Fraunhofer gets \$9.85 million grant

Fraunhofer USA Center for Molecular Biotechnology and Gov. Jack Markell announced the award of \$9.85 million from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for clinical development of a transmission blocking vaccine to combat malaria.

The foundation, with tens of billions of dollars in assets, focuses on child and education issues. It was launched by Microsoft co-founder William Gates and his wife, Melinda.

No Delaware employment impact figures from the grant were immediately available.

"This is one of three projects supported by the foundation, and coupled with the Center's cGMP pilot production capability will be key for the validation of CMB's production platform," said Dr. Vidadi Yusibov, CMB's executive director. "We are looking forward to beginning clinical product development following up on the exciting pre-clinical results we have achieved to date."

Dr. Philip Russell, on the Board of Trustees of the Sabin Vaccine Institute, commented, "The technology has the potential to provide the capacity and cost effectiveness required to deal with the health and economic problems caused by malaria in developing countries."

According to The World Health Organization, 41 percent of the world's population lives in areas where malaria is transmitted, and each year more than one million people die from the disease, most of them young children in sub-Saharan Africa.

Gov. Jack Markell thanked both Fraunhofer and the Gates Foundation for their efforts to improve global health.

"We're very excited that Fraunhofer's contributions to Delaware's legacy of innovation may save lives across the world. Their ideas and their efforts are creating the kind of quality jobs we need to move Delaware's economy forward," Markell said. "The Gates Foundation awards tend to honor existing excellence and potential.

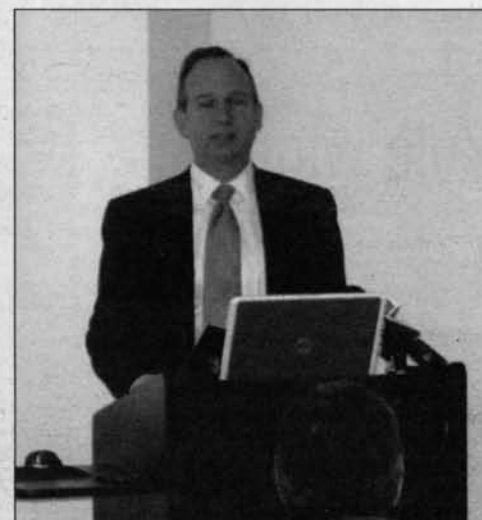

John Novak of Newark, was recently inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy (USMMA) in Kings Point, Long Island, NY.

Novak, who graduated from the USMMA in 1974, earned four letters for pistol and was the team's captain during his senior year. He earned many honors while also setting national records.

In 1974, Novak led the Pistol Team to its first undefeated season in Academy history. He was named First-Team NRA All-American in Intercollegiate Pistol while setting the NRA

National Pistol Record that year for standard pistol (.22 caliber at 25 meters), scoring 532 points out of a possible 600. He also led the team to a ROTC Pistol Number One ranking.

Bank teller helps police nab fraud suspect

An alert bank teller helped Delaware State Police arrest a woman accused of a number of fraudulent bank transactions in Newark and other areas.

The suspect was identified by Delaware State Police as Courtney Henry, 27, of Bingham Street in Philadelphia.

Police reported Henry went to the Wachovia Bank on Naamans Road in the Claymont area and attempted to withdraw \$7,900.00 out of a Wachovia bank account. She allegedly forged a withdrawal slip in the actual account holder's name.

The bank clerk believed Henry was not the account holder and called in the Delaware State Police to investigate.

Troopers arrived and took Henry into custody. Investigators later determined she had gone to other Wachovia locations and successfully withdrawn money on previous days and attempted another theft on the day of her arrest. Other transactions included:

- December 14th, 2009-Route 202 in the Fairfax

Shopping Center, Wilmington, attempted theft of \$7,900)

- December 12th, 2024 Naamans Road, Wilmington (\$7,900)

- December 11th, 7270 Lancaster Pike, Hockessin, (\$4,900)

- December 10th, 310 Dove Run Boulevard, Middletown (\$4,900)

- December 8th, 622 South College Avenue, Newark, (\$4,900)

Henry was formally charged with the following offenses: Identity Theft (felony), Theft (felony), two counts of Attempted Theft (felony) and Forgery (misdemeanor). She was committed to the Baylor Woman's Correctional Institute in lieu of a \$1,600.00 secured bond.

