work taught by the faculty of the Newark schools, and by student teachers from the Women's College.

Attendance Record

The attendance record in the Newark schools for the month of April shows an increase in average daily attendance of one-tenth of one per cent over the preceding month; the average for April standing at 89.8, and the average for March at 89.7. The chief cause of absence was illness. The tardiness figures showed a decrease of 183 over the preceding month. The tardiness for April was 290; for March 473. Grades 2 and 3 reported no pupils tardy. Grades 6 and 7 reported less than 10 tardy.

Board Meeting

A meeting of the Newark Board of Education was held last Wednesday evening in the new school building, all members being present. The financial statement from July 1, 1926, to May 1, 1927, was considered. The charges appeared as follows:

General control, \$2,028.77. Instruction costs, \$38,498.56. Operation of plant, \$6,832.52. Maintenance of plant, \$247.81. Fixed charges, \$611.42. Transportation, \$707.62. These expenses, totalling \$48,226.70, deducted from the appropriation of \$60,359.24, left a balance of \$11,432.54.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

Favorite Fruit Cup

Almost any fruit cup is improved by the addition of canned pineapple. The following are favorite combina-

tions: Put in layers of sherbet glasses sliced apple, diced banana, crushed (or sliced, cut in small pieces) pineapple. Fill the glass with the juice of preserved strawberry or cherry. Top with whipped cream.

Prune Whip

Soften one tablespoonful gelatine in two tablespoonfuls cold water, dissolve over boiling water and add a cupful of hot prune pulp and one-half cupful of sugar. Beat while cooling, and when beginning to stiffen, fold in a cupful of whipped cream and the well-beaten whites of two eggs. Turn into individual molds and chill. Unmold and serve on pretty plates, garnishing each with two halved prunes filled with halved marshmallows. Top each whip with a star of whipped cream.

Party Sandwiches

Use whole wheat and white bread for these sandwiches, slice thin and remove crusts. With a cookie cutter forming a star or a pussy cat or a chicken, cut figures from the centers of half the slices. Spread the other slices with jelly or jam, cover with the slices from which the figures cut from the whole wheat bread and vice versa.

Popovers

Sift then measure and sift again one cupful of flour, to which you have added one-half teaspoonful of salt, add one cupful of milk and beat five minutes with a rotary beater, beat two eggs to a stiff froth without separating them, then combine mixtures and beat again two or three minutes. Half fill heated iron or pottery gem pans, and place in a hot oven. Bake twenty minutes.

Codfish Souffle

Soak one-half pound salt codfish, then place in fresh cold water, bring to boiling point and simmer till tender, remove, drain, cool and flake into tiny pieces. Bring one cupful milk to boiling point and add the flaked fish, with pepper and paprika to taste. Blend a tablespoonful each of butter

and flour together, add to the fish and beat with an egg beater for two or three minutes. Whip one egg, beat into it one-half cup cream, and whip into the egg. Beat several minutes until light and airy, serve on squares of toast.

Prune Marmalade

Prune marmalade is easily prepared. Use medium sized prunes cooked in the usual way. Cut into small pieces. To one pound of pulp, add one orange cut in tiny particles. Cook slowly. Add one pound of sugar to one and one-half pounds of prunes. Simmer till thick and add three table-

Polychrome Conserve

One-half pound of dried peaches, one-half pound of apricots, one-half pound of prunes, one orange, one-half cupful seedless raisins, one-quarter cupful nut meats, one and one-half pounds of sugar. Press the dried fruits, which have been cooked in the usual way, through a sieve, add grated peel and juice of the orange, and the raisins chopped fine, nutmeats and sugar and simmer altogether until thick.

Lemon Cream Pie

Cream together one-fourth cupful butter and one cupful sugar, beat in a tablespoonful of cornstarch and the well beaten yolks of three eggs, and the grated rind and juice of one large lemon. Beat the mixture until light, then add a cupful of rich milk and finally fold in the stiffly whipped whites of three eggs. Pour into a pastry lined pan and bake in a moderate oven. If the pie seems to brown too quickly, cover with a sheet of heavy paper. The filling should be firm in the center when the pie is finished.

