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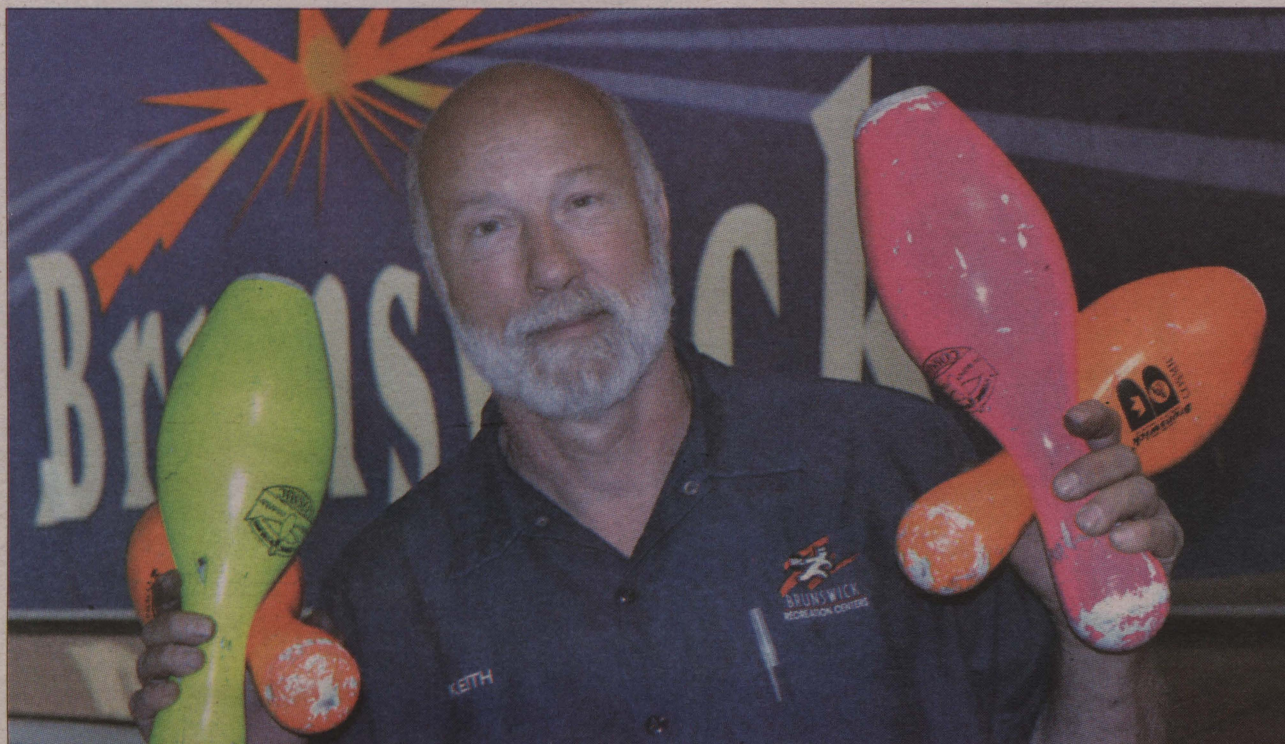

Man behind pins keeps things humming at Blue Hen Lanes

To step behind the curtain at Brunswick Blue Hen Lanes at Newark Shopping Center is something like passing from one dimension to another in "The Twilight Zone."

On one side, bowlers are laughing over tacky bowling shoes and selecting their bowling balls. On the other, is a robotic realm where 32 automatic pinspotters perform their noisy tasks with a clockwork precision that's surreal and maybe a tad frightening.

This is Keith Beaudean's domain. He's the mechanical operations supervisor.

At first glance, pinspotters look like enormous tumble dryers, where fallen pins spin in a circle, then drop into a turret that feeds the setter, which gently places them on the shiny

floor, in just the right position to be knocked down again.

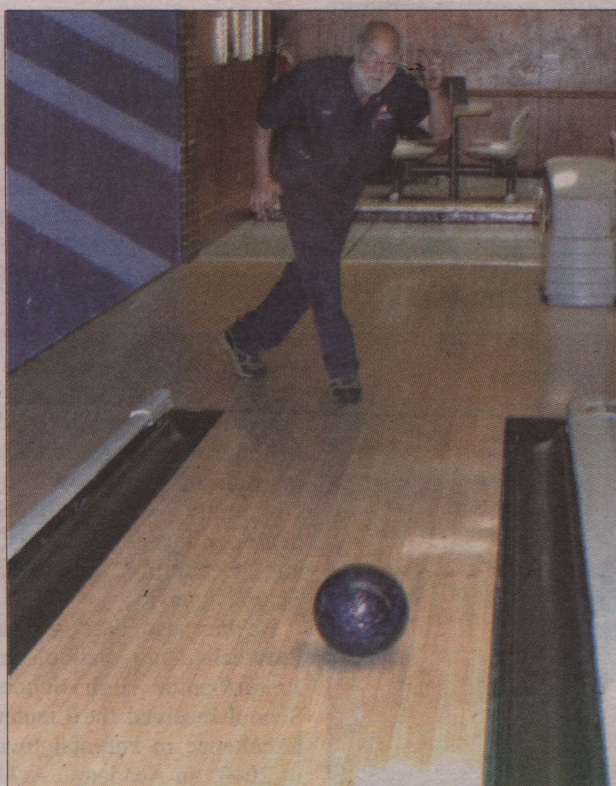
Meanwhile, there's the robot arm that reaches out and collects every pin — Beaudean calls it "cleaning up the dead wood."

