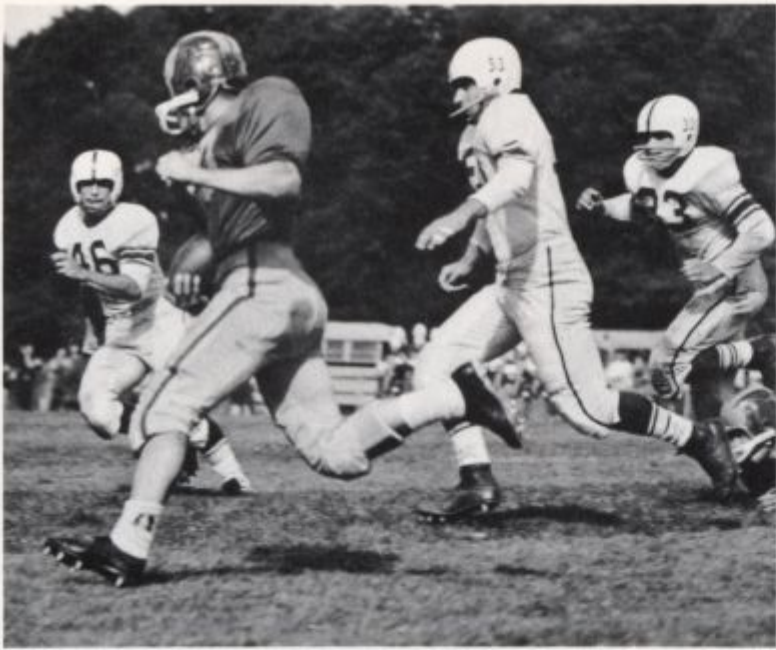

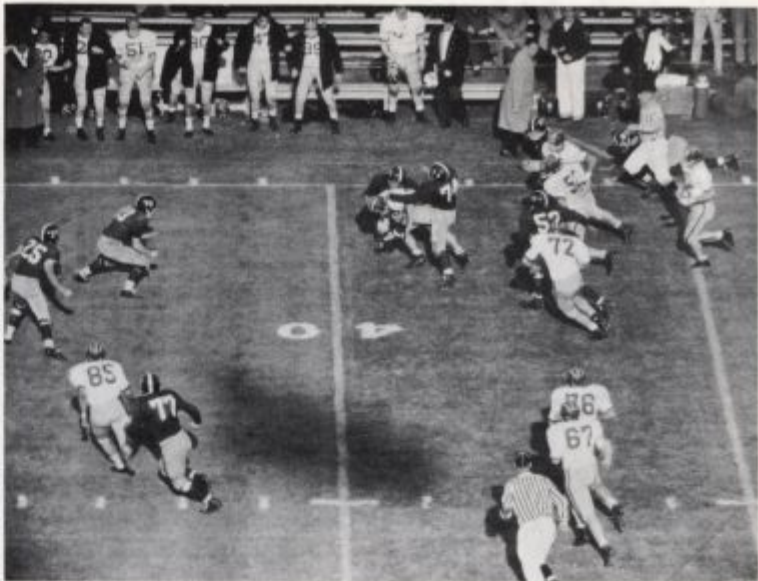

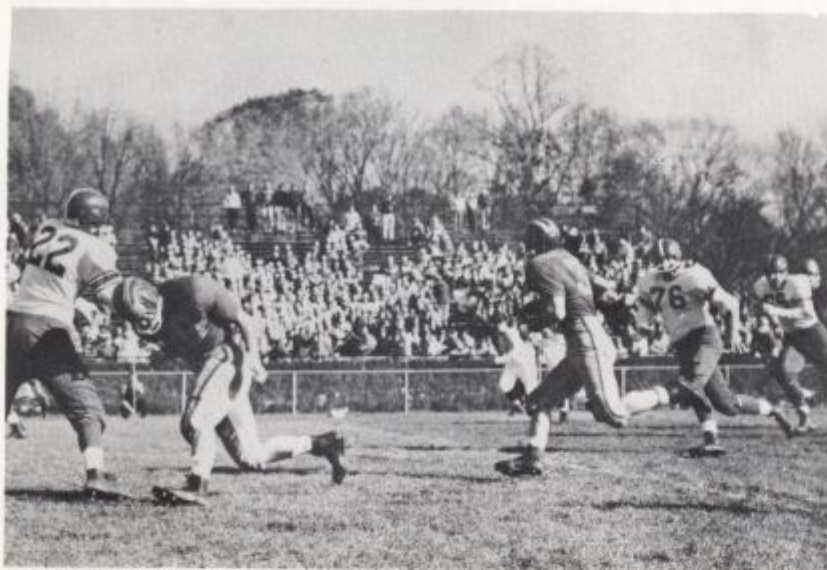

Tony Toto displays his elusive running ability against the Temple Owls. The Hens created a new scoring