Dear Tom:

As per our telephone conversation of Thursday, January 12, 1978, this letter, hopefully, will serve as an explanation why the County Council has requested an increase in our borrowing limit from Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) to Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00). As you are aware, the County is involved in a number of sewer and water projects. Many of these systems have just begun operation. The startup costs associated with those operations have severely taxed our cash flow situation. The situation is sort of like the proverbial chicken and the egg. We need money to operate, but we can't charge the people in the systems for services before they receive those services. Therefore, the County Council has elected to use other funds to operate the sewer and water systems until the collections from the users can be made. Obviously, this presents a serious cash flow problem.

Beside sewer and water, the County also faces a problem with continuing a number of construction projects that are on line to begin in the near future, the most important of which is the Emergency Operations Center that will provide new and efficient emergency services for the people of Sussex County. The County intends to sell bonds to pay for this facility; but in order to save the taxpayers' dollars, the County does not intend to sell bonds until after construction costs have been determined through bidding. Obviously, between the time when construction of the project begins and when bond money can be obtained, there will be a need for funds. The raising of the borrowing limit will allow us to pursue this

project as well as the others.

By the way, a bill to correct an oversight in the original Home Rule Bill allowing the County to borrow in anticipation of selling bonds is being prepared to be introduced very shortly.

A third point that should be made concerns the problem of operating the County between the months of July and September when new tax dollars are not available. At the present time, most people pay their taxes in September; but we must operate the County for three months without, basically, any of our tax dollars. The Three Hundred Thousand Dollar (\$300,000.00) limit is not now sufficient even to make payroll for this three month period, let alone pay for such items as electric, office supplies, mileage, etc.

I trust that these three points answer the questions that were raised on Thursday, January 12, 1978 on the floor of the House of Representatives; but, as always, I stand ready to provide you with whatever information you so request.

It is my pleasure this afternoon to present to you and the people of Delaware my budget message for fiscal year 1979, which begins next July first. The budget I am presenting today is unique in two respects: It is the first budget for which my administration is wholly responsible and it is the first budget in ten years which, if enacted as presented, will end the fiscal year in the black with no tax increases. It is an honestly balanced budget which also creates a reserve fund of ten million dollars to protect Delaware's financial health and well-being in the future -- a goal we have all sought for many, many years. A balanced budget; no increase in taxes; a reserve for contingencies -- three of our primary financial goals are achieved in this budget. Credit for having brought our finances to this point belongs to both of us, the legislative and executive branches of government, and to an expanding economy.

Fiscal 1977

When I last addressed the General Assembly a little less than a year ago, Delaware was in the midst of yet another of its chronic fiscal crises. To solve the problem Governor Tribbitt proposed \$58.6 million in tax increases; I had proposed \$40 million in budget cuts and \$24 million in tax increases. In fiscal 1977 together we tightened Delaware's belt; we cut expenditures and enacted and earmarked certain taxes to fund the \$19.2 million deficit which had accumulated over the past three years. Doing what had to be done was not easy but it was accomplished. It was a difficult year for all of us but I think we both can be -- and should be -- proud of our successes.

Fiscal 1978

As a result of our successful actions to finance Delaware's three year deficit, we entered the current year -- fiscal 1978 -- with a clean slate. But we also entered it was a razor-thin margin for error. At the time of the adoption of this year's budget, I believed that there were certain items which were under-funded and which would require additional supplemental appropriations. is proving to be correct. Many of you believed that the revenue estimates of the Delaware Economic and Financial Advisory Council were conservative. That, too, is proving to be correct. of a strengthening economy and our vigorous program to collect back taxes, the Council has increased the base revenue estimate by almost \$15 million over the estimate contained in your joint resolution which passed the House in June. Barring an unforeseen calamity, and with continued restraint by both the executive and legislative branches of our government, this \$15 million increase in revenues should more than cover the need for additional supplemental appropriations, thus producing Delaware's first balanced budget in four years.

Fiscal 1979

The 1979 no-tax budget which I am presenting to you today calls for spending \$518.7 million. Using the current midpoint revenue estimates of the Delaware Economic Advisory Council, this budget would yield a cumulative surplus of about \$10 million by the end of fiscal 1979.

The revenue estimates upon which the budget you have before you is based are the <u>official estimates</u> provided by the Delaware Economic and Financial Advisory Council. Recent events have shown the Council's estimates to be on the conservative side. Personally, I would far prefer a conservative rather than an overly-optimistic one. Candidly, both my financial advisory and I believe that the current estimates might very well be conservative, and, of course, if revenues approach the high end of the DEFAC range, and expenditures remain under control, any surplus could be substantially larger.

But the purpose of the Council is to take revenue estimating out of the political arena and leave it to what I think you all will agree are a great many talented people who work long and hard. The Council contains six members of the General Assembly, including four members of the majority party. In addition, participation by those who are not official members has been encouraged. I would like to encourage all of you who believe you have a contribution to make to estimating revenues or expenditures to use the Advisory Council as a forum. Your advice and counsel will be welcome.

But, a word of caution about counting on surpluses. I cannot emphasize to you too strongly that we <u>must</u> avoid the temptation to spend any surplus which is generated. We cannot continue to spend down to the very last dollar we raise. With no cushion --with no margin for error -- the slightest downturn in the economy or surprise expenditure; or enactment by another state of discriminatory tax legislation, for example, could throw the budget into a deficit position. That would force unnecessary borrowings and put us back onto the familiar path to financial instability.