Snaking around inside this impossible labyrinth is the ball return, which scoops up the ball and sends it back precisely 60 feet to a belt-driven machine that deposits the ball right next to the bowler's waiting hand.

"All this does not happen by itself," Beaudean says, gesturing across the lanes. "There are a lot of moving parts and a lot of upkeep."

Despite the fact that he's a man and they're machines, Beaudean and the pinspotters have seen the best and the worst of one another in 40 years, and they seem to have come to an under-

Flooding caps off record-setting June

Strong thunderstorms hit Newark June 28, bringing torrential downpours, flooding streets and stranding motorists headed home during the evening rush hour.

The storms were part of a barrage of severe weather that has pounded Newark in recent weeks, leading to a record-breaking 13.66 inches of rain for the month of June.

"That's a new rainfall record for June," National Weather Service meteorologist Kristin Kline said, adding that the previous record for June was 9.9 inches in 2003.

The worst of the storms came June 10 when a tornado hit the Robscott Manor neighborhood, bringing down trees and heavily damaging seven homes.

Newark not giving up on PILOT expansion

City officials say they're not surprised the state legislature wrapped up on Sunday without addressing what they see as an unfair tax law, but that doesn't mean they're giving up.

City officials had been hoping the state would expand the PILOT program, which stands for payment in lieu of taxes.

PILOT currently gives state funds to the three county seats to make up for the tax money the municipalities do not receive from tax-exempt properties like

schools and churches.

More than 46 percent of property within Newark city limits is tax-exempt; however, the city is not part of the PILOT program. There is no city in Delaware with as much tax-exempt property as Newark.

House Bill 169 would have authorized payments to any city with a population over 25,000 and with more than 20 percent tax-exempt property. If that were to happen, Newark would stand to gain about \$300,000 to \$500,000 a year.

