## Golf Course Plan For Newark Deleted From Capital Budget

City Council Shelves Municipal Golf Course Project Pending Availability Of Federal Funds; Sewer, Street Improvement Programs Approved In Five-Year Proposal

A municipal golf course with land acquisition and development at a cost of \$750,000, was ruled out of the five-year capital improvement program at a special meeting of Newark City Council last Monday night, as council approved sanitary sewer division improvements of some \$55,000, and a street division project of \$394,300 in consideration of City Manager Edward R. Stiff's five-year capital projection.

Councilman David H. Doehrlert declared the municipal golf course project as "not reasonable at the time," with federal "open spaces" funds not available to us now... not during the Vietnam War. It just won't make money under present circumstances," Doehrlert added, citing the need for a municipal golf course to provide revenue for an overall recreational program.

"The day it can stand on its own—pay—I will put it back on the table," Doehrlert concluded.

Robert E. Snyder, chairman of the municipal parks and recreation committee, urged council acquisition of land for the proposed golf course.

"I don't even play golf," Snyder said, "But I can't possibly believe that next year... or 10 years from now, we are going to buy any land for any less than we can buy it right now."

Snyder said it would be "A gross error not to purchase land for developing a golf course," and pointed out that land acquired could be sold "for reasonable profit by 1977."

Mayor Norman C. Williams pointed out that the 130-acre required at \$5,000 per acre would involve "a \$650,000 in land acquisition, alone," and added "our section of the country is woefully lacking in swimming pools."

Councilman William M. Coverdale added that only "eight per cent" of the people play golf, and that the money should be "put into streets—get the town uncluttered."

Harlan C. Williams in the audience, urged that council not abandon plans for golf course land acquisition, citing Central Park in New York City as evidence of foresight with the founding fathers in providing valuable parkland and enhancing values of adjacent property.

Williams added that with resale of adjoining tracts, "land for the golf course could be acquired for virtually nothing."

But the project was shelved in a "50-50 vote with the motion" observation that the "golf course is on the back burner—not really dead."

A public meeting of council was scheduled for Oct. 2, to consider the parks program and "any other aspects of the capital program."

**Electric Rates**  
Council tentatively approved a proposed ordinance providing a new electric service classification P with increased rates for major power consumers effective next Nov. 1, at the first of two required readings. A final reading is scheduled for Oct. 9.

Sanitary sewer division improvements approved in the five-year capital program include connections for new customers within the city at a cost of \$17,000; and extension of the city line on Rt. 273 east at a cost of \$16,000, with 50 per cent assessable return.

County construction of a Christiana interceptor to eliminate two pumping stations and to relieve an interceptor now operating at capacity, for future city growth, was approved at a cost of \$70,000. The line is to extend southeast along the creek, and costs are not assessable.

An interceptor on South Chapel Street to the Pennsylvania Railroad at a cost of \$7,000, with 50 per cent of the cost assessable; and a Fairfield interceptor to eliminate two pumping stations and to serve newly annexed areas was approved at a cost of \$28,500 to the city, with the county paying the other half.

The raising and sealing of manholes to prevent infiltration was approved at a cost of \$5,000, along with a sewage pump for \$1,500.

**Emergency Equipment**  
Purchase of emergency equipment, proposed at a cost of \$10,000, was deferred pending a report on alternatives after a check of community customers for such equipment.

"If other communities are doing this, I will invest in some stock in generating equipment companies, very fast," Doehrlert said of stand-by equipment proposed for use in major power failures.

Street division improvements include replacement of incandescent with mercury lamps at a cost of \$32,500, with mercury vapor street lights lasting five years, and the program to be completed by 1970, Stiff said.

## Honorary Degrees Presented Monday With Convocation

Acting-President Shirley Addresses Record 6,500 Undergraduates on Campus

At the university's traditional convocation officially opening the 1967-68 academic year last Monday, two honorary degrees were conferred and Dr. John W. Shirley, acting-president, told a record number of some 6,500 undergraduates, and 500 faculty and staff members that "On this campus, our first responsibility is to teaching and learning. Our earnest desire is to have both of the highest possible quality."

