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## Downes community aids injured student

Boy returns home after six-month stay in hospital



**D**ownes Elementary School students recently learned, first hand, a lesson in sharing.

Their eight-year-old classmate, Jeremiah Butler, will return home this month from the A.I. duPont Hospital, where he has been in recovery since he fell through ice into a pond near the Newark Country Club six months ago.

Butler, who was a second grader at Downes Elementary School, is now confined to a wheelchair and in stable condition, according to Jean Ulissi, the school nurse at Downes. But the Newark home that he, his mother, and his two sisters lived in before the incident was not wheelchair accessible. The family recently found a Wilmington apartment that will suit all the



## Recycling back on city's priority list

\$10,000 grant from DNREC will allow study to raise participation

**I**s increased recycling feasible here, or just a waste of time? This is an issue that local officials will look into, if Newark receives a \$10,000 grant from the state Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control. City council members agreed at their regular meeting on Monday night to submit a grant application.

The grant is one result of an executive order that calls for the statewide recycling average of 14 percent to rise to 30 percent in each sector, said Janet Manchester, a DNREC represen-

tative.

Former Delaware Governor Thomas Carper issued the order before he left office. "It has created a daunting task for us," Manchester said. "I don't know if it can be done or not, but we're trying hard to do it."

The state will distribute \$45,000 in grant money towards recycling research throughout the state before the end of this fiscal year. "I can't guarantee that you would receive a grant; they are competitive," she told Newark city council members.

If DNREC officials choose Newark as a grant recipient, members of the local Conservation Advisory Committee said they will do what they can to help. Steven Dentel, CAC chair, said a three- or four-person task force will survey Newark residents and further investigate the benefits of other recycling methods, on the condi-

wheelchair and in stable condition, according to Jean Ulissi, the school nurse at Downes. So Downes students, their parents, and community members have banded together to help Jeremiah and his family with the transition.

"Our goal was to get them set up in their new home; it's one less thing they have to worry about," said Sue Moyer, whose son Ben is also a Downes student and one of Jeremiah's best friends. Moyer came up with the idea for a giving tree earlier this month. She and her children cut out 80 hearts and wrote a typical household item — iron, washcloth, towel, sheets, blanket, bedspread — on each heart. They placed the hearts on the tree branches and brought the tree into school, and the responses from Downes students and parents was overwhelming, she said.

"We sent fliers home with all of the kids the same day we put

## Delaware law enforcement agencies raise more than \$1 million with Torch Run

**T**housands of participants and spectators came to Newark last weekend for the Special Olympics Delaware 2001 Summer Games held at the University of Delaware. Over the two-day event, more than 1,000 athletes competed in six sports including aquatics, track and field, power lifting, bocce, team softball and tennis.

This year's Summer Games were extra special, because they marked the 15th Anniversary

of support by Delaware's law enforcement community. Under the umbrella of the Law Enforcement Torch Run, law enforcement personnel raised over \$1 million dollars this year in support of Special Olympics Delaware.

Additionally, Special Olympics Delaware and a group of local medical professionals launched a new initiative at the Games — the Healthy Athletes program.

Healthy Athletes is a national program designed to help Special Olympics athletes improve their health and fitness. Local dentists and optometrists provided free screenings for all registered athletes during the Games.

# BAC level getting legislative push

Newark already lowered limit in city for DUI convictions

**S**tate Senator F. Gary Simpson (R-Milford) and five other Republican state senators, including Steven H. Amick (R-Newark West) and Liane M. Sorenson (R-Hockessin), have signed on to co-sponsor House Bill 53 to reduce the BAC (blood alcohol concentration) for Driving Under the Influence statewide from .10 percent to .08 percent.

H.B. 53, sponsored by State Representative William Oberle (R-Beecher's Lot), was passed by the House of Representatives in March and is currently awaiting action by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Other senate members sponsoring the bill are Catherine L. Cloutier (R-Heatherbrooke),

Dorinda A. Conner (R-New Castle) and J. Dallas Winslow (R-Talley Hill).

