Awards will be as follows: For three Awards will be as follows: For three winners from each county. (1) a trip to the University of Delaware, including tours of the Experimental Farm and the Poultry Department, and (2) a football game at the University of Delaware or some other college; and in addition. for the three highest scoring contestants in the State, irrespective of countles, cash awards of \$10, \$7.50, and \$5.

The contest is based on keeping of a Delaware Poultry Record Calendar on the contestant's or his family's flock. These record calendars have been prepared by the Extension Service for poultrymen to provide a convenient place for recording the business transactions of their poultry enterprises. They are available to the boys and girls from vocational agriculture teachers, 4-H club agents, or county agricultural agents.

ers, 4-H club agents, or county agricultural agents.

To be eligible to enter the contest, the boy or girl must be a Delawarean who has not reached his 19th birthday before January 1, 1945, and his poultry accounts must cover at least nine consecutive months.

Contestants will be judged on (1) neatness, accuracy and completeness of records, (2) profit per bird, (3) mortality of laying flock (4) egg production per bird, and (5) a 250 to 300-word essay on "Value of Record Keeping", or "My Poultry Experience Dursing 1944-45."

The contest will be under the supervision of J. Frank Gordy, poultryman for the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service. The rules and regulations governing the competition and awards have been formulated in cooperation with Paul M. Hodgson, acting state superviser of Vocational Agriculture, and C. E. 

### GOOD CREDENTIALS

Although the designation "self-made man" is seemingly a trite one it does apply fully and completely to A. Joseph DeFiore, for more than two decades a citizen of Wilmington, who started with practically nothing but a determination to succeed and has, his own efforts, earned a position of prominence, responsibility and respect in New Castle County. During the course of the past ten years there has been hardly a civic or communal project in which Mr. DeFiore has not taken an active part. He has given to the community and to the nation liberally of his time, his talents and, in many instances, of his substance. Now 48 years of age, he is one of the outstanding figures in the motion picture field in Delaware and is recognized as a man of ability and integrity.

A busy executive in one of the county's most modern and popular community theatres, Mr. DeFiore has been honored with the Republican Party's designation of his candidacy to the office of Sheriff of New Castle County. This nomination follows his wide range of activities concerned with the war effort, to which in the past few years he has devoted the major portion of his time. Every effort in wartime programs in which Mr. DeFiore has been concerned has been eminently successful.

Later he became associated in the operation of the Park Theatre at Fourth and Union Streets, and is at present actively engaged in that theatre's management, among other activities

Mr. DeFiore is the father of four children. His oldest son, Joseph, 22 years old, is attached to the Navy in a civilian capacity as aircraft designer, and recently was transferred to the West Coast. His daughter Rita, 21 years old, a graduate of the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science is now in Wilmington, employed as a pharmacist. Robert, 16 years of age, is attending Archmere Academy in his third year, and the baby of the family, Linda Marie, 8 months old, together with Mrs. DeFiore, completes the family.

An accomplished linguist, Mr. DeFiore speaks Italian, French and Spanish fluently. Because of this accomplishment he was recently offered a captaincy in the AMG. Realizing, however, that he would best be able to serve by continuing his war activities and patriotic duties on the home front, he reluctantly declined the

With so many personal and civic activities, Mr. DeFiore still has time for an interest in recreational fields. He is not only a business leader, who has amply demonstrated his capacity for leadership but, in addition, enjoys such hobbies as horseback riding, baseball, boxing, swimming and golf. He is also a hunter of no little ability. He enjoys being busy and to him creative work and organizational activity are the very salt and spice of his living.

Mr. DeFiore enjoys the respect and admiration of those who know him either in the field of business or in civic and communal work. He has given liberally of his time and ability, to say nothing of his own personal funds, to make our community and finest in which to live. In the Twelfth Ward, where he has lived since coming to Wilmington, his name is a household word. The kids in

the neighborhood rate him "tops", as do their parents.

Throughout the years, Mr. DeFiore has increased his nis persona popularity with thousands of people in Wilmington because of his readiness to help in any worthwhile project. He has a keen sense of humor, a ready smile, a quick wit and a sense of responsibility to his community.
