Council Plans Hearing On New Town Charter WHITE GIFT

Date Not Set As Yet; Meet Not Required But **Public Backing Sought**

With the proposed zoning ordinance atill under consideration here. Town Council this week swung the spotlight on another major civic issue, when it amounced plans for holding a public hearing on the new Town Charter. A date for the session has not been set yet but an amouncement is ex-

They are also anxious to get the public's reaction on a number of controversial points in the current draft, especially those relating to voting regulations, pay for Councilmen, assessment procedures and the filling of vacancies on Council.

Simple Precautions Can Insure Safe Holiday

If you wish to help keep your Christmas tree from casting a dark shatlow into your home, the Delaware Safety Courcil offers these simple precautions. See that you tree is well supported against tipping and that it is set well away from the freeplace. The tree can be kept fresh if you set it up in a pan of water. Cut off the bare of the tree at an angle at least one fieth above the original cut and keep the tree standing in water during the entire period that the tree is in the house, adding water to the jar or tub in which If you wish to help keep you thre period that the tree is in the house, adding water to the jar or tub in which the tree stands at injervals to keep the water level always above the cut. This method when used with fresh trees reduces the flammability as effec-

trees reduces the flammability as effectively as any fireproofing chemicals. Chemical may cause the turn to turn brown or yellow or to lost its needles. Do not use tree light with freyed cords and do not let tinsel come in contact with the light sockets, or a short circuit may result. Do not overload a circuit, or a fire may start it, the walls, if a fuse blows, climinate some of the lights, it is best to use metal, glass, mich, asbestos and other five-resistant materials for decorations rather than cotton and paper. Never rather than cotton and paper. Never use flame candles And never leave the tree lights turned on when there is no one at home. It may be a pretty sight—but it might turn out to be a traine sight! Observe these precautions prevent holiday fires-and keep the Christmas glow cheerful, not tearful!



We shall be filled with frestul indecision over what to buy and further weighted down by the knowledge that the few people with whom, through long costom, we exchange gifts are filled with a like frustgation over what to buy us.

We have, of course, tried to break through the hard shell of this custom. Annually, we sit down with these old fronds and have a "senible" talk. We all agree that gift giving among adults is an unnecessary duplication, a canceling out of sterilized generosity, and that we will drop it this year. We tell each other solemnly that Xmas is mainly for children and that we will limit our gift giving to them this year. But, somehow, this resolve never holds firm. Perhaps it is because we overlook the tromendous impact of four straight weeks of canned carol singing, radio dramatizations of Dickens, quotations of Tiny Tim, and rendificins of a White Christons Whatever the reason. radio orannatzations of Dickers, decided to those of Tiny Tim, and rendfillons of a White Christmas. Whatever the reason Xmas always flods us shamefacedly exchanging gifts again and explaining how it wouldn't seem like Xmas if we

On the matter of Xmas cards we have managed to adopt a firmer policy. We send them only to persons we know will not be sending any to us. We prefer the self-righteous feeling that comes of appearing to remember someone who has forgotten you to the yearone who has forgotten long humiliation of having overlooked someone you apparently were supposed to remember-

someone you apparently were supposed to remember.

Of course, we still get cards, but these are only from people trying to salve their conscience for not returning ours the previous year. We use a new batch of names every year and thus are always a jump ahead of the game. We think this system is less nervewracking than the more common one of keeping a lengthy mailing list which, a week before Xinas, you must hurridly bring up to date by crossing off the bores who didn't return your card last year and adding the smart-alecks who slipped you one for the first time. Members View Work Of Dept. Research Men

Dr. Vincent E. Parker, chairman de-partment, was host to the group and gave an introductory talk on the back-ground of the department, describing its growth from a two member staff in 1941 to its present ten. He also out-lined plans for expanding into a new building. lined pla building.

During the tour, the Jaycees were During the four, the Jaycees were greatly impressed by the amount of equipment and the ingenuity shown by the staff members in constructing complicated research apparatus from parts salvaged from war surplus materials at little cost to the state.

Much interest was taken in the Bray cavity accelerator, the mass spectometer and the Geiger counter research equipment.

Parker introduced Professor H. Feeny,

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



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