As you know, there are several proposals currently before the General Assembly to create a constitutionally-mandated reserve fund. The details differ, but the point is the same: Delaware should set aside money today to protect us tomorrow. I strongly support these proposals and so have set aside 2% of estimated revenues, or \$10 million, into a contingency reserve fund. These funds should not be used except in the event of an emergency, and then they should be restored promptly in the following year's budget. I welcome the opportunity to work with the General Assembly on the details of this proposal.

The budget you now have reflects my belief that we should not be seeking more ways to expand the role of the state and increase its intrusion into the lives of all citizens. It is not a Great Society budget. It is, rather, an affordable budget, which seeks to improve upon the delivery of the services we already provide. It is a financial roadmap to get us back to basics and to permanent financial stability.

In terms of the bottom line, the budget I present to you today will require spending of \$37 million more in operating funds than estimated to be expended in the current fiscal year. A large portion of that increase is automatically required by increases in debt service, revenue refunds, and federally mandated welfare costs.

I have recommended that one third of the increase -- \$12 million -- be allocated to employee pay raises to help offset increases in the cost of living. This means that nearly every state employee will receive a pay increase of 6.7% in fiscal 1979. This increase is equal to the increase in the Philadelphia region consumer price index during the last year. However, I believe that should any of the teachers in the New Castle County schools receive increases for "leveling up" of salaries in excess of 6.7%, the state should not grant an additional increase on top of that amount. This is reflected in my budget.

The balance of the \$37 million increase is necessary to meet inflation costs and to provide program improvements in a number of areas.

ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

In this budget, I am placing major emphasis on improvements in the administration of justice. An increase of \$7.7 million will bring the total budget for criminal justice to more than \$50 million. This increase is necessary to meet the high cost of implementing federal court orders concerning our corrections facilities, and will provide adequate funding to continue implementation of my master plan for corrections. It includes funding which could allow for additional personnel in the courts to meet rapidly expanding case loads.

In the Department of Corrections itself, I have recommended a 24% increase in funding. These additional funds will provide personnel necessary for maintaining records accurately, hearing grievances, conducting educational programs, and providing for the classification and treatment of inmates. It will also provide for the continuation of outside contracting for medical care and treatment of inmates.

In the budget for the State Police, I am recommending state funding for the ten troopers assigned to the Traffic Accident Control (TAC) team which is facing the expiration of federal support. I am also recommending that the State Police hire 12 civilians to release a like number of uniformed police for road patrol work. We will continue our evaluation of attrition in the Delaware State Police. We must maintain adequate troop strength to maintain the Delaware State Police as an effective instrument of law enforcement.

EDUCATION

I am recommending an appropriation of \$237.5 million for our education programs in Delaware. This represents 46% of net general fund expenditures.

Five specific initiatives deserve comment:

1. I am recommending in this year's budget an additional \$70,000 for the State Department of Public Instruction to work

with the federal government in improving student assessment and testing in Delaware schools. This will help set up guidelines for the competency based education program that is so critical to the future of education.

- In this year's budget, I am proposing an additional \$50,000 for major new activities to provide adult education, particularly in the southern two counties.
- In the 1979 budget, I am asking for the establishment of the first state supported program for the gifted and the talented. This appropriation will provide demonstration programs within at least five school districts upon which future programs can be built.
- 4. Providing an education for all handicapped individuals is a high priority. Three quarters of a million dollars was provided for the education for the handicapped in 1978, and I recommend an increase in these funds to \$819,000 in 1979.

Finally, I urge that we double the funds available for the

state's school-related youth organizations.

In higher education, I am recommending the establishment of a new state coordinating board at no added cost. This will provide better coordination of our programs, budgets, and overall direction to accomplish Delaware's goals in higher education.

I cannot conclude my remarks on the education budget without raising the issue of a sleeping giant -- the desegregation of New Castle County schools. The federal court decision was not handed down in time for me to include in the budget any realistic estimate of the state's share of desegregation costs. It will still be several weeks before we know what these costs may be. The court order does not make clear which costs will be allocated to the current year, and which to next year. I think it would be precipitous to act on these costs until we have a better analysis of their magnitude, the amount of federal assistance that may be available, and until we have further revenue estimates for both 1978 and 1979. My financial and educational advisors are continuing to develop and refine the potential costs of desegregation to the state and to recommend alternative methods of financing these costs. I ask the General Assembly to join with me in an effort to develop a plan which is equitable to all taxpayers.

MAKING GOVERNMENT WORK -- MANAGEMENT IMPROVEMENTS The budget I am presenting to you today makes a number of recommendations for management improvements to help meet my goal of making government work for all the people of our state:

First, I believe it would be useful to have a computerized on-line legislative information system, which would provide the General Assembly with a rapid, efficient and relatively inexpensive method of tracking the status of legislation. A large number of states have implemented these systems, and they are available to Delaware without the need to invest in development costs. included \$50,000 in this budget as an estimate of the first year's costs.