The bill was introduced

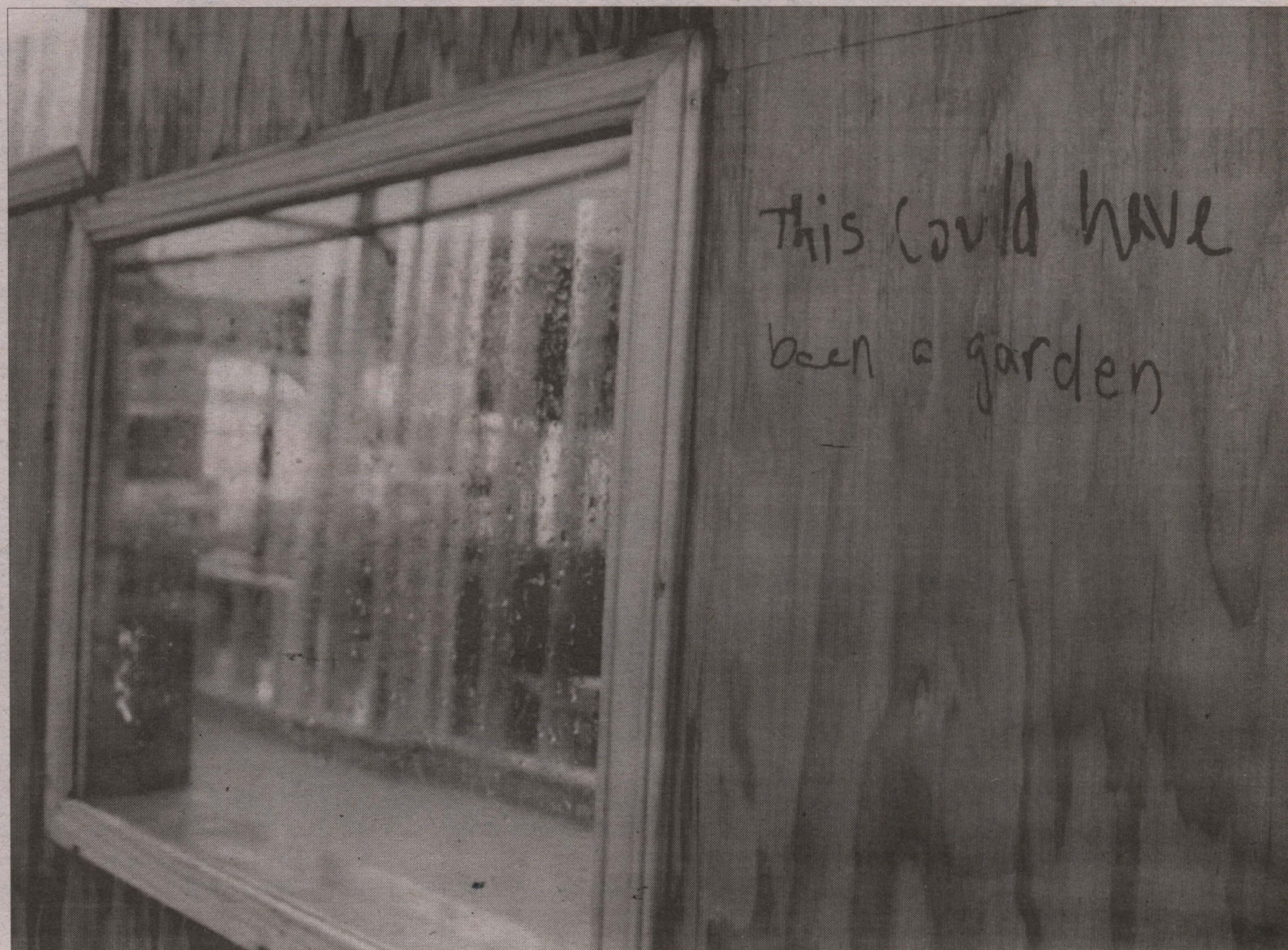

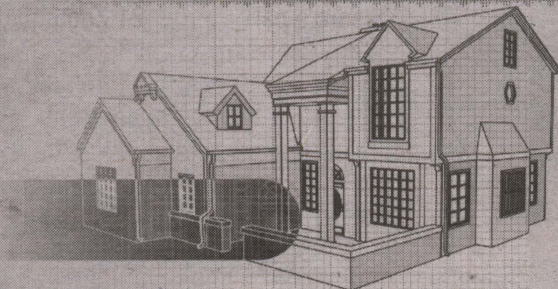

Program helps NHS students ‘ASPIRE’ to attend college

Newark High School rising senior Akia Johnson wants to be a social worker and help troubled kids in either Delaware or New York City.

However, she said she was concerned about applying for college in order to follow her dreams until a program set up by the University of Delaware and Johnson & Johnson helped her out.

“I was worried that I wouldn’t be able to complete college applications and FAFSA and all that, and my mom doesn’t have the knowledge and it’s hard for me to find out,” Johnson said. “This program provided me with a lot of help.”

The program, set up by the university’s Center for Teacher Education’s ASPIRE Program and Johnson & Johnson’s Bridge to Employment, helps Newark High School students complete their college and scholarship applications.

Dr. Melva Ware, associate director of the Center for Teacher Education, said the program is a class for undergraduate students which will help increase and improve access to college for students from impoverished areas.

“I’m running a class, that’s

an independent study, and it’s interdisciplinary,” Ware said. “So it’s public policy, leadership and education. So the undergrads are studying the national urgency for college to increase and improve access for first generation and low income students, and they are looking at politically what we are doing as a country to increase access, especially for the kinds of kids we’re working with.”

Ware also said the students must present their findings on this as part of the course.

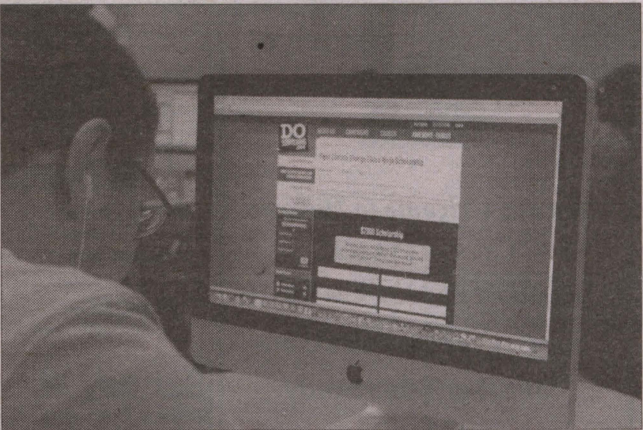
Five university students work with nine high school students for two weeks. The schedule for the course has students working on their college applications for the first week and their scholarship applications during the second.

This is the sixth year the program has been held, Ware said. Last year, some of the mentors and students partnered up to work together to develop a program at Newark High School, rising senior English Education major

Kevin Nai said. “Last year, we were helping them launch All Students Aspire, or known as ASA,” Nai said. “The goal was that these students, there were nine Newark High School students, were going to be launching a student-led tutoring program at Newark High School.”

Johnson said she now is prepared for what will come next.

“Now I have college essays, I have dates for scholarships, I know when the college I want to attend opens up,” she said.

“I’m very ready for college.”

Other students in the program have big dreams as well. For rising senior Kevin Cramer, that dream extends to going to law school and possibly running for office. Cramer said he enjoyed the program because of its individualized nature.

“My personal thing isn’t about what they’re doing; it’s about who they are,” Cramer said. “This was a really personal experience, like for someone to care about me and where I’m going in life, that’s what’s amazing about it.”

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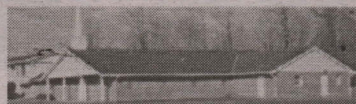
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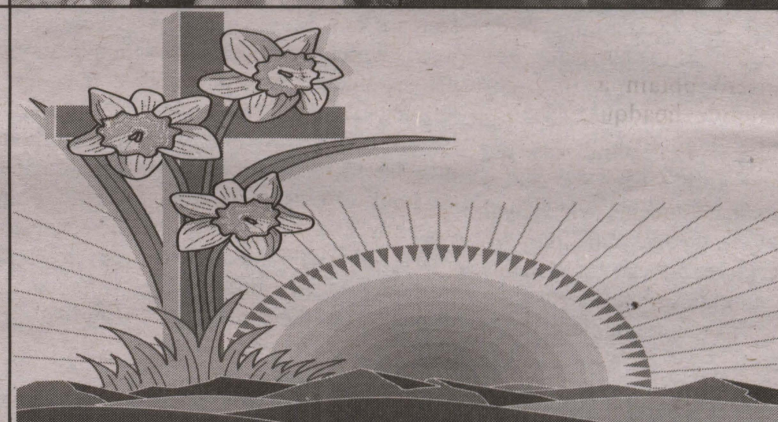
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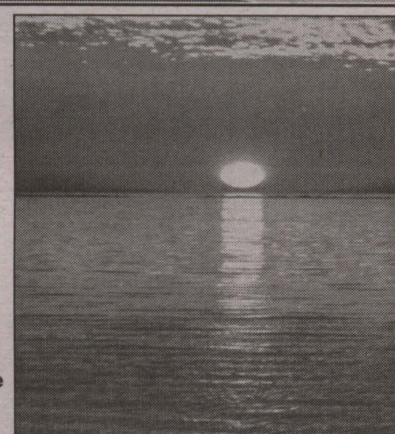

Counterfeit \$10 bill seized

Police were called to the Shell station at 105 S. College Ave. on Sunday afternoon to find an employee and a customer arguing over a suspicious \$10 bill.