Arrests in Cherry Hill Manor robberies

The Newark Police Department announced the arrest of two people for their participation in an armed robbery that occurred in the Cherry Hill Manor neighborhood on November 17. The investigation has revealed that the female "victim" of the robbery actually was a participant, serving as a conspirator with the robber.

The female, now known to be Desiree Pulliam, 19, walked with the victim and notified her co-conspirator, William Malachi, 23, that she and the victim were on the service road. Upon being told of their

location, Malachi committed the robbery, knowing that the victim was carrying cash.

Pulliam and Malachi both live in the Cherry Hill Manor neighborhood. They were

both arrested at their homes on the morning of December 18. Pulliam was charged with Robbery 1st Degree, Conspiracy 2nd Degree, and Criminal Solicitation. She was released after posting \$6,500 bail. Malachi was charged with Robbery 1st Degree,

Possession of a Firearm during the Commission of a Felony, Aggravated Menacing, and Conspiracy 2nd Degree. He was being held on \$22,250 bail.

An Airsoft (BB) gun, believed to be the weapon used during the robbery, was recovered during a search of Malachi's house.

A 2003 School Bus (operated by Charlene Reed, 57, of Wilmington) was stopped on the aforementioned off ramp behind a stopped 2006 Nissan Altima (operated by Luis Vazquez, 43, of Delaware City). The school bus driver accelerated and rear-ended the Nissan.

Two students on the bus, a 14 and 15-year-old female, sustained minor facial injuries. Two passengers in the Nissan, a 4-year-old boy and his 39-year-old mother, were evaluated for possible injuries.

The school bus had 29 total students coming from the Delaware Military Academy.

Reed was cited for Careless Driving. The school bus was towed from the scene.

Car break-in suspect nabbed

New Castle County Police have arrested Michael McDowell, 42, whose last known address is in the 100 block of Brookside Drive near Newark. He has been charged with theft related offenses when officers apprehended him after he

broke into several cars in the Scottfield community. Officers have recovered and returned a number of stolen items to victims, however, a handful of

other stolen items have not yet been linked to victims.

On Dec. 16 at 10:45 p.m., County Police responded to the area of the 800 block of Broadfield Road for a report of theft in progress. When the officers arrived, they contacted a witness who advised a male subject was walking along Broadfield Drive breaking into cars and stealing items. Officer Thomas Purse located the subject walking in the area and was able to take him into custody without incident.

Purse found McDowell was in possession of a GPS, a men's watch, cash, and a radar detector that had all been stolen out of cars in the community. Officers were able to locate one victim where property was stolen and returned and two other attempted thefts. Additional items have been recovered but not linked through crime reports as the victims have not yet reported or possibly noticed the crimes.

McDowell, who is reportedly homeless, has been charged with two counts of attempted theft and one count of misdemeanor theft. He is currently awaiting an arraignment.

Fossil and mineral collection goes to McVey School

Over the summer, McVey Elementary School received a Fossil and Mineral Collection with an accompanying set of books from Juan and Judy Villamarin. Their gift was made to give McVey students the opportunity to see, enjoy, and be inspired by an impressive collection of specimens, many of which the students can directly relate to what they are learning in earth science and human studies.

The Villamarins have lived close to McVey Elementary for

over 30 years. Their daughter, Joann Villamarin, attended McVey beginning in 1971 as a first grade student, and completed fifth grade there in 1976. Juan Villamarin, a Professor of Anthropology at the University of Delaware from 1970-2004, was a passionate teacher and collector. When he passed away, his wife Judy decided to share some of his treasures with the students of McVey Elementary School, so they could enjoy and learn from them as he did.

When the offer was made to

the school, Principal Heather Bordas and the PTA purchased a lighted and locked display case so the collection could be viewed easily, safely, and securely. The case is now positioned in the hallway opposite the school office, so children walking down the hall can enjoy the treasures inside each time they pass by.

"It's fantastic and exciting to see the students mesmerized by the amethyst, fluorite, dinosaur teeth, stalactites, shells, and other objects in the case," said

Danne-Michelle Murphy, who served as McVey's Creative Mentoring Coordinator last year. "Juan would be very proud and happy to know that part of this collection is inspiring the imagination of the students at

McVey--perhaps a whole new generation of anthropologists, archeologists, and geologists!"

Bordas has also reported that the case has a huge captive audience all day long, and that teachers and students love

the display and can't wait to use it in their academic work. Everyone at McVey is proud of this honor and thanks Mrs. Villamarin for this extraordinary gift, a release noted.