I am recommending a continuation of the adoption of zerobased budgeting throughout state government. The budget I am presenting to you today reflects the adoption of zero-based budgeting in three departments: State, Natural Resources and Environmental Control, and Community Affairs and Economic Development. Funds to continue zero-based budgeting and to make sorely needed improvements to our accounting, payroll and personnel systems are provided in the 1979 budget.

I am recommending the installation of a <u>modern revenue management system</u> to begin the task of automating state tax administration; the replacement of many of the casual and seasonal employees in the Division of Revenue with full-time employees; and the addition of 29 people to the enforcement and compliance staff. The hard work of the enforcement and compliance personnel of the revenue division, vigorous execution of judgments and filing of tax liens have yielded \$5 million in back tax collections during the past twelve months. But we can do more. The Secretary of Finance has estimated that these additional resources will generate an additional \$1.6 million in revenue and we have, accordingly, added this \$1.6 million to the \$520.3 million revenue estimate of the Advisory Council for a total revenue estimate of \$521.9 million.

I will support a 1978 supplemental appropriation to undertake an independent statewide financial audit which is required by the federal government. If this audit is not promptly undertaken, we stand in danger of jeopardizing federal funding for our many programs. The need to begin is urgent, so I hope the General Assembly will act promptly.

I believe the time has finally come to begin transferring employee salary costs from 20 year bond funds to current operating funds. For a number of years it has been the practice in Delaware to use 20 year borrowed money to pay the salaries and fringe benefits of a large number of employees. This practice has become so costly that now over \$5.5 million of borrowed funds are spent annually to pay employee salaries. The extra cost to the taxpayer is substantial: To pay a dollar in current salary with 20 year bond funds ultimately costs \$1.63. It is costing you, the taxpayer, 63% more to use this method of salary payment. My long-term goal is to transfer all these operating costs back into the operating budget; however, this problem has grown so large that it is not possible to undo in a single year that which has transpired over many years. In fiscal 1979, I would like to begin the first phase of the program.

Another problem concerns the <u>budget epilogue</u>. It is a nightmare of complexities and problems; I believe that the epilogue should contain only those items which are intended to apply to the current year's budget. Provisions intended for both current and <u>future</u> years should be enacted by separate legislation and discussed on their merits. I would like to work with you to review the epilogue and agree upon a separate package of bills covering such long term policy matters.

In my report to the people last Tuesday evening, I spoke of the need to undertake a major economic development effort. At my direction, an overall plan has been prepared and is in the process of being reviewed with local communities and business leaders. The advice of the Delaware Development Council will also be sought

as soon as it is in operation. Following public hearings this spring, we will be prepared to move ahead with our program.

SEPARATION OF POWERS

In recognition of the constitutional separation of powers, and the need to preserve our system of checks and balances, I have departed somewhat from tradition in presenting the budgets of the Judiciary and of the General Assembly, while still fulfilling my obligation to propose a balanced budget. I am, nevertheless, presenting only the bottom line total for each of the Courts and each House of the General Assembly. If you desire, I will make available the analyses used to support my recommendations. But, I do not believe it should be within the purview of the Executive Branch of government to recommend line-item changes in the budget requests of equal branches of government under the constitution.

CAPITAL BUDGET

As you are all aware, legislation introduced by former Governor Tribbitt and passed by the 128th General Assembly limits new bond bill authorizations to 75% of the principal repayments of the previous fiscal year. I have strongly supported this limitation because I believe the state must make firm efforts to control its growing debts -- debts which now consume 17¢ out of every tax dollar expended. My Capital Management Program is designed to lower debt service cost from 17% to 10% of the budget by 1985.

Because of the bleak financial outlook in the first few months of 1977, I did not recommend that the General Assembly enact new bond authorizations. To the contrary, I have recommended that nearly \$20,000,000 in low priority projects be de-authorized in order that we might protect the taxpayers' pocketbooks. I remain sincere in my desire to discuss these recommendations with the leadership and members of the General Assembly.

I am today proposing legislation which meets the test of the existing capital restraints law: \$30.1 million for fiscal year 1978 and \$31.8 million for fiscal year 1979. If enacted, this program will generate approximately \$75 million in federal matching funds. The program calls for a \$3.6 million bond bill which I feel must be acted on immediately in order for us to meet our existing contractual obligations for the new State Office Building, for emergency repairs at Port Mahon and Records Pond, and for successful completion of the maximum security building at Smyrna, the Sussex Correctional Institute and design work on the new multi-purpose facility in New Castle County. I urge members of the General Assembly to consider this an immediate priority.

The balance, \$26,563,000, is being presented as a regular bond bill for Fiscal Year 1978. I am requesting new bond authorizations for Fiscal Year 1979 which, although not eligible for funding until July 1, 1978, are an important part of our Capital Program for the ensuing months.

Let me stress that the recommendations I am making will <u>fully</u> fund all of the needed correctional facilities for the state in our

foreseeable future. I recognize the cost is high, but we can no longer ignore the fact that dangerous criminals are still at large because of rising crime rates and federally mandated limitations on our existing facilities.

Second, let me emphasize that I strongly favor construction of a new Agriculture Science Building at the University of Delaware and improvements to existing campus buildings to comply with Federal OSHA regulations and to better serve the handicapped. However, the statutory borrowing limit simply does not permit us at this time to assume the costs of these investments. I propose, instead, that the University exercise its legal right to issue revenue bonds -- something which other state agencies cannot do -- in order to quickly expedite construction of these facilities.

