A Note From The Director

Dear DRC Staff, Alumni, and Friends.

Welcome to the inaugural issue of the DRC Dispatch! It has certainly been busy here the last few months. We felt the Mineral, Virginia earthquake strongly on campus; the Center swayed noticeably, first with pictures trembling on the walls and then building up momentum, accompanied by the noise of walls and the suspended ceiling quivering. Dr. Ben Aguirre and Dr. Lucia Velotti, a research assistant and student in public policy, have been conducting a survey of earthquake experiences and perceptions on campuses around the area. Yvonne Rademacher and Alex Greer, graduate students in the Disaster Science and Management program, and Laura Keeley, a historic preservation graduate student, traveled to Virginia and to Washington on a reconnaissance trip. Alex and Yvonne also traveled to Japan, completing a second NSF-funded reconnaissance trip to the area affected by the March 2011 earthquake and tsunami, gathering information on volunteers, interorganizational coordination, nonprofit organizations, and other topics that we hope will form the basis for a more intensive study.

Most recently, and on a lighter note, I'm pleased to say that we participated in the University of Delaware spirit photo contest... and placed first in the "People's Choice" category! The DRC was featured at the university's Spirit Day activities, part of the homecoming weekend celebration. It was unusually cold, and I for one was glad to receive a foam UD crown, which I wore for warmth. Organizing the photo shoot and the production process was spearheaded by DRC's cadre of resourceful graduate students, and we thank everyone who voted for us.

Meanwhile, we hope you'll enjoy this first issue of the Dispatch, and we'll look forward to hearing from you.

Past Experience by Dr. Russell Dynes and Dr. Enrico Quarantelli

The following experience is from Professor Emeritus Russell R. Dynes.

"During World War II, I built a pipeline from India, through Burma over the Himalayas into China with the help of several national armies. Travel for academics is more difficult, but I found the Fulbright Program useful. When the DRC was first starting, I went to Egypt and spent time at the United Nations Arab States Fundamental Center. In 1971, I lectured at many Indian Universities, as well as Pakistan and Nepal, and organized an All India Disaster Conference at Patna, Bihar.

In 1998, I was at the Asian Disaster Preparedness Center in Thailand and organized a U.S.-South Asia Conference on disaster.


I also spent a semester at Cardiff University, Wales and did field work for the DRC in Japan, Mexico, Iran and Curacao. I estimate I have lectured or attended conferences in over 40 countries.

While there are important personal learnings from such travel, there are also institutional consequences; which provide world wide awareness for the activities of the DRC which lead to visits and stays from others around the world which universalizes the study of disaster." ~ Russell R. Dynes

"I was at DRC from March to June 2010. My stay was a significant experience, both personal and scientific. For my research objectives it was of paramount importance, namely in terms of theoretical learning on the sociological aspects of disasters; but also in terms of network building and bibliographical research. Coming back to my country, I felt that I had not only consolidated, but also expanded my knowledge. Already in Portugal, I have been invited to pre-

sent research in Lisbon on resilient cities, and I had the opportunity to spread what I learned from the DRC research team. I continue now developing my work in connection with DRC, I still continue to rely on the same quality, effectiveness, and efficiency of Dr. Benigno Aguirre and Pat Young. Thank you.

I am a third year Ph.D. student in Civil and Environmental Protection at the Università Politecnica delle Marche (UNIVPM) at Ancona, Italy.

The aim of my research is to study climate change scenarios in the Marche Region (central Italy) in order to identify possible strategies for the local emergency management agencies to achieve the goal of hazard reduction. I have organized the research into three main sections: (1) Analysis of climate trends (precipitation and temperature) at the local scale, (2) Climate change risk perception and strategies for risk prevention and vulnerability reduction, and (3) Construction of impact scenarios and definition of strategies of action useful for local civil protection.

During the time spent at the DRC I mainly focused on climate change risk knowledge and perception. Taking advantage of the Disaster Research Center's inter and multi disciplinary approach I developed a new analysis of perception data collected in Italy in 2010. As a matter of fact, with the support of the experienced DRC scientists I decided to concentrate my data analysis not only on cli-mate change risk knowledge and perception but also on information and communication exchange among citizens, institutions and emergency managers.

This new direction of research has opened up the possibility to analyze the existing gap between science and practice in terms of emerging climate hazards and risks. Furthermore, the possibility to observe new methods of work and access to specific resources dedicated to disasters, taught me how organize and summarize information and knowledge from different areas.

During the last two months spent at the DRC I used the available resources (books, articles, knowl-edge and ideas exchange) in order to define a local adaptation strategy for future climate hazards which directly involve emergency managers and citizens. The result of this last period at the DRC is the analysis of the communication channels and networks among all the players who act in vul-nerability reduction, risk prevention and citizen information and awareness. Furthermore, I wrote part of my final dissertation.

After returning to Italy in November I continued to write my dissertation using all the collected information and fostering the research line identified with my DRC tutor, Prof. James Kendra.