"We have joined in sponsoring this bill to strengthen DUI enforcement as a matter of public safety," said Simpson. "According to figures provided by the National Conference of State Legislatures, if Delaware fails to enact .08 BAC laws by 2003, we will have five percent of our federal highway funding deducted in FY 2004 (\$4,274,920) and 10 percent withheld thereafter (\$8,549,840). Additionally, Delaware is already missing out on receiving a portion of more than \$55 million dollars available to states that have already enacted .08 BAC laws."

Simpson said the citizens of Delaware must demand tougher drinking and driving laws. "Make no mistake, we are not saying someone doesn't have the right to consume alcohol," Simpson said, "but what we are saying is that they don't have the right to harm others while doing it."

# Interconnected roads are a community's decision

DelDOT Secretary said connector road could split community of Salem Woods in half

**D**elDOT's Secretary of Transportation, Nathan Hayward III, has "two ears and one mouth," and plans to use them in that proportion.

Hayward spoke to a group of residents at the recent 7&40 Alliance meeting about his philosophy "listening and approaching situations in a pragmatic" way.

He spoke about transportation from the issues of air quality to DelDOT spending. Many residents were particularly interested in interconnective roads in their developments.

"A concern of many of us is the policy of interconnectivity in communities," said

Linda Bailey, the former 7&40 Alliance president. "Little by little alternate routes are being put in instead of just connecting communities."

Interconnectivity should be approached community by community, Hayward said. If a community does not want an interconnective road than the department will not force one on them and in the same respect, if a community does want interconnectivity than the department "will make it possible," Hayward said.

Some residents were skeptical of the approach because they feel that interconnective roads are being forced on them.

"I believe that if interconnection is not committed to by the developer than they can not turn any of the roads in the development over to public maintenance," a resident at the meeting said. "So instead of being stuck with the maintenance of the roads they create interconnective roads."

Hayward said he is not in favor of "broad, sweeping policies."

Residents seemed happy to hear that the state-planned Newtown Road connector for the community of Salem Woods has been killed.

"I don't think the connector road should be built," Hayward said. "I will never support that road."

The connector road would split the 753-home community of Salem Woods in half. The project would be disruptive and totally inappropriate for the area, Hayward

said. He suggested that the department speak with the community to let them help design a bike path or a place for benches on the land that was to be used for the road.

Hayward also answered questions about the site at the intersection of Old

Baltimore Pike and Rt. 273, referred to as Christiana Corner.

The most recent proposed plans for that site include a day care center. Hayward said three things that should be accomplished at the site are to solve some transportation problems with an access road coming from the back of the site, preserving open space, and allowing for reasonable future economic growth.

"We hear what you are saying about Christiana Corner," said Rosemary Waggoner, president of Raintree Village on Old Baltimore Pike. "Out of the three things you want we just want the road to go behind the site so our neighborhood is not used as a turn around."

Hayward attempted to assure the residents that the department is working on a transportation project to solve the traffic problems at the site.

"I think it is important for you all to know that Mr. Hayward is using flexibility and common sense in dealing with issues," said State Senator Anthony DeLuca (D-Varlano). "We know the corner is going to be developed and he is looking at the situation reasonably as we work through it."

### Armed robbery at Hampton Inn

Delaware State Police are investigating a robbery that happened at the Hampton Inn, located off Route 273 near Interstate 95 around 8:15 p.m. on June 6. A male suspect entered the hotel and displayed a weapon to a 45-year-old male clerk and a 54-year-old female clerk. The suspect fled the lobby area once he took an undisclosed amount of cash and was last seen fleeing on foot.

Troopers are looking for suspect described as a male, 5 feet, 7 inches, thin build, 20 to 25 years-old. He was wearing a multicolored baseball cap and a blue cotton zipper jacket.

### Car thefts, burglaries linked to three youths

On June 7, New Castle County Police investigated a report of two vehicles that had been stolen from a residence in the unit block of Victoria Drive in Summit-Pond (Middletown). Also on June 7, police investigated another stolen vehicle from the Mount Pleasant Trailer Park. The victim believed the theft was related to a burglary that occurred earlier at Mary's Kitchen in Middletown. On June 8, New Castle County Police investigated a burglary at the Little League

concession stand at the Silver Lake Elementary School. A large amount of cash was reported stolen.

