We remember...

In venues throughout Delaware, citizens came together this past Sunday to recognize the tenth anniversary of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001.

In Newark, a special ceremony was held Sunday morning at the Lighthouse Baptist Church, located at 1842 Otts Chapel Road, that featured first responders of the Aetna Hook, Hose, and Ladder Company, members of the New Castle County Police Department, and State Senator Bethany Hall-Long, who spoke about the courage and dedication of Delaware's police, military, and emergency personnel.

Later in the evening, Bishop W. Francis Malooly gave a homily at a Vespers service at St. John the Baptist-Holy Angels Church, at 82 Possum Park Road, which was presided over by Pastor

Arthur Fiore.

All over Newark, and the state, people watched coverage from the site of the Twin Towers in New York City, as the names of the almost 3,000 victims of the attacks were read live on television.

In Dover, members of the 146th General Assembly, on behalf of the Delaware

Heritage Commission, gathered to dedicate a stone bench to the memories of those who fell victim and those who responded to the attacks ten years ago.

The memorial was first suggested by Sen. Robert I. Marshall, D-Wilmington

Capital Improvement Plan okayed by City Council

Newark City Council on Monday unanimously approved a five-year, \$41.8 million capital improvement plan that includes funding for a new parking facility and work on the former Curtis Paper Mill site.

The plan contains a 15 percent increase from the plan approved last year, due mostly to those two projects.

Every year, council votes on a five-year plan, though

only the first year is binding, Finance Director Dennis McFarland said. The other four years are presented so future plans can be made, but those figures are often changed in the following year's plan.

"The real impact of their decision is on the subsequent calendar year," McFarland said.

The gross capital budget for 2012 is \$9.5 million, an increase of \$3.2 million over 2011's budget, due mostly to the More Park parking system.

However, the \$3.5 million More Park system will be paid for with a tax-exempt lease, so the total cost to the city for 2012 capital projects will actually be slightly less than in 2011.

The More Park system is a foundationless, modular steel-and-concrete structure that will be placed over the existing Lot 3, which is behind Café Gelato and Catherine Rooney's Irish Pub. According to initial estimates, the structure, called the More Park System, will add 113 parking spaces to

the existing 200 in the lot.

It is appealing to officials because it can be built quicker and cheaper than a traditional parking garage.

"It's built like building blocks and can be placed directly over an existing parking area," Maureen Feeney Roser, assistant planning director, told council last month. "Because it's modular, we don't have to shut down the entire lot while it's being built."

Construction is expected to begin this summer and could be completed before

students return in the fall.

Officials plan to find a private company to build and pay for the initial construction. The city will then pay rent to use the facility and eventually have the option to purchase it.

The cost is expected to be offset by raising parking fees in all three of the city's pay-to-park lots from 50 cents per half hour to 60 cents per half hour.

Also included in the 2012 capital budget is \$571,000 in spending on the former Curtis Paper Mill site, though

most will be covered by grants. Over the five years, the plan allots \$1.5 million for a three-phase development of the park, which will include walking trails, a new footbridge, skate spots and an athletic field.

McFarland also presented projections that show the city will have an average surplus of \$1.5 million over the next five years, he said.

"The city's not flush with cash that we can do anything we want [...] but there are other municipalities worse off than us," he said.

West, who has actively pursued constructing a memorial for several years, and who was on-hand to witness the unveiling of the bench.

"While we recoil at the evil which unleashed the events of Sept. 11, 2001, we simultaneously rejoice at the ordinary citizens who showed extraordinary courage," Marshall said. "This memorial is a modest, but heartfelt tribute to the Americans who fell on Sept. 11, 2001, but whose courage should serve as an inspiration to us all."

Lt. Matt Denn, who also attended the ceremony, spoke about those affected by the tragedy:

"On this September 11 and, more importantly in the months and years ahead, we need to recognize in real and concrete ways the crushing burden that has been carried by a select few and our continuing obligation to do right by them," Denn said noting the obligation owed, not only died on 9-11 and in the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, but to those who continue to serve. "Events like that the one that we're here for today are part of paying down that debt, but only a small part. To those who are in harm's way, we owe every effort to keep them safe, support their families and to bring them home as soon as our nation's

safety allows."

