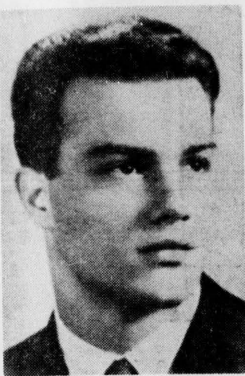

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New Aetna Fire Call System For Newark Introduced Today

Local Caretaker Telephone Service In Aetna Firehouse Discontinued With County Fire Control Board Tie-In; 24-Hour, Three-Shift Professional Service Instituted

Beginning today, the Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Company will receive all emergency fire calls through the New Castle County fire call board at the Levy Court Building on Kirkwood Highway, President Olan Thomas reports.

Caretaker telephone service in the Aetna firehouse has been discontinued in an effort to provide improved protection and service for residents of the Newark fire district, with trained professionals on three-shift, 24-hour duty at the county center.

The Newark fire siren will be activated from the Levy Court Building fire control board, and constant radio and telephone contact will be maintained between the Newark fire district and the county control center.

The present Newark fire call telephone listing on the Endicott exchange—8-2300—will be maintained, with emergency calls to be received at the county control board.

This Endicott number and the new Wymann number—4-0901—are to be used for emergency calls only, and are not to be used by the public nor by firemen, either, to obtain information concerning the location of a fire, or for other reasons.

The Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Company plans to install special routes for fire calls in the homes of various members, Thomas announced yesterday.

Research Results To Feature Aug. 2 Farm Field Day

Farmers who want the latest research results in the production of field and vegetable crops, fruit, dairy, livestock and poultry, should circle Aug. 2 on their calendars—the date of this year's annual Farm Field Day at the University of Delaware's farm at Georgetown.

Key feature of the day will be bus tours of vegetable, fruit and field crop experimental plots and inspection of the broiler research facilities.

The women's program will feature a demonstration of the latest methods of freezing fruits and vegetables.

A special highlight this year will be a pageant portraying progress in farming and homemaking from colonial days to the present.

The pageant is one of several events the university is planning in 1961-62 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Morrill Act which led to the establishment of America's unique system of land-grant colleges and state universities.

Other attractions will include a luncheon featuring fried "Delmarvalicious" chicken and educational exhibits on a variety of subjects of interest to farmers, homemakers and the general public.

Junior Gardeners Sponsored By NRA Grow Vegetables

The Newark Recreation Association has announced the initiation of a junior gardening program. A new spring and summer activity, 68 junior gardeners are participating in the program.

The junior gardening project was started in late May as a pilot project. Gardeners were selected with the aid of the schools from fifth and sixth grade students interested in science, and gardening in particular. Following two sessions of general gardening instructions and practice in laying out a garden plot, the first gardening session was held early in June.

Thirty-five garden plots were staked and each team of junior gardeners has a 10x20-ft. garden plot. They have planted snap and lima beans, summer squash, pepper and tomato plants, and sweet corn on each plot.

The gardens are located on Delaware Circle in George Read Village, and the area has been made available by Miss Etta Wilson, and planting materials were provided with the cooperation of University of Delaware Agriculture Extension personnel, and the agriculture program at Newark High School.

All produce from the gardens is for home consumption by the junior gardeners.

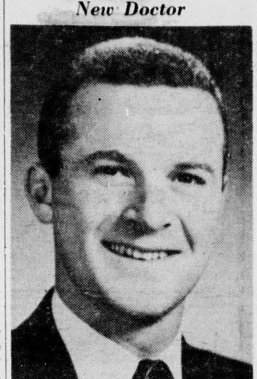


Alex D. Cobb, Jr.

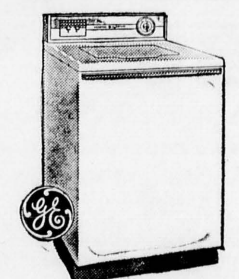

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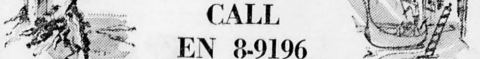

All the scoring was done in the first frame with the help of three bases on balls, and singles by Wingard and John Medlin.

