Dear Friend:

I have your letter of August 19 with which you enclose a copy of a letter of introduction to Mr. Erich Loewe who intends to spend a few days in Habana, and you may be sure that I will be very happy to see him if I am still here. I haven't given up hope of being able to get away, but my hopes are dimming. The circumstances are such that it is quite impossible for me to leave for the present.

With your letter you enclosed a copy of one to me of August 19, the original of which I have not yet received. I am sure that you will find Secretary Morgenthau a very understanding and sympathetic person. I have had an acknowledgment of my letter to him of which I sent you a copy. I am sure that you will be successful in making some satisfactory arrangement so as to be able to use your funds. It is a real problem which you have, but you have had many more difficult ones in the past which you have successfully handled, and in this one you will have a sympathetic understanding by our officials. It may be difficult to work out a formula, but I am confident some formula can be worked out. If there is any way that I can be of any use, please do not hesitate to let me know. If there is any possibility of my getting home I will let you know.