Gov. Jack Markell, at another gathering on Sunday, said, "Together, we will pause to honor those that were lost, to celebrate those who have served, and in many cases, give back to our friends, our neighbors and our country, for all that we have received from them. This weekend is a chance to reflect, and remember, but also, I hope a chance to rekindle that spirit of unity that remains alive in each of us."

Additional tributes were given by Senators Tom Carper and Chris Coons, as well as U.S. Rep. John Carney, who stated that the anniversary should be remembered as a

day of grieving, but also a day of pride.

"September 11th, 2001 will forever be remembered as one of the worst days in American history. And we must never forget the people we lost that day, or the horror that occurred in New York, Washington and Shanksville. But today, ten years later, let's celebrate what that day taught us. Let's celebrate the life of the victims. Let's celebrate the heroism we witnessed. Let's celebrate the sense of community we saw, with firefighters and first responders flooding into New York from across the country, including Delaware. Let's celebrate our country's resilience. And let's

celebrate America's enduring freedom."

Sen. Coons reflected on the challenges our country has faced in the years after the attacks:

"Our nation has been undeniably changed. Our soldiers continue to fight on foreign soil the war that was started on ours that day, and our police officers, firefighters, and emergency personnel stand vigilant in the protection of our communities. We will never know the full extent of the damage caused by the 9/11 terror attacks, but as long as we fight to preserve that which makes us American — the freedoms, rights, and responsibilities on which our nation was formed and which we hold so dear

— we will ensure the terrorists were unable to strike the true target for which they were aiming."

As a final tribute, Sen. Carper spoke about how the strength of unity has helped our country face adversity, both past and present:

"...It is important that we take a moment to reflect on how we've grown as a nation, as well as the challenges that still remain," said Sen. Carper. "I am reminded of the Latin phrase 'E pluribus unum,' which means 'Out of many, one.' This phrase adorns our nation's seal and suggests that while we all come from many different places, we are one nation. In the immediate aftermath of Sept. 11, we came together as Americans

and truly became one. We overcame differences of race, class, gender, and party to work together to meet the challenges posed by terrorism and to heal. Today our country still faces the threat of terrorism, even as we struggle with the challenges posed by a weak economic recovery and two wars."

"As I pause to observe this anniversary, I am reminded again of the need for our country to unite as a people and a nation. I can think of no better way to honor the memory of those we lost on that tragic day ten years ago than to renew our commitment to that spirit of unity that helped carry our nation through that terrible day and the difficult days that followed."

Elkton man arrested in backyard of Newark home

An Elkton man faces indecent exposure and lewdness charges after being spotted in a backyard of a home north Newark twice on the same day.

New Castle Police reported that Robert Meyer, 26, of the 100 block of Kirkaldy Drive, was seen in yard in the 300 block of Valley Road.

When officers arrived, the occupant of the home indicated that while she was sitting in her computer room a man walked past the window. Moments later, man was seen performing a lewd act as he was sitting on her picnic table.

The victim went to the front of the home and saw a black Ford sedan parked in her driveway. A short time later, he was seen fleeing the area.

A computer inquiry indicated that the registered owner lived in Elkton. Police went to the home and with the assistance of an officer from the Cecil County Sheriff's Office, but could not find the occupant.

Later in the night, an officer went to the victim's residence and found the vehicle was again parked in the driveway. The officer saw a man walking toward the vehicle who matched the suspect's description. The man, who was later positively identified as Meyer, was taken into custody without incident.

He was charged with the following: Criminal Trespass in the Third Degree (Two Counts), Indecent Exposure in the Second Degree (Two Counts), Lewdness (Two Counts), and Trespassing with Intent to Peer or Peep into a Window. Meyer was taken to the Howard Young Correctional Institute in Wilmington after failing to post \$1,200 bail.

Public tips lead to arrest of bank robbery suspect

Delaware State Police Robbery Detectives have arrested a Newark man in connection with the robbery of the PNC Bank, University Plaza that occurred on Friday, September 9.

