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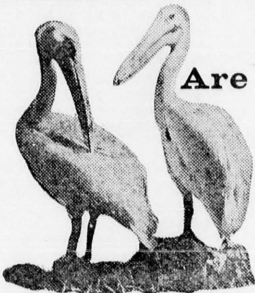
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SCHOLAR AT INDIANA

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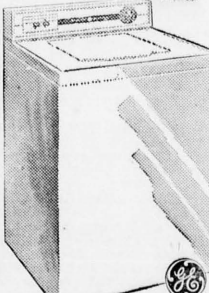

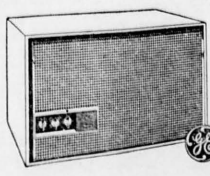

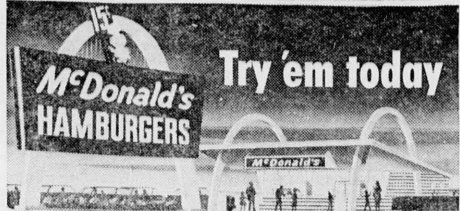

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Word Hits Homer As NHS Tops Bulldogs; Talarowski's Nine Faces Friday Finale

Newark High broke out of a woe-ful three-game hitting slump that included a string of 15 scoreless innings, with a 9-5 drubbing of Brandywine, away, last Friday, only to lose a 4-2 heart-breaker to Wilmington here on Tuesday to eliminate chances of finishing the campaign above the 500 mark. The Jackets sported a 5-6 record, entertained Conrad tomorrow in their season finale.

The Red Devil defeat was especially disheartening since Newark whipped them 11-7 in an earlier contest.

Charley Word limited the opposition to six hits while striking out eight, but the Jackets found themselves back in their mid-season drought, reaching Wilmington hurler Charley Muxom for only one hit after the second inning.

Doubles by Word and Archie Peel sandwiched around an error gave Newark a 2-0 lead in the first frame, but the Red Devils pulled even with single runs in the second and third.

Word issued a base on balls to start the fifth and a sacrifice bunt moved the runner to third when the base was left unguarded. The squeeze play was then utilized to perfection to score what proved to be the winning run.

Besides his first-inning double, Word also collected a single to lead the meager Jacket attack.

The win at Brandywine avenged an earlier loss to Bulldogs hurler Rick Wise. Enemy errors and shortness on the base paths gave right-hander Alan Whitman an early lead he never relinquished. The sophomore workhorse blanked the Bulldogs over the last three frames after surviving a shaky start by recording his third triumph against one defeat. He held the opposition to six hits while fanning 11.

The Jackets tallied twice in the first frame with the help of a double steal. After singles by Archie Saunders and Lloyd Wells put runners on first and third, an attempt to cut down Wells stealing second failed, enabling the alert Saunders to streak home unopposed. Although Wells was later nipped at third, Word singled and eventually scored

on a wild pitch.

Brandywine reached Whiteman for three consecutive doubles in the same inning to knot the score at 2-2, but Newark came back with a five-run barrage in the second to put the game out of reach.

A walk to Jim Cunane, following singles by Dave Beatie and John Collins, loaded the bases. Failure of the enemy shortstop to come up with Saunders' hopper brought the first two runs home. After Cunane scored on Archie Peel's grounder, Wells drew a base on balls. Guy Cage then celebrated his return to the line-up after being benched for weak hitting with a two-run single to left.

After the Bulldogs closed the gap to 7-4 with singletons in the second and third, Word drove one "a country mile" with Saunders on board in the fourth for his first homer of the season.

Coach Joe Talarowski used a revamped lineup against Mt. Pleasant last Thursday, but Warren Hayes whitewashed the Jackets 5-0. Beatie, starting his first game at third, collected one of Newark's four hits, a double in the fifth.

Other new faces in the order included Tommy Van Kirk at second and John Barber behind the plate.

Word twirled a six-hitter but Barber had trouble holding his lively fastball.

The Green Knights tallied once in the first on a walk, two errors, and a single. Word walked two more in the fifth and both scored on a squeeze play and passed ball.

Mt. Pleasant completed its scoring in the seventh, banging out three singles for two runs.

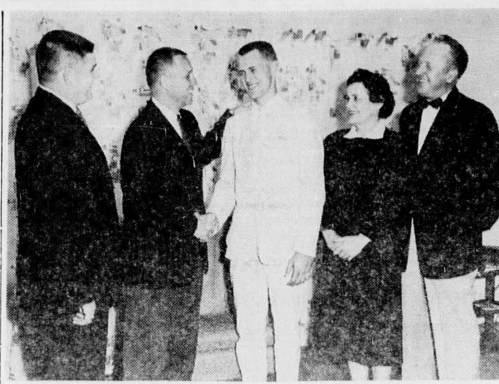

Lloyd Wells, Delaware high school football scoring champ in 1960, plans to enter the University of Delaware in September.

Wells scored 155 points last year while playing for Newark High School under Coach Bob Hoffman, and also won the Blue Hen Conference scoring title with 90 points, surpassing the 43-point record set the year before by Mike Brown, also now at Delaware.

The 165-pound halfback won almost every football honor available last fall. He was named to the Blue Hen Conference first team; All-State first team; and he was selected to play in the All-Star Game at Delaware Stadium this August.

Wells was named to the seventh team of the Sporting News National High School All-Americans squad, ranking with the top 77 of some 7,500 nominees picked by coaches and members of the press "throughout the country."

The senior athlete received conference honors also in both his sophomore and junior years. He received the school's sportsmanship award in 1958.

In high school extracurricular activities, Wells has served as treasurer of the Student Council, president of his home room, and is a varsity outfielder for Coach Joe Talarowski's Yellowjackets. He is a member of the H-Y and attends St. Paul's Lutheran Church.

Coach Dave Nelson said "Wells comes to us with excellent credentials, and we expect he will be a credit to the university as a scholar and as an athlete."
