## 4 years and 515 tons for UDon't Need It

the 2010 "UDon't Need It?" Program reported another successful year at diverting material from the landfill as well as assisting families and households in need of food and household goods.

Co-Chairs of the "UDon't Need It?" program Carol Houck, Newark's assistant to the City Manager and Deb Hoff, assistant University of Delaware secretary, estimate that another 148 tons of material was diverted from the landfill during this year's program.

City staff and more than 60

volunteers, comprised mainly of University of Delaware employees, worked to collect, organize and distribute the

items brought by students that were still in usable condition.

Many items went to assist over 50 families in need of furniture and other household items. In addition, approximately 30 barrels of non-perishable food products were collected for the Food Bank of Delaware. Five large containers of books were collected for the Better World Books Project.

The Street Division of the City of Newark Public Work Department's overtime budget was reduced by approximately 50 percent from the three years prior to the start of the program by making this program available to students. Previously, City staff spent 500 hours on

## Bill aims to protect elderly

ov. Jack A. Markell Jisigned legislation late last week designed to protect vulnerable and infirm adults from abuse. Sponsored by House Majority Whip Rep. Valerie J. Longhurst and Sen. Bethany A. Hall-Long, House Substitute 1 for House Bill 348 would create enhanced penalties for those who commit crimes against a vulnerable or infirm adult. The legislation was drafted by Susan Del Pesco, director the state Division of Long Term Care Residents Protection, and backed by Attorney General Beau Biden.

The legislation would

increase the penalties for about 50 offenses if those crimes are committed against someone determined to be a vulnerable or infirm adult. In most cases, the charges would be increased by one class, such as a class A misdemeanor becoming a class G felony, a class G felony becoming a class F felony, and so on. Class A and B felonies would remain the same grade, but the minimum sentence of imprisonment required by law for the offense would be doubled.

"People who have physical or mental limitations or disabilities face a much

greater risk of someone taking advantage of them," said. Longhurst, D-Bear. "No one should have to live in fear of being targeted because of their personal situation. Those who commit these crimes are just preying on the vulnerable, and they should face tougher punishment.

"It's my hope that these new penalties serve as a warning to people that we aren't going to tolerate this behavior and that the enhanced penalties protect our vulnerable and elderly populations."

## 1st credit union business loan made in state

The U.S. Small Business Administration and U.S. Senator Tom Carper joined local elected officials and representatives of Newark-based American Spirit Federal Credit Union to mark the opening of Queen Bee Beauty Supply in Smyrna. The oversized check presentation and tour took place at the retail business located at the Shop Mart Plaza at 72 E. Glenwood Avenue in Smyrna.

"We are excited and honored to have received this loan which has changed our lives for the better. The American dream is now in our view and attainable," said Eustace Kamanja, co-owner of Queen Bee Beauty Supply. "We thank God for bringing us this far, the U.S. government through the SBA, as well as Maurice Dawkins and the American Spirit Federal Credit Union for helping us to realize our dream and contribute to the economy."

Queen Bee Beauty Supply

offers artificial and human hair, extensions, weaves, wigs, make-up and nail and hair accessories. The Kamanjas financed the business start up with a \$250,000 SBA 7(a) loan guaranteed through American Spirit FCU. The loan was financed under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, providing the credit union with a 90 percent SBA guarantee and the business with a temporary elimination of loan fees, saving it \$5,940.

The loan to Queen Bee Beauty Supply represents the first SBA loan financed through a Delaware credit union. It is also American Spirit FCU's first loan since being approved as a new SBA lender last year. America's credit unions financed 2,453 SBA loans nationally last fiscal year for a total of \$240.6 million.

a new criminal offense, crime against the vulnerable or infirm, which imposes enhanced penalties for offenses including reckless endangering, assault, abuse of a pregnant female, terroristic threatening, unlawful sexual contact, fraud, rape, robbery, burglary, identity theft and forgery.

"As a nurse, I have witnessed firsthand the impact that neglect and abuse has on our special populations." said Hall-Long, D-Middletown. "I am pleased to have worked with our governor, Attorney General Biden, Rep. Longhurst and the community on this legislation that will act as a tool with stiffer penalties for those who abuse."