The customer said she just pulled the bill out of an ATM machine, but the bill felt odd to the employee and had no watermark. Also, the bill failed the cashier's pen test, which detects counterfeit currency, said Newark Police spokesman James Spadola.

Police took the counterfeit bill into evidence, Spadola said, adding that the victim of this crime is the customer.

Counterfeiters are making bogus bills of smaller and smaller denominations, Spadola said.

"Usually we get a bunch, so we'll see what happens," he said.

Teen charged in D.P. Dough vandalism

Newark Police stopped three men near the D.P. Dough restaurant early Sunday morning after get-

ting a complaint that someone had put his hand through the front window.

When officers arrived at the eatery, located at 122 E. Main St., an employee said he heard a smash and turned in time to see someone pull an arm out of the window, said Newark Police spokesman James Spadola.

Police examined the hole and saw drops of blood going east on Main Street. Police also radioed an EMS unit from Aetna Hose Hook & Ladder Company to take one of the men to the Christiana Emergency Room because he had a laceration

on his arm.

Matthew Pisarcik, 24, of Elkton, Md., turned himself in at Newark Police on Sunday, and was charged with criminal mischief and disorderly conduct. He was released on \$200 unsecured bond and given a no unlawful contact order with the restaurant.

Cough syrup, condoms stolen

A Kmart employee was charged Saturday with stealing food, cough syrup and condoms valued at \$34.06 police said.

The store's loss-prevention officer called Newark Police at 6:14 p.m. The officer told police that store officials had been finding empty food bags around the store for three weeks last month.

A Connecticut man who police say was trying to sneak through Delaware with a carload of untaxed cigarettes on Sunday now finds himself staying awhile, as an inmate at

Howard Young Correctional Institution in Wilmington.

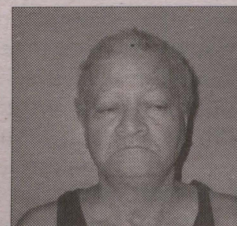
Juan Rodriguez-Acosta,

62, of Hartford, was traveling on I-95 near Churchmans Road and struck another vehicle, police said. He fled the scene of the wreck, but was stopped and arrested by Wilmington officers, according to Kimberly Chandler, in the media relations department of the Delaware Department of Safety and Homeland Security.

State police showed up to investigate the hit-and-run and noticed 252 cartons of untaxed cigarettes, valued at \$12,000. They charged Rodriguez-Acosta with possession of untaxed tobacco products and attempting to evade or defeat taxes.

He was also charged with five traffic offenses, including leaving the scene of an accident, driving without a license, improper lane change and failure to report an accident.

He was arraigned in JP Court 11 and held on \$3,000 secured bond at the Howard Young Correctional Institution.

Do you own a firearm? If so, Newark Police are asking you to take steps to make sure it is securely stored in a location inaccessible to children and other unauthorized people.

The police have obtained the gunlocks through the Project Childsafe Program.

To obtain a free gunlock, stop by police headquarters, 220 S Main St., between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, and ask for the Departmental Armorer.

Police will supply two locks per per-

son while supplies last.

Project ChildSafe is a nationwide program that promotes safe firearms handling and storage practices among firearm owners through the distribution of safety education messages and free firearm Safety Kits.

The kits include a cable-style gunlocking device and a brochure that discusses safe handling and storage.

Since 2003, the project has partnered with local law enforcement agencies to distribute more than 36 million safety kits to gun owners in all 50 states and five U.S. territories.

SEPTA increases fares for Newark line

Newark residents who use the SEPTA service will see fares go up.

SEPTA's Wilmington to Newark line has seen a rate increase that started Monday as part of a system-wide increase, according to company spokesman Andrew Busch.

Busch said the line will be consolidated and see an increase in the price of a single trip ticket, but not for weekly or monthly passes. A single-trip ticket has risen 25 cents to \$6.50. Weekly passes stayed the same at \$53, as did monthly passes at \$191.

Busch said the fare increases are normal and happen in increments.

"We do fare increases every three years, starting in 2007, the next one was in 2010, so this was the next scheduled one," he said. "Fare increases were recommended in 2006 by the Pennsylvania Transportation Funding and Reform Commission, so SEPTA enacted fare increases, but keeping them within cost of living increases."

Ex-UD coach Jim Fischer to start DelTech cross-country program

Some people are just born to coach.

So in 2011 when the University of Delaware announced it was dropping its varsity men's cross-country and track-and-field programs, head coach Jim Fischer hoped it wasn't his last college coaching position.

"I do hope to coach at the college level again someday," he told the Newark Post shortly after Delaware announced its decision.

His hopes have come true. Delaware Technical & Community College announced last month that this fall it will introduce a coed cross-country team for the first time in school history. Fischer has been hired to lead it.

"We are looking forward to working with Jim on forming our cross-country team," said DelTech athletic director Ron Burgess. "It is exciting to be able to work with a coach of this caliber, and our students will greatly benefit from having him here."

