More than a year later, missing man's fate uncertain

The disappearance of Paul G. Guarino, a hot dog vendor on Newark's Main Street, remains a mystery to his family and police a year and a half after he left his home at 236 Kells Avenue for what he said would be short time.

roommate, Edward Scully, he was going out and would return soon, Bernadette Mumford, Guarino's sister, called and discovered he was gone. That was reportedly Jan. 20, 1993.

When Mumford, Middletown, didn't hear from "Pauly", she said she started getting nervous. On Feb. 1, Scully

The day after Guarino told his and Guarino's father reported him missing to the Newark police. Unfortunately, there were not many clues for police to investi-

> Guarino, 35 when he disappeared, and his friend Tony Triboletti shared the hot dog stand that could be found in front of Wilmington Trust on Main Street. On the day Guarino disappeared

he was not scheduled to work.

The last person to see Guarino was his roommate, Scully, who had known him for three years. Scully said then he didn't think it strange when Guarino left midafternoon on Jan. 19. Scully was unable to be reached for comment.

The day Guarino was officially reported missing, Newark police found his 1988 white Suzuki

College Square near Pep Boys. His sister said a friend of Guarino's saw the car and said, "Pauly must be back." But an employee at WSFS bank said he remembers the car sitting in the lot for at least a few days, according to police.

Daugherty's fate same, but UD to adjust plans

University of Delaware officials are refining their student center building design, but plans still call for the back part of Daughtery Hall to be demolished around

A historical review of the student center plan, done at the request of the Delaware General Assembly and concerned members of the public, reports it as "suc-cessful from an overall viewpoint." The report continues and give suggestions for improving the

The report has left members of the Coalition to Save Daughtery Hall vowing to fight to the end to keep all of the building intact.

Daniel Griffith, director of the state division of historical and cultural affairs, conducted the review,

using federal guidelines. He reports the university's plan

fails two of three criteria established by the federal government because it results in the significant loss of an historic structure and changes the nature of the streetscape.

He notes the new student center will fill a substantial portion of half a block of West Main Street, "transforming the historic character of the block from a residential to an institutional one.' Griffith suggests the new build-

ing be made compatible with the historic character of Daughtery Hall through color, texture, materials and design details. He said the plans do meet the

third federal standard of visual distinction between the new and old construction, but suggests further ways to give the two buildings a

Public hearing to focus on Deer Park Farm rezoning

A public hearing to discuss rezoning the Old Deer Park farm property for single family homes is scheduled for Newark City Council's July 25 meeting at 8 p.m.
The 1.2 acres of land, which

includes the historic Deer Park farm house, has been the topic of controversy since the owner, Ed Sobolewski, tried to subdivide the property for five luxury townhomes earlier this year.

After much public debate, Newark's planning commission voted to table their recommenda-tion for Sobolewski's townhouse plan. The plans were withdrawn and the property was put up for

Residents who lived nearby. objected to townhouses near their single family homes and to the

demolition of the the farm house, which is a registered historic building. However, most agreed the farm house in its present dilapidated state, is an eye soar and safety hazard.

Todd Ladutko, a realtor associ-ate for Patterson Schwartz, said Sobolewski asked \$275,000 for the property. "Numerous inquiries' were made, but the property was never sold.

In order to build houses, Sobolewski needs to demolish the farm house. The present zoning however, is contingent upon using the farm house in any construction plans, so the owner must successfully rezone the property from multi-family residential to singlefamily residential.

According to the building direct tor for Newark, Junie Mayle, there is no reason a demolition permit won't be issued if the rezoning

Godwin: 'No Woodstocks in Newark'

An ordinance that Newark City Councilman Hal Godwin hopes will eventually prohibit Wilburfest was read for Council members Monday evening.

During a previous council meeting before the May 7 annual party, Godwin objected to using tax payer's money to pay off-duty police officers to oversee the event. He was also adverse to noise and traffic tie-ups on Cleveland Avenue and went so far as to motion that the "City of Newark deny Wilburfest operation and deny it in the future," but no one seconded his motion.