On June 9, Elkton Police arrested a 15-year-old male operating one of the cars stolen from the Summit Pond address. The youth had over \$447 in cash in his possession. Later that day New Castle County Police arrested a 14-year-old youth at the Christiana Mall who was operating the other stolen car from the Summit Pond address. The younger suspect was in possession of over \$700 in cash. A third suspect, age 16, was identified by detectives. Officers responded to his residence in Newark and recovered over \$626 from him.

Detectives were able to link all three youths to the aforementioned crimes. They have been charged with burglary, theft, conspiracy, and three counts of vehicle theft. The 14- and 15-year-old boys both reside in Middletown. Police recovered \$1793 cash and the 3 stolen cars. The arraignment dispositions are pending.

### Home invasion in Harbor Club apartment

New Castle County Police Detectives are continuing their investigation into an attempted robbery and home invasion that occurred at the Harbor Club Apartments on Tuesday, May 29, at approximately 9:05 a.m.

The 19-year-old female victim was asleep in her apartment when she was awoken by someone

ringing the doorbell. She answered the door, believing that it was an acquaintance. The suspect pushed the door open, demanded money from the victim and began assaulting her. She fought off his attack causing the suspect to flee the area. He is believed to have fled on foot to the parking lot of Harmony Plaza.

The suspect was not armed during the incident and no property was taken from the victim. The victim received a small laceration to her lip during the confrontation with the suspect.

The suspect is described as a Hispanic male, in his 20's, 5 feet, 9 inches, 195 pounds, medium build, dark curly hair with shaved sides, light brown eyes and clean-shaven.

Anyone with information about this crime or the suspect is asked to contact County Police Detectives at 395-8110. Residents of the area can also schedule a free home security survey by a County Police Officer by calling 395-8050.

Detectives have distributed a flyer to the community and other apartment complexes in the area as part of their ongoing efforts to solve this crime.

### Teen arrested twice in two days

A 17-year-old youth arrested for allegedly spray painting a road in a Bear community, was arrested again by the same officer

the next morning after he and an acquaintance allegedly attempted to burglarize two homes in Christiana Hollow in Bear on June 12.

New Castle County Police arrested the 17-year-old for allegedly spray painting several words on a road in the development of Barrett Run in Bear on Sunday, June 10 at approximately 6:50 a.m. Officers found a can of spray paint in the teen's pocket and a short distance away, several spots of fresh spray paint and words including "I got you" were found.

The teenager, who resides in the 400 block of Old Baltimore Pike, was charged with a graffiti offense.

On Monday, June 11, at approximately 12:45 a.m., officers responded to Christiana Hollow for a report of two males knocking on doors and looking into windows of homes in the area. The defendants allegedly ignored police commands to stop and became disorderly.

Investigation revealed that the 17-year-old, and a 16-year-old who resides in Colton Meadows, New Castle, drove to the area of Christiana Hollow allegedly with a plan to burglarize a home. Before stopping at one home on Birchgrove Drive, they obtained a baseball bat and a golf club then approached the house and knocked on the door.

When the homeowner answered, the subjects left the area. Another area resident called police and reported the incident.

While officers were responding, the defendants drove further down Birchgrove Drive and approached a second home while still armed with the golf club and baseball bat. They again knocked on the door and began looking in the windows. However before they were able to enter, the police arrived and were able to take the defendants into custody.

Both were charged with attempted burglary, resisting arrest, underage consumption of alcohol, night prowling, possession of burglar tools, conspiracy and carrying a deadly instrument. Both defendants were committed to the Juvenile Detention Facility.

### Mother has crack cocaine hidden in child's diaper box

On June 10, New Castle County Police charged Nicole Grayson, 32, of the Hidden Valley Apartments with possession of crack cocaine, possession of heroin, possession of drug paraphernalia, and two counts of endangering the welfare of a child after police found drugs in a diaper box in her children's bedroom. Officers responded to Grayson's home after receiving a request to check on the welfare of her children around 6 p.m. When police arrived they found Grayson and two children inside,

ages 3 and 5.