Third, I should note that the capital budget includes three specific programs of concern to many taxpayers: \$988,000 for watershed and tax ditches; \$250,000 for mosquito control improvements; and \$500,000 for beach erosion control program.

Finally, let me stress that Delaware's existing transportation system needs prompt attention. Our highways and major roads have been heavily damaged by two severe winters. Delaware needs more money to fix the potholes and pavements. Therefore, I am recommending a combined total of more than \$27 million for the transportation improvements, of which \$4.7 million is specifically earmarked for repair, repaving and rehabilitation. If the General Assembly acts favorably on Senate Bill No. 163, which establishes a system to set transportation priorities, much of this money can be used to match for federal dollars to which Delaware is entitled.

Delaware has too long mortgaged its future with twenty year bonds for projects which do not last that long. Therefore, I am recommending that \$17 million of this combined \$62 million authorization be financed with shorter term bonds, saving the state substantial interest over the life of these projects.

CONCLUSION

This is the financial management program I am recommending for 1979. It reflects the priorities and the hopes of my administration for our State and its people. It reaffirms my commitment to keep expenditures within available resources in order to secure and maintain fiscal stability for the State of Delaware without additional taxes. It is a budget of difficult choices because, as you well know, the demand for funds far exceeds the ability of the taxpayers to support such spending.

Over the next few months, as you in the General Assembly review this budget, you, too, will be faced with many difficult decisions. They will require thoughtful attention and they will require discipline. I stand ready, along with the members of my financial staff, to work with you to render whatever assistance you may wish, and to consider other alternatives you may desire.

Together we can build a sound financial base for our State and all its citizens.

There are about six developments surrounding that prison site, Mr. Speaker, and if I were a prisoner escaping, I'd head for the nearest one.

We've had a number of escapes from the Smyrna Prison, and I don't care what anybody says, as long as there are prisons, there will be escapes.

When a prisoner escapes, it's a lot easier to find him in open ground, such as farmland, than it is in a highly dense urban area, which is what we will have if this prison is build back of Farnhurst.

Now if a prisoner escapes from this prison, he can go into Farmcrest, Manor Park, Leedham Estates, Wilmington Manor, Minquadale, Chelsea, or any of the businesses up and down Route 13. There are a lot of people near this prison site, Mr. Speaker, and finding a prisoner among them is like trying to pull a needle out of a haystack. What happens if someone escapes? Are we going to start having door-to-door

searches in all these developments? How is anyone who owns a house in any of these developments going to get a fair price if they try to sell their homes, with prospective buyers -- if there are any -- knowing there's a prison down the street?

There's some other problems too, with this site. For one thing, it's under water. It's a swamp, Mr. Speaker, and it costs a lot of money just to get the ground level enough to build on.

And there's no access to this land except by Interstate 95, and that means building an expensive interchange just to get into the place.

Which brings me to another escape idea: If I were a prisoner, I'd stop the first car I could on 95 and presto, I'm on my way.

The other thing about this, Mr. Speaker, is that this is just another idea of the knee-jerk liberals from Greenville trying to use New Castle as the State's dumping ground. We've already got four dumps, Mr. Speaker, and we need this one like we need a hole in the head. Why don't we build this new prison up in Brandywine Hundred, Mr. Speaker, or Greenville? Or better yet, we've got 232 acres of Open Space Called the du Pont Estate which the State already owns.

Starvation. A word that conjures up pictures of emaciated children in India, on the other side of the earth from comfortable Delaware homes.

"That's a false notion," says Jean H. Colon, coordinator of the newly formed Human Rights Organization for Kent and Sussex counties. "People are starving right here, in all of Delaware's counties."

"I know people personally who have to go without electricity because they can't afford it," she adds. "Sometimes they have to go without heat."

Mrs. Colon is trying to formally incorporate the human rights group and expand it into a large organization to lobby for more state and federal funds for poor. Yesterday, the group met in a Milford church to explain the organization's goals. About 60 people showed up.

"When a speaker asked why they'd all come," Mrs. Colon said, "a lot of them stood up and said they were shocked to hear that people are starving right here. They couldn't believe people were starving in Kent and Sussex Counties."

I advertised the meeting by saying that people were starving and then wondered if I was really exaggerating," she added. "But social workers who came told me I'm not at all."

Census figures for 1976 indicate that total income for each Delaware resident averaged \$7,030, one of the highest rates in the country. But higher incomes in New Castle County suburbs raise the average.

Part of her group's purpose, Mrs. Colon said, is to push for passage of a bill sponsored by state Representative Al O. Plant, D-Wilmington. The bill would award \$50 monthly to unemployed people between 18 and 54 whenever the unemployment rate rose above 5 percent, Mrs. Colon said. The Delaware unemployment rate was gauged at 6.7 percent in November.

The money would come from general assistance funds, she said. Currently, she said, "able-bodied" individuals between

those ages can't receive general assistance benefits.

Mary Cuyjets, regional director of Catholic Social Services, spoke at the meeting about inadequate nutrition, Mrs. Colon said, and charged that the state government hasn't allocated sufficient funds to help the poor.

"Even the \$50 a month would help a lot of people," Mrs. Colon said. "It's not very much, but it's better than

starving."