Fischer, 64, came to Delaware in 1982 after serving two years as head track-and-field coach and assistant football coach at Concordia College in his native Minnesota. While at

Delaware, he was named America East Coach of the Year five times and in 2012 was inducted into the Delaware Sports Museum and Hall of Fame.

After leaving Delaware in spring 2012, Fischer wasted no time getting back into coaching. However, it wasn't at the college level, but instead at Sanford School in Hockessin, where he took the reins of a high school program for the first time in more than four decades.

"It was an adjustment, there's no doubt about it," Fischer said of coaching Sanford's cross-country and indoor track teams. "With college kids they have a sense of the intensity it takes and with high school kids, and it's not their fault, it's part of their process to learn how to do that. In high school, it's more about learning your limits. How hard you can work. How much you can take."

Fischer enjoyed the experience, but when his longtime friend Mark Brainard, who serves as Vice President and Campus Director at the Stanton/Wilmington Campus, approached him about the job at DelTech, he eagerly accepted. But, as anyone who knows Fischer will attest, he's as loyal as they come.

So not only is Fischer going to start DelTech's new program, but he'll continue to coach at Sanford. He'll run practices at DelTech in the morning and Sanford in the afternoon.

"I think it will be an adjustment both for me and the kids in working with two separate groups," Fischer admitted. "I'm going to have to make this up as I go along."

This is the first time Fischer has started a track program at any level completely from scratch.

"I don't know what to expect," he said. "I'm not sure how many kids we'll

get out, especially because it's so late that we're just announcing it now. If only a few kids come out, we'll do it with a few kids just to get it going. There are [approximately 6,500] students who go to school at the Wilmington and Stanton campuses, and we're thinking there are some kids who would like to continue their running careers. I hope to be able to get a bunch of kids entrusted in the program."

Fischer said he will take anyone who wants to improve their running.

"We're looking for people who want to be com-

mitted to getting better," he said. "This isn't just an activity for people to do, it's for people who want to compete and get better at their running skills."

First a Cobber, then a Blue Hen, and now a Roadrunner. The nickname of the school doesn't matter. What does is that Coach Jim Fischer is back where he belongs.

Newark-area author turns love of music, TV into career

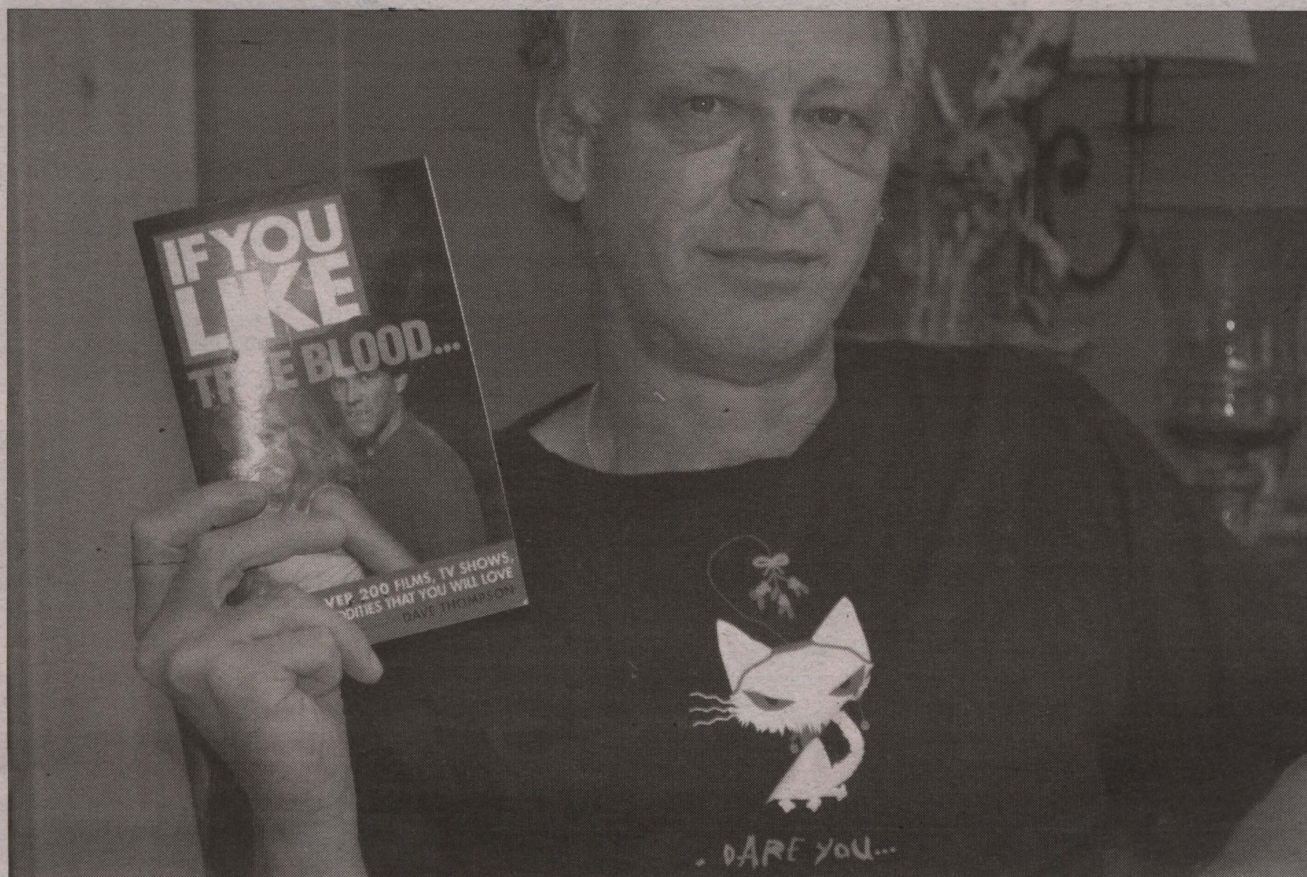

Fans of the HBO series "True Blood" now don't have to wait between seasons to get their vampire fix, as Newark-area author Dave Thompson has released his newest book, "If You Like True Blood ...," which profiles other vampire-related media.