Police found a crack pipe in her possession. Crack cocaine and heroin were found in her bedroom and more crack cocaine was hidden in the children's bedroom. The Division of Family Services placed the children with a responsible family member.

### Blood supplies very low in region

The Blood Bank of Delaware/Eastern Shore has issued an urgent call for blood donors. There is a particular need for type O donors, although all types of blood are in short supply throughout Delaware and the Eastern Shore of Maryland.

Blood inventories are very low and it has been difficult to recruit enough donors to meet the needs. Blood usage by patients in local hospitals has been very high recently due to a large number of trauma patients and accident victims.

Blood donors are asked to call 1-888-8-BLOOD-8 to schedule an appointment. Convenient donation sites are located throughout Delmarva.

The Blood Bank of Delaware/Eastern Shore provides blood for the 18 hospitals and seven renal care centers throughout Delmarva.

### MADD believes a nationwide .08 BAC could save 500 lives a year

Newark city council voted unanimously in December 2000 for a new municipal ordinance decreasing the BAC level for drunk driving from .10 to .08.

During the public hearing on the ordinance, Dolly Banks, the president of the Delaware Chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving, told city council that MADD believes up to 500 lives could be saved annually nationwide if all states went to the .08 level. "It's number one on our agenda in Delaware to get this passed to .08," Banks said.

Banks noted it takes five drinks in one hour for a 170-pound man to reach Delaware's current legal BAC level of .10 for drunk driving. "To me, that's more than social drinking," said Banks.

Newark's city solicitor Roger Akin said the BAC level is the number which provides almost an automatic case for drunk driving. "There's no defense to the drunk driving charge if this blood content level is present," said Akin, "even if the driver can meet all other indications for sobriety like walking a straight line..."

Researchers will talk with leaders of communities in comparable situations to Newark, and see how their recycling systems are working, survey residents and try recycling possibilities at community events, conduct recycling campaigns in schools, try to develop the market for recycled goods, and report their findings back to city council members.

## New Castle Athlete lights Flame of Hope to open Summer Games

The Gala Opening Ceremonies for the Games displayed the pageantry of parading delegations accompanied by area celebrities.

Opening night also featured the presentation of Outstanding Awards to Special Olympics' supporters and culminated with the final leg of the Law Enforcement Torch Run.

Amidst indoor fireworks, the Flame of Hope was passed to New Castle resident Glenna Marie Wooters, the Special Olympics Athlete of the Year, who lit the cauldron to "officially open" the Summer Games.

Wooten, in her 20th year of Special Olympics competition, is a two-time World Games participant. An athlete with the Golden Sabres, she has competed in 12 different sports.

The 1,000 Special Olympics athletes represented 41 programs in Delaware supported by 250 volunteer coaches and chaperones and 2,500 volunteers.

Competitions included: 330 athletes in Aquatics; 340 athletes in Track and Field; 120 athletes in Tennis; 450 athletes in Unified Softball; 30 athletes in Softball Skills; 45 athletes in Powerlifting; and 120 athletes in Bocce.

Marie McIntosh of Wilmington was recognized as the 2001 Volunteer of the Year after more than 15 years of service, during which she has been tennis director and aquatic director. In 1987, she was head swimming coach for the World Games athletes. She and her husband also participate in the annual Polar Bear Plunge fundraiser, sponsored by Happy Harry's for the past five years.

Georgetown resident Dick Goodwin of Ennis School was honored as the Outstanding Coach of the year. He has been head coach for basketball for four years and a Games chaperone for

eight years.

Creig Doyle of Lewes was named Outstanding Unified partner for his work during the past six years with the Landsharks program in Seaford.

Special Olympics is founded on the belief that people with mental retardation can, with proper instruction and encouragement, learn, enjoy and benefit from participating in individual and team sports, adapted as necessary to meet the needs of those with special mental and physical limitations.

Eunice Kennedy Shriver began Special Olympics with the intentions of giving individuals with mental retardation the chance to show their physical capabilities.

In 1968, she organized the First International Summer Special Olympics Games at Soldier Field in Chicago. Today, over one million children and adults with mental retardation from over 120 countries participate.