Coffee Nut Pie

Scald two cupfuls milk and pour it over half a cupful of sugar mixed with three tablespoonfuls cornstarch, one-fourth teaspoonful salt, and add one cupful clear strong black coffee. Cook over hot water till slightly thickened, then add two eggs beaten with one-fourth cupful sugar, cook five minutes longer, add half a cupful chopped nut meats and a teaspoonful vanilla. Pour into pastry lined

pie shell, scatter granulated sugar and chopped nuts over surface, and bake in a moderate oven.

Fruit Melange

Cut in small pieces one slice canned pineapple, one orange and one cupful cooked prunes, removing the stones. Mix all together, adding enough of the prune juice to moisten well, chill and serve in cocktail glasses, garnish-

Prune Cream Pie

Wash, soak and cook in one and one-half pints of water a pound of prunes. Cool, drain and remove pits, arrange the prunes in a pastry lined pan. Bring the prune juice to boiling point and thicken with two teaspoonfuls cornstarch blended with one-fourth cup of cold water, add three-fourths cupful sugar, and a table-

Chicken Custard

Make a white sauce of two cupfuls milk, and one tablespoonful each flour and butter, season to taste and fold in a cupful of finely chopped chicken, also one beaten egg. Pour into tiny ramekins and bake to a delicate brown.

"The Room"

It is not the room you would be shown into if you were calling socially on Miss Wylie. The drawing-room for you, and Miss Wylie in a colored merino to receive you; very likely she would exclaim, "This is a pleasant surprise!" though she has seen you coming up the avenue and has just had time to whip the dust-cloths off the chairs, and to warn Allick, David, and James, that they had better not dare to come in to see you before they have put on a dicky. Nor is this the room in which you would dine in solemn grandeur if invited to drop in and take potluck, which is how the Wylies invite, it being a family weakness to pretend that they sit down in the dining-room daily. It is the living-room of the house, where Allick, who will never get used to fashionable ways, can take off his collar and sit happily in his stocking soles, and James at times would do so also; but catch Maggie letting him. There is one very fine chair, but, heavens, not for sitting on; just to give the room a social standing in an emergency. It sneers at the other chairs with an air of insolent superiority, like a haughty bride who has married into the house for money. Otherwise the furniture is homely; most of it has come from that smaller house where the Wylies began. The draught-board is on the edge of a large center table, which also displays four books placed at equal distances from each other, one of them a Bible, and another the family album. If these were the only books they would not justify Maggie in calling this chamber the library, her dogged name for it; while David and James call it the west-room and Allick calls it "the room," which is to him the natural name for any apartment without a

bed in it. There is a bookcase of pitch pine, which contains six hundred books, with glass doors to prevent your getting at them. No one does try to get at the books, for the Wylies are not a reading family. They like you to gasp when you see so much literature gathered together in one prison-house, but they gasp themselves at the thought that there are persons, chiefly clergymen, who, having finished one book, coolly begin another. Nevertheless it was not all vainglory that made David buy this

library; it was rather a mighty respect for education, as something that he had missed. This same feeling makes him take in the Contemporary Review and stand up to it like a man. Allick, who also has a respect for education, tries to read the Contemporary, but becomes dispirited, and may be heard muttering over its pages, "No, no use, no use, no." 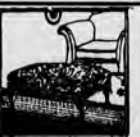

The Garden Dainty—Asparagus

One of the most delicate vegetables from the garden and a general favorite is in season. The butts or ends of the shipped varieties are usually woody and suitable only for flavoring soups, but it is the rankest waste to use the ends of the home-grown asparagus in this manner. The housewife takes the trouble to peel potatoes, why not peel asparagus? With a paring knife, simply peel from the ends of the stalks the outside tough covering. The whole stalk may then be cooked tender, and no waste left on the plates.

Asparagus should be washed, then tied in a bunch and placed upright in a covered kettle of boiling, salted water. A coffee-pot is an excellent shape for holding the bunch upright. It gives the necessary depth for the boiling water and the height to allow the delicate tips to be above the water. The steam will cook them sufficiently. Fifteen or twenty minutes will cook it tender.

The following suggestions for cooking and serving this delicious vegetable are clipped from a recent issue of The Christian Science Monitor:

"The water in which the asparagus is cooked is valuable for making its accompanying sauce and to moisten the toast on which it is placed. When the asparagus is to be served cold, as a salad, reserve a little of the water in which it was boiled, squeeze a half lemon into it and also add one or two tablespoonfuls of olive oil. Let the asparagus marinate while on the ice in this seasoned vegetable water. Any that is not absorbed may be used in making the dressing.

