will study fiscal problems and needs in the school district;
public relations and communications; and plans for the
new high school.

chairman for the fiscal study com-

lert, Sigurd Andersen, Mrs. Bruce

This committee is charged with
study of the school system finances,
and will review needs and recom-
mendations for the next five years
with an interim report by April 1.
to assist the board in establishing
school finances for the 1961-62 bud-
get.

As soon as a baby is born it is given a physical examination and remains under close medical scrutiny while the mother is hospitalized, and during the first year has frequent physical check-ups by a doctor.

Animals, too often, are born in any available surroundings and don't see a veterinarian until trouble develops in the form of illness or an accident.

Your veterinarian is just as much an advocate of preventive medicine as your physician. He is trained to help you prevent trouble as well

for your animal.

Generally it is unsatisfactory to ask a veterinarian to diagnose your pet's ailment via telephone. It is necessary to take your pet to his office so he can give him a thorough examination before making his diagnosis.

Your veterinarian charges fees for his services. They generally are

reasonable and have been determined by taking into consideration such factors as his time, laboratory requirements, technical ability used, and service to you.

You should discuss fees with your veterinarian on your first visit. Ask him approximately what his proposed treatment will cost and find out his charges for hospitalizing your pet. He is as eager as you to

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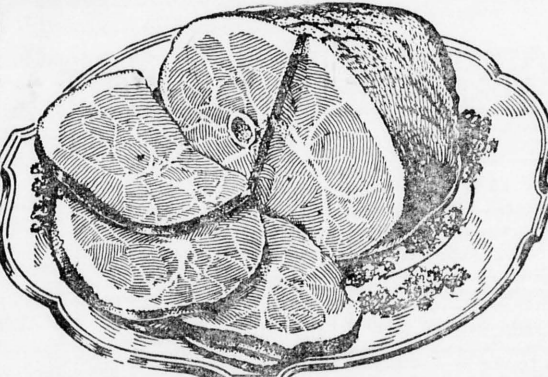

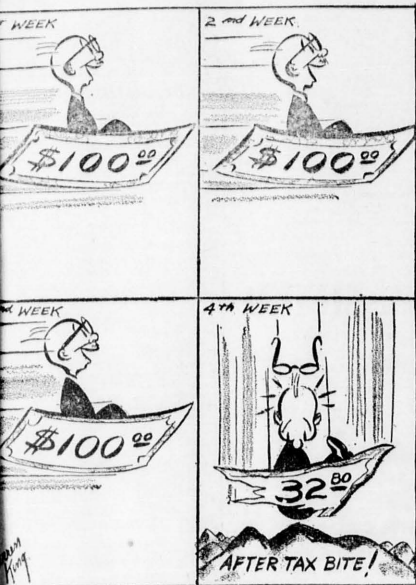

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Starting Salaries For College Grads Cited With Survey

Placement Chief At U.D.
Mrs. Geraldine M. Wyatt
Reports On Council Study

Mrs. Geraldine M. Wyatt, director of placement at the University of Delaware, released today the first report of the College Placement Council's study of starting salary offers being made to male college seniors.

Delaware is one of 61 colleges and universities from coast to coast participating in the study.

Electrical engineers continue to lead the field for top dollars offered and are also in greatest demand by volume.

The council survey revealed the averages of 1,406 offers made by business and industry up to the time of Christmas vacation.

Highest starting rates at this point in the recruitment year are, in order, electrical engineering at \$552; aeronautical engineering at \$551; physical sciences, \$546; chemical engineering, \$540; and mechanical engineering, \$536.

In terms of high demand, offers are for electrical, mechanical engineering, accounting, general business, and chemical engineering.

General business students are receiving offers averaging \$435, while those for students in liberal arts and biological sciences are averaging \$423 per month.

The council's statisticians point out that early offers tend to be concentrated in the scarce technical categories while both arts and business offers increase in volume and value as the recruiting season progresses.