The Delaware program which began in 1970, now has more than 1,600 athletes participating in 16 sports representing 50 programs.

Any individual eight years of age or older who has mental retardation, or other significant learning impairments, is eligible to participate in Special Olympics.

The Summer Games are a highlight of the annual schedule, providing all of the pageantry and excitement of regular International Games, including Opening and Closing Ceremonies, awards presentations and associated cultural activities.

## Delaware needs lower BAC passed

**I**t appears the Delaware General Assembly is in support of lowering the BAC (blood alcohol concentration) standard for drunk driving in the state from .10 to .08.

This week, the bill already passed in the House of Representatives in March, was introduced in the State Senate with the backing of six senators. However, the time is close when the General Assembly session ends, and this issue is too important to get lost in the hectic year-end shuffle.

Drunk drivers are a critical and continuing problem on highways throughout the country. For this reason, a federal highway law, which went into effect in 2001, mandates that states which do not have the .08 standard in effect by 2003, will lose two percent of their federal transportation funding.

In Delaware, this means more than \$4 million lost in the first year. The penalty rises to 10 percent by 2008, meaning a shortfall of over \$8.5 million for the state.

According to AAA, which supports the .08 standard, states that adopt the lower standard before 2007 will be reimbursed for lost revenue.

Transportation money doesn't just talk, it shrieks on the congested highways of a small state like Delaware.

We cannot afford any loss at all in this regard.

But, more importantly, we cannot afford the loss of life and limb which occurs daily on our roads due to impaired drivers.

There is absolutely no reason for anyone to be driving with this level of alcohol in their blood. According to the Mothers Against Drunk Driving, it takes five drinks in one hour for a 170-pound man to reach a blood alcohol level of .10. That's chugging a lot of drinks in a short time, but, hey, it's your liver.

All we're saying, as one sponsor of the bill said already, is "you don't have the right to harm someone else while you're doing it."

It's number one on MADD's agenda to get the .08 standard passed in Delaware. It should be number one for every person who uses the roads.

## Exit, Stage Right, (The Curtain Comes Down On Act 1)

By the time this column is published my departure from Glasgow High School and the Christina School District will be virtually complete.

No, by "virtually" I do not mean that I will be departing via some computer simulation; I wish that were the case. I do mean that my room will be emptied of notes, papers, and memorabilia collected over 16 years of teaching and coaching with only the mundane routine of facing personnel and finance forms to complete my resignation, a task daunting enough to give pause to even the most determined deserter.

I use the term deserter because that, in part, is how I feel. When I was hired 16 years ago, I expected to be here at least 25 or 30 years. If duration is some measure of success, then I have failed.

I expected to mold, shape, influence, inspire, and hopefully, amuse wave after wave of our students for that same period of time. By letting the students down, the idea of failure crawls out of the back of my brain and lobotomizes the small amount of

pleasure I take from leaving a workplace that has pushed me to levels of frustration that threatens my physical and mental health.

By workplace I do not simply mean Glasgow High School; a school encompasses far more than the building, administrators, teachers and students.

The whole atmosphere of teaching in a public school in Delaware has become horribly oppressive. Far too many parents fail to support teachers and administrators in disciplinary actions.

Administrators create rules and beg teachers to enact them but when the cock crows three times the teachers are left to hang on their own.

Legislators scream for teacher accountability and professionalism, yet fail to treat teachers as professionals when it comes to matters of curriculum, disciplinary policy, and last but not least, payment for doing a job that is increasingly hard to fill. Come to think of it, salary is the "least" when

compared to most of the districts in our surrounding states.

My greatest sense of failure comes from leaving behind some of the finest and most dedicated people I have had the privilege to have had as friends and colleagues; my fellow teachers.

As a staff, it would be difficult to find a more knowledgeable, enthusiastic, and innovative group of teachers than can be found at Glasgow High School. Given all the problems that face education today, they still make things work and keep the educational process running. However, for many of our experienced teachers, the marathon is about to end.

In my leaving, I have unfortunately accelerated the arrival of the biggest threat that faces public (and private) education in Delaware today, a lack of qualified teachers.