record as they stormed to a 71-7 triumph.

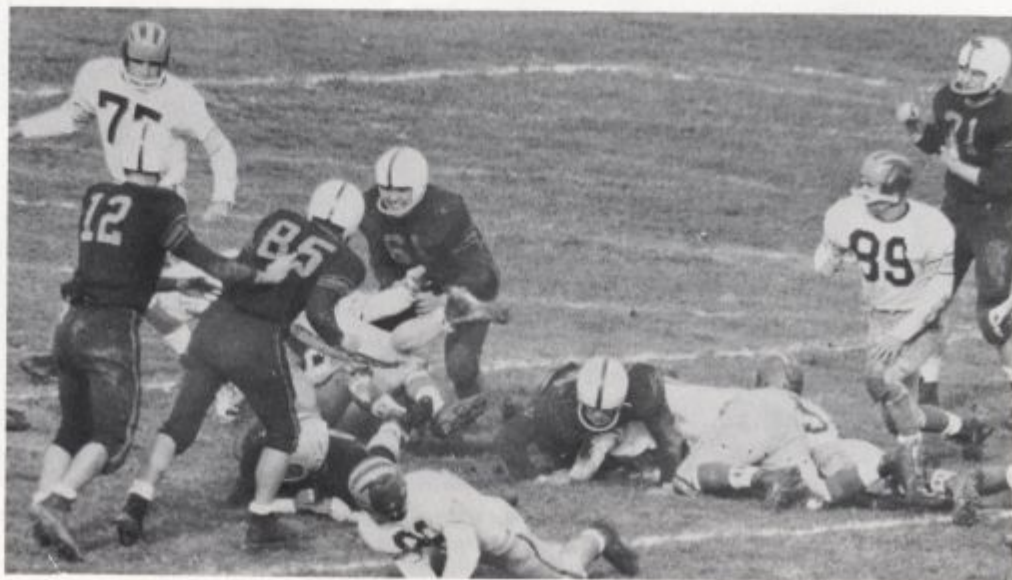

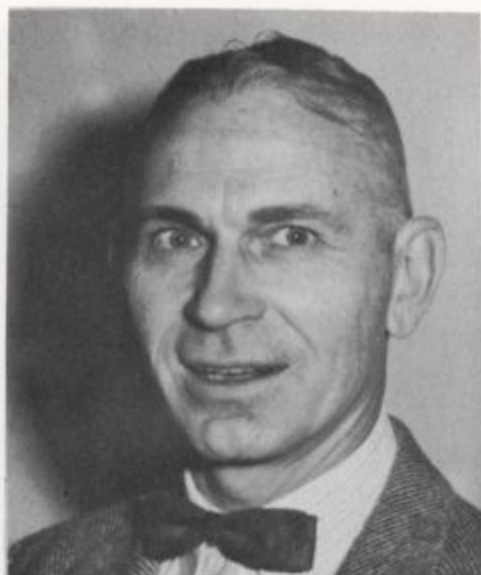


Star left halfback Vladimir Bohdan is about to intercept a pass intended for Western Maryland's Varga.