Attorney General Biden said that the new law would provide protection to a segment of Delaware's population that has never before benefited from added safeguards under

"One of government's core responsibilities is to protect the safety of Delawareans, especially the most vulnerable among us," Biden said. "Today we are increasing our efforts to protect those who cannot protect themselves. We will be going after criminals who target vulnerable adults with enhanced penalties that reflect the deplorable nature of the crimes they commit. Criminals who prey on vulnerable adults in Delaware now face tough new penalties."

A retired Superior Court judge, Del Pesco noted that she is among the first wave of "Baby Boomers" who will greatly increase Delaware's elderly population in the coming years, which makes this new law even more essential.

"This new law is important now and will be even more essential in the future," Del Pesco said. "In 2000, there were 10,500 Delawareans ages 85 or older, a number that will triple by 2030."

## Georgetown man arrested for DP Dough burglary

A Georgetown, Delaware man was apprehended last week in connection with a burglary on Main Street. Newark Police arrested Jason Wilz, 30, for the burglary of the DP Dough on East Main.

The resturant was burglarized on June 10th and Newark Police were able to recover video surveillance footage of the suspect in this case. The investigation led to detectives obtaining a search warrant for Wilz's residence in Georgetown where evidence

was recovered.

Wilz was charged with the following: 1 count Burglary 3rd degree; 1 count Wearing a Disguise During the Commission of a Felony; 1 count of Theft under \$1,500; and 1 count of Criminal Mischief

Wilz was released on \$6,500 unsecured bond.

#### Wheels stolen from Newark Jeep

Police are once again investigating a break-in at Newark Chrysler Jeep, located at 244 E. Cleveland Ave., where two suspects broke into the dealership and stole the wheels of a

vehicle that was parked near the repair shop.

Employees notified the owner, a resident of Perryville, Md., that his black 2005 Dodge Ram was resting on milk crates and had had all four of its tires, valued at \$300 a piece, and its aluminum rims, valued at \$704 a piece, taken. Including the lug nuts and center caps, the total value of the stolen merchandise is over \$4,200.

Employees also showed officers that the suspects had removed the wheels of a 2010 Jeep Wrangler and replaced them with spare wheels from four other jeeps. The four stolen wheels are worth a total of \$2,150.

A search by police showed that the suspects cut a hole in the chain link fence behind the dealership and entered the lot. The damage to the fence is estimated at \$400.

A video surveillance tape shows two individuals running toward the main building and taking the wheels. The first suspect is a white male, approximately 5'06 to 5'10 tall, wearing a light blue baseball cap and a light blue jacket or shirt. The other male suspect is shown wearing a light blue hooded sweatshirt with the hood up. His race is unde-

termined in the footage.

No fingerprints were recovered, but police are reviewing the videotape in order to develop a better description of the suspects.

## Shoplifting suspect arrested

Last week, Newark Police arrested a male shoplifter who had taken two bottles of alcohol from Newark Discount Liquors, at 230 E. Main St., in the Newark Shopping Center, and had run out of the front door without paying.

The store's owner told officers that the young male had run out of the store, towards E. Main St., with a 1.75L bottle of Hennessey and a 1.75L bottle of Grey Goose vodka. A search by officers showed that the suspect had run behind the Super 8 Motel, where they found Steven Caldwell, 25, a resident of East Main St., Newark, still holding the bottle of Grey Goose. Police questioned Caldwell, who admitted he had taken both bottles and that he had already given the bottle of Hennessey to an acquaintance.

A background check on

Caldwell revealed that he had an active capias against him. He was charged with shoplifting and released on a \$591 unsecured bond.

#### Attempted carjacking

A woman and two other females who happened to be in the area were able to stop a carjacking late Saturday morning. On Saturday at 11 a.m., County Police were called to the Brookside Shopping Center.

When police arrived, they found a 61 year-old woman who reported she had just parked her car and was walking to the local Happy Harry's Store when she was approached by a white male who asked her if she would give him a ride to the nearby gas station where his car was parked. He then asked the woman for money and became combative when she refused.

The suspect then told the victim he was taking her car at which time he tried to grab her keys. The woman refused and a struggle ensued. Two female bystanders witnessed the attack and helped the victim fend off

the assailant. During the altercation, the female victim sustained a laceration to her finger from the keys.