High-speed network coming to the region

A high-speed Internet network is coming to the Newark area.

The Newark City Council approved drawing up a lease for Clear to put transmission equipment on two water towers in the city. The towers are expected to help bring 4G wireless service to the city and region via a Wi-Max.

Clear (www.clear.com) is the a venture between cell phone carrier Sprint and Comcast that will offer high-speed wireless service. It now offers the 4G service in the Philadelphia area, with a Comcast spokesman forecasting that the system will be up and running in northern Delaware in 2010. Clear, Comcast and Sprint are all offer the service as low as \$25 a month in the Philadelphia area for home Internet service.

Demand for the service has grown rapidly, due to the use of "smartphones" like the Droid and iPhone that surf the Internet. The technology



may also appeal to some home customers who do not want a cable connection.

Business and some consumer customers also want high-speed Internet service that can be used on sales and service calls.

Such service is available through current Verizon, AT&T, Sprint and other systems, but at speeds that are below those for wired Internet systems.

Comcast became an investor in Clear as a way to participate in growth in "go anywhere" Internet that could pose a threat to its cable system, since 4G's higher transmission speeds could carry TV as well as Internet "pipes" into a home.

Comcast recently rolled out technology that allows its customers to access thousands of television shows and movies via the Internet.

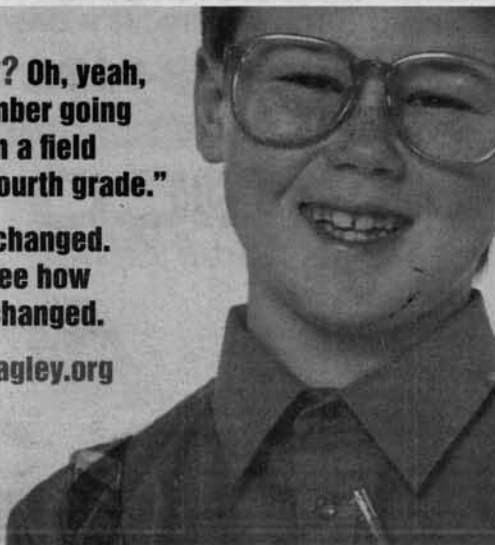

Action against distracted driving could be coming

It seems everywhere I go in Newark and New Castle County, people are talking about cell phone use and texting while driving. I have been participating in Safe Family Holiday events sponsored by the Delaware Office

of Highway Safety, UD New Castle County Cooperative Extension, and local community businesses to remind drivers to Pay Attention, Slow Down, Buckle Up, and to Designate A Driver when alcohol is involved in any celebrations. DuPont Vespel and Christiana Hospital Trauma Program in Newark, Comcast in New Castle, and AI DuPont Hospital for Children Trauma Program in Wilmington, all hosted free

non-alcoholic holiday drinks and snacks to employees while distributing this safety information. At these events, I am usually accompanied by a police officer who is there to demonstrate the effects of inattention and impairment to guests. Guess what everyone wants to complain about? The first words from people I talk to are how very dangerous cell phones and texting are making their driving experience. People are angry and scared for their safety when people are not paying attention while they are driving. I say this is great news! We all need to do more complaining about bad drivers to change people's behaviors when it comes to respecting driving as a responsibility.

What can be done about the distraction of cell phones and texting while driving? We need to let drivers know that not paying attention and driving is unacceptable and our lives are worth a lot more than their carelessness. Beginning New Year's Day 2010, this line of thought will be backed up by law. Wilmington will begin enforcing a law to fine drivers \$50 if caught using cell phones that are not equipped with a hands-free device. This is a primary law, which means an officer will be able to enforce this ordinance individually, without any other reason or probable cause to stop a motorist in violation of this law. Wilmington is not the first municipality to pass a cell phone law. November 1 of 2009, the town of Elsmere banned the use of hand-held cell phones and texting while driving. The Delaware Senate is also considering a statewide texting ban, which if passed, would make it less confusing for motorists who travel through towns across Delaware. Elsmere's law, as well as Wilmington's law, also applies to bicyclists. Ultimately, these laws will provide additional protection for all motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians, as it forces drivers to focus on the task of driving, which should be their first priority behind the wheel of a vehicle.

However, these laws do not solve the whole problem. A study by AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety confirms that

one man Wednesday.