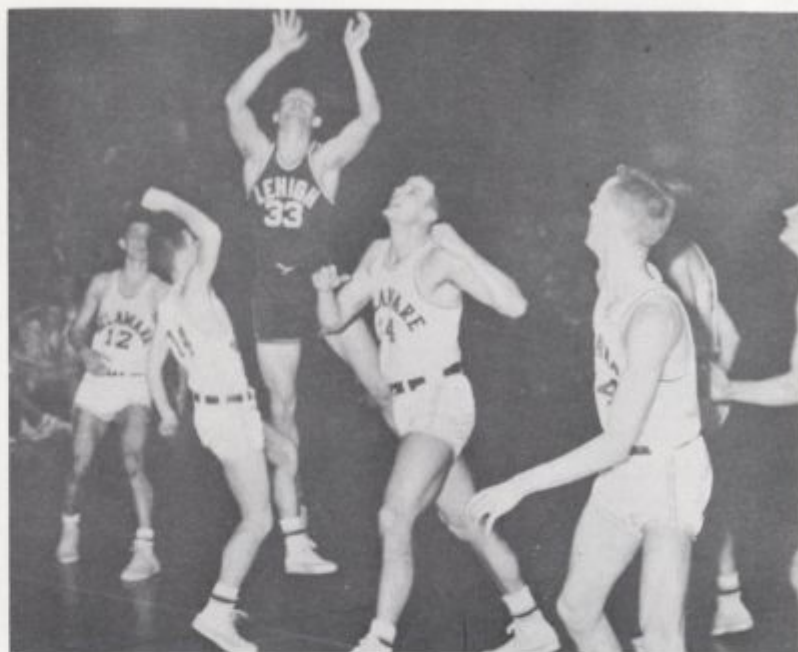

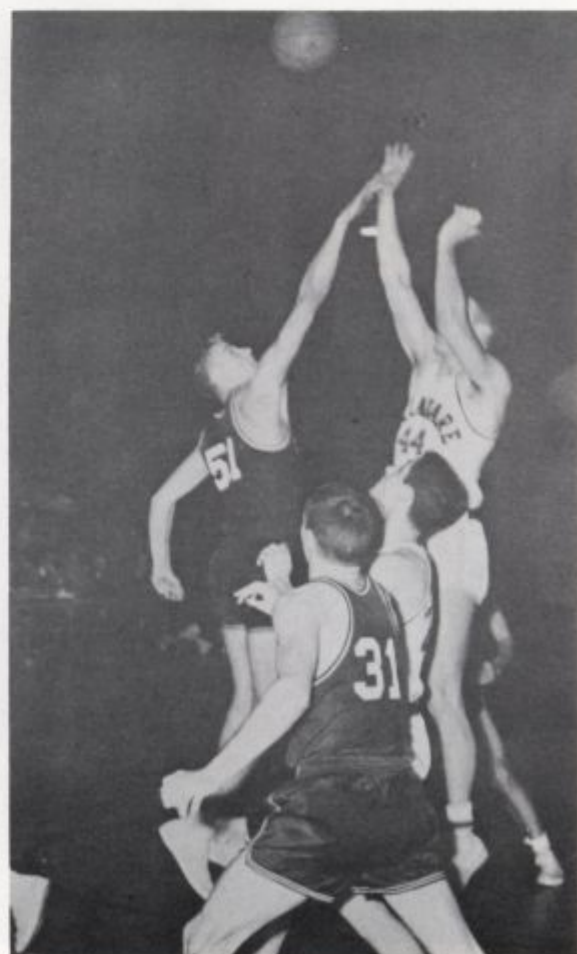

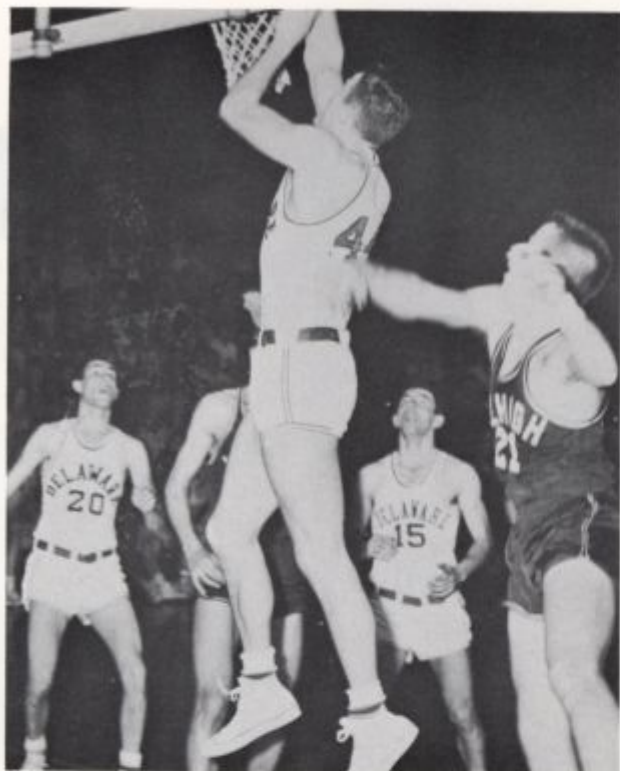
Lehigh adds two points to their score as Mosher, Wickes and Bob Schliro anxiously awaiting for rebound. Helping out is Don Hutton (14).