The group hopes to push for Plant's bill and other legislation in telephone and letter campaigns, she said.

"We want to build this into a vast organization (and) pool all our resources," she said. ". . . And we want to have a prayer committee to pray for help for the poor and for human rights. This is a spiritual thing we're doing."

Three Harmful Bills

When there was time for the General Assembly to take effective action on school desegregation, the legislators wouldn't act.

When the Senate finally acted last week, the timing was so bad as to make it doubtful that the action would be effective or equitable.

What the Senate worked on late into Thursday night, and what the House will be considering when it reconvenes tomorrow, are three bills that would undo much of the desegregation planning that has been going on earnestly since January 9, when U.S. District Judge Murray Schwartz issued the "final" remedy order. If the House enacts the bills that the senators passed, and if the governor signs them, most people in New Castle County will once again not know what kind of school system awaits them this fall. The era of confusion, uncertainty and court hearings would be prolonged.

The first of the three bills, <u>SB 456</u>, would give the state Board of Education authority to reorganize school districts. The assumption is that the state board would then divide into four parts the single school district that has been created by court order.

The four districts would probably run very much along the same lines as the four attendance areas that are now part of the organizational plan of the single district. The difference would be that there would be four independent districts, each with its own elected school board, its own administration, budget and tax rate. The reorganizers' argument is that this would permit more direct local input into school affairs, a point that we question since parents' councils can exert as much influence on the running of their area schools as they can put pressure on a school board.

But the crucial problem is really not whether there be one autonomous district or four. Either system might work satisfactorily.

The heart of the number-of-districts question lies in the next Senate bill, <u>SB 457</u>, which sets up formulas for arriving at the operating tax rates. Calculations pursuant to these formulas make it clear that once again there would be gross

economic inequality in New Castle County education if there are four districts instead of one.

Figures supplied by the finance director of the Department of Public Instruction show that the total (operating and bonded indebtedness) tax rate for Newark and a part of Wilmington would come to \$2.10 per \$100 of assessed valuation, while another district that would include a part of Wilmington, Alexis I. du Pont, Stanton, Conrad and Marshallton-McKean would be levying only at a \$1.68 rate.

The differences in economic base that have been plaguing New Castle County's present 11 districts would be perpetuated. Different districts would levy different tax rates and would also spend different sums of money on the education of their students.

Senator Francis J. Kearns, D-New Castle, pointed out the troubles inherent in the four-district formula, when he said on the Senate floor, ". . . I think everybody should be paying the same thing . . . every child should have the same number of dollars spent on him and her."

To put the tax matter in perspective, the figure reportedly under consideration by the New Castle County Planning Board of Education, which is working on the single district plan ordered by the court, is \$1.97 for the next school year, well below the \$2.23 ceiling set by the court.

Finally, there is <u>SB 459</u>, which says that after the contracts of the administrators in the reorganized districts expire, the state will not be responsible for the state share of these contracts.

SB 459 recognizes that the existing contracts, extending for two or three years, cannot be broken. But the bill's authors worry about the future. That seems premature. Judgments about administrative pay in the district (or districts) will have to be made after reorganization when the schools are operating. Besides, in the future, the administrative needs of the reorganized area should be handled the same way as any other district in the state. There is no need for this law.

These three bills, then, are misguided, from a substantive point of view. They would also subject everybody in New Castle County to further confusion and trips to court, as the relationship of these legislative acts to the court order is examined.

We have said it before. We shall say it again: The people in New Castle County have been given more time than any other jurisdiction to go about the integrating process in an orderly manner. That process is now well under way. To halt the organizational work now, to go back to court, and then to start on a new organizational tack or even return to the present one can only lead to less preparation and less satisfactory integration.

Representative Plant requested that the following memorandum be read into the record:

TO: Members of the State House of Representatives FROM: Representative Al O. Plant

The three Bills as drawn are calculated to delay the reassignment of pupils. They creats four new state agencies in New Castle County who would then be defenders, each with their own new set of lawyers while maintaining the existing districts and their lawyers for purposes of the case and appeal. It would call for four new plans of desegregation with new people, new boards, having to start over in the planning process, which shall no doubt lead to new requests for delays and new fights in the courtroom.

This Bill and the planned reorganization which will inevitably follow makes good the threat of reprisal against those people who brought the lawsuit; namely, Wilmington children and their parents. The Wilmington District will be dismembered, just as it was threatened by the State Board representatives. It creates uncertainty; makes an equitable plan of desegregation more difficult, and will result in added burdens for black students. The desire for racial preference for whites at the expense of black children and coming at this late date clearly expresses an intention to obstruct the desegregation of schools.

The legislation violates Delaware Law in that it reorganizes only part of the school districts of the state and it unlawfully delegates legislative power to a new, untried and unknown commission. Race is the reason for these Bills and retaliation and dismemberment are their secondary goals.

RE: HB 677

I am returning without my signature House Bill 677 entitled: "AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 9, TITLE 29, RELATING TO THE PRINTING OF SESSION LAWS."