The incident occurred as the suspect entered the bank branch located at 84 University Plaza, Newark, at approximately 9:40 a.m. The suspect approached a bank teller and produced a note announcing a robbery and demanding cash from the teller. The bank teller complied and turned over an undisclosed amount of money to the suspect. He then fled from the bank in an unknown direction. There were no injuries.

Through investigation and numerous tips from the public after media publishing of the surveillance photos, Troop 2 Robbery Detectives were able to connect Thomas J. Wingfield, 34, of Newark, to the robbery.

The investigation culminated in the early morning hours on Sunday, September 11, as Delaware State Troopers located Wingfield at the Dutch Inn Motel, 100 block of South Dupont Highway, New Castle where he was staying. Wingfield was taken into custody without incident.

Wingfield was arrested and charged with Robbery Second Degree. He was arraigned and committed to HRYCI. Bond information not available at the

time of this release.

Local hotel site of multiple robberies

Last week, Newark Police investigated a number of robberies that occurred at the Howard Johnson's Hotel and Conference Room, located at 1119 South College Avenue.

On Monday, September 9, a pair of guests staying at the hotel, and also using the first floor meeting facilities, reported that a wallet had been taken from one victim's purse, containing a small amount of cash and several credit cards, and a laptop computer worth over \$900, that had been used during the meeting, was taken from the other victim. Both victims stated that the meeting room had been secured after they had left. A search by responding officers showed that there were no signs of forced entry. Representatives with the hotel said that they were unable to recover any video surveillance footage of the incident.

On Saturday, Newark Police responded to two additional robbery reports that occurred in separate rooms.

The first call was made on Saturday morning, where a guest stated that her laptop and cell phone were taken as she was sleeping. The woman, who told officers that she was part of the adult film industry, said that she had been contacted to meet a photographer at the Newark Library. When she did, the man told her that a room had been bought at the Howard Johnsons and to meet him there. She said that the photo shoot had lasted until 1 a.m. and that she had unexpectedly fallen asleep right after the shoot. She woke up the next morning and found the laptop and phone missing. The suspect is described as a black male, between 40 and 50 years old, 6'00" to 6'3" tall, average size, with short hair and missing some teeth. Police recovered a fingerprint from a coffee maker in the room and are analyzing it to name a suspect.

On Saturday night, a couple staying at the hotel reported that an unknown suspect had

forcibly opened the door to their room and made off with several items, including over \$9,000 in jewelry. Police saw that the door had been opened with enough force to break the jamb and to damage the strike plate, causing the door to become very difficult to open. Authorities were unable to recover any fingerprints, but the male victim turned over an unknown cell phone that he had found under the bed when was in the room earlier on the week. This case has been turned over to the Criminal Investigation Division for further follow up.

Residential robbery nets over \$40,000 in missing items

On Thursday, September 8, a resident in the 300 block of Amoroso Way reported that unknown suspects had broken into his house and stolen over \$40,000 in jewelry, rare coins, computer equipment, and watches.

The victim told officers that he had returned home and found that an interior door leading to the basement was left open. A further inspection showed that a rear basement window had been broken, and that the storm door to the kitchen had been unlocked. The owner searched throughout the house and saw that several watch cases, as well as jewelry boxes, had been emptied, along with several glass cabinets containing the coin collection.

The owner's girlfriend, who does not live at the residence, told police that some of her pieces of jewelry, that she leaves at the house, were among some of the missing items.

Police performed a search of the premises, including running a track with a K-9 officer, but could find little evidence. No blood splatter was found by the broken glass and authori-

ties were unable to recover any fingerprints. Neighbors did not report seeing anything unusual at the house that day.

Troopers investigate one-vehicle crash

The Delaware State Police have arrested a Bear man following a one-vehicle accident that occurred late night on Thursday, September 8, in Newark.

The accident occurred at approximately 11:36 p.m. as Stephen Shaw, 19, was operating a 1999 International truck and was traveling southbound on DE Rt. 896 approaching the intersection of Winsome Way. For an unknown reason, Shaw's vehicle left the west edge of the roadway and traveled approximately 500 feet before colliding with a ditch and coming to rest. The force of the collision caused one of the truck's fuel tanks to become dislodged spilling between 75 to 100 gallons of diesel fuel onto the ground. A Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC) hazardous materials crew as well as fire department personnel responded to the scene to assist in cleaning up the spill.