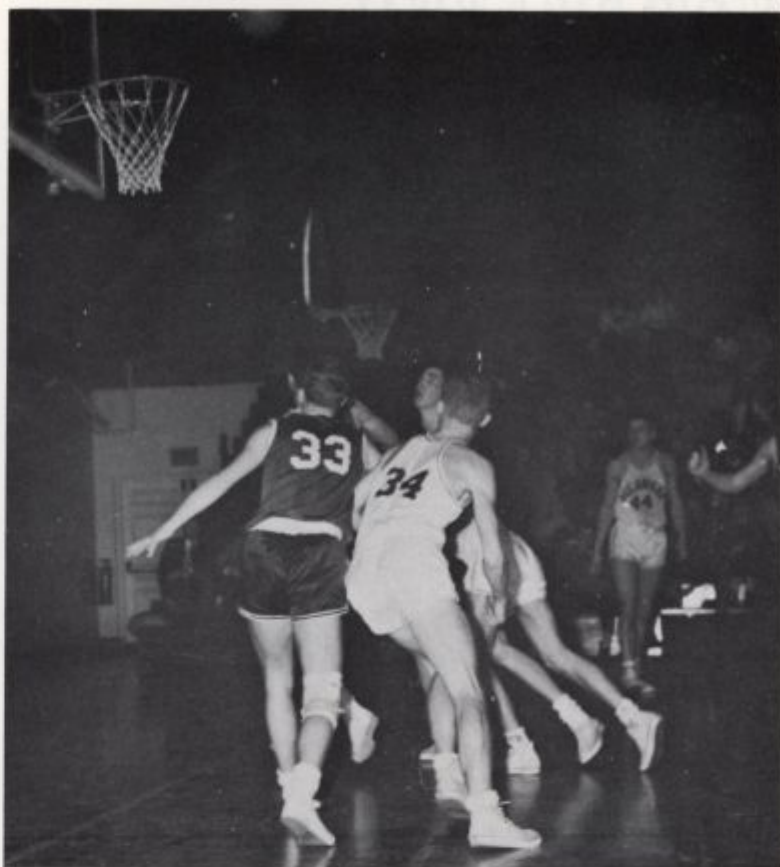

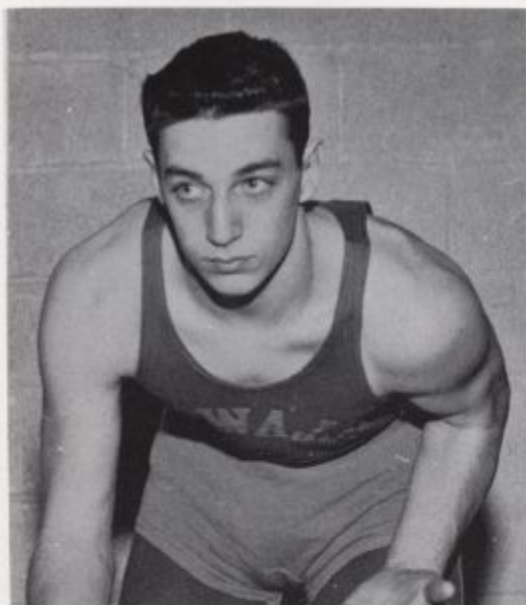

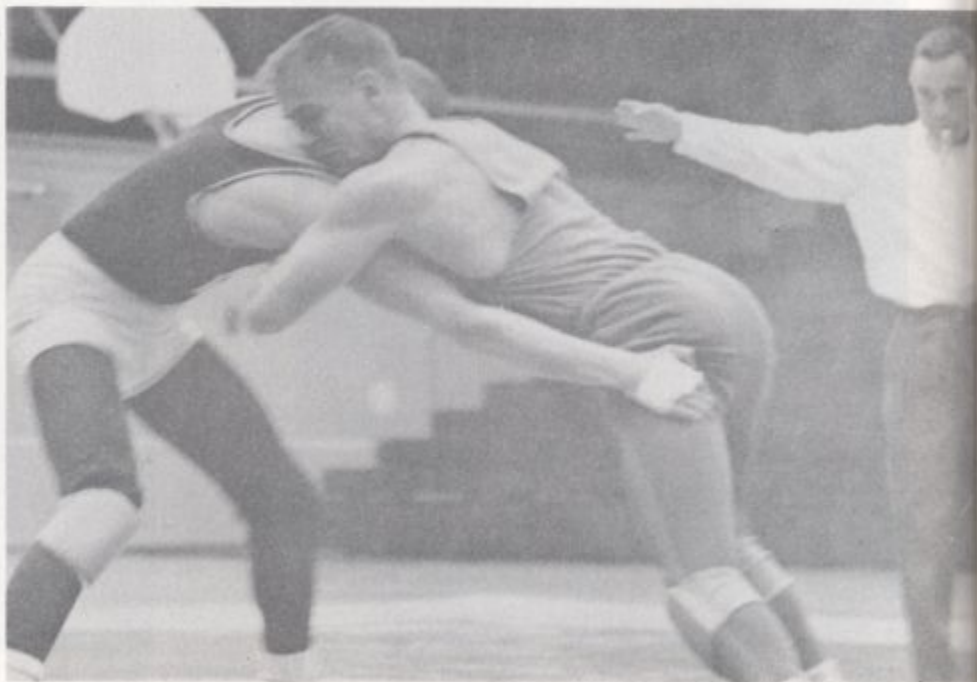