Honorary degrees were presented to Daniel F. Wolcott, chief justice of the Supreme Court of Delaware, and Walter M. Whitehill, of the Boston Athenaeum. Whitehill gave the convocation address.

The citation conferring the honorary degree of doctor of laws on Judge Wolcott reads:

"Distinguished citizen of Delaware, you have, for two decades, graced its bar and its bench by the wise and exemplary practice of your chosen profession."

"You served your country in World War II, in both the Army and the Navy."

"A director of the Historical Society of Delaware and a trustee of the New Castle County, you have helped preserve the rich culture and history of this state and awakened in its citizens a deeper appreciation of your venerable heritage."

"A member, director, and twice president of the University of Delaware Library Associates, you have, through the contribution of your time, energies, considerable talents, and graceful wit, helped to enlarge and enrich the collection of the university's library."

"Your interest in and concern for education at all levels and the confidence of your fellow citizens resulted in your appointment as chairman of the governor's committee on education, whose forward-looking blueprint for the future of Delaware's schools is known as the Wolcott Report."

"For a career dedicated to the highest ideals of the legal profession, for exemplary citizenship, for the preservation and dissemination of history and culture and for the advancement of education in your native state, a grateful university commends you."

## Judith A. Smith In Munich Study As College Student

Judith A. Smith, 203 Saturn Drive, Newark, a student at Rockford College, will begin a year of study this fall under Wayne State University's Junior Year in Munich program.

Ninety-one students from 50 American universities are participating in the program this year. They will arrive in Rotterdam, Sept. 26, and tour the Netherlands and Germany for orientation and language study before beginning the fall term at the University of Munich on Nov. 1.

The Munich program was founded in 1953 by the late John Ebelke, professor of German at WSU, and is now the largest European study program of its kind sponsored by an American university.

The program features courses in philosophy, psychology, history, art, music, languages and literature—all taught in German.

In addition to attending large group lectures typical of European universities, students live in dormitories and private homes and study and travel on their own.

The 1967-68 junior year session will end in July.

## Delaware Outlet For Landlocked Colleges Weighed

Congressional Delegation Offers University Marine Lab Aid In Oceanography

The University of Delaware might find an outlet to the sea for landlocked colleges interested in oceanography, it was indicated this week.

This was one possibility suggested at a meeting arranged by Delaware's congressional delegation for officials of the university and representatives of federal agencies involved in oceanography programs.

Dr. G. Franklin Daiber, acting director of the university's marine laboratories, commented on the many inquiries received this summer from inland schools wanting to take advantage of Delaware's marine field station at Lewes.

Stacey Hicks, chief of the oceanography division of the Environmental Sciences Services Administration, suggested that this is a potential Delaware might develop, as Duke University has done further down the Atlantic coast.

During the two-hour meeting in Sen. J. Caleb Boggs' office, university and federal agency representatives explored facets of the expanding study of oceanography.

Dr. George M. Worrlow, university vice-president, called the meeting "productive."

Others present from the university were Dr. G. Fred Somers, chairman of the department of biological sciences, and Dr. Kent Price, field station director of the marine laboratories at Lewes.

Senator Boggs, on behalf of Sen. John J. Williams and Rep. William V. Roth, Jr., said Delaware's congressional delegation is anxious to help the university in its effort to expand its oceanography program.

## Postmaster F. Allyn Cooch, Jr. Retires After 16-Yrs. Service

Appointed Successor To Cyrus E. Rittenhouse In 1951, By President Truman, Cooch Heads U.S. Post Office Growth In Newark With Staff Increase From 25 to 120

Newark postmaster since February, 1951—F. Allyn Cooch, Jr., retired Sept. 8, after more than 16 years of local post office direction. Charles S. Hopkins, supervisor of mails, is in charge of the U.S. Post Office at Newark until presidential appointment of a postmaster as Cooch's successor.