Stephen Shaw was cited by the Delaware State Police and DNREC for Driving under the Influence of Drugs, Inattentive Driving, No Proof of Motor Vehicle Insurance, and Discharging of a Pollutant (DNREC citation). He was not injured in the crash. Traffic was not affected.

Pro-active patrol leads to drug arrest

New Castle County Police have arrested Jay Verucci, a 25 year-old male who resides in the 100 block of Woodland Road in the community of Timber Farms in Newark. He

has been issued traffic citations and charged with a drug offense after a traffic stop was conducted and he was found to be in possession of marijuana.

On Wednesday evening, September 7, an officer was on routine patrol in the community of the Sparrow Run Townhouses when he observed a Nissan Pathfinder with an equipment violation. At 7:15 p.m., a vehicle stop was performed on Brookmont Drive in the area of Kemper Drive.

When the officer approached the car, the driver, who was later identified as Jay Verucci, was contacted and could not provide a registration or insurance for the vehicle. A computer inquiry revealed that his license was suspended and he also had an outstanding capias issued by Newark Alderman's Court. Verucci was then found to be in possession of marijuana (118 grams) that was located inside a plastic baggie, which was discovered on the front passenger seat of the vehicle.

Jay Verucci was issued several traffic citations and a criminal summons for being in possession of marijuana, and then released.

Talking to kids about cancer can alleviate fear

Chances are you know someone who has had cancer, but when your own family is affected, the word cancer takes on a new meaning — one that can feel personal and frightening. Cancer can be especially confusing to children who may be coping with a family member's diagnosis or their own.

What is Cancer?

The more you know about cancer, the less anxious and

better prepared you'll be to talk about it with your child. Our bodies are composed of many types of cells, which grow and divide to produce more cells as needed to keep the body healthy. Cancer occurs when abnormal cells begin to divide without control and invade other tissues in the body. Different kinds of cancer have different signs, symptoms, treatments and outcomes depending on the type of cell involved and the degree of uncontrolled cell growth.

Coping with Childhood Cancer

Cancer affects about 14 of every 100,000 children in the United States each year. The

most common childhood cancers are leukemia, lymphoma and brain tumors. A child diagnosed with cancer will have many feelings about the changes affecting his or her body, and should be encouraged to express any feelings, concerns or fears. Honest communication is a key component to helping a child adjust to a serious medical condition.

As you explain your child's illness and its treatment, give clear and honest answers to all questions in a way your child can understand. It is important to inform your child that he or she is sick and will be getting lots of care.

Parents can also prepare their child for any treatments

— and possible discomfort that might go along with those treatments — by reminding them that the hospital and medicine may feel frightening, but they are helping to fight the cancer.

When a Friend or Relative has Cancer

Children can also have many different reactions when someone they love has been diagnosed with cancer. When talking to your child about a friend or family member's diagnosis, the goal is to prevent or alleviate fear and misunderstanding with open, honest communication.

Provide your child with opportunities to express his or her feelings and re-assure them their feelings are never wrong. It's also normal for your child's feelings to change frequently over time,

so be available to discuss any questions or concerns your child may have. If you don't know the answer to his or her questions — don't panic. Tell your child you don't know the answers, but will ask someone for them.

Prepare your children for the possible side effects of cancer. It may upset your child to see side effects such as hair loss, nausea, fatigue or weight loss. Explain these are common side effects of treatments that are helping their friend or relative fight their cancer.

Many hospitals offer support groups and services for children dealing with their loved ones' cancer diagnoses. A social worker can facilitate discussions designed to help children talk about their feelings, while also giving your child an opportunity to meet other children with similar

family situations.

September is childhood cancer awareness month. Families can make a difference in the fight against pediatric cancer by participating in local fundraising and awareness events held by organizations such as the Andrew McDonough B+ Foundation, Alex's Lemonade Stand, the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's Light the Night Walk, Kids Runway for Research, Kelly Heindz-Grundner Brain Rumor Foundation, or the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life in their local communities.

Juvenile injured during robbery attempt

New Castle County Police are investigating an attempted robbery that occurred on Smalleys Dam Road near the intersection of Victoria Boulevard in Newark.

