On Frozen Egg Savings

Here's a money-saving suggestion from Janet Coblentz, extension nutrition specialist at the University of Delaware. If you have extraspace in your freezer, use some of it for eggs. They are low in price. Break the eggs into a mixing bowl and mix them thoroughly with a fork or beater. If you use an electric mixer, keep it at low speed and avoid whipping in excess air. For each cup of the mixed egg, add either 1½ teaspoons of sugar or ½ teaspoon of salt, depending on how you plan to use the eggs. Stir until the sugar or salt is dissolved. Frozen whole eggs will keep from six to eight months when stored properly, Miss Coblentz adds.





To kill ants in the home, zray suggests treating the baseboards, window sills, and other areas where ants are seen. Use a household-type spray containing two per cent chlordane. Apply the insecticide at weekly intervals until the ants disappear.

There are a number of ant baits that can be used in the home, he adds. Follow the directions on the container when using baits. Many of them contain poisonous materials that must be used with caution.

Ant colonies in the lawn can be eliminated by sifting one teaspoon of five per cent chlordane or one per cent delidrin dust over each nest, and then sprinkle area throughly with water. Bray reports.

Delaware certified seed producers are off to a good start in the 1961 seed year, according to William H Mitchell, University of Delaware agronomist, with about 1,000 acres of small grain field inspected by the Delaware Crop Improvement

the Delaware Crop Improvement Association.
Field inspection is performed to determine the presence of such serious weeds as Johnson grass, onions, and cockle as well as purity of the seet, according to Mitchell, the first step in the certification process. Many acres are turned down each year he said because they fail the first test. This amounted to about 20 per cent of the acres that applied this year.

The next step in the certification process is to examine the seed to determine the germination percentage; presence of diseased seed; and possible contamination with other crop seed.

possible contamination with other crop seed.

This test is performed at the Delaware Seed Testing Laboratory in Dover under the direction of John Clough.

The Delaware Crop Improvement Association, official seed certifying agency in the state, issues to growers who pass all tests, the coveted blue tag used throughout the world as a mark of quality and assurance of varietal purity, Mitchell said.