During Postmaster Cooch's term of office in Newark, the post office staff has increased from 25 to 120 persons, and from a long central post office at Main and Center Streets, facilities have been added to include a new central post office at the Newark Shopping Center; the Main Street building as a branch office; and four smaller branch offices in area pharmacies—at Ballard's in Brookside; Chestnut Hill in Odontown; Caldwell's in Meadowdale; and Cappelletti's at the Park 'n' Shop Center.

## Delaware Graduate

A native of Wilmington, Cooch graduated from Peckskill Military Academy in New York, and from the University of Delaware with a BS in agriculture in 1921.

He taught vocational agriculture and biology at A. I. du Pont High School until 1923; was an agent with Continental American Life Insurance Co. until 1928; and assistant of the Equitable Life Insurance Co. in Wilmington until 1938.

Manager of the Delaware State Employment unit in Wilmington until 1939, he was area manager for the Delaware census of 1940, and state director of employment for Western Pennsylvania until 1942.

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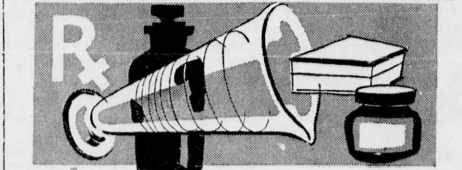

## Author, Physicist F. W. Van Name, Jr. Dies In Brooklyn

Author of three textbooks, and former Newark resident, Dr. Frederick Warren Van Name, Jr., 46, died last Thursday in Long Island, College Hospital, Brooklyn, N.Y., after a brief illness.

Chairman of the department of physics at Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, Dr. Van Name was chairman of the University of Delaware physics department from 1957 to 1962.

After undergraduate work at Swarthmore, he received his PhD in physics at Yale University. A second lieutenant in the U.S. Naval Reserve from 1943 to 1946, he was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and a leader in the Newark Little League program.

Dr. Van Name was a member of the American Association of University Professors, the American Physical Society, of Sigma Xi and Sigma Phi Sigma, and listed in "American Men in Science," "Who's Who in America," and "Who's Who in the World."

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Jeanne Robinson Van Name of Brooklyn; two sons, Frederick W. III and Theodore G., and a daughter, Patricia F., at 247 West Main Street, Newark; his father, Frederick W., and his stepmother, Mrs. Katherine D. Van Name of Haddon, Conn.

Traffic signals including Lum-brook, Main Street at the Senior Center; Rt. 896 and Chestnut Hill Road; Casho Mill Road at the elementary school; and overall synchronization, were approved at a cost of \$40,000.

Acquisition of rights of way for the outer beltway at Hunting Hills, and for extension of Apple Road to Barksdale Road at a cost of \$12,000 each, and for New London Road reconstruction from Cleveland Avenue to the city line at a cost of \$50,000 were approved.

**New London Road Project**  
Concerning New London Road reconstruction, Councilman Olan R. Thomas said that he understood the State Highway Department was to "start in 1968," although Newark's capital expenditures were budgeted for 1969. Public Works Director Benjamin J. Campagna said that "1969 was the last report."

Councilman William E. Frame pointed out that the city's expenditure for this reconstruction was 25 percent of the total, with the state bearing the balance.

Coverdale urged extension of Cleveland Avenue to Woodland, stating "the people were promised this by-pass," and Finance Director Albert K. Martin replied that \$42,000 is in the reserve fund for this, but the city solicitor had been instructed by council to defer land condemnation action.

Councilman Arthur P. Mayer proposed extending Marrows Road to Woodland.

"Newark is stranding in traffic," Mayer said, citing a required "half-hour to cross town now that college is back in session." He urged that this project be included in next April's referendum. A report is to be presented Oct. 9.

## Design, Decision Computer Courses Offered This Fall

Five courses on computer applications to decision-making and engineering design are being offered by the University of Delaware this fall.