I am doing so for the following reasons:

- 1. The subject bill eliminates the current requirement of Delaware Code Section 906 that the home rule charters and amendments thereto of municipalities adopted pursuant to referendum be printed in volume form. I am advised that these important enactments are not available in any other compendium.
- 2. The bill removes the requirement that all executive orders and proclamations of the Governor be printed and requires only those "deemed to be of permanent interest" to be printed. While I realize the need to eliminate unnecessary paperwork in government, I believe that it is difficult today to determine what may or may not be of permanent interest to Delawareans fifty or one hundred years from now. The Director of Historical and Cultural Affairs agrees. I believe that all executive orders and proclamations should be printed and preserved in our archives for the potential benefit of future generations.
- 3. Article III, Section 10 of the Delaware Constitution designates the Secretary of State as the keeper of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor and the current provisions of 29 Delaware Code, Section 906(a), consistent with Article III, require the Office of the Secretary of State to carefully preserve the original of such acts and proceedings. HB 677 removes the provision that the Director of the Division of Historical and Cultural Affairs in the Department of State "carefully preserve originals" and only directs the Director of Research of Legislative Council to "convey" to the Division "any originals in his possession". It further removes the constitutional responsibility as the keeper of official acts and proceedings from the Secretary of State pursuant to Article III and places it in the Director of

Research of Legislative Council, at least until the end of each session. I do not believe that such shifts in responsibility are in keeping with the intent of Article III of the Constitution.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning HB 677 to you without my signature but would welcome the opportunity to work with you to eliminate the problems of concern in the current statute. I have so advised the bill's sponsors as well.

To the House of Representatives of the 129th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

Pursuant to my authority under Article III, Section 18, of the Delaware Constitution, I am returning without my signature HB 583, entitled:

"AN ACT TO ADD A CHAPTER TO TITLE 30, DELAWARE CODE, RELATING TO THE LEVY, COLLECTION AND PAYMENT OF A TAX TO BE KNOWN AS THE COMMUTER TRANSPORTATION TAX ACT."

HB 583 was adopted by the Delaware General Assembly, with my full support, as a contingency measure in the event the "Commuter Transportation Tax Act" passed by the New Jersey General Assembly became law. That legislation, Assembly Bill No. 2426, would have taxed the income of Delaware residents who work in New Jersey at the same rate the State taxes the income of New Jersey residents who work in Delaware. Since Delaware residents are entitled to credit against their Delaware income tax for taxes paid to other states, the New Jersey legislation would have resulted in a significant loss of revenue for Delaware. HB 583 was designed to offset any such loss by imposing a similar commuter tax on New Jersey residents employed in Delaware.

However, I have learned that Governor Byrne of New Jersey has not signed Assembly Bill 2426, with the result that that legislation will not be implemented. Accordingly, HB 583 is not presently needed to deal with possible loss of revenue, and I am therefore returning it without my signature.

On March 21, 1978, I received House Joint Resolution No. 48, entitled:

"Requesting the Delaware Congressional Delegation to Work for Relocation of the Dover Classification Yard to Delmar."

I am certainly in favor of having the Conrail classification yard removed from the present Dover site due to the aggravating noise levels and the potential safety threat of hazardous cargo. Further, I am sensitive to the desire of Delmar to have the Conrail operations returned to that town and would certainly urge the Congressional delegation to pursue vigorously any possibility of having Delmar selected as the new location.

However, HJR 48 directs the Congressional delegation to work against locating the operations at any other site. In the interest of providing the Delmarva peninsula with the best possible rail service, I believe we should not, as a matter of state policy, foreclose other potential locations in the area. Because the policy enunciated by HJR 48 would diminish our options and possibly foreclose the most feasible and economic solution to the present problem, I am returning it without my signature.

We have recently discovered that we have underpaid two of our employees for the 1976-1977 school year. We are therefore requesting that you assist us by introducing legislation which will provide the necessary funds to pay the state share of salaries and fringe benefits which are due them.

The two individuals and the amount of state funds required are shown below.

SALLY A. HIGGINS - A ten-month Guidance Counselor at Seaford Senior High School was inadvertently paid on the basis of a Master's degree instead of a M+30. The differences in salary and related costs are: \$811.40 SALARY; \$49,09 F.I.C.A. and \$94.12 PENSION - a total of \$954.61.

INA J. UPSHUR - A ten-month teacher/coordinator of Special Education in the district. Ina was inadvertently paid on the basis of a Bachelor's degree instead of a B+30. The differences in salary and related costs are: \$807.50 SALARY; \$48.85 F.I.C.A. and \$93.67 PENSION - a total of \$950.02.

In summary, the total amount of state funds needed is \$1,904.63.

To our knowledge, this is the only instance of such an error ever having occurred in the Seaford School District.

We have already revised our procedures, and we believe the change will preclude a reoccurrence of this type of problem.

Your assistance with this matter will be very much appreciated.

Please refer to my letter to the Mayor and City Council of the City of New Castle dated February 3, 1978 regarding the status of the replacement of Third Street Bridge No. 289 over Broad Dyke. Bridge 289 at Third Street and Bridge 290 at Sixth and Chestnut Streets both span Broad Dyke and constitute the only northerly access from the City to New Castle Avenue.

With Bridge 289 closed to traffic for replacement, the community is forced to rely exclusively on the integrity of Bridge 290 for access for emergency (fire and ambulatory) services. School buses, DART, DAST, and the general public would be forced to detour to U.S. 13 and Route 141.