On Thursday night, September 8, at 10:47 p.m., officers responded to the Christiana Hospital for a reported cutting. When officers arrived, the 15 year-old Bear teen indicated that he was approached from behind by two unknown male subjects who attempted to rob him while he walking on Smalleys Dam Road.

The investigation revealed the teen was walking on Smalleys Dam Road near the intersection of Victoria Boulevard when he was accosted from behind by two unknown male subjects. Moments later, the suspects

grabbed the victim and began rifling through his pockets in an attempt to remove his property. During the altercation, the victim was stabbed in an upper extremity. The suspects then fled the area in an unknown direction, empty handed.

After returning to his home, the juvenile was transported to the Christiana Hospital by a family member and was treated for a small laceration he sustained during the incident, and was released. The suspects were described as two black males in their teens, 6'00" to 6'02" tall, weighing 210 to 230 pounds, with an unknown clothing description.

Construction equipment taken from site

Employees with Trio Excavating reported that a skid loader, worth approximately \$45,000, was taken from the construction site at 136 Elkton Road.

The vehicle had been parked at the site since September 2, but was found to be missing on September 6. Employees told officers that the site has a locked and gated fence surrounding the area and that the key had been locked in the manager's office. A 15-20 foot wide gate lies next to the office, but no tracks were found leading away from the site. Representatives with Trio stated that the particular brand of the loader uses a universal key, and that anyone who has a key could have taken the vehicle, a common occurrence, according to the employees.

Police were unable to recover any footage of the theft from local businesses nearby.

More BRAC workers choosing Cecil than initially projected

The first wave of military relocation to Aberdeen Proving Ground ends Thursday with the official closure of New Jersey's Fort Monmouth, and numbers released last week show 18.2 percent of those relocated workers have moved to Cecil County.

"The data comes from actual ZIP codes in updated human resource files," said Steven Overbay, BRAC coordinator for Chesapeake Science and Security Corridor, which released the numbers.

They're based on 3,024 Command, Control, Communications, Computers, Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance (C4ISR) personnel hired between August 2008 and September 2011, which is only a portion of the 6,300 jobs that have been filled so far at APG.

"I think these are significant numbers and should help our economy," said Roy Clough,

deputy director of economic development. "These jobs that pay an average of \$84,000 a year, which should help increase the average wage of Cecil County."

The numbers were released as part of a presentation made last Thursday at a CSSC reception in Aberdeen to celebrate extension of 48 partners who have signed onto an expanded collaboration for post-BRAC efforts.

Cecil County is one of the 48 members.

"The numbers released last week reflect nearly the exact percentages, only slightly higher numbers, as reported one year ago from the same source," Overbay said.

The report shows 1,826 hires (60 percent) from C4ISR live in Harford County, while 541 hires (18.2 percent) chose to live in Cecil County and 194 (6.7 percent) are living in New Castle County, Del., for the top three choices so far.

"We have no way of knowing how many are renting or how many have bought homes

from this information, only where they have chosen to live," Overbay said.

BRAC officials are predicting another 7,500 to 10,000 indirect jobs from private contractors will be created in the next several years as the economy stabilizes.

In 2007, Sage Policy Group released a study predicting impacts of BRAC on the region, including where everyone would choose to live.

The report said Cecil County would get about 12.5 percent, Harford County would get about 46.5 percent and Baltimore County would get 25.5 percent.

The figures released last week show the Baltimore County predictions were off considerably, since only about a quarter of that prediction (5.4 percent) are living in Baltimore County ZIP codes.

And it appears that Baltimore County's loss is New Castle County's gain.

"I think the flip-flop of numbers favoring Cecil County and Delaware instead of Baltimore County could be that some of those moving from Fort Monmouth still have homes or family in New Jersey," Overbay said.

"I think it's great we got so many BRAC employees moving to Cecil County," said County Commissioner Robert Hodge.

The study shows Elkton's ZIP code as the recipient of the majority of those 541 living in Cecil County, while North East is second and Port Deposit is third.

