The first offering of the evening was "The House with the Column," by Luigi Pirandello, one of Italy's foremost playwrights. Dealing with the attempts of an aged mother to contact her two sons who have left
their home village, the play itself was a highly dramatic one, both timeless and timely in its impli cation.
In the leading role of Maragrazia, the old mother, was Sybll Levenson, who gave her usual beaulifu performance. Although the part lacked the intensity present in

## Constitution of the Student Body of the University of Delaware

We, the students of the University of Delaware, in order to further the activities of student ilfe, to promote a widespread interest in student activities, and to assume the responsibiuty of self-government delegated to us by the faculty in the interest of the University, do
hereay patablsh this Constitution of the Student Body of the Univer sity of Dela ware.

The name of this organization shall be " "The Student Body of the University of Delaware

The purpose of this organization shall be to enact and enforce such regulations as may from time to time be deemed necessary and promote such activities as may better the stuc
The membership of this organization shall consist of all students the University of Delaware who shall have pald the Student Activitues Fee, Only members of this organization shall be entitled to vote Class and student Boay

Any constitution now in effect is hereby rendered null and vold. The legislative powers of the student Body shall be vested in The legisative powers of the student Boay shan be vested in he Board of Trustees and of the Faculty.
Duties: In addition to carrying out the functions implied in Artcce II of the Constitution, the Student Government Assoclation shall:
Conduct Student Body and Class elections.
Approve all appointments specified in this Constitution. Allocate and supervise expenditure of all money reeeived by
the Student Body as provided in Article VIII of this Con. the student Body as provided in Article VIII of this con-
utution. Have sole power of impeachment against any officer or mem. ber of this organization for just cause by the concurrence
of two-thirds of the membership of Student Government Assoclation.
Enact by-laws which shall supplement this Constitution in all respects necessary to insure full force and effect of this Constitution. No by-law of the Student Body existing before the adoption of this Constitution or enacted hereafter shall Constitution. Have all powers which its function as the supreme executive body of the Student Body requires.
Membership: The membership of the Student Government Association shall be composed of:
The President, who shall be a man elected from the Senior Class, shall preside at all meetings of the Student Government Association. He shall see that all provisions of this Constitution and by-laws are faithfully executed. The Vice-President, who shall be a woman elected from the f President. She shall be the constitutional authority and parliamentian of the Student Government Association. All matters of Parliamentary procedure shall be referved to her,
The Secretary, who shall be a woman elected from the Senior or Junior Class, shall record the minutes of all meetings and be responsible for keeping them on file. She shall conduct all correspondence, be responstble for keeping the files of the Student Government Association and perform
such other administrative duties as the President may direct. such other administrative duties as the President may direct. The Treasurer, who shall be a man elected from the Senior
or Junior Class, shall supervise the expenditures of Student or Junior Class, shall supervise the expenditures of Student Government Association funds, keep appropriate records of expenditures of these funds, act as chairman of the finance
committee, and audit the accounts of all subsidiary organizacommittee, and audit the accounts of all subsidiary organizaChairman of Men's Affairs, who shall be elected from the
Senior Class, shall be concerned with those problems which are closely associated with the men students in the University. He shall assist the Dean of Men in duties which from time to time may be assigned. The Chairman of Women's Affairs, who shall be elected from the Senior Class of the Women's College, shall be concerned with those problems which are closely associated with the
women students of the University. She shall assist the Dean of Women in formulating and administering rules of conduct. Chairman of the Social Committee, who shall be elected from the student body at large, shall be responsible for conducting a well rounded social program for the students of the University. The Soclal Chairman shall prepare the Social Calendar for the following year by the preceding May there are no conflicts.