Now, almost two months after

more than 5,000 people gathered for the all-day event, an amendment to the city's ordinance that controls parades, public assemblies and special events is pro-

More than 1,000 people turned out at the Third Annual Fire Services Muster at Delaware Park June 26.

The event included over 100 pieces of fire apparatus, competitions for firefighters and a Dalmatian competition. Christiana Fire Co.'s mascot, Domino – owned by Christiana Fire Chief Bob Bennett, won first place in the female dog competition. Sponsored by the New Castle County Volunteer Fireman's Association, the muster raised in excess of \$1,500 for the Delaware Valley Burn Foundation.

> In the proposal, "special event" was redefined to include gatherings on private property as well as those in public arenas. It also says a gathering is not private if a fee or donation is charged or if there are more than 500 people expected to attend.

Wilburfest organizers traditionally charge \$5-6 for admission to the party which features bands and drinking (sometimes by minors). It's a combination that Newark police say leads to unruly behav-

University events conducted on

university property are exempt from requirements but must comply with other ordinances affecting events.

According to City Solicitor, Tom Hughes, the amendment will not stop Wilburfest, but will require organizers to reimburse the city for expenses.

Godwin said the proposed amendment is a "step in the right direction," but he's not sure it is "enough to guarantee that Wilbur Street and Cleveland Avenue residents will have the safety and tranquility the rest of us enjoy.

Although Godwin does not represent the area in question (Councilman Gerry Grant does) he said residents against the party

4-H agent, back from Asian trip, hopes to form lasting ties

New Castle County 4-H agent Mark Manno, recently back from a trip behind the former Iron Curtain, returned with a fresh insight of life in a struggling Asian democracy and the hope of forming a 4-H club where one has never before existed.

Manno and 14 others were in the former Soviet state of Uz'bekistan this spring to offer training skills in youth development and democratic ideas. Their 11-day visit, which ended May 17, was at the invitation of the Uzbekistan government and was sponsored in part by a grant from the Agency for International Development and the International Republican Institute.

While in Uzbekistan, Manno, who lives and works in Newark, spent six days of his visit at a former Soviet youth camp interacting with a group of 220 young adults from throughout the region, offer-

ing his thoughts on what doors democracy may open.
"Ironically, the place was built as a Young Pioneer camp," Manno explained. He said such camps served to indoctrinate Soviet youth into the many facets of communism, using a well-oiled pro-

poganda campaign to deliver the message. Vestages of that era still exist in large murals at the camp depicting young, happy workers. Guard towers loom along a fenced-in perimeter, too – out of business since the fall of the Soviet empire in 1991.

Manno's primary goal was to develop a free exchange of ideas among participants, focusing on how to organize teens to do various projects

He said a lot of thoughts were shared, but unlike here, brainstorming doesn't exist. "It was very frus-trating," Manno said, noting that it was a major

undertaking for a group decision to be reached. He blames it on a society heavily influenced in the past by communism, with its lack of room for collective decision making.

One collective decision of which he boasts, however, was to establish a 4-H program in Uzbekistan. He and others further promoted 4-H during a

youth fair held in Tashkent, one of the country' major cities. There, hundreds of children and their parents were greeted with an abundance of entertainment and information sharing.

Manno said his 4-H booth was a favorite spot, and one that was quite effective in getting the message out. So much so, that he recently received word that a 4-H club is being formed in Tashkent. Plans are for children to go into the country there, meet with farmers and learn about agriculture.

There also seems to be a strong interest in future Uzbekistan 4-H'ers becoming involved in the theater doing everything from performing to sewing costumes. Many also would like to have club activities that promote ethnic arts and crafts.

"The only thing that seems to get in the way is cost; it's a big factor over there," Manno said. But he said it's not perceived as an obstacle. "They have nothing, but they give everything."


Manno plans to return to Uzbekistan with a team

money will be needed, but he remains optimistic.

Also, Manno would like to host of group of Uzbekistan youth here in Newark, to experience 4-H

and American lifestyles firsthand. "Not only do you teach them culture, you teach them about freedom and democracy," Manno said.