Thompson, who has been a published writer for nearly 30 years, said he had wanted to write a book on vampires due to his lifelong love of the genre.

"I always wanted to write a book about vampires; it's as simple as that," he said. "As a kid, I was the one who wanted to stay up late and watch the Hammer films."

Thompson, originally from Kent, England, has lived in Newark for eight years. He said he usually writes about music and pop culture. Having worked for English music weekly The Melody Maker for a while, Thompson said he enjoys writing books more.

He has written more than 100 books, most of which are about television shows, music or movies. Some of his other recent titles

include "Ozzy Osbourne: Wit & Wisdom," "Bob Marley: The Ultimate Listening Guide," and "Doctor Who FAQ."

"If You Like True Blood ..." contains more than 200 films, books, TV shows and songs about vampires. Thompson said he has per-

sonally viewed or listened to all the materials listed in the book.

The book describes not only the backstory of the

works listed, but other works that did not get their own section, as well as a review of the work. "If You Like True Blood ..." is intended to help the reader comprehend vampire-related media past what popular culture dictates, Thompson said.

"I mean everybody knows vampires have a long literary and cinematic history, but there's a lot of stuff out there that just gets completely overlooked and forgotten about," he said.

While Thompson said his favorite film depends on his mood, 1973's "Lemora: A Child's Tale of the Supernatural" is one of his favorites to watch.

Thompson said he also likes vintage black and white films with little or no dialogue because of how the directors made them.

"They just did what they felt was right," he said. "Early films were a lot like punk rock, where they were developing something new and seeking what worked."

Bowling: A game, a sport and a calling

standing: You do your part and I'll do mine.

• • •

To say that bowling is Keith Beadean's life is not some Zen idea or metaphorical "Big Lebowski" thing. It is in fact the only way to describe a relationship that's outlasted many marriages.

Bowling is what his life sounds like: The ceaseless release, the relentless rumble, the constant cacophonous collision with 320 bowling pins, followed by raucous rejoicing or moans of disappointment.

To Beadean, 56, it's a familiar comfort. It is the sound of serenity.

He finds the mechanical pinspotters a marvel of design — first because they

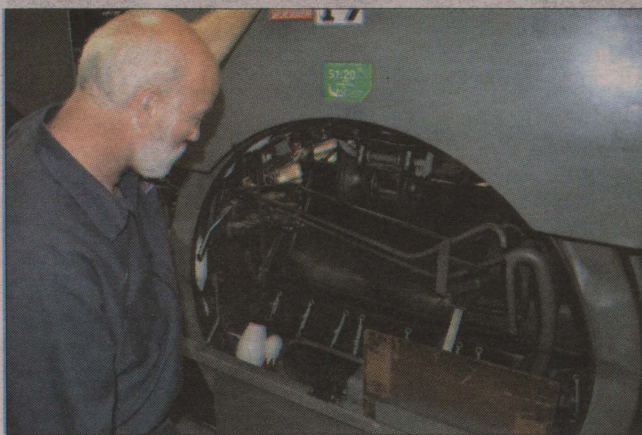
sprang from the mind of man 50 years ago and second because they could still be functioning in another 50 years.

"They're 50 years old, but they could run forever," he said.

He first stepped into Brunswick Blue Hen Lanes in 1973, an 11th-grader tagging to work with mom on Christmas break. That was 40 years ago, and Blue Hen Lanes has been his "second home" ever since.

He's seen a lot in 40 years. The move from wooden lanes to synthetic. The evolution of balls from rubber to urethane to resin.

Every year and a half, he replaces all the pins in the house. Since each of the 32 lanes needs 21 pins (two sets and a spare), he orders close to 700 pins from Brunswick. That's an \$8,000 expense.

The worn-out pins are given away as trophies and prizes and often sold by the case for target practice.

• • •

Bowling centers go to great lengths to stay afloat in the 21st century. The staff at Brunswick Blue Hen knows

good and well it's the seniors and the leagues that keep the place humming.

"This morning I had 32 lanes of seniors, four bowlers per lane, four games each — so I had 4,000 balls thrown this morning," Beadean said.

In an effort to attract a younger crowd, Beadean

a few years ago decorated the alley with day-glo pins, ultraviolet lights, strobe lights and even a fog machine. Brunswick called it "cosmic." He called it "corny."

"This is not a good business to be in if you just want to make money — because it will eat you alive," he said, noting that a single electric bill could buy a small car.

Brunswick Corp. is now consumer-testing some new designs for bowling centers that focus heavily on dining. Some centers even feature islands of tables amid the lanes, complete with full menus and table service.

"The whole idea is to keep the customer here for two hours," he said.

• • •

The last pin is scheduled to fall at Brunswick Blue Hen when the lease

runs out on June 30, 2014. Meanwhile, said Dan Kubera, director of media relations and corporate communications for Brunswick, the company is looking for a new home nearby and hopes to have something to report by the end of the year.