The conditions in our schools and the hurdles set by legislators are barriers to the incredible number of new educators that will be needed when the experience exodus erodes the intellectual infrastructure of our schools over the next few years.

Even the Delaware State Education Association (teachers' union) seems to be unconcerned about the anticipated teacher



# Couple's travel to Orient inspires garden in Newark backyard

The house at 604 Dallam Road fits right in with its Nottingham Green neighbors-but the yard is another story. Where you'd expect to find an expanse of green lawn, Mae and Robert Carter have constructed a Japanese-inspired garden, edged in flowering lines with split wood

and river stones.

The Carters worked on this design themselves, deciding to forego the advice of a landscape designer, who had offered a geometric idea. They wanted a more natural look, a carefully composed, peaceful garden that would offer them both beauty and privacy.

Indicating an organically

shaped expanse of small stones, Robert Carter explains that this particular area represents a pond. Two quartz rocks serve as islands.

"We began with just the large one," he explained, "but, it seemed too alone, so we added the smaller stone islet. We kept moving the stones around until they found the right places. The stones are buried deep into the ground for stability and strength."

The representational quality of the garden also takes in the undulating junipers next to the stone pond, which have been trimmed to suggest mountains, and the "marsh" created by the lily turf, or lariope. Accents include a dramatic Japanese black pine and a weeping cherry, each of which stands on a small mound.

Most plants in a Japanese garden require constant shaping, and that holds true for the wisteria that climbs from a twisted trunk at the Carters' front door and stretches across the front of the house.

### Talking to kids

Many parents think that the main purpose of communicating with their kids is to get information from them. Questions such as, "Is your homework done?" or "How did you do on your spelling test?" are common in most households with school age kids. We also say things like "Eat your broccoli" or "Wear a jacket today." While both of these are examples of communication, the best form of communication is one that connects a parent to the child's feelings.

Healthy communication between a parent and child starts shortly after birth. Numerous studies show that parents who talk more with their child, will eventually have happier, better-adjusted children.

Communication with kids lets them know that they are loved and cared for, helps kids feel safe and helps them share their needs.

Good communication with your child helps relieve some of the stresses and frustrations that can result from raising a child.

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Being available to communicate is probably the most important thing you can do, but as many of us know it can also be the most difficult. A minimum of 10 minutes a day with each child is recommended. This time should be free of distractions for both of you. Talking about something important while you're fixing dinner isn't ideal and may send the wrong message to your child.

A second important building block is being a good listener. Good listening skills are hard to develop. Being a good listener helps your child feel loved and understood, even when you can't do anything to help them with a particular problem.

The team received a rating of nine on a scale of zero to 10 for the car design, giving it an "AWESOME!" label.

The judges liked the fact that the team "had the chains connected to the motor, unlike the other cars that had them connected to the axles," Mays said.

"One of the cars was shaped like a bridge and there were a lot of cool designs," Cammock said. "There was a lot of good competition for us in the design category."

Team one included John Bingham,


solar panel and motor and his added materials of balsa wood, CDs for wheels and a piece of a plastic toy car.

think it would be good to focus on design with one car and speed with the other."

The next stop for the boys is Turner Falls, Mass., for the National Junior Solar Sprint competition. Those that think they are able to attend are optimistic and excited about their attempt to win a national title.

This is the first time that the students have attempted to build solar powered cars and thought that it sounded like a "neat idea and something fun to be a part of."

Many of them have interests in engineering and design. Cammock said he enjoys anything that pertains to racing since he races cars.

"The only cars I ever built," Kettler said, "were with Legos when I was a kid."

Though this was a fun experience for the students, their science teacher Nancy Smith, feels that it was an educational one as well.

"This was important for them to participate in because it taught them about options for sources of power, an awareness of the environment and alternate fuel," Smith said. "It gave them an opportunity to use their imagination and knowledge of circuitry as well."



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



## UD's Cariello named to All-ECAC softball team

### Mark also receives regional honors

University of Delaware junior pitcher/outfielder Amanda Cariello has been named to the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) honorable mention All-East softball team.