Glasgow soccer looks to repeat last year's success

The Glasgow soccer program is coming off one of its best seasons ever. Brian Grant, in his first season as head coach, led Glasgow to an impressive 11-4-1 record and into the first round of the state tournament, where the Dragons lost in overtime to Archmere.

As one would expect given the team's record, the season statistics were impressive: 50 goals scored, only 14 allowed, and nine shutouts.

But what typically happens when a team has an outstanding season is that several players take those memories with them onto the stage at graduation and into their next phase in life. Eight players in total, four of them starters, did just that this past June at the school's graduation ceremony.

Fortunately for the Dragons, one of the key returning starters from last season is goalkeeper Eric Sevilla.

The experienced senior will anchor a strong defense, which also includes returning starters Will Carver (sr.) and Bright Simpson (jr.). Grant was quick to point out that it will be his team's defense that will be the key to another run at the state tournament.

"The team's greatest strength will again be our defensive ability," Grant said. "We play a team-defense style, which in turn leads to

our success offensively. We are going to try to build off the nine shutouts we had last season."

On offense the Dragons must replace leading scorer Paul Amponsah, whose 25 goals broke the school's single-season scoring record previously held by Tolu Oluwafe. This season the team will rely on returning starters Nate Dehel (12 goals) and Jeremy Euston (13 assists) to pick up some of the scoring slack left by Amponsah's departure.

"We are looking for Nate and Jeremy to provide senior leadership for our team offensively," said Grant, who teaches physical education at Glasgow. "They are our two leading scorers back from last year."

Getting back to the playoffs won't be easy. Glasgow's 15-game schedule includes six against teams that qualified for the state tournament in 2010. But an optimistic Grant hopes the difficult regular-season schedule will prepare his inexperienced team for not only a run at the state tournament, but success once it gets there.

"Our goal is to win Blue Hen Conference Flight A," Grant said. "We look forward to competing against top level teams in the state to help get us ready, and if we are lucky enough, to make a run in the state tournament. If we stay committed to our defensive style and remain united as a team, the rest will take care of itself."

Christiana looks to rebuild in Flight B

Christiana is also coming off a successful 2010 campaign on the pitch. The Vikings finished 9-5-1, narrowly missing a chance to compete in the state tournament.

Like the Dragons, they'll look to replace key players from that team, most notably goalkeeper Zac Lee, who

coach Tom Hammond called "outstanding." The Vikings also lost leading scorer Tre Robinson and top defender Maliek Shammack.

Despite the loss to graduation of those three key players, Hammond is optimistic about this year's squad, especially given the athletic program's change from Flight A to B in the Blue Hen Conference.

"We have to rebuild but

dropping to Flight B should help us," Hammond said of the change that is due to the school's drop in enrollment. "We have some nice freshmen players coming in, but it may take time for us to gel as a unit."

The Vikings will rebuild with three key returning players — Bartu Diktas, Orville Hemmings and Ernesto Zamora — but Hammond says the best quality of this team has nothing to do with statistics.

"This team's greatest strength is its attitude," Hammond reiterated, "We have a quality bunch of play-

ers who are willing to work hard."

108 West Main Street.

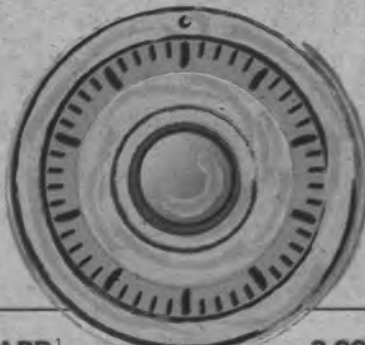

Miller Brothers opened in this location after the Newark Department Store moved from it to the Newark Shopping Center in 1955. Their advertisement in the Greater Newark Chamber of Commerce Indexed Map of Newark, Delaware and Surrounding Area read, "Miller Brothers... The finest and largest furniture store in the Newark area!" in the heart of downtown Newark. Choose from the finest collection of brand name furniture in America. We also offer free decorator service." Product lines included furniture, bedding, carpeting, and slip-covers. Miller Brothers eventually moved to new and



larger space at University Plaza on route 273 near Christiana. The 56-58 East Main Street property was redeveloped as a Mini-Mall with an upstairs restaurant.
