# Council Approves Annexation Air Pollution Study Of 7.277 Acres South of City Offered In State

Plat For 33 Town Houses Approved With RA, Business B Zoning In Annexation Of Hearn Tract; \$5,000 Requested For Senior Citizens; Municipal Golf Study Authorized

The size of the City of Newark was increased by 7.277acres last Monday night with council passage of an ordinance annexing the tract owned by Hearn Bros., Inc., between East Chestnut Hill Road and the Joseph M. McVey Elementary School, east of South College Avenue.

A portion of the property was zoned RA for construction of 33 dwelling units, and the remainder zoned Business B.

In unanimous 5-0 vote for annexation and zoning with Councilmen Davis H. Doehlert and Olan R. Thomas absent—Thomas later appeared after the fire siren had all but drowned out City Secretary Charles D. Long's reading of the ordinance—council passed a resolution approving a plat of 33 town houses to be constructed with additional prevision of four additional parking spaces.

Councilman Fred Wakefield urged that the city appropriate \$5,000 to renovate the municipal property on East Main Street provided for the senior citizens group sponsored by the Newark Soroptimist Club.

Wakefield said that some 100 senior
citizens who had resided in the city
for "50 years or more had never
asked for anything before. I think
the time has come to think of our
senior citizens," he continued, appealing for an appropriation for this
group.

City Condemnation

Proceedings Begin

With Polluted Crop Loss

Air pollution may become an increasinly serious problem for Delaware farmers, according to Dr. John W. Heuberger, chairman of the department of plant pathology at the University of Delaware.

The continually growing number of automobiles and trucks as the nation becomes more urbanized, has increased the severity of the air pollution problem for farmers as well as city dwellers, Heuberger pointed out.

Crop losses because of air pollution along the eastern seaboard have been estimated at more than \$18-million each year, and in Delaware some of the damage occasionally has been so severe that entire fields of tspinach and other crops have had to be discarded.

Cling the change many Delaware farmers have made from growing a diversity of crops to specializing in one or two crops, Heuberger points out that damage from air pollution could be devastating to the individual farmer. Some crops are more susceptible than others to air pollu-

Equipment Offer Benefits In Federal Income Taxes

Investment credit is the biggest ax break that business, manufacurers, and farmers have had in reent years, according to W. T. McIllister, farm management specialist the University of Delaware. Investment credit is designed to neourage businesses to make larger avestment in depreciable machinery nd equipment and thereby to boliet the economy.

er the economy.

Tax benefits which investment redit provides apply just as much of farming as to any other type of

laws, many farmers have overlooked its benefits.

McAllister explains these benefits by the illustration of one farmer who ownes \$650 income tax and a second farmer who ownes \$650 income tax and a second farmer who ownes \$650 income tax and a second tractor in 1965 for \$5,000. He determines that the tractor will be useful for eight years. He figures the investment credit is \$350—seven per cent of the purchase price. There are a number of rules that apply to investment credit, McAllster says. County agricultural agents have copies of the 1966 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide in which all rules are explained.

There are a few general rules. McAllister says.

Credit can be taken for purchases of depreciable machinery and equipment and certain real property such as fences, storage facilities, orchards, vineyard and asparagus plantings. Investment credit can be taken on the purchase of new or used equipment. It must have a life of at least four years—and a life of at least four years—and a life of at least four years—and a life of at least fight years to get the full seven per cent credit.

Investment credit can be taken only once and in the year the item purchased was available for use.

Some Delaware farmers may find it advantageous to make a last minute purchase in 1985 of machinery they will need in 1986. McAllister notes, In this way the 1985 tax obligation can be reduced. If they elect to do this they must buy, pay for the item and take delivery before the end of the year.

If the farmer waits and makes the purchase in 1966 he will get the same benefits to apply against 1966 income tax.



Financing of the hospital insurance program has been kept separate from that of the already existing Social Security program. This was done by establishing a separate contribution schedule with funds raised going into a separate trust fund.

Employees, employers, and self-employed people will all pay the same rate for the hospital insurance program. Initially, starting in 1966,



Major air pollutants causing plant damage include acid gases such as chlorine. fluorine and surfur diox-ide, and hydrocarbons or oxidants such as ozone, PAN and ethylene. Heuber said ozone is one of the prime causes of plant damage in this area, although other chemicals contribute to the problem.

Spinach, tobacco, cultivated dock, annual bluegrass and pine are especially sensitive to ozone and some of these will be used as "indicator" plants in the study. Snapdragons and carnations can be used to determine the presence of ethylene in the air, while tomatoes and alfalfa help detect surfur dioxide.

Petunias, spinach, lamb's quarter and cultivated dock show damage caused by peroxyacyl nitrate, or PAN, a photo-oxidant, while fluor-

PAN, a photo-oxidant, while fluoride damage is particularly noticeable on grapes and peaches.

In addition to showing pollution damage from specific chemicals, plants are more susceptible to damage at particular times during their growth. Plantings will be made at various intervals to give a further indication of the type of pollutants present in the air at various times of the year.