Police: no motives to pursue and no fresh leads in Newarker's disappearance

MYSTERY, from 1A

The car was abandoned in the middle of the lot, which seemed strange to Detective Rick Williams and Mumford. Both commented on its location because the car wasn't parked close to a store.

"They found his car Super Bowl Sunday," Mumford said. "It seemed strange the car was so far away from the stores."0

Police discovered Guarino left without his house keys, wallet and the keys to the fuel tank of his car, when they found the items at his home. There were no signs of "foul play" in Guarino's room or in his car, according to Williams. Guarino also left behind the cash he got, more than \$2,000, when he sold his Harley Davidson motorcycle a few

days before he disappeared.

The only thing police could find missing was a 9 mm handgun and the box it was stored in. Williams said police found bullets for the gun in Guarino's room.

Mumford said she knew her brother had a gun for protection, but said she believed it was strange the

box was missing as well.

"There is a real possibility that Guarino is dead and met with foul play," Williams said. Several terrain searches on a

field near College Square Shopping Center and Guarino's home produced no new evidence, according to Williams. Police have no motives to pursue

and no fresh leads. There has been no activity related to his social security number or applications for out of state driver's licenses in his name. The possibility of suicide has been explored but Williams, Guarino's family and friends, all said they don't believe that's what happened.

Mumford said there was no reason for her brother to leave without telling anyone. She said he had no outstanding bills, didn't owe any money, was on good terms with his family and had never been married or had any children.

"There's nothing I can tell people, there's nothing I can tell his nephew," Mumford said.

Guarino's family launched a

search campaign when he was first reported missing. They posted pic-tures all around Newark, but no new evidence was found. Mumford even wrote to the television show "Unsolved Mysteries," but received a letter saying the show couldn't accommodate Guarino's case because there were already so many

missing person stories. Guarino's friend for about 22 years, Matt Mondel, was able to offer some insight into "Pauly's" personality.

Mondel said he didn't think his friend committed suicide

"Pauly was the kind of guy that if he was going to off himself, he would have done it on Main Street. Mondel said. "He had a flare for the dramatic."

Mondel also said Guarino wasn't stupid, "If he were in a tight situation, he would have called someone." On the other hand, Mondel said Guarino was trusting and was the type of person who would pick "scroungiest" looking hitch

His friend since their days at

Glasgow High School where they were on the wrestling team together, Mondel, described Guarino as a 'pacifist" and a "fighter for the

The hot dog vendor had a "gift of gab," according to Mondel, who said Guarino liked to go to the Stone Balloon or the Deer Park Tavern. Mondel said his friend could sit on a stool and talk to a professor about Lenin or Marxist theories or talk to a "head banger' about music. Ironically, Mondel said Guarino was a strict vegetarian who never ate the hot dogs he sold.

Guarino attended Salisbury State University in Maryland on a wrestling scholarship, but left school after he hurt his neck in an accident, according to Mondel.

After living on the West Coast for five years, Guarino was in Newark less than a year before he disappeared. He helped operate a Los Angeles-based catering business that specialized in serving the stars on movie projects throughout the region. He and his partners would travel with film makers on location to places such as Montana, St. Louis or San Francisco for six months at a time. Some of the movies he worked on were, "Tango and Cash," "Sneakers," "Lock Up," "The Dead Poets Society," and "A River Runs Through It.

In a feature article November, 1993, in the Newark Post, Guarino said he returned to Newark to escape the fast-paced lifestyle of Los Angeles.

Guarino's family and friends don't know whether to hope Guarino is alive or mourn his passing. They are left only to speculate, which Mumford she stopped doing

some time ago,
"He was my little brother,"

child's life, another child's life, at a nursing home or at a local school or boy's club.

I feel at times there are so many

negative things going on in the world, that it's time that each one of us, busy as we are, look to where we can get involved.

It does not have to be as major as the political battle to save a build-ing from demolition. But what about simply vowing to spend some scheduled quality time with your own child, spouse or parents? And if you do have time to reach out to others think about what you would enjoy doing, because it is a rare organization or institution that turns down volunteer help.