Cariello, a junior from Bear, was the lone Blue Hen player selected to the team. The team included 12 first-team selections, 13 second-team selections and 13 honorable mention picks.

The teams were selected from a vote of ECAC member head softball coaches, an area that includes NCAA Division I schools from Maine to North Carolina. Rider outfielder Deanna Dovak was named the ECAC Player of the Year.

Cariello, who also earned first-team All-America East honors in May, was selected to the team as a designated player. She was Delaware's leading hitter this past spring and also led all America East hitters with a .349 average. She started all 49 games, collecting 51 hits, scoring 20 runs

and knocking in 24 runs.

In addition, University of Delaware senior outfielder Lauren Mark has been named to the Louisville Slugger Mid-Atlantic Region softball second team as selected by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

Mark, a senior from Hockessin, DE (Ursuline Academy), was named to the all-region team for the second time in her career. She earned first team honors in 1999 when she batted .397 with 45 runs batted in and was named the America East Player of the Year. The region

includes all NCAA Division I teams in New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Delaware.

Mark, a second team All-America East selection this spring, led the Blue Hens to a 24-25 record as she started all 49 games and was second on the team with a .344 batting average, ranking fourth in America East. She led the team with 53 hits, ranked second in America East with six triples, and ranked fourth in America East with 26 runs batted in. She also led the team with 76 total bases, a .494 slugging

percentage, and with 20 walks.

A tri-captain, Mark also was the Blue Hens' No. 3 pitcher, posting a 4-5 record with a 2.24 earned run average. She struck out 22 batters in 50 innings of work.

Mark capped an outstanding career this past spring by setting school records for career hits (182), career RBI (107), career triples (22), and career total bases (263). Her .367 career batting average ranks third all-time at Delaware.

# Hens hoops to open in Alaska

The University of Delaware men's basketball team will open the 2001-2002 season in Fairbanks, Alaska at the Top of the World Classic.

Delaware will face Wichita State in the first round of the eight-team tournament on Nov. 16 at 1 a.m. Eastern time. The other three first-round match-ups feature Washington taking on host Alaska-Fairbanks; Bowling Green facing Mississippi and Radford squaring off against Butler.

The trip marks the Blue Hens' first departure of the Continental U.S. since 1997 and the school's first-ever trip to the state of Alaska in any sport.

"Any time you are able to take

your student-athletes to a part of the world they wouldn't normally see, it is exciting," said Delaware coach David Henderson. "From a basketball standpoint, the tourney presents a challenge. We have to face some tough competition in a far away place and a different time zone with a team that will have no seniors on the court. That certainly makes for an interesting way to open the season."

Last season, Butler won the Mid-Continent Conference title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament and knocked off Wake Forest in the first round. Mississippi received an at-large bid and advanced to the Sweet 16.

The Blue Hens return just two

starters, but seven regular contributors from last year's 20-10 team. Guard Austen Rowland is the Blue Hens' leading returning scorer, averaging 11.6 points per game and connecting on 36 percent of his three-point attempts.

Henderson also welcomes three newcomers to the program in highly touted junior college transfer Vohn Hunter from Champlain Community College in Burlington, VT and St. Raymond's High in the Bronx.

Delaware's complete schedule for the 2001-2002 season, its first as a member of the Colonial Athletic Association, will be announced later this summer.

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

The USS Rasher Association is attempting to locate former crew members, families of departed crew, and friends of Rasher and submarines, to inform them of the upcoming reunion to be held Oct. 5-9 in Charleston, S.C.

From 1943 through 1967, the USS Rasher served through World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. The recipient of numerous medals, awards and commendations, Rasher is credited with sinking the second most tonnage of any World War II U.S. submarine and holds the record for most tonnage sunk on a single war patrol.

Cut up for scrap metal in 1971, a

semblance of the USS Rasher, in the form of a 12-foot cutaway metal sculpture, can be viewed at the Palm Springs, Calif., Air Museum. Her original periscopes and conning tower are currently mounted and in use at the Columbia River Maritime Museum, Astoria, Ore., and her original handmade battle flag is displayed at the Submarine Force Museum in Groton, Conn.