Each season hotels, restaurants and tea rooms strive to find some new and attractive way of presenting asparagus to offset the fact that there is little of novelty in the actual cooking. Slipping the stalks of each individual portion through rings of fried bread is an easy and pretty method of serving. One fashionable restaurant serves the toast cut on oblongs the length of the asparagus stalks, taking the slices of bread from the length of the loaf for this purpose. Each portion is then slipped through a ring of bread that has been toasted or browned in the oven. Another hotel, noted for attractive service, decorates the asparagus on toast with two bands of thick Hollandaise sauce sprinkled with paprika. They look like ribbons tying the stalks in place. Another pretty service trick is to use a small tomato, a slice from the top having been first removed but not the skin. This tomato is heated through but not cooked, the soft interior removed with a sharp spoon, and the bottom filled with rich Hollandaise sauce. In this foundation the asparagus tips are placed upright. Serve each on a round of toast. The tips should project above the tomato and the sauce not be discovered until the tomato is broken into.

Almost all the attractive details of serving hot asparagus may be applied when the vegetable is used cold as a salad. Instead of toast rings, slip the stalks through rings of green pepper or raw tomato and instead of the bands of Hollandaise sauce, use thick and very cold mayonnaise. A boiled salad dressing is especially good with cold asparagus. In making all sauces to accompany either hot or cold asparagus, endeavor to use some of the vegetable water for the liquid called for by the recipe. It gives a noticeably better flavor and is a point to be remembered."

GOOD MANNERS OUTDOORS

The American Nature Association, interested in keeping our country beautiful, announces an "outdoor good manners campaign."

It means by that phrase: "Don't tear up wild flowers by the roots. Don't pick ANY of the rare wild flowers. Act in the presence of Nature as you wish uninvited visitors to act in your own home. Be ladies and gentlemen and save a little of the beauty you enjoy for generations to come. It is true that 'posterity never did anything for you,' but won't you feel better INSIDE if YOU do a little for posterity? That argument cannot be answered and no one should try to do so. Good outdoor manners here in California also mean being careful about matches, burning cigars and cigarettes, and taking care to put out camp fires.—San Francisco Call.

NESTING TIME IN APRIL

In April, bluebirds, robins, chickadees, nuthatches, and phoebes begin housebuilding. A few well-placed houses are certain to have tenants before the month is very old, and by setting them low along fences or on the laundry line poles, one may watch the birds closely.

NESTS ON THE GROUND

The meadowlark's nest is a scooped-out hollow in the meadow. It is formed of dead grasses, arched over with a sort of roof. The four or five white eggs are lightly dotted with reddish brown and gray.

To Clean Tennis Balls

Tennis balls may be cleaned by dissolving a little ammonia in hot water and then scrubbing them with a fairly hard nail brush. EXCERPTED

Excerpts from the lecture given by Frank Bell, C. S. B., of Philadelphia, in the Christian Science Church in Wilmington Tuesday, May 3.

"Life is a matter of great importance to most persons. Yet many persons would find it difficult to tell you how they live or why. The human mind speaks sometimes with a brave show of finality as to incidentals. Ask it to define one absolute fact, and it is very likely to offer you a theory. Much of its so-called knowledge is mere belief."

"Christian Science has been accused of unduly emphasizing the healing of disease, whereas the prime purpose of religion is to save from sin. A sufficient answer, to a Christian, should be the gospel record of Jesus, who by both his example and his specific command to his followers identified the healing of the sick with the religion of Christianity."

Promotion of mere physical ease would not of itself be worthy of religion. What the critic possibly has failed to see is that true Christian healing is identical with the destruction of sin. They cannot be separated."

"The schools are devoted to the overcoming of ignorance, yet they do not regard it as something. No time is wasted in the schools in trying to instruct any one as to the origin or elements of ignorance. . . . The educator knows that ignorance is not the presence of something but the absence of something, in other words, a pure negation. Knowledge of the essential negativeness of ignorance does not tempt the educator to ignore the effects of the negation."