I am so excited because hopeful-

ly beginning this school year, I will be mentoring high school students who need some extra support with the process of getting into college.

I want to help juniors or seniors who want to attend college but do not know how to go about doing it. These students are the ones who are the first in their family to attend college or whose parents are wrapped up with making ends meet and don't have the time or energy or knowledge about how to help their children.

This topic of attending college is very close to my heart because it was about eight years ago that I graduated from high school and attempted to go away to school - the first in my family to go to col-

It is a myth that all students qualify for a Guaranteed Student Loan (now called Stafford Loan). My parents claimed me as a dependent at tax time, so it was decided they made too much money for me to qualify, but there were some things the form did not tell financial aid officers about my situation.

My parents had the year before filed for bankruptcy after having a business of their own. As a result, they could not sign for a bank loan for me and I couldn't get a loan myself because I was 20 with no

Financial aid officers told me I couldn't get a government loan butI wrote letters until I did.

If planning goes well, I will be working with the new Christiana High School Principal Michael Epler and possibly Christiana's Parent Teacher Student Association to create a program to help other disadvantaged students succeed after high school.

So whether it's saving a child or saving a building, I want everyone to realize how much potential they have in creating positive results. And I want other people who some-times get disillusioned that they are alone in their endeavor to make the world a better place that there are others here with an optimistic view.

It might seem to some with a more cynical view, that this is a

sugary vision of the world.

But I have learned through volunteer experiences that it does not take much for one person to make a difference. When I visit senior citizens in a nursing homes and receive smiles from residents. I've made a difference. When I participate in the Adopt-A-Highway program and pick up bags of trash that would have stayed there if I had not done it, I've accomplished a worthwhile

thing.

My way of thinking may seem simplistic to some, but I truly believe in what I say and I know there are others out there who believe as I do.

Win/Win works (so far, so good!)

The negotiations for the contract between the Christina School District and the Christina Education Association are over! This is a piece of news to be met with rejoicing on both sides and throughout the community. The tedious process of wrangling over salary and language in the contract frequently extends into the summer and beyond, resulting in a contract that all too often leaves both sides feeling cheated and alienated. This contract, however, could "be the begin-ning of a beautiful friendship." (Sorry, I have a Casablanca fan spinning over my head and I couldn't resist.) Maybe "a beautiful friendship" is a little too strong. The new contract does set in motion several cooperative ventures that should result in a better academic climate for our students and the

employees.

How did this all come about? The process is called Win/Win Negotiations and it involved many more people in the process than in previous negotiations. The partici-

pants (the Christina School Board, administrators, and the Christina Education Association) in Win/Win negotiations meet as a large group to air concerns and establish a dialogue or base upon which the rest of the negotiations can operate. The large group then divides into several subcommittees reconvene at various points to share their progress with the group as a whole. At the

conclusion, the entire group meets to review and approve the ideas generated in subcommittee.

The entire process described above happens spontaneously and smoothly keeping everyone happy at all times. As some of my students would exclaim: Not! Present at the large group meetings and some of the subcommittee meetings was a facilitator who kept the discussion focused, smoothed ruffled feathers, and reminded participants that they shared a common goal: the education of the children in the Christina School District. In this capacity, Rob Germain, head facilitator, was excellent.

The process directed by Rob Germain produced a contract with many unique aspects. As with any contract, the "nuts and bolts" of salary and daily operating procewere reviewed and established. In addition to these, the very process by which negotiations were conducted led to the establishment of several collaborative ventures which will (or should) continue to evolve and strengthen administrative/teacher relationships through-

Early morning at White Clay Creek Preserve is for the birds

The Lion King illustrates the call of the wild, but White Clay Creek Preserve gives the community a birds eye view.

Among the summer programs sponsored by Delaware State Parks is birdwatching. Hosted by the White Clay Creek State Park Saturday's 8 a.m. to 9:30 a.m., birding calls for instant recall and a quick eye.