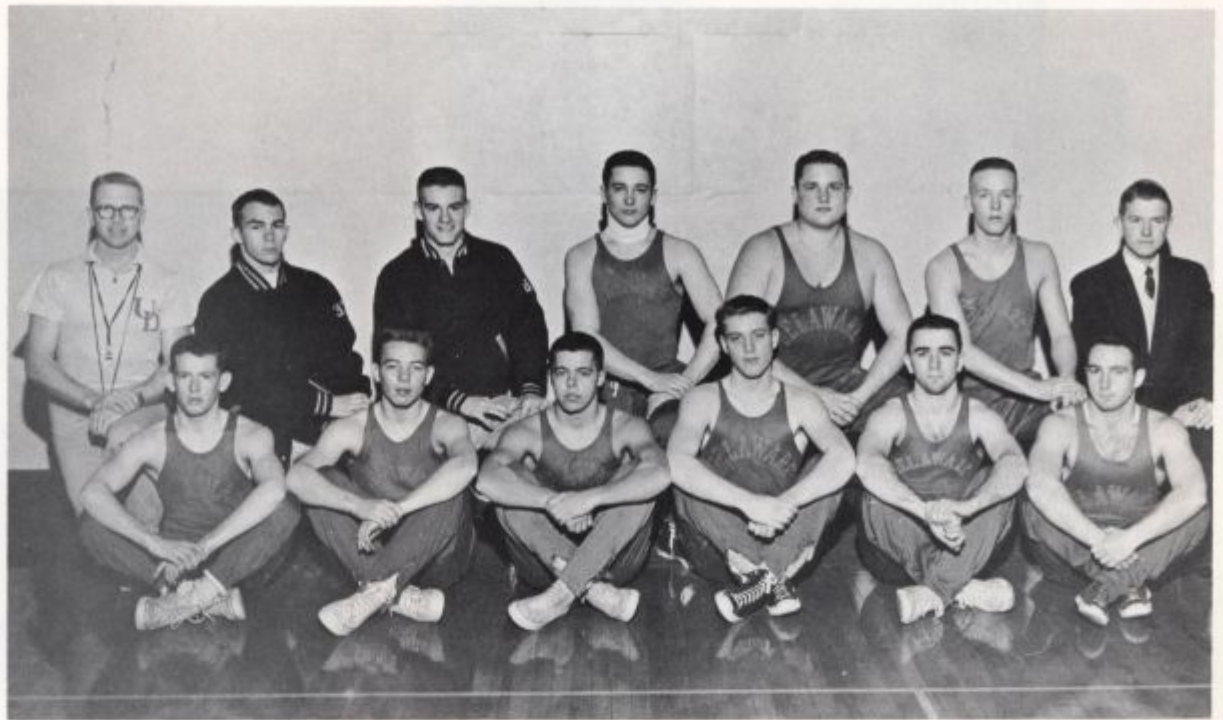

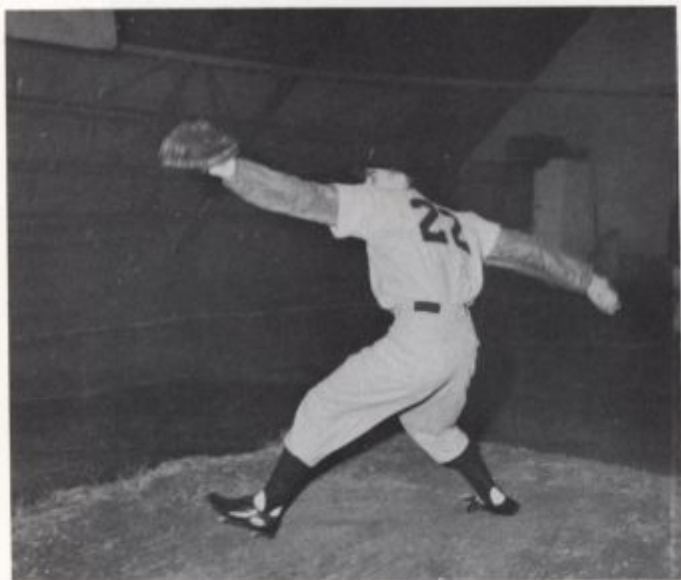

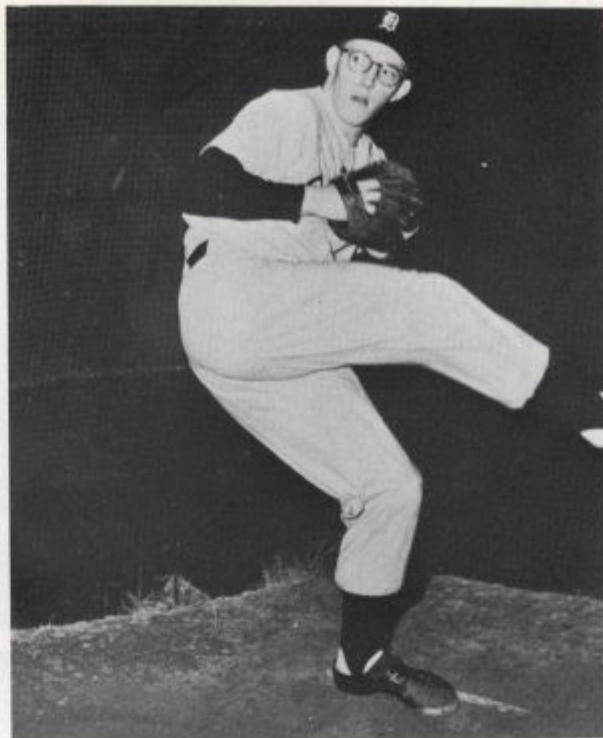