The series is presented cooperatively by the university department of statistics and computer science, office of technical services, and division of university extension.

The decision-making course will meet for two hours on Wednesdays for 12 weeks, beginning at 7 p.m., Sept. 27.

Designed to assist technical managers, the course will include problem recognition and formulation for computer solution; system analysis; information storage and manipulation; statistical and probabilistic studies; and problem model construction.

The other four—each geared to a specific engineering branch—will begin meeting the week of Oct. 2 for two hours each week for five weeks from 7 to 9 p.m.

Each section will cover a discussion of computers, their types and capabilities, and presentation of typical examples of commercially available programs used for optimum design purposes.

Monday nights are for chemical engineers; Tuesdays for mechanical and aerospace engineers; Wednesdays civil engineers; and Thursdays for electrical engineers.

Registration details for the five computer courses can be obtained by writing or calling the extension division, at 79 Amstel Avenue, Newark.

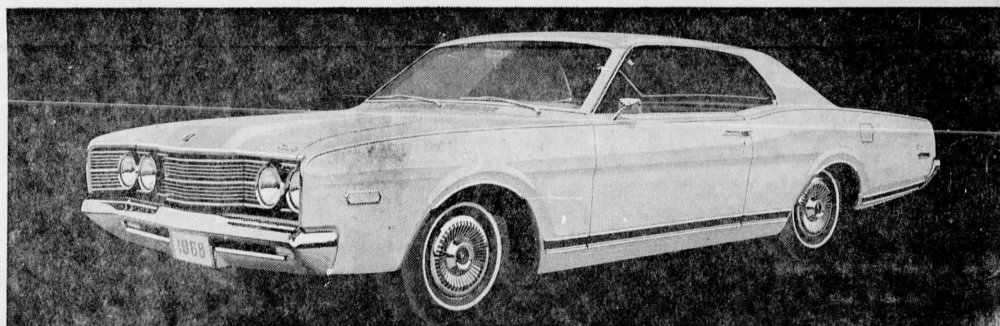

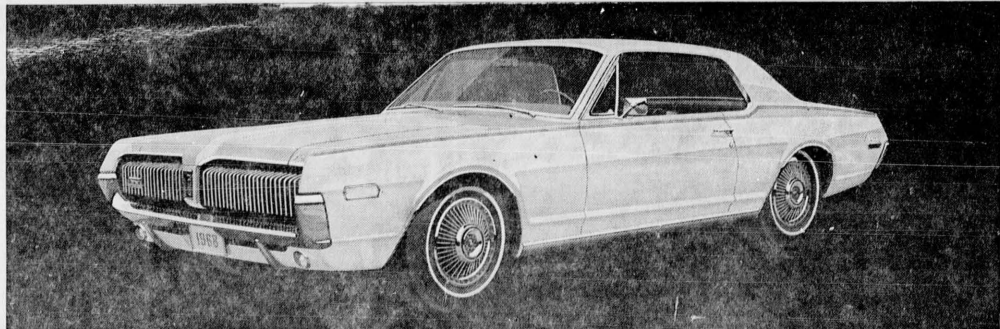

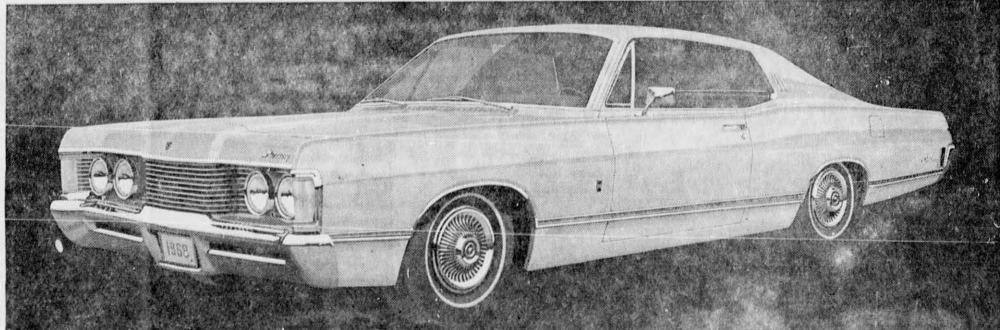

## Ex-Yellowjacket Lee Hackney With Hens Provides Strength As Star Linebacker

Linebacker is probably the most solid position on the Delaware football team as it enters its final week of practice before Saturday's season opener, and Newark's Lee Hackney—former Yellowjacket co-captain and fullback—is one of the solid reasons. Hackney, as one of two returning starters, and a pair of promising sophomores make up the linebacking corps as the Blue Hens prepare for Saturday's opening game with Rhode Island in Delaware Stadium.

"We feel that our linebacking will be more than adequate," Blue Hen Line Coach Ed Maley says. "Lee Hackney and Bill Laughlin should both benefit from the experience they gained last year and we have high hopes for both John Favero and Dave Klingner."

Hackney, a senior, was the Blue Hens' regular left linebacker last year, and one of the Hens' most consistent performers. The stocky 210-pounder could play on either the right or left side this year.

"We will have a lot of younger players on the defensive unit this year, particularly in the line," Maley notes. "We are counting on Lee to provide some leadership up front."

Laughlin, a 200-pound junior from Central Catholic High School in Pittsburgh, moved right into the starting lineup last year as a sophomore and developed rapidly as the Hens' middle linebacker.