Bird families are distinguished by their calls. These calls are what birdwatcher Margie Pilman of New London, Pa., use to identify birds. "I like to sit in a chair and think of how many [bird's calls] I can identify," Pilman, a member of the Delmarva Ornithological Society and the West Chester Bird Club,

With a field guide in her pocket and binoculars around her neck, Pilman guided birdwatchers Sat June 25 on an eye-raising walk down Creek Road.

"Psshhh. Psshhh. Psshhh. Psshhh," Pilman repeated. This is the sound of scolding. It is also a way to get some curious birds to poke their head out of the dense green foliage. Birdwatchers quick with their binoculars can glimpse many varieties of birds this way.

The bird sightings at White Clay Creek Preserve vary by week. Pilman, a five-year birder, was able to identify, among other birds, a warbler's call Saturday. "When you see warblers, they're like little jewels," she said.

Another factor involved in bird watching is the time. Pilman, who goes birding at least twice a week before work, claims the best time for birding in the summer is 5 a.m. to 7 a.m.

While birdwatching at White Clay Creek Preserve does not start until 8 a.m. there are two more opportunities to participate this season. Dorothy Miller will lead the birdwatchers Sat July 2 and Charles Sample will lead Sat July 9.

Discipline, as discussed (or disgust) in my last column, has been a problem in many schools. The primary problems have been enforce-ment of the Code of Conduct and the consistent application of penal-ties when a student violates the Code. The new contract establishes a committee comprised of teachers and administrators to oversee the methods administrators use to enforce the Code of Conduct and to correct problems before they create rifts in faculty and administrative

relationships.

Since many other aspects of the contract involve working relationships that are collaborative in nature, the true measure of this contract's success cannot be established until the contract expires three years from now. 

Summertime a great time to explore science

Thy do leaves fall from trees? Where do earthquakes come from? Where does rain go? Where does the sun go at night? Do birds sleep?

Kids ask a lot of questions. Incredibly curious, they want to know how everything works. Today's kids are tomorrow's scientists, science teachers and science

They will rely on science and advanced technology to generate even more than we do—for jobs, communication, health, energy and environmental protection.

Children and science are natural partners. Scientists ask questions, then try to answer them. So do children. When your children ask questions about the world around them, trying to find the answers, they are beginning to do science.

Children's attitudes about science are formed at a young age. Often by the time children are 6 to 8 years old, they've developed the attitudes and interests that will lead them into science-oriented careers.

Science education starts in the home and supports science taught in the school. Summer is a great time to help your children explore nature and generate enthusiasm for knowledge. Doing science at home doesn't cost a lot of money or

require special equipment. Sit with your child in the yard and watch a spider spin a web or a colony of ants as they go about their business of maintaining the colony. If you have a bird feeder, watching birds can be a fascinating experience as you see their different patterns of

Summer weather is also an interesting way to give kids a science experience. Observing the patterns of clouds forming before a thunder-storm is an absorbing activity. With the start of hurricane season June 1, the cable TV Weather Channel offers fascinating programming on how storms form and how they are tracked. Even something as simple as a walk in the park can provide insights on plants, trees and animals and how an ecosystem works

Kids, especially those curious 6to 8-year-olds, are curious about what interests their parents. They like the same sports teams we like and often have the same hobbies. You don't have to know much about science to set the stage for

Let your children take the lead. Build on their interests. The confidence they gain will carry over into other areas. They'll also love to "teach" other kids when they learn something fun and interesting. Take time to "do" science. Be ready for those unexpected science moments that come along at the beach or on a rainy day. It's worth the extra five minutes it takes. Encourage kids to talk and ask questions. Science is about searching for answers. It's OK to say, "I don't know." The next time you go to the library you can check out a science book or search the reference area for answers together.

Don't forget about safety. Teach good science safety habit never taste something you aren't sure of. Use only non-toxic materials and make sure that all potential hazards are removed from the areas kids can reach.



Special rail trip to state fair, Sussex, offers unique excursion

two important parts of the history and culture of our state are coming together on the 23rd of this month. It is the third time in as many years that these two events will come logether, but it is the first time Newark will be directly involved.