The suspect was last seen fleeing the area on a blue bicycle toward Brookside Road. He is described as a white male with a beard, 30 years old, wearing a light brown baseball cap, a beige shirt and khaki shorts.





average of overtime cleaning the streets and curbs of Newark of the furniture and other items left by students when moving out at the end of the school year. It is estimated that the "UDon't Need It?" program has had a positive impact as the average overtime for the period over the last three years has been reduced to 225 hours.







## Newark Nite does not need an overhaul

couple of things crossed my desk on a steamy July day. There used to be a standing joke around this office that every Newark Nite was better than the last.

Was it simply hyperbole?

Nope, nearly every year was better than the last for the event that was held back in

So what happened this year? It was great by most accounts. But even its most ardent backers believe it could use a little tweaking. There is some lingering concern that the vendors who do not have a physical presence in Newark are cutting into the revenues of Main Street businesses. On the other hand, Newark Nite is an expensive affair and revenues are needed.

Another issue is also worth bringing up. While most folks came downtown simply to enjoy the event, some rough characters have been populating the edges of down-town from the time Newark Nite shuts down and into the early morning hours.

It resulted in some drunkenness and police activity. Keep in mind that this activity takes place on many weekends and care must be taken not to directly tie all incidents to Newark Nite.

This year, the hours were changed a bit to see if it might keep some undesirables away. That did not happen and Newark is not alone. Some undesirable elements have also been showing up at church carnivals and other events.

The resulting publicity over this year's incidents may have led some, who don't care much about Newark in the first place, to believe that the event is populated by hooligans.

Those who attended Newark Nite know better, but such myths can quickly take hold in a sprawling county where rumors can spread quickly.

To its credit, the city has organized a committee to take a fresh look at Newark Nite and present some recommendations for next year's event.

Again, it is not time make a major overhaul, but instead add a couple of new features that will rekindle some enthusiasm.

One point of clarification. Newark Nite is actually organized by the city's Parks and Recreation Department and has no ties with the University of Delaware. UD did hold an alumni weekend that drew thousands to the city at the same time as Newark Nite.

Once a month, Assistant Editor Mark Corrigan attends the monthly meeting of the Middletown Council.


Recently, the council approved a new fiscal year budget and passed out information on how the town compares to its counterparts elsewhere in the state in regard to a combination of utility and tax costs.







## Tri-State's work in Gulf results in major donation

Pattern Energy, a company with offices in California and Texas, has made a donation of \$100,000 to Newark-based Tri-State Bird Rescue & Research.

Executives at Pattern Energy were impressed with Tri-State's work in response to the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico, prompting them to make a donation to the organization.


Closer to home, Tri-State Bird Rescue & Research admitted 57 young purple martins at its Wild Bird Clinic. Over 85 percent of the fledglings were brought from the Middletown area after being found on the ground near their colonies.

The birds were dehydrated and underweight, but had no external injuries or signs of toxin exposure, the group reported.

The hot and dry weather may have played a significant role in this unexpected wave of admissions to the clinic. Early July is when many martins fledge and young birds begin the process of becoming independent of their parents. Within a week, they are on their own, feeding exclusively on flying insects caught during flight. It is likely that there was a decrease in the availability of these insects because of the recent extreme heat and drought conditions. As a result of this extreme, many fledgling martins may have had difficulty finding enough food and regulating their body temperature, Tri-State noted.

Recent storms should alleviate the insect shortage; however, Tri-State will be caring for these young birds until they are healthy and mature enough to be returned to the wild.

Tri-State .Bird Rescue & Research is a nonprofit wild-life rehabilitation organization that cares for nearly 3,000 injured, orphaned, and oiled native wild birds each year ranging from hummingbirds to eagles. For more information about Tri-State, visit www. tristatebird.org.

## **Blackson has his eye on the Tigers**

Angelo Blackson is a behe-moth of a man. Yet at 6-foot-4, 295 pounds, the Red Lion Christian Academy senior is a quiet man.

"He's a quiet kid," Red Lion Christian football head coach Eric Day says of the senior. "But he's slowly coming out of his shell. In fact, he leads the morning prayer when the athletes gather at the beginning of the school day. That's something he would have never thought of doing when he first came to us."