Bridge #1-290-378 is a two span I-beam bridge, encased with concrete, carrying Sixth Street, New Castle over Broad Dyke. The bridge was built in 1921 with unreinforced concrete abutments and wingwalls on timber piling. The structure is 43'-6" long and 24'-0" curb to curb (26'-8" out to out) with a 4'-0" footwalk which was added to the West Side at a later date.

The bridge is 56 years old and is showing evidence of deterioration. The concrete beam encasement has spalled from the beams. The sidewalk has deteriorated.

The abutments have cracked and are pushed out of line. The approach roadways have settled repeatedly causing a bump in the roadway surface at the bridge abutments. The north abutment is worse than the south, and in the past four (4) years a vertical crack in the abutment has opened up from two (2) inches to six (6) inches. The crack has resulted in the undermining of the approach roadway and the erosion of fill behind the abutment. Corrective measures of sealing the crack with concrete have not been successful, as undermining and erosion of the approach roadways continues. The south abutment has a vertical crack two (2) inches wide at the west side wingwall which also permits the erosion of the fill behind the abutment. The center concrete pier has deteriorated at the water line.

In October of 1974, the traffic count over this structure was 12,526 vehicles per day.

In 1975 due to the pushing of the abutment walls and the

deterioration of the old structure which was not designed for present loads, the loads across the structure were restricted to 10 tons.

In 1976 from data submitted to the FHWA, this structure was considered to be functionally obsolete on the national bridge inventory and when revisions to the inventory are submitted later this year, this structure will also be structurally deficient.

On our current list of replacement of structures prepared on a statewide basis for all structures, this structure is listed in the top ten and has been given a high priority.

North District maintenance forces have been asked to fill the abutment cracks with concrete as a temporary repair to prevent further roadway settlement and to secure the abutment to prevent further abutment separation. This work should start this Spring.

Funding for preliminary engineering in the amount of \$10,000 has been requested in the Bond Bill for fiscal 78 and funding for construction has been requested for fiscal 79. It is extremely important that Bridge 289 be replaced immediately to place it back in service for City access and for utilization as a detour when Bridge 290 is replaced. Preliminary engineering funding for Bridge 290 replacement design should be approved this fiscal year for subsequent construction to insure unimpeded traffic on Route 9.

Dear Ernie:

We have been requested to determine the cost impact of House Bill 610 which would amend the State Pension Law to increase the mandatory retirement age from 65 to 70.

In theory, increasing the mandatory retirement age results in net savings to the Plan. A later mandatory retirement age produces a smaller liability to the Plan (even taking into account larger pension benefits due to longer service and additional salary increases) than an earlier mandatory retirement age.

In practice, however, the cost impact of increasing the mandatory retirement age may have no effect on long-term costs if it does not actually alter the average age at which employees actually retire. For example, in the State Plan the impact of a mandatory retirement age is diluted by the effect of the liberal early retirement provisions. Increasing the mandatory retirement age will probably not affect the average age at retirement which is presently under age 65.

Consequently, if increasing the mandatory retirement age does not alter current retirement patterns, House Bill 610

will have no cost impact. If, on the other hand, increasing the mandatory retirement age encourgages employees to postpone retirement, then there will be a small net savings to the Plan.

However, if the main intention of the bill is to harmonize State law with the new requirements established by the recent amendments to the Federal Age Discrimination in Employment Act (Public Law 93-259), then I would recommend that the bill be referred to the Attorney General's Office for further refinement. The Federal Act applies to State and local governments. The operative portion of the statute reads as follows:

"Section 4(f). It shall not be unlawful for an employer . . . (2) to observe the terms of a bonifide . . . retirement, pension, or insurance plan, . . . except that no such employee benefit plan . . . shall require or permit the involuntary retirement of any individual specified by Section 12(a) of this Act because of age of such individual . . ."

The application of the Federal Act is limited to individuals who are at least 40 years of age but less than 70 years of age, and does not apply to elected officials, tenured University personnel and employees in high policy-making positions. This would appear to exclude the option of the employing agency to retire an employee after age 65 without his or her consent provided for in House Bill 610.

On April 27, 1978, I received <u>House Bill 749</u> entitled: An Act to Amend Subchapter I, Chapter 11, Title 24, Delaware Code, Relating to a Peer Review Immunity Provision for Persons Reviewing Dental Records, Dental Care and Dentist's Work.

I am returning House Bill 749 without my signature for the following reasons:

House Bill 749 provides immunity for persons serving on committees which review dental work and dental care. The bill provides that such persons shall not be subject to law suits, claims or other civil recourse except where a reviewer acted in bad faith or with malice. To permit suits where there has been bad faith or malice serves to assure that the review function is not in any way abused.

However, subsection (b) in the bill effectively nullifies this limited base for suit by providing that no records of the review committee may be subject to court subpoena or discovery, and that no person attending a review committee session may be requested to testify as to what transpired. Without such records or testimony, it would be virtually impossible to establish bad faith or malice. Thus, this provision of the bill establishes an immunity which was not intended.

Also, the title and body of the bill purport to amend Subchapter I, Chapter 11, Title 24, Delaware Code; the proper reference should be Subchapter II of said Chapter.