But for today, back in Beadean's realm, pinspotters continue their relentless task. Pins fall over. Robotic arms still sweep up the dead wood. The ball returns still rumble.

"Yep, listen to 'em. They're my babies," Beadean says.

He looks over his domain with rare satisfaction. Nothing went wrong today.

Jailhouse wine cellar harkens back to Kate's history

New wine offerings, parlor room part of effort to improve Main Street restaurant

Returning to the building's history as a jailhouse, Main Street's Klondike Kate's now boasts one basement cell full to capacity – with wine.

Klondike Kate's beverage manager Bob Baker said that a lot of research went into constructing and stocking the new wine cellar, which was completed in April. Converting this cell into wine storage allowed the restaurant to expand its offerings and create ties to its history, Baker said.

"This is one of the wines inspired by the jail cell," Baker said, picking out a bottle from the rack. "It's called The Prisoner. It's not to the point where it's like hokey or over-the-top, or like everything on the wine list is inspired by 'jail' or 'prisoner,' but we have enough to peak your interest... Big House Red, Witness Tree, Fingerprints."

Tucked into the original stone walls of the basement, the newly expanded wine selection is locked up behind an authentic-looking barred

metal door. Baker said the cell was chosen because it generally stays at a cooler temperature than other parts of the building, perfect for keeping wine from spoiling.

Featured wines come from California, Oregon, and even as far away as Argentina.

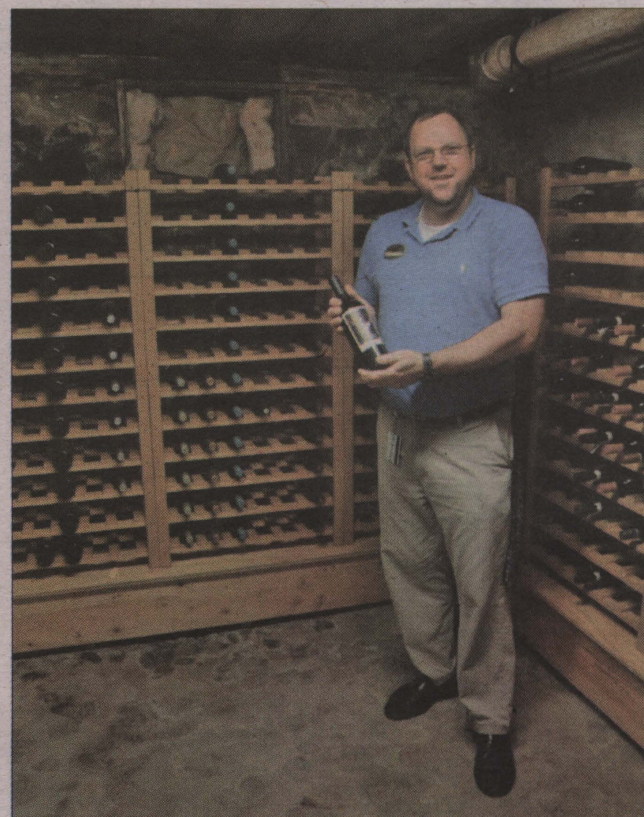
Baker said the recent expansion of a coatroom into a "Parlor Room" dining

area and the creation of the wine cellar were the efforts of Klondike Kate's owner Alan Burkhard to change the image of the restaurant.

According to Baker, the increased selection has had a noticeable impact on wine sales.

"When I first came here I tried to infiltrate different wines onto the specials sheet

or our drink list and didn't have much success, but now since we've done this, we've noticed a big increase in wine sales," Baker said. "On the dining room floor on Saturday night, I saw three different tables having bottles of wine. You know, five years ago we didn't have three bottles of wine to give people."

Officials hopeful measure will pass in next session

June 4 by Rep. Paul Baumbach, D-Newark, but never moved out of committee.

However, Baumbach believes he has a good chance of getting the bill passed when the next legislative session begins in January.

"As a rookie, I was unreasonably optimistic," Baumbach said.

When the legislature meets again, he said, "we've got a good chance of success."

Mayor Vance A. Funk III agreed Newark has "a far better chance of getting it next year," than it did getting included when PILOT funds were first introduced in 2008.

"I'm confident the economy is getting better and that our legislative delegation is able to enlist the power players," Funk said.

The mayor has termed the situation nothing

more than "political payback," dating back to 2008.

The bone of contention, he alleges, is that Newark that year passed an ordinance making .08 the legal BAC limit for operating a motor vehicle in town. (The rest of Delaware at that time still allowed a 0.10 BAC.)

Until a few days before the passage of that ordinance, the cities being considered for PILOT were Wilmington, Newark, Dover and Georgetown.

Then Newark mysteriously fell off the list. City Manager Carol Houck said the change sought by HB 169 has merit and makes sense, but that the city got off to late start in the 2013 session.

"We're not immune from the economy," she said. "There's things that are becoming a burden for us to fund."

Let fitness become summertime habit

School's over, the days are long, and children want to hang around the house, relax, play video games, and maybe go swimming. This is all fine. But summer offers an excellent time to create a new habit for our young ones.

Perhaps it's time to start a new fitness program with your children. Some people say it takes 21 days to make a habit. Realistically, encouraging a fitness habit will require the months of summer and consistent effort. While they may moan and groan initially, they will eventually learn to enjoy and even cherish this time with you or their fitness peers.

For children who have been sedentary over the school year, start slow. Encouraging them to get outside and taking short walks together are initially best. Encourage other forms of play such as bike riding, skating, and hopscotch.

