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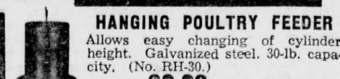
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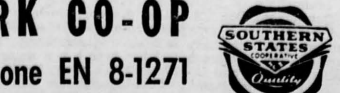

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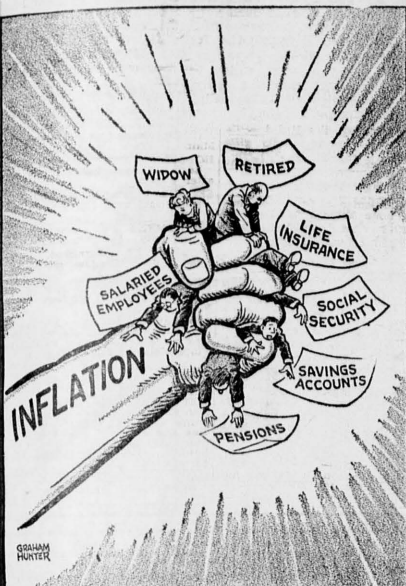

CAUGHT IN THE SQUEEZE

One of the homespun virtues of America has been to save. Even though a man knew he couldn't take it, he could hope to provide for his old age and for wife and children after he was gone. But inflation has made this virtue into a mockery. Americans who have worked and lived carefully find now that the value has been

squeezed value from a dollar like a clenched fist squeezes water from a sponge. But the dollar feels no pain; people who are hurt. And the squeeze clamps hardest on people with a limited supply of dollars and no ready way to more—widows living on life insurance, retired workers on pensions, employed workers living on salaries.

Yet inflation is not inevitable. It is caused by our own actions and can be cured by our own actions. A major cause of inflation is heavy government spending and debt—caused by our demands on government. We can remove this cause of inflation by stopping our demands for government hand-

And Newark City Council is to be commended for holding line against inflation with an 80 cent tax rate carry-over the municipal budget prepared by Francis Neide for 1960.

The League of Women Voters Of Newark

Who can vote an absentee ballot? Servicemen and women who are registered voters in the City of Newark, who expect to be absent on election day; and registered voters who are ill or have a physical disability which prevents their voting in person. These two categories of absentee voters are established by ordinance under a provision of the charter which permits absentee voting as specified by council.

Help for Servicemen—The League of Women Voters is especially interested in helping service personnel who wish to cast an absentee ballot because the Department of Defense in Washington has requested league

assistance to inform men and women in the armed services about their voting rights. Upon request of service personnel, their families or friends, the voter's service committee of the League of Women Voters of Newark will give non-partisan information on election and registration procedures, and on candidates.

How do you get an absentee ballot? Apply to the election board of the City of Newark, Council Office, Academy Building, Newark.

Absentee ballots will be issued only between March 24 and April 11 during regular business hours. They will be accompanied by a form of affidavit which must be filled out and returned with the ballot.

What is the deadline for return of absentee ballots? Before closing of the polls on election day, April 12. Must a voter register in person? Yes. There is no absentee registration! The last registration days are March 19-20. Registration is at the council office between 7:30 a.m. and 7 p.m. To be eligible one must be a citizen of the United States, and by April 12 have reached the age of 21; lived in the State of Delaware for one year prior to that date, and in the City of Newark for three months.

Even though you have voted in a city election before, you must register again if you have not voted since 1955, or if you have moved or changed your name since the last time you voted.

Registration and voting in the City of Newark for the mayor and council are entirely separate from registration for the general elections. Your voters ID card does not entitle you to vote in the city election on April 12.

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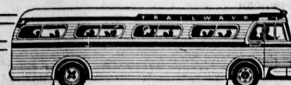

being all the places where school elections are usually held in said School District.

A voter shall cast only one ballot at one of the polling places listed above. Every citizen, male or female, residing in said School District who would be entitled at the time of the holding of said Special School Election to register and vote at a general election if such general election were to be held at the time of said Special School Election shall be deemed to be a qualified voter and entitled to vote at said Special School Election regardless of whether he or she is a registered voter at the time of said election.

At said election voters will be provided with ballots upon which are printed the words "For Additional Tax" and also the words "Against Additional Tax" to be separated and each followed by a blank square in which the voters shall mark their choice.