"Bill did a fine job for us last season, improving with each game," Maley says. "We expect him to continue to develop this year and he could be one of the top linebackers in the conference."

Maley and Head Coach Tobby Raymond are relying on the sophomores to replace Little All-American Herb Slattery at right linebacker.

Favero, a 208-pound product of Paramus, N.J., took over the job

during spring drills and has been working with the first defensive unit all fall.

Klingner, a 195-pounder from Woodbury Heights, N.J., has been the fourth linebacker during pre-season practice and could fill in anywhere.

"Favero has been doing a fine job for us," Maley notes. "He has good size and quickness, but he needs the game experience. Klingner has been coming along very well and could break in somewhere."

Two players who have regular jobs elsewhere in the lineup also have been working with the linebackers. John Miller, 195-pound senior from Westmont, N.J., is probably the Blue Hens' top defensive end, but he also provides depth at linebacker.

"John is very versatile and could play almost anywhere," Maley says. "He is a top defensive end and is a second level offensive fullback and linebacker."

Bob Novotny, junior from Maplewood, N.J., can play linebacker in addition to his duties as regular right guard on the offensive unit.

Two relatives of former Blue Hen standouts have earned starting spots in the defensive secondary with strong performances during pre-season practice sessions.

Joe Purzycki, brother of Delaware pass receiving record holder Mike, will start at cornerback for the Hens. The younger Purzycki, a sophomore from Newark, N.J., was a standout for the Delaware freshman team last year as a spread receiver and defensive back. He has been running with the first unit defensively since the start of the spring drills.

Dick Keller, a sophomore from Columbusiana, O., is the other newcomer in the backfield with family ties to Delaware. Keller, a 190-pound safetyman, is the brother-in-law of former Hen backfield ace Jack Itzick.

"Dick reminds us of Jack in that he is a good, solid tackler," Backfield Coach Mickey Heineken notes. "He is a little bigger than Jack, and could develop into the same type of aggressive player."

Both Purzycki and Keller have excellent credentials.

Purzycki was All-State, All-Essex County, All-Orange and All-Conference at Our Lady of the Valley High School in East Orange, N.J., and All-Prep at Bordentown Military Institute before coming to Delaware.

Keller was All-County and All-Tri-County at Columbusiana High School.

The two sophomores will join Capt. Art Smith of Vineland, N.J., and Junior Chuck McCallion of New Castle, in the defensive backfield.

Merkel left West Point after attending the military academy for two months.
