Medical Director Reports Reduction For Illness Rate

Dr. Thos. Hogshead Cites Progress In DuPont Plan Of Health Consciousness

Of Health Consciousness

An active program to help employes become health conscious can sharply reduce the illness rate, Dr. Thomas H. Hogshead of Newark, medical director of Dn Pont's engineering department, told members of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers in New York last week. At the close of World War II, Dr. Hogshead said, a survey of the health of Dn Pont engineers disclosed "a critical situation, particularly in the area of cardio-vascular disorders. An active health program geared mainly to the prevention of heart trouble and related disorders was put into operation. . . The health record changed for the better almost immediately."

Following consolidation of the engineering department in the new Louviers headquarters building near Newark in 1953, the medical division launched a broad program to help employes become health conscious. As evidence of its success, Dr. Hegshead said, "With an average of 2,500 men and women over the five-year period, 1953-57 . . . our stckness absenteeism is 1.3 per cent of the total hours scheduled for work, The average for comparable industrial groups is usually some two to three times this figure."

The medical division is equipped to handle an emergency situation, he said, "but our program is geared to prevent emergencies from happening. This makes it desirable for us to be in contact with the employes as frequently as possible."

Soybean, Sorghum Cited Substitutes For Corn Silage

One of the best silage crop substitutes for corn is soybeans and sorghum, according to a communication received recently by Edward H. Schabinger, county agricultural agent.

Recommending the silage substitute was Prof. William H. Mitchell, agronomist at the University of Delaware. Prof. Mitchell said the yield from the combination may be 10 to 15 per cent less than from corn—but the nutrient value is about equal to that of good corn silage. If a good yield is expected, the soybeans and sorghum should be seeded by early June.

Hay-type varieties of soybeans—such as Wilson—give best yields, but Wabash and Ogden also might be used, the communication suggested. Hegari, Black Amber, and Atlas are sorghum varieties well-suited to Delaware conditions.

Prof. Mitchell warned that mixed sorghums should not be used, since there maye be considerable variation in maturity among them.

Fertilizer recommendation is 400 to 500 pounds of 10-10-10 per acre. The fertilizer should not be drilled with the seed, because of danger of injury to germination of the soybean seed.

Early one recent Monday morning a Wilmington mother was rushed to the nospital with acute appendicitis. Within an hour an emergency appendectomy had been performed; by noon the patient was resting comfortably in her room. Twenty-four hours later she was ambulatory—out of bed, up and around for short periods. On Friday, her husband and three young children welcomed her home—after an absence of only four days!

How wonderfully different from the way these things used to be! Ten years ago, for example, this woman's hospital stay would have been twice as long. 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

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