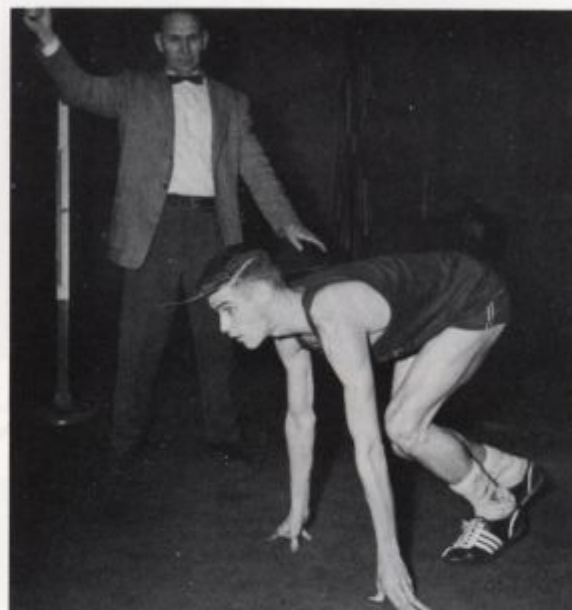

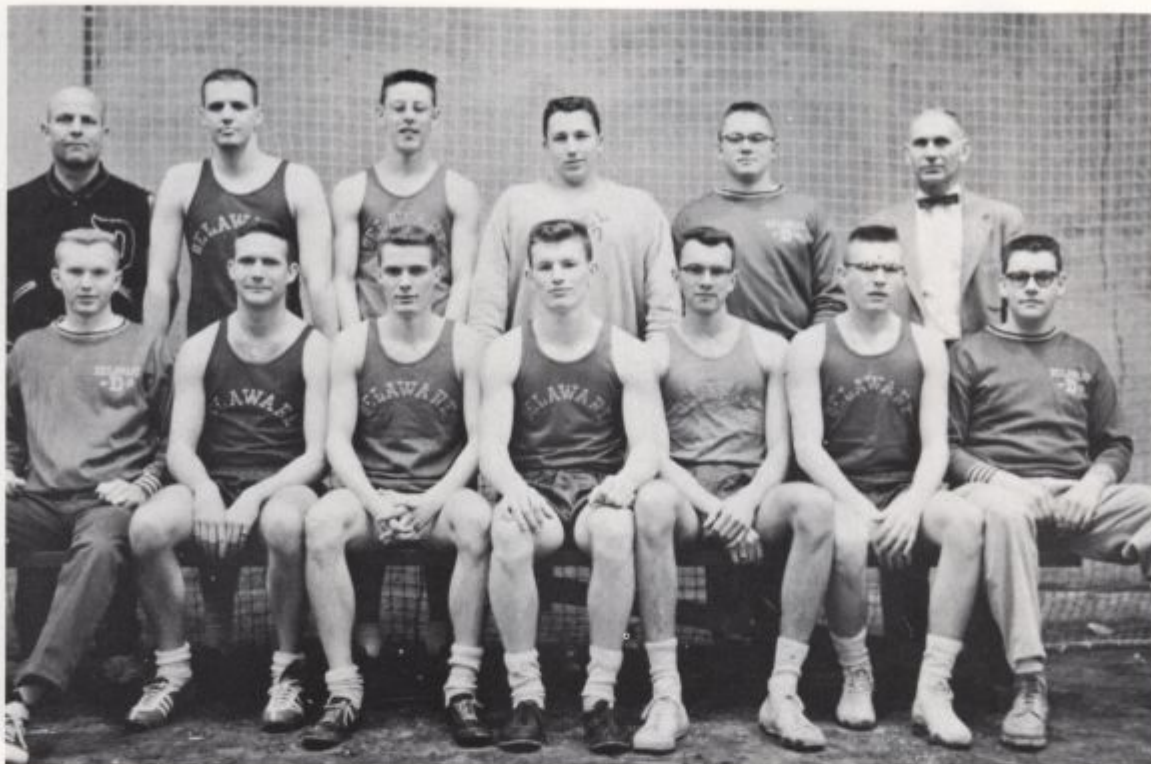

To all the girls at the