Newark businessman crafts poetry to honor heroes

An entrepreneur, retired engineer and former Golden Gloves boxer, Newark businessman James Manniso surprises, somewhat, when he speaks on one of his many other talents: writing poetry.

Through his Newark-based business, Prints of Poetry, Manniso sells poems he has written in tribute to the veterans of the Vietnam War, the men and women who serve in America's Armed Forces and firefighters that risk their lives, everyday, in their own communities.

The poems appear on colorful, commemorative posters, just below a painting by a professional artist that depicts the scene. The posters can be framed and dedicated to a particular serviceman or woman with the addition of a gold plaque.

Manniso said he began reading poetry as a teepager, but it wasn't something he showed off. "Because when you grow up in South Philadelphia, you do not want anyone to know that you're reading poetry. Even though I was a boxer, I didn't need anymore fights," he said.

District has tight timeline for NSA plan

elli Racca, Christina District's supervisor of facilities services, told the school board on Tuesday night that they need all the help they can get to develop a Neighborhood Schools plan that meets the mandate of the General Assembly. "We have to use the capacity in buildings we have," Racca said. "We need the public's help to decide what we can do, or where to fight for a hardship exemption."

School superintendent Lillian Lowery

School superintendent Lillian Lowery echoed the challenge. "We've got to put out a plan that is compliant with the Neighborhood Schools Act and our existing buildings."

The administrators' remarks came during a board workshop to prepare

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Trap closes, auction planned



Thompson family ran popular Newark restaurant for 25 vears

ith little fanfare, the Trap seafood restaurant on Elkton Road closed its doors earlier this month. A sign in front of the building advertises a public auction to be held in July for a sale of items

The Trap opened as the Crab Trap in 1982, owned by Paul Thompson and his family. It started out in the back room of the High's Dairy outlet, and the facility grew as the business did.

Thompson and his family ran the business for 25 years. The restaurant catered to a mix of residents, from college professors to retirees, construction workers to professionals, and the many regulars that came in, some more than once a week.

In an interview last February, Thompson posited that customers were drawn to the familiarity of the Trap. "They keep coming back.... They're comfortable with it. It's not new and modern and brassy," he said then.

But the facility was due an update, and, in recent years, Paul Thompson's son, Tim, took on the project.

Last year, Newark's City Council approved Tim

Thompson's proposal to revamp the corner with new retail space and apartments. The first phase of the project – to build two brick buildings with eight town-houses each behind the Trap restaurant – has been completed. Tenants began moving in earlier this month.

The second phase of the project requires the demolition of the restaurant and a small office building on the site. Thompson said demolition should occur sometime this summer with construction starting by early fall on a new, J-shaped building that will front Elkton Road and Amstel Avenue. This building will have retail space on the first floor and six, upper-level apartments.

Thompson said closing the restaurant his family ran for 25 years was somewhat emotional, but he "crossed that bridge," he said, during the design and approval process.

The real emotional thing, I

think, happened a year and a half ago when we got the project approved. I knew then what we were doing was a reality," he said. "Now, this is kind of the denouement.'

The closing, he said, was tougher on his father. "I guess the finality of it didn't hit him until the business closed," said Thompson.

Some of the Trap will live on, and longtime customers will have a chance at owning a piece of memorabilia. Nearly everything in the restaurant, including large kitchen equipment, tables, chairs, even the paintings that hung on the walls, will be up for auction on Monday, July 9, from noon to 4 p.m. and Tuesday, July 10, starting at 10 a.m.

Country Club review moved to August

Planning Director Roy Lopata said Monday the Newark Planning Commission may begin its review of the proposed residential development of the Newark Country Club property earlier than anticipated.
"It looks like the process

may start at the August planning commission meeting. At least that's our tentative plan at this point," he said.

Last week, Lopata said the review would start in September "at the earliest." However, because the internal review went

At this point, said Lopata, it looks like the project will be reviewed by the planning commission at its Tuesday, Aug. 7, meeting. The meeting starts at 7:30 p.m., in council chambers.

Developers have submitted plans to build 268 single-family homes on the property along West Main Street. The project is to be known as "Country Club

Changes at Newark post offices

Barksdale Road condos get OK

Council approves Main Street project,

wo development projects got the OK at a meeting of Newark's City Council on Monday night.

With 7 to 0 votes, council approved a proposal to build 12 townhouse condominiums at a 1.16-acre property at 711 Barksdale Road and one to build a 2,400-square-foot mixed-use building at 209 E. Main Street.

Matt Longo of Hillcrest Associates said the Barksdale Road project, known as "Sutton will be marketed "to adult buyers and professionals that would like to live close to downtown." Owner Ed Sobolewski said prices for the 2,000-square-foot units with two-car garages would start at \$350,000.

The project stipulates that no more than two unrelated tenants will be able to live in each townhouse, an effort to prevent the development from turning into student rentals.

Planning Director Roy Lopata said the restriction has

been effective in other developments. "We're not interested in increasing the rental market in this area," he told council.

Most discussion on the

project centered on a fence that will separate the property from the CSX right-of-way. The back of the property born ders the railroad tracks; town-houses will be built 100 to 280 feet away from those tracks.

Though the city's planning

commission recommended a masonry wall, city council voted, instead, to require the developer to install a chain link fence after the developer argued that the masonry wall could cause problems with stormwater runoff and graffiti.

Longo described the townhouse architecture as English Tudor-style and said the project "will be very pleasant look-ing from Barksdale Road."

With little discussion, council approved a request by Gahunia LLC to build a 2,400square foot brick building with three, two-story apartments in the now-vacant lot at 209 E. Main Street.

The property, said attorney Mark Sisk, is owned by Dr. Narinder Singh, a physician who has practiced in Newark for 30 years. The new building, known as "Bela Place," will be used for residential and commercial purposes.

State awards more than \$133,000 in Merit Scholarships

Students from the Christina, Red Clay, and Colonial school districts, as well as the Delaware Military Academy and St. Mark's High School, were among high school seniors receiving more than \$133,000 in 2007 Merit Scholarships from the state of Delaware.

The Delaware Higher Education Commission (DHEC) announced the recipients of state Merit Scholarships for the 2007-08 academic year. There are no gifts exchanged or egg hunts. Flowers are not given and nobody dresses up. You don't see it advertised in the mall months beforehand.

This holiday lacks the cost and the hustle and bustle

The Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Newark supports the passage of Senate Bill 141 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. We urge the Insurance & Elections Committee to release the bill from committee quickly for full consideration.

In 2006, our church, with more than 200 members and which has recently enjoyed our 50th anniversary in Newark, voted to take a stand to oppose discrimination based on sexual orientation in all its forms. Because we value the inherent worth and dignity of every person, we are

The quality of the students that have entered the school has increased steadily during Roselle's presidency as well. It's become a more difficult college to get into, which raises its stature nationally.

At the same time, however, there is more opportunity to get a UD degree for in-state students. With the SEED program and the affiliation with Delaware Tech, more Delaware

high school students have the chance for a higher education.

Fans of the university's athletic programs have seen progress as well.

The football team won the NCAA I-AA national championship in 2003 and the men's and women's basketball teams have been to their respective NCAA tournaments. The men's lacrosse team went to the Final Four this year and the baseball team has made several appearances in the NCAA Tournament.

The entire athletic program has been upgraded by moving from the America East to the Colonial Athletic Association. In turn, the scholarship support has increased from \$1.3 million in 1990 to more than \$6 million today.

Of course it would be impossible to talk about Roselle without mentioning his incredible ability to raise money for the university. Whether it's the cap-

ital campaign, which blew past its original goal of \$225 million (to more than \$450 million) or the quadrupling of the endowment, it's all been a benefit to the university.

Barbecuing food safely

h... the warm days of summer. Perfect for cooking outdoors with family and friends. As it heats up outside, it's important to pay close attention to how you handle your barbecued foods. Following food safety guidelines to prevent harmful bacteria from multiplying and causing foodborne illness will help keep family barbequing a fun activity that's healthful too.

If you're using meat that has been frozen, you'll want

to completely thaw before grilling so it cooks more evenly. Use the refrigerator for slow, safe thawing or thaw sealed

packages in cold water. You can microwave defrost if the food will be placed immediately

on the grill. If using a marinade, marinate food in the refrigerator, not on the counter. Poultry and cubed meat or stew meat can be marinated up to two days. Beef, veal, pork, and lamb roasts, chops and steaks may be marinated up to five days. If some of the marinade is to be used as a sauce on the cooked food, reserve a portion before putting raw meat and poultry in it. However, if the marinade used on raw meat or poultry is to be reused, make sure to let it come to a boil first to destroy any harmful bacteria. Keep meat and poultry refrigerated until ready to use. Only take out the meat and poultry that will immediately be placed on the

When using a cooler, keep it out of the direct sun by placing it in the shade or shelter. Avoid opening the lid



too often, which lets cold air out and warm air in. Pack beverages in one cooler and perishables in a separate cooler.


Be sure there are plenty of clean utensils and platters. To prevent foodborne illness, don't use the same platter and utensils for raw and cooked meat and poultry. Harmful bacteria present in raw meat and poultry and their juices can contaminate safely cooked food.

If you're eating away from home and carrying food to another location, keep it cold to minimize bacterial growth. Use an insulated cooler with sufficient ice or ice packs to keep the food at 40 °F or below. Pack food right from the refrigerator into the cooler immediately before leaving home. Also, find out if there's a source of clean water. If not, bring water for preparation and cleaning. Or pack clean cloths, and wet towelettes for cleaning surfaces and hands

Precooking food partially in the microwave, oven or stove is a good way of reducing grilling time. Just make sure that the food goes immediately on the preheated grill to complete cooking.

Cook food to a safe minimum internal temperature to destroy harmful bacteria. Meat

and poultry cooked on a grill often browns very fast on the outside. Use a food thermometer to be sure the food has reached a safe minimum internal temperature. Beef, veal and lamb steaks, roasts and chops can be cooked to 145 °F. Hamburgers made of ground beef should reach 160 °F. All cuts of pork should reach 160 °F. All poultry should reach a minimum of 165 °F. Never partially grill meat or poultry and finish cooking later. After cooking meat and poultry on the grill, keep it hot until served — at 140 °F or warmer. served -Keep cooked meats hot by setting them to the side of the grill rack, not directly over the coals where they could overcook. At home, the cooked meat can be kept hot

in an oven set at approximately 200 °F, in a chafing dish or slow cooker, or on a warming tray.

When taking food off the grill, use a clean platter. Don't put cooked food on the same platter that held raw meat or poultry. Any harmful bacteria present in the raw meat juices could contaminate safely cooked food. In hot weather (above 90 °F), food should never sit out for more than one hour. Refrigerate any leftovers promptly in shallow containers. Discard any food left out more than two hours (one hour if temperatures are above 90 °F).

Following these key strategies will keep bacterial growth at bay and will keep your food tasty and healthy. Enjoy the barbecue and family fun.





Racca also noted that there are 1,364 K-5 students in the District's five schools in the city of Wilmington. "But, we have 3,500 seats in those schools. What

do we do to use that capacity and still comply with the NSA?"

Racca also noted that the demographics of the District's student population is "very different" than it was in 2000 when the NSA was passed. "People don't realize how the level of poverty and economic disadvantage has and economic disadvantage has changed," Racca said. "Fifteen of our schools — elementary, middle and high school - have over 40 percent of students eligible for the Free and Reduced Lunch program."

In addition, Racca said, for the first time, the population of black students District-wide is greater than that of white students

Realigning student feeder patterns and schools for any NSA plan will require funding. "We have some [capital] money in hand from previous projects," Racca said. "We need to determine what we need to implement the NSA, even if it is only a verbal referendum to approve moving that money into new projects.'

The state Department of Education will not accept a District's NSA plan that requires a referendum for approved referendum already in hand when endum already in hand when we go to the DOE with the plan," Racca explained.

Meetings for public input, plan design and public review are scheduled throughout July, August, September and October. The school board hopes to hold a referendum on Oct. 30, and present the District's completed NSA plan to the State Board on Nov. 15. "This will put us in a position to get our funding in the January state Bond Bill, so we can turn this over immediately for [the

2008-09] school year."

Lowery said a Website is being set up with information and the timeline for the District's NSA plan. "We will also have it set up so the public can comment online," Lowery said. "We really need the entire community's

Lowery emphasized the complex and interlinked nature of the challenges facing the District. "For example, if we can't do this, we will be the only [school] district in the state of Delaware without full-day kindergarten in 2008

Lowery and Daniel Cruce, Christina's manager of human resources, took their problem and concerns to Dover last week. "We shared all this information with legislators," Lowery said. "We've also invited [Wilmington] city council to be part of the NSA Design Team. We're going everywhere we can to seek input and

help."

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State bills would mandate recycling

n its closing days, the Delaware General Assembly may take up legislation that would change the way trash and recyclables are collected throughout the state.

House Substitute 1 for House Bill 146 would establish a mandatory residential curbside recycling program statewide.

State Rep. Pam Maier, R-Drummond Hill, one of the bill's prime sponsors, says this approach is overdue. "Voluntary programs have been in place for 15 years and the percentage of material we're recycling has remained stagnant at 14 percent,"

The legislation sets a goal of boosting residential waste recovery to 30 percent by January 1st, 2010. Fifty percent of the com-mercial waste stream would be expected to be recycled by the same date.

"Residents will be asked to separate recyclables from garbage and simply place the two containers on the curb," said Maier. "The haulers will then collect these separated items and take them to

a local processing facility."

The act would levy a \$3-perton assessment on all non-recycled solid waste disposed of in Delaware. The money collected would create a fund that would be used to help pay for various aspects of the recycling system.

Maier said there will be no "trash police" under her bill.

"Enforcement ... would begin at the landfill. The Delaware Solid Waste Authority would check the haulers' loads and, if necessary, would remind them to inform their customers of the proper procedure. Before we know it, recycling will become second nature.'

The act also deals with the issue of yard waste management, which became an especially controversial subject in New Castle County after it was banned from the Cherry Island Landfill earlier this year. That ban has since been delayed until the start of 2008. HS 1 for HB 146 would

encourage the creation of private yard waste management facilities. However, if these facilities fail to materialize, the Delaware Solid Waste Authority would be charged with establishing and operating them.

A second bill (House Bill 246), also sponsored by Maier, would establish a system for creating "trash and recycling districts" to serve the unincorporated areas of New Castle County.

Such districts - formed with the input and consent of residents would give a single waste-hauler the exclusive rights to service a defined geographic area. The county would solicit bids, award contracts and tax residents to pay for the service.





Council accepts report by ad hoc committee

limit for that section of the road is 25 miles per hour, but traffic counts by the Newark Police Department indicate cars typically travel speeds of 36 miles per hour.

For those reasons, the city is asking DelDOT to study traffic calming measures that could be used to slow traffic and make the state-maintained roadway safer.

Traffic calming is a design tool meant to influence driver speeds and behavior. Examples of measures include traffic circles

to visually narrow roadways and make drivers more aware of speed limits, bike lanes and pedestrian crossings

DelDOT is being asked to assess what affordable traffic calming measures may work for South College Avenue.

In supporting the request, Councilman David Athey, who has made traffic safety one of his primary concerns on council, said We need to be more diligent and try to do what we can to control the speeds.'

Also at Monday's meeting, council accepted a report by the

Newark Traffic Calming Ad Hoc Committee, which formed in January 2006 to study pedestrian and transportation safety issues in Newark.

The report, said committee member Heather Dunigan, recommends a more simple process for determining whether a road is eligible for traffic calming measures. That process involves Newark's Traffic Committee and residents of the proposed street.

Also, the report recommends that eligibility be expanded from Old Newark to citywide, as crash rates on some of Newark's roads for the 2000-2005 period are

two times to more than three times the average of New Castle County, according to data from

the Wilmington Area Planning



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
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
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Newark youth win big at Livestock Classic