Dear Gerry:

I understand that you do not intend to lift House Joint Resolution 57 from the table since actions taken by the Newark School District make the purpose of the resolution unnecessary. Let me reassure you that the records of all students in the Newark School District who were suspended in connection with the walkouts and demonstrations on March 23, will be expunged of any reference to disciplinary action taken with respect to that incident. Disciplinary records are always removed from pupil files on graduation and no reference is made to disciplinary actions in any references to colleges or prospective employers. Most schools remove disciplinary records at the end of the school year. In this particular case, we have assured parents that such records will be removed before the end of this school year. Any parent who wants to reassure himself that the record has been cleared has the right, both under Newark School District policy and under the Family Rights and Privacy Act, to inspect the student's records.

I believe that the position of the Newark School District with respect to records satisfies the concerns represented by your resolution, and I believe your decision to leave the resolution on the table under those circumstances is a good one.

Dear Representative Gilligan:

I regret that I could not get back with you sooner in reference to the veteran's attitude regarding the celebration of Memorial Day; I have however contacted representatives of practically all of the organizations in Delaware.

Veteran's Day was originally designated to be observed on May 30 and following the Civil War General John Logan issued a General Order so establishing this date on May 30, 1868.

In recent years, certain individuals have deviated from the established date of May 30 and have observed this sacred day on the last Monday in the month in order to create a long three-day weekend.

At the insistence and upon request of the veterans in Delaware our Legislature did see fit to re-establish May 30 as the official day of Memorial - we are grateful to our elected officials for this action, which, I might add, was also legislated in practically all States. The Federal Government also passed legislation officially declaring May 30 as the proper date of observance, this to be effective in 1979 since some calendar companies had printed their calendars two years in advance.

Now we are told that there are those who would like to revert back to the long three-day weekend by declaring Memorial Day as the last Monday in May - this in our opinion is being done for personal reasons alone and not for what is considered to be right. Memorial Day was never meant for a day of vacation or fun, it was meant to be a sacred day of mourning, of reverence to those who had given their last full measure of life, and as a fitting reminder of our war dead.

You ask "who would attend our Memorial Services if the 30th of May came on a Tuesday?" I ask "who would attend our services on Monday if the day was a holiday and people were enjoying a three-day weekend. Those individuals who care to attend the services will attend no matter what the day?"

This is America's day - it should be a day when a grateful nation mourns for those who gave their lives to keep America free; we should not sacrifice this sacred day for a day of fun and self pleasure.

This is my opinion about the matter and I might add that it is the feeling of the vast majority who served our Nation in time of war. We are grateful to you for your splendid cooperation with us and we trust that you will understand and support our position.

As provided by Article III, Section 18 of the Delaware Constitution, I am returning without my signature House Bill 506 which is entitled "An Act to Amend Chapter 59, Title 29, Section 5949, Delaware Code Relating to Appeals", and which I received on May 4. I am doing so for the following reasons:

- 1. The bill substantially weakens the remedy which subsection (d) of Section 5949, Title 29, Delaware Code, now mandates must occur when the State Personnel Commission finds that an agency's action was taken "for any political, religious, or racial reason." The present provision directs that where such a determination is made, the employee "shall be reinstated to his former position or a position of like status and pay without loss of pay for the period of suspension", and marks a significant commitment by the State to its policy of non-discrimination in employment. House Bill 506 would simply eliminate this provision altogether and consequently dilute the power of the State to deal with such instances of discrimination.
- 2. House Bill 506 would also alter the authority which has traditionally reposed in the State Personnel Commission. The Commission's function in appeals brought pursuant to Section 5949 of Title 29, Delaware Code has been limited to determining whether there is an adequate factual basis for a suspension, demotion or dismissal of an employee by the State agency. House Bill 506 marks a substantial departure from that traditional role by permitting the Commission also to substitute its own penalty or disciplinary action for that imposed by the agency.

Such authority to alter or modify the discipline imposed by the agency supersedes the usual function of a state commission, or even a court, in appeals from state agencies. For instance, the State's Administrative Procedure Act directs that the court's review of agency action "shall be limited to the determination of whether the agency's decision was supported by substantial evidence on the record before the agency."

3. Finally, it is not clear whether the power which House Bill 506 would vest in the Commission to modify the agency's action applies only in cases of dismissal, demotion or suspension. The Synopsis indicates this is the intent of the legislation, but neither the body of the bill, nor the language of the present Section 5949 (d) clearly limits the Commission's authority to such cases. If the bill's language were interpreted to permit the Commission to modify other, more minor agency actions, it would mark a serious intrusion on the managerial authority and responsibilities of state agencies.

For these reasons, I am returning House Bill 506 without my signature.

I am returning to the House of Representatives <u>House Bill</u> No. 440 entitled:

"An Act Directing the Transfer of Oak Grove School Site of East Dover Hundred, Kent County, Delaware, to J. Ward Hurley and Mildred J. Hurley".

I am doing so for the following reasons:

House Bill No. 440 directs the Secretary of State to execute a deed transferring the State's interest in the Oak Grove School site to private individuals who claim to have been in possession of the tract since 1955.

In recent years the policy of the State has been to

transfer similar school sites to charitable and non-profit organizations such as community associations for a nominal consideration. However, to my knowledge, this would be the first time that the State is giving such school property to a private individual without any compensation. I believe it would be an unwise precedent for the State to depart from its normal practice.

I am, therefore, returning House Bill 440 without my signature.
