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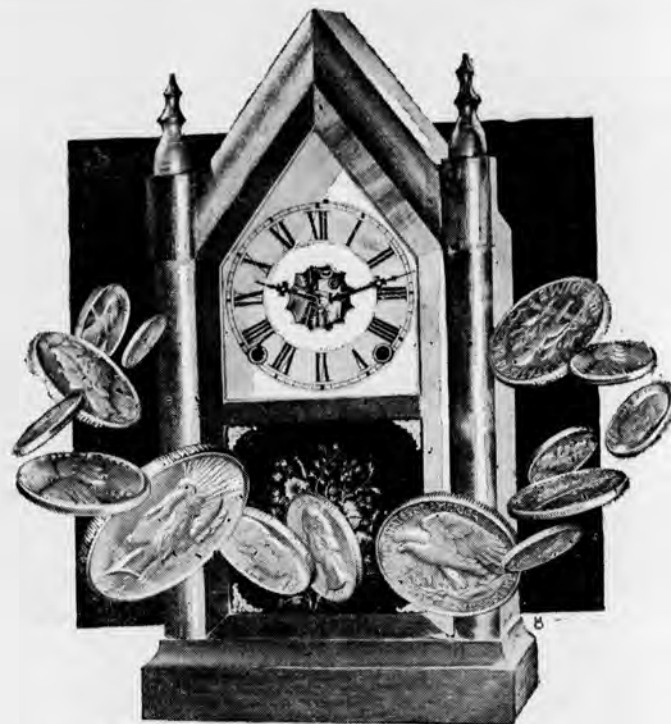

INVESTMENT IN SUCCESS

In a recent speech, some advice to retailers was given by Charles M. Edwards, Jr., dean of the school of retailing at New York University.

In conclusion he said, "Through a favorable location you carry your store to the people. Through well-planned, well-prepared advertising you must bring the people to your store. Literally, through advertising you must reach out to buy customers before you can expect customers to buy your merchandise."

Long ago progressive retailers—like other businessmen—stopped thinking of advertising as a necessary evil or an expense that cuts into profits. They know that advertising is a basic investment in success.

From the consumer's point of view, advertising is not an expense which increases the price he must pay. To the contrary, it holds down prices, even as it results in more and better products, by increasing the value of business done on both the producing and retailing levels by stimulating competition.

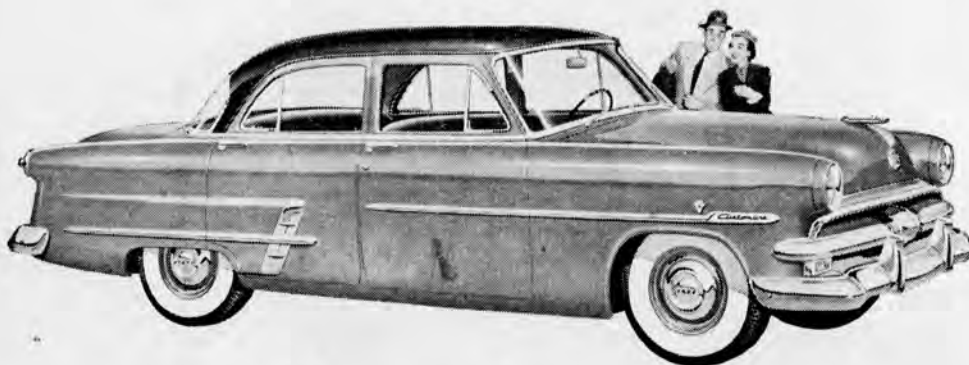

Impressed but unawed by Lehigh's opening 14-7 loss to the big league Columbia Lions, Delaware's varsity gridgers rolled over the Engineers for four touchdowns and a 24-13 victory at Delaware Stadium on Saturday—two more goal line crossings than Lou Little's Lions could negotiate.

After a scoreless opening period, Delaware rang up the first touchdown in the second quarter when Lanky Frankie Serpico shifted from his flanking post in the line to the Engineers' backfield and blocked a Lehigh defensive punt.

Delaware recovered the ball on the Engineers' 16-yd. stripe, took two softening-up punches at the Lehigh forward wall, and then Rocky Carzo, the Hens senior, 167-lb. fullback, drove through left tackle from the nine to score without molestation. Serpico's placement was good for the extra point.

Stung, the Engineers struck back with a 53-yard touchdown drive as Joe Kryla plunged into the line and Carzo dashed to the Lehigh ten. The Hens hammered away at the Engineers' defenses, moved to within a yard of the goal line and a sophomore halfback Jimmy Zaiser broke through center to score and give Delaware a 13-7 half-time advantage.

In the third quarter Frankie Grevan, 191-lb. junior center, blasted through the Lehigh line to block a kick on the visitors' 30-yard marker, and Carzo got the call. The Hens came through for the desired 20 yards and his second touchdown of the afternoon.

Leading 19-7 at the final period, Nelson noticed his comfortable advantage shrink to a lone touchdown as Lehigh's Capt. Tom Gunn took a 38-yard touchdown pass from Tom Glodde.

But with a little more than three minutes remaining, Zaiser zigzagged his way through the Lehigh center and fled ahead of the pack for 73 yards, his second, and the Hens' fourth touchdown of the afternoon.

Lank Frank took another kick at the ball and the Engineers' hopes for his second conversion.

Delaware's iron-man, Captain John Borresen, played another 39

Miller Leads Delaware Offense With 197-Yds.; Zaiser, Carzo, Next

Scores are not always indicative of a team's superiority although the long end of a final count is gratifying to the victors.

Delaware has not only knocked off their first two opponents handily, but the Hens have also registered the more power and authority in the Albert Chance statistical department.

Serpico, who has been outstanding in the two games played to date, also leads the pass receivers with 10 catches in 14 attempts for a gain of 136 yards.