Bausman Reports On Clover And Alfalfa

(Continued from Page 1.)

for the most part got "cured" on sweet clover and did not seed any this year. The dealers report that the farmers who bought this year are a new lot. These farmers, according to the dealers, apparently became interested through the activities of the Extension Service. It is, therefore, apparent that the lime problem is the crux of the sweet clover situation.

"The dealers report a marked increase in the use of lime this year. Whether or not the lime was used on sweet clover will have to be determined. Many farmers have stated that if they limed consistently they could grow red clover successfully. All of which is true. We are not maintaining that sweet clover can be grown easier than red clover. The question is, what is the relative grazing capacity of red clover and of sweet clover? The grazing capacity of red clover is limited even during the early summer, and during July and August it is practically negligible. Sweet clover produces an abundance of pasture during the major portion of the growing season."

"The use of lime has more far-reaching results than that of simply growing clover. It is impossible to grow clover consistently without lime, and it is just as difficult to maintain a high state of soil fertility without growing clover consistently. Soil fertility, it is not necessary to state, is the crux of successful farming."

Alfalfa Campaign

"There have probably been more failures of alfalfa due to the use of unadapted seed than any other one factor. During past years there has doubtless been a large amount of imported and southern grown alfalfa seed used in this area. This type of seed usually germinates fairly well but does not survive our winters. In the last few years the seed used in this area has resolved itself to the northwestern grown strain. This is a step in the right direction, but northwestern grown seed includes anything from Kansas up through the Dakotas. Kansas lies too far south to give the seed the hardy characteristics that are necessary for most consistent results in this section. Neither do the seeds grown in the irrigated sections of Idaho and Utah carry the hardy characteristics necessary for this section. We are advised by the office of Alfalfa Investigation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture that for most consistent results in this area we should use the extremely hardy seed of Montana, the Dakotas, or Canada."

"We have been doing a great deal of

talking about the use of lime, inoculation, and proper seed in the growing of alfalfa. These factors are all essential. However, in looking over several fields of alfalfa that have been started recently I am impressed that there is another factor, one which we have not said so much about, which is quite essential. This is a factor as old as Methuselah, namely, that of soil fertility. A few days ago I was looking over a field of alfalfa that was started last fall according to my instructions. The stand this spring is only fair. The owner was in a quandary relative to the difficulty. In looking over the field I observed that in one corner there was probably a quarter of an acre that showed a better growth, had a better color, and a perfect stand. I raised the question relative to what happened in this corner.

"Why," replied Mr. Mc—, "an old barnyard was there some fifteen years ago." I said, "that solves your problem, doesn't it?"

"I have observed several cases recently both in the growing of alfalfa and sweet clover where lime, inoculation, and good seed were used and still with little or no success in growing the crop. My observation has been that these farms were generally deficient in soil fertility. Whereas, those farms that have developed a good condition of soil fertility are usually the ones that are experiencing success."

Home Economics Dept. To Show Years' Work

To Be Part Of Women's College May Day Program

On Saturday, May 21st, as a part of a May Day program of Women's College, the Home Economics Department is planning to give an exhibit which promises to be unusually interesting and delightful. The exhibit is in charge of the Senior Class co-operating with the other three classes of the department. The purpose of the display is to show to those interested what the Home Economics Department is trying to do. For Foods and Home Management there will be products such as pies, cakes, and bread made by students of these classes. There will be worked out in the successive steps, such projects as "The waste as compared to the edible portion in various cuts of meats"; and "Methods of finishing the tops of the housewife's kitchen table."

An important problem for the college girl's mother is that of removing of stains. This will be worked out in detail, showing how and what to use to remove ink, fruit, tea, coffee, and other common stains. There will also be illustrated the process of washing and drying delicate laces.

From the display of the Clothing Laboratory, the College girl's mother may find a complete exhibit of a wardrobe for her daughter who is going away to college. This part of the exhibit will begin with the Fall, including underwear, dresses, hats, coats, and will continue throughout the Winter, Spring and Summer seasons. The display will give excellent ideas of clothing selection, color, design, and appropriateness in the choice of clothing for the young girl. The wardrobe has been designed and made by students of the four Home Economics classes. The exhibit will not consist entirely of finished products, but will show as well, the construction steps in process.

The Home Economics Department extends an invitation to visitors to come and see the exhibit, which will demonstrate the year's work in the department.