Blackson's arrival at Red Lion Christian was unexpected. After enrolling at Newark High he became ineligible for the football team after failing to get to his physical on time. It was that, combined with some other circumstances, which led to his enrollment at Red Lion Christian. It's a decision Blackson feels was a turning point in his life.

"More than anywhere else, Red Lion helped me," says Blackson, who also plays var-sity basketball. "The teachers give you all the extra help you need and the football coaches are on you and don't let you fail. We're in school all day and then have to go to a hard practice. The coaches wouldn't let you quit and that taught me discipline, mentally and physically, through football."

Blackson's resilience has paid off. The talented defensive lineman has verbally accepted a football scholarship from Auburn University, a place he says felt like home the minute he stepped on campus.

"I went down there for a visit and it was awesome," says Blackson, whose other official recruiting visits included Clemson and Maryland. "I had the chance to go to a lot of



other places, but when I went to Auburn I just felt comfortable. It felt like home away from

Home for Blackson since he was 7 years old has been in the city of Wilmington, where his sister has raised him. He says her impact on his life has been significant, and it's not having her around that will be a big adjustment once he leaves for Auburn next summer.

"Academically, I'm not going to have the same support get from my sister now and living the lifestyle that I live," he said. "I'll need to become my own man down there and adjust to living my own lifestyle, not my sister's.

For now, Blackson is working out four nights a week in the weight room with his teammates, and says his goal for the team is for them to bond together and work toward winning a state championship. In addition, he plans to better himself by improving his speed, endurance and strength. And while some players already committed to a college might slack off, Day is confident Blackson will approach his senior season with every bit of the same commitment he has in the past.

"You usually have to push kids who are as talented as Angelo," Day said. "You don't have to do that with him. He's one of those kids when you run sprints, he's in front. He genuinely works hard with every repetition, every play. He leads by example.

"Angelo has all the physical skills necessary to be successful in college. Now what he needs to refine are his techniques. That and continue to become stronger. There are a lot of guys his size in the Southeast Conference who are fast, so it's his strength that he has to continue to build."

Blackson takes life seriously, realizing that for him to reach his ultimate goal of playing in the NFL — Day says play-ing defensive line in the SEC compared to other conferences probably increases his chances to be noticed by the NFL - his toughest challenges are ahead of him, both in the classroom and on the field.

However, there's one thing he says he is confident he'll adjust to right away: "They eat a lot down there. Two things I do great - play football and eat."





## Seat belt usage rises above 90 percent in Delaware

Surveys conducted in mid June to measure seat belt usage statewide show the 2010 Delaware seat belt use rate is 91 percent, an increase of 3 percent from last year. "Seatbelts mitigate injury and save lives," said Delaware Gov. Jack Markell. "It's good to know that more people are using them. The more people buckle up, the greater chance we'll reduce fatalities on our roads."

Not only did the overall statewide usage rate increase but each county also saw an increase over last year. New Castle County usage rate went



from 87 percent in 2009 to 89 percent for 2010. Kent County is currently at 94 percent, up 2

percentage points from last year and the Sussex County usage rate of 93 percent had the biggest percentage increase from 90 percent last year. "Utilizing a seat belt can mean the difference between life and death in a vehicle crash and the fact that more Delawareans are buckling up is very encouraging. This trend shows that motorists are changing their behavior every time they get in a vehicle," said Lewis D. Schiliro, Secretary of Safety and Homeland Security.

Seat belt use has increased almost every year since Delaware began conducting the Click It or Ticket campaign in 2002 with the one exception of 2009 when it dipped down slightly from the previous year. "It is absolutely fantastic to see this increase in seatbelt usage in our great state. We are grateful and proud of our fellow Delawareans for recognizing the importance of buckling up," said Tricia Roberts. director of the Delaware Office of Highway Safety. "Increased seat belt usage translates into lives saved and there is nothing better than that."

During the Click It or Ticket campaign officers from approximately 30 State, County, and municipal law enforcement agencies issued a total of 1,663 citations to unbuckled motorists during the campaign. Out of the 31 vehicle occupants killed to date in 2010 in a fatal crash, 52 percent were not wearing a seat belt. At this same time last year, 46 people had been killed in a fatal crash and 61 percent were not wearing a seat belt.

Click It or Ticket is a nationwide seat belt enforcement and awareness campaign aimed at saving lives by increasing the number of people who consistently buckle up.
