X-Ray Units Come to Newark for 5-Day Stand, Wednesday

Three Mobile Units of Statewide Chest X-Ray Survey To Begin Newark Operations Next Week; Mayor Urges 100% Local Participation in Public Health Service

Three mobile X-ray units will move into Newark for a 5-day stand beginning Wednesday, October 14, and Mayor Wallace M. Johnson urges 100% participation by residents of the area in the Statewide Chest X-Ray Survey which is free and in the interest of public health service.

Beginning at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, one mobile X-ray unit will be located near the corner of Main and Academy Streets in Newark while from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., the second unit will be located near the Continental Auto Company plant to the east.

The third unit will be located at the High School from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. X-ray staff—children 6 to 12 years old—will be seen by Dr. Gordon C. Godfrey, associate director of university extension.

Students will receive lecture notes, a reading list of materials available in the Wilmington Free Library, and an examination which they can take at home and send to the university for correction if they choose. There will be a different packet of materials for each lecture series.

The series will consist of seven half-hour lectures, given on successive Monday nights by four university professors.

The first lecturer was Dr. John A. Munroe, chairman of the history department, whose topic was "The History of Delaware."

Other lecturers will include Dr. Paul Dolan, chairman of the department of political science, "Your Delaware Government"; Prof. Earl P. Hartman, chairman of the geography and geology department.

In its tribute to the working press, the club was addressed by Robert Woodruff, local newspaperman and special guest of the occasion.

More than 3,000 Kiwanis clubs throughout the United States, Canada, Alaska, and Hawaii, will conduct similar programs designed primarily to draw public attention to the importance of maintaining freedom of the press.

Kiwanis clubs have participated in the observance of National Newspaper Week almost from its inception 14 years ago, local club president Wm. D. Skold said.

Newspaper Association Managers, Inc., sponsors of the week, announced recently that the slogan for 1953 is "An Informed Press for An Inform'd People," and the 1953 theme is "Freedom of Information."

Kiwanis members of the newspapers of the continued cooperation and support of more than 218,000 Kiwanians who are vitally interested in this important phase of preserving our freedoms.

World War II Vet Assumes U.D. Post In Military Dept.

Capt. F. J. McCarthy Named Ass't Professor Of Military Science

Capt. Francis J. McCarthy, of Worcester, Mass., has been appointed Assistant Professor of Military Science and Tactics at the University of Delaware, Col. E. W. Hidderick, professor of Military Science and Tactics at the university, has announced.

A graduate of the Antiaircraft Artillery Officers Candidate School in 1943, Captain McCarthy was transferred to the Infantry and served in Hawaii, the European theatre during World War II, as well as in the Caribbean area.

During 1951 to 1953 he served in Korea with the 19th Infantry Regiment of the 24th Infantry Division. He returned to the United States in September 1953.

He wears the Bronze Star Medal, American Theatre Ribbon, American Defense Service Medal, European African Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, United Nations Service Medal, Korean Service Medal and the Combat Infantry Badge.

Captain McCarthy lives at 209 West Park Place, Newark. He is married and his wife, Bess, and son, William, will join him at his new home next month.



INVESTMENT IN SUCCESS

In a recent speech, some advice to retailers was given by Charles M. Edwards, Jr., dean of the school of retailing at New York University.

In conclusion he said, "Through a favorable location you carry your store to the people. Through well-planned, well-prepared advertising you must bring the people to your store. Literally, through advertising you must reach out to buy customers before you can expect customers to buy your merchandise."