Detective Ray Lynn of the Maryland State Police said 29-year-old Justin Sudina of North East has confessed to robbing The North East Store on Nov. 24, GNC in Elkton's Big Elk Mall on Dec. 10, and a BP Gas Station convenience store in North East on Monday night.

He also confessed the July robbery of a GNC in Newark, Lynn said.

Police said each robbery followed a similar pattern: a lone suspect entered the store, produced a knife and demanded money.

Lynn said investigators received a tip that led them to Sudina after the Cecil Whig ran a story featuring photos taken from video surveillance cameras.

"Someone recognized the description and the mask and called us (saying), 'Hey, I think I know who this guy is,'" Lynn said.

Lynn said the witness positively identified Sudina.

After Monday's robbery of the BP convenience store at knife-point, police went back to the same witness, who again identified Sudina, whose last known address is on Church Point Road.

"But he had been living in his car," Lynn said.

Police found Sudina Wednesday asleep in the front seat of his car, which was parked in a train station parking lot at Delaware Park in Stanton.

Sudina's car also helped

police to match him to the crimes, said Lynn who added he was driving a white Ford Crown Victoria — a former police car that still had the search light attached to the driver's side.

He was charged with armed robbery and theft in Delaware and is being held without bond while he awaits extradition to Maryland, Lynn said.

UD police arrest 2 for break-ins

University of Delaware Police arrested two men on Thursday, Dec. 17, in connection with a series of thefts from cars on the campus. Arrested were Robert Hynes-Tyre, 22, of Newark and Steven A. Emmons Jr., 23, of Bear.

Officers were at the Dickinson Residence Complex

In the resulting investigation, Newark Police charged

both with five counts of theft, four counts of criminal mischief and four counts of conspiracy for incidents occurring on Dec. 6 at Embassy Suites on South College Avenue, on Dec. 9 at Embassy Suites and Christina Mill Apartments on Elkton Road and on Dec. 11 at Sleep Inn on South College Avenue.

Unsecured bail was set at \$13,000 for Hynes-Tyre and at \$9,000 for Emmons.

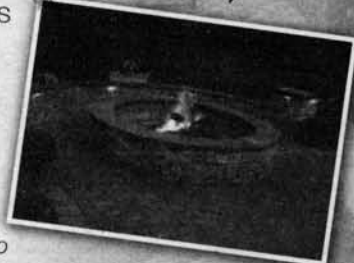

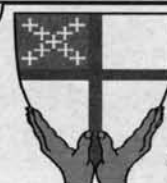

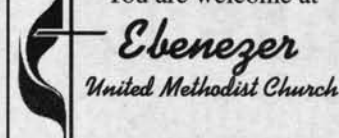

White Clay bill moves forward

Legislation to expand White Clay Creek's "Wild and Scenic River" designation has received unanimous committee approval and will move to the U.S. Senate floor for a vote early next year. Sen. Ted Kaufman (D-Del.) introduced the bill in April to increase protection for Delaware's first and only Wild and Scenic River, and it was co-sponsored by Sen. Tom Carper (D-Del.).

"White Clay Creek is a Delaware treasure, and we are pleased that its unique cultural, natural, scenic and recreational values are being rec-

ognized," said Sens. Kaufman and Carper. "The committee's vote this week is a significant step forward in further protecting the creek from over development. The White Clay Creek watershed is the home to many plants and animals and is a source of drinking water for the region. This legislation would help preserve the quality and health of the waterway as well as increase the watershed's value when applying for state, local, and federal grants."

The bill designates an additional nine miles of White Clay Creek in Delaware and

Pennsylvania as a wild and scenic waterway. The expansion includes two sites: Lamborn Run in Delaware, and the East Branch and Egypt Run in New Garden Township, Penn. This would bring White Clay Creek's total designated area to 199.9 miles.

The legislation was among a suite of 31 other bills reported by the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee that would create throughout the United States new wilderness areas, national parks, wild and scenic river designations and water transfers.

cell phone use — hand-held or hands free — impairs a driver's ability to operate a motor vehicle and increases a driver's chance of being in a crash by four times. A driver's reaction time is decreased and that increases their stopping distance. AAA also reports that for each 2 seconds a driver does not have his eyes on the road, the driver is twice as likely to be in a crash. Nationwide Insurance reported that 50% of the drivers they interviewed used cell phones while driving, and 45% said they had been in a collision or near-collision due to a driver using a cell phone. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports over a half million people are injured in crashes due to driver distraction. Driver distraction, which includes cell phone use, is a top cause of teen crashes in the U.S. Driver inattention continues to be the leading cause of all crashes in Delaware. The National Safety Council

has been reported to requesting the governors of all 50 states to enact laws banning motorists from using cell phones and messaging devices.