The recommendations for children are 60 minutes of physical activity daily, with about 30 minutes of vigorous activity at least three times

per week. This will require a conscious effort even if your children are engaged in sports once or twice a week.

It's helpful to establish a consistent time a few days and times each week that everyone can commit. For example, on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings, set out at a designated time - earlier is best before the heat of the sun sets in. Have a light breakfast such as a banana and a little cereal and make sure to take along a water bottle.

Again, start out slow. Encourage friends to join you. Walk for five minutes and run for one or two. Aim for 20 minutes total time, and as the days go by, increase the total time until the kids can run one to two miles without stopping. Eventually work up to three miles with teens and interested tweens. Follow up with some stretching and perhaps some push-ups and sit-ups for a bit of strength training.

Keeping a log really helps people track progress and feel good about their accomplishments. You can make one on Excel or purchase an inexpensive calendar.

A family log is helpful if your kids thrive on competition. And, at the end of a designated time frame, you might have a reward such as a trip or treat.

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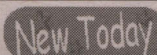

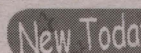

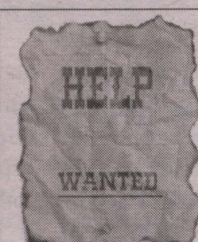

Last Friday's storms began around 4:30 p.m., and in nearly two hours, thunderstorms dropped 1.9 inches of rain, according to a University of Delaware weather station.

High water closed several roads in the city, including Paper Mill Road, which was blocked between Cleveland Avenue and Old Paper Mill Road for almost three hours. A tributary to the White Clay Creek overflowed its banks, sending water gushing over the roadway and into the front yards of homes on Curtis Lane, a small, dead-end street off of Old Paper Mill Road.

Residents there, however, were thankful that the water did not do damage inside their homes.

"I'm glad it wasn't as bad as it could have been," Michael Waters said, noting he's seen

the road flood several times in the two years he has lived on Curtis Lane. "We've been blessed."

He and other neighbors spent the evening watching the water rise in their front yards, while several children played in the pools of water created by the flooding. As the water receded, several people

grabbed shovels to begin clearing off the several inches of mud and silt left behind.

"The neighbors all chip in," Waters said. "It's a family street."

One of the motorists blocked by the road closure, Dave Gillaspay, decided to take fixing the problem into his own hands. Together with a police

officer who had been directing traffic, Gillaspay knelt down in the water and used his hands to dig out mud from storm drains on Paper Mill Road, allowing the water to drain off.

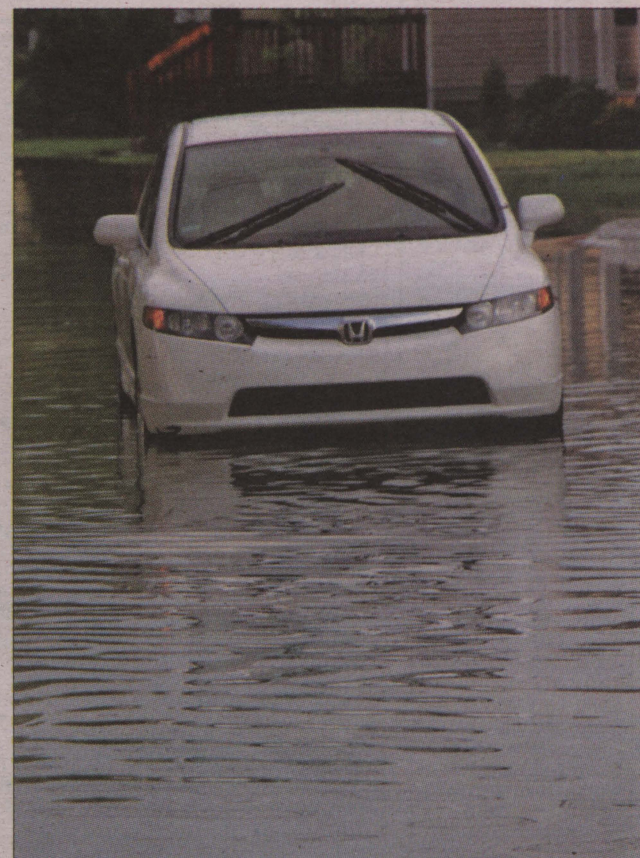
"I'm just trying to get home," Gillaspay said, mud dripping from his pants.

Elsewhere in and around the city, flooding was reported on Capitol Trail, Casho Mill Road and Main Street, where water was several inches deep near Haines Street.

Flooding also closed South Chapel Street for a while after a car was disabled by rising water and abandoned near the intersection of Lovett Avenue.

The railroad crossing on Chestnut Hill Road near South Chapel Street was closed for some time due to a disabled train, which was reportedly struck by lightning.

Newark Police officer pulls two women from raging creek

A Newark Police officer is being credited with saving two women who were caught in a creek during the thunderstorms over the weekend.

Police were summoned to the Paper Mill Road bridge over the raging White Clay Creek on Sunday afternoon for a water rescue, according

to Cpl. James Spadola.

The officer who responded saw two women clinging to the north pylon of the rain-swollen creek.

He waded in and pulled one of the women out, Spadola said.

"My friend's still out there unconscious," the 47-year-old woman reportedly told the officer. "She's laying in it."

The officer then waded back into the rushing waters and pulled the second woman, 34, out.

The second woman was treated at Christiana Emergency Room for hypothermia and possible water inhalation.

Spadola said the officer, who was not publicly identified, will be honored for the rescue.