The first has been a central focus for Delaware folk art and crafts as well as a showplace for the state's agri-business industry for decades. It is the Delaware State Fair. Held annually in Harrington, it is faithfully attended by residents of Kent and Sussex counties, and many people from our county as well.

The second was the force which unified our state (and peninsula) and did its best to overcome the separation of "The Canal." It has had many names and, just before it ended service, it was called the Pennsylvania Railroad. But, to we natives, it is still known by its nom d' amour, "The Delaware Road."

The organization bringing these two facets of our heritage together for the past two years, and this year involving Newark area residents in a special and direct way, is the Delaware Rail Administration (DRA), part of the Delaware Department of Transportation, DelDOT for short. Many other groups are working with the DRA including Amtrak, Conrail, the Delmarva Rail Passenger Association, "Operation Lifesaver" (a DRA safety program) and the Delaware State Fair.

On Saturday, July 23, you may have an experience denied for three decades, a train ride down the Delaware Road to attend the State Fair at Harrington. This is truly a mixture of two old Delaware customs back on the scene once again and we are all grateful to the DRA for this opportunity so close to home. Yes, close to home. The first year, 1992, you could board "Rails to the Fair" only in Wilmington. In 1993 you had to board the train in Claymont. This year there is a stop right at the old Pennsylvania Railroad Station here in Newark. It is located on South College Avenue, just north of the 896 bridge over the tracks.

As if that weren't enough, the Delaware Rail Administration is also planning an extra excursion for those who would rather see more of the old Delaware Road with a trip down sec-ondary track to Frankford, Delaware, almost to the Maryland border. The folks who take that trip will still have some time at the State Fair, less of it to be sure. So if you like Delaware history, like to visit the State Fair or are a rail buff — or a combination of all three — this is the trip for you.

Chris Schulte, manager of opera-tions for DRA, explained that with the direct route of the Delaware Road from Wilmington long since torn up, the train will have to reverse course

to Frankford.

five times during the trip to get everywhere it has to go. For that reason, the train will have an Amtrak F-40 Diesel at the point and a cab control car at the rear so that as the train changes direction, no time will be lost. "Half of the seats in each of the modern Amfleet cars will be facing one way and half the other," said Schulte. "Everyone will ride forwards and

backwards on this unique trip."
"Unique" was the perfect word.
There is nothing else like it today. Conrail now owns the Delaware Road and when the Pennsylvania Railroad ceased operation, all rail passenger service left the peninsula. I remember riding behind the magnificent K-4s as the steamed their way from Wilmington to Cape Charles. They were the only steam trains around on the PRR because the New York to Washington main line was completely electrified. There were several secondary tracks which criss-crossed the peninsula bringing service to many small towns from the Delaware to the Chesapeake bays. On the 23rd of this month you will have a unique opporto experience the main line as far as Harrington and a secondary line

Your entire family can enjoy this one day rail excursion aboard an air conditioned Amtrak train. If you ride to Harrington you will have five hours to enjoy the Delaware State Fair. If to enjoy the Delaware State Fair. If you go on to Frankford, you will have two hours at the fair. You may board the train at Claymont, 10:40 a.m.; Wilmington, 10:53 a.m.; Newark, 11:13 a.m.; Middletown, 11:54 a.m. or in Dover at 12:37 p.m. You will arrive in Harrington at 1:32 p.m.

Since parking is a problem at the Newark Station, DRA has arranged for a shuttle bus from the DelDOT "Park and Ride" lot at Routes 896 and The bus is free and will run from 10:30 to 11:00 a.m. It will also operate after the train arrives in Newark at 8:56 p.m.

The round trip fair from Newark to Harrington is \$30 for adults, \$18 for children. From Newark to Frankford the round trip fare is \$50 for adults and \$30 for children. You may purchase tickets at DelDOT Transportation Stores on the Market Street Mall — box office of the old Aldine Theater — or at Pennsylvania Station at Front and French Streets,



Watts was taken into custody by Delaware State Police, who were working the game, and taken, still in his game uniform, by University of Delaware Police to Justice of the Peace Court 11 where he was arraigned on two counts of thirddegree assault and one count of