While I believe these new laws can make a difference, they do not fully protect us. I think the full answer lies in all of us taking responsibility for our actions behind the wheel. Hands-free or not, pull

over to use your cell phone for emergencies, conversations, and sending text messages. Resolve this New Year to do your part to follow the new law and pay attention to your job of driving and not to your cell phone — all of us will live without using our cell phones while driving. Happy New Year to All.

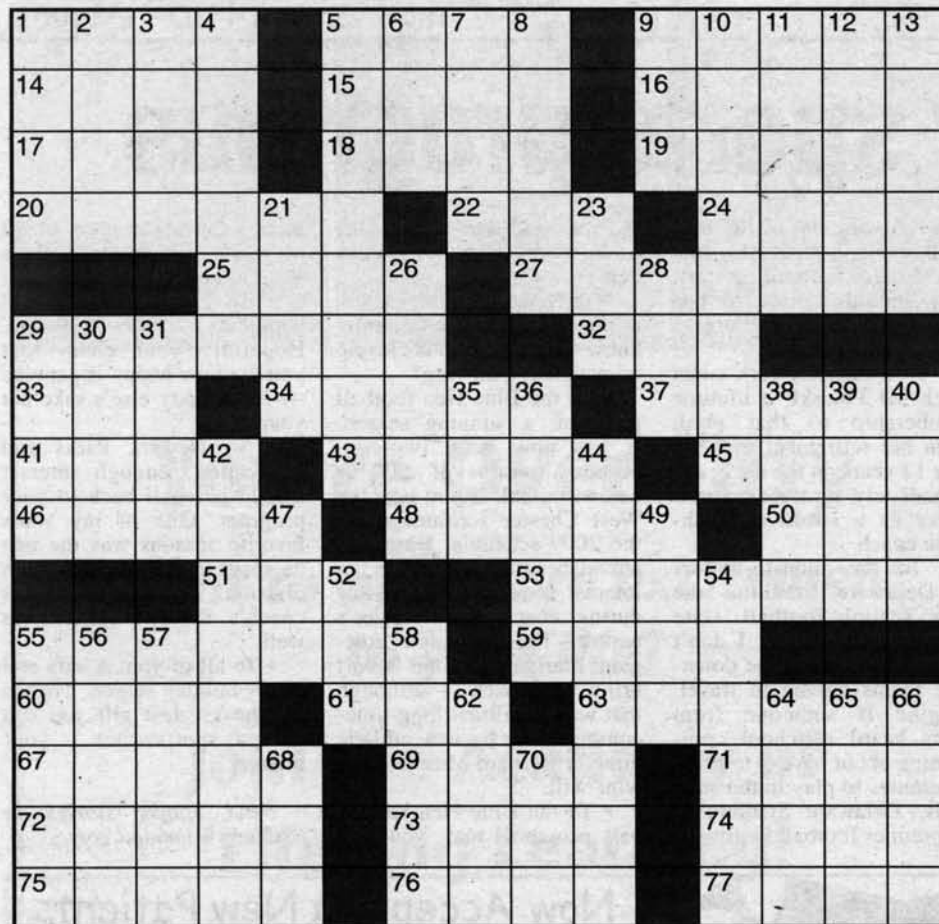

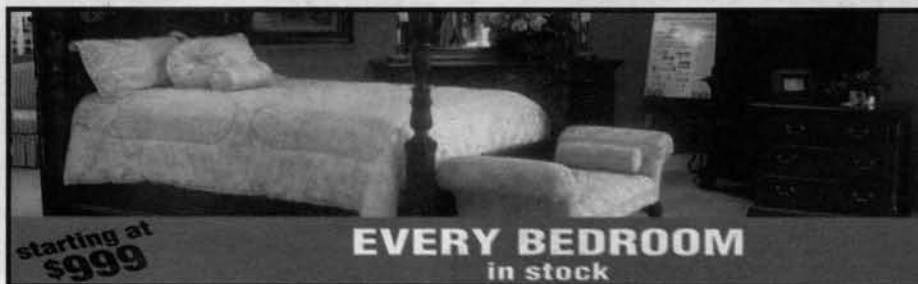