University, WAA provides a well rounded program in the field of sports. However, its function is not only for physical well-being but for social benefits, as well as the building of good character traits.



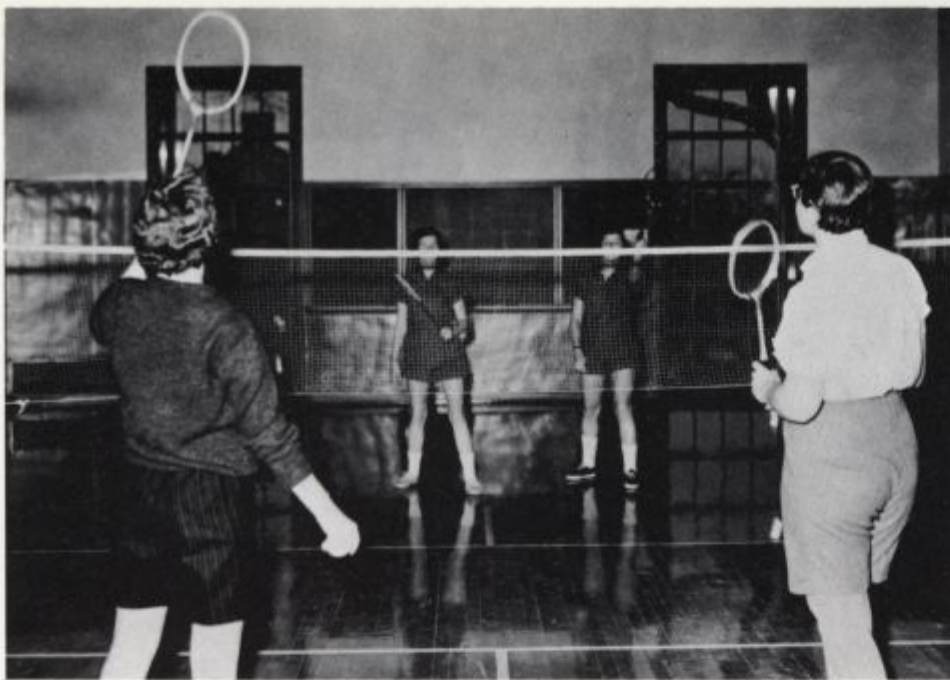