Los Dave Claus recovered from the bombardment to fan 10 and pitch shutout ball the rest of the way.

Wingard also powered a 13-0 rout of the McDonald Cardinals with his ninth and 10th homers of the campaign. George Cavanaugh hurled the whitewash, spacing three safeties.

"The sportsmen catch three times as many fish as the commercial men," the dockman responded, shocking the captain into stunned silence. "He sounds like he's a commercial fisherman," one of the crew observed.

"He is," Francis Neide said, indicating a big board sign over the shed at the landward end of the dock.

Pianist Joseph Schwartz will be featured in a concert at the University of Delaware's Mitchell Hall on Monday at 8:15 p.m., with selections from Mozart, Chopin, Brahms, Debussy and Liszt in the university's summer concert series.

Upon return from a Brazilian tour during 1960, Schwartz was appointed assistant professor of piano at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music in Ohio.

Crushing Machines Provide Savings With Hay Harvest

Research indicates that hay-crushing machines can slash alfalfa hay-field curing time in half.

Dr. William H. Mitchell, agronomist with the University of Delaware, cites Illinois research in which conditioned hay cut at 9 a.m., averaged 75 per cent moisture. By 2 p.m. the following day, the moisture had dropped to 16 per cent.

Untreated hay from the same field cut at the same time, showed about 30 per cent moisture at the end of the same drying period.

Crushed hay in all tests was already for baling at least a day earlier than uncrushed hay.

Fast curing isn't the only advantage of crushing. It can save up to 10 per cent more hay by preventing loss of leaves and small stems caused by extra drying and handling after rains.

Crushing also saves vitamin A, since hay is exposed to sun and rain for a shorter time. In addition, rapid curing saves protein that otherwise could be lost in shattered leaves.

Feed Grain Plan Enrolls 35% Of State Corn Farmers

The final tally shows that 35 per cent of 1,801 of the 5,184 corn-producing farms in Delaware enrolled in the 1961 Federal feed-grain program.

Results of a six-week sign-up campaign by the Delaware Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee were announced by committee chairman Jacob Zimmerman, Dover farmer.

Sign-up percentages by county of all corn-growing farms enrolled includes New Castle—46.9; Kent—31.1; and Sussex 34.3.

On an acreage basis, Delaware farmers agreed to divert to conservation 38,514 acres, or 24.5 per cent of their total corn base acreage.

Chrysler Joins Gillette As Baseball TV Sponsor

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick has announced that Gillette will be joined by Chrysler Corporation in sponsoring baseball World Series and All-Star games on television and radio in 1961.

The two All-Star games will be at San Francisco, July 11, and at Boston, July 31.

Frick revealed that total payment for television-radio rights to the World Series and All-Star games will be \$3,750,000.

A total of 225 TV stations and 500 radio stations in the U. S. will carry the World Series and All-Star games, Frick said.

Lloyd Advises Culling Of Non-Profit Poultry

Any time is a good time to remove obvious poultry culls, advises Ray Lloyd, extension poultryman with the University of Delaware.

A bird of laying age eats about 25 cents worth of feed a month just for maintenance. If she's not laying, it costs you that much just to keep her around, Lloyd says.

Obvious culls are those that are sick, weak, molting, or otherwise out of production.

A good time to cull the laying flock is at night with a flashlight. Keep a catching hook handy in each house. Get rid of the birds as soon as possible.

If there is no market for them, destroy and dispose of them.

Elisabeth Young Sets Mark For Girls' High Jump

Girls' physical education activities at Central Junior High School include an exclusive club in which members prove they can jump four feet or more.

Best records are by Elisabeth Young, ninth grade, who jumped 4'7"; Carol Artz, eighth, and Linda Bailey, seventh grade 4'2".

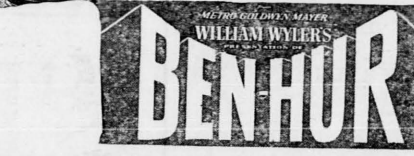

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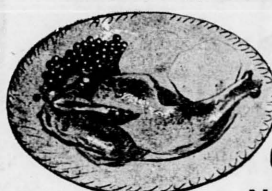
